Under administrative supervision, responsible for implementing international trade development workforce and economic development operations as the Deputy Sector Navigator-Global Trade in accordance with the goals and objectives of the California Community College Chancellor's Office, Workforce and Economic Development Division's Doing What Matters Initiative.

REPRESENTATIVE DUTIES

Works collaboratively with Statewide Sector Navigator and Deputy Sector Navigators in other regions, and with the Regional Consortium chairs to align the needs of sector employers with the programs and curricula offered by the colleges in the regional consortium. Works with individual colleges in the region to develop faculty collaboratives, connect international education and global trade programs and employers, and promote and strengthen curriculum and program alignment. Works with employers, industry and international education and global trade organizations and Workforce Investment Boards to determine workforce gaps. Promotes integration of workforce training and employment. Strengthens programs within the Global Trade Sector at regional colleges and high schools, through such activities, including but not limited to, career exploration, career pathways, international education and dual enrollment. Provides incumbent worker training and promotes opportunities for contract education. Promotes faculty professional growth and internationalization of curriculum. Identifies and prioritizes gaps in the workforce, and develops strategies to address them. Works with representatives of business, labor and professional trade associations to develop and implement courses and programs to train incumbent workers in the regional industry sector. Provides counseling and technical assistance on international trade to small business owners and individuals starting international businesses. This counseling and technical assistance will include, but not be limited to: assisting with identification and choice of distributors; matching buyers and sellers; assisting with contract negotiation, strategic planning for future business expansion, and possible avenues of finance. Marketing counseling in such areas as: 1) identifying international market niches; 2) market research; 3) access to international market studies; 4) market plan; 5) advertising and public relations; 6) product display; and 7) cooperative marketing. Supervise budget, auditing timelines, and evaluations. Develops and maintains international referral services. Establish formal agreements and delineate specific services and roles with other entities providing similar services, such as California Export Finance Office, US Department of Commerce, and Small Business Development Centers in the area. Recruit, train and schedule a cadre of consultants to provide services. Maintains close liaison with local, state and federal lending sources for small businesses involved in international trade. Serves on appropriate business and educational committees at the local and state level. Conducts classes and/or workshops as appropriate. Prepares reports to funding sources and college administration, and participates in the preparation of grant applications. Establishes and maintains administration

planning/organizational procedures in accordance with state codes and related laws. Prepares a variety of reports, agendas, proposals and agreements as required. Assists in establishing continuing funding sources. Maintains appropriate computerized records that document services provided. Collects and reports data on all required accountability measures working with commen metrics and accountability measures, and working with the statewide LaunchBoard initiative. Performs other duties as required to implement the project work plan and to meet grant requirements and conditions.

ORGANIZATIONAL RELATIONSHIPS

This position reports to the Assistant Vice Chancellor Educational Services and manages the Deputy Sector Navigator-Global Trade grant program and supervises the program's staff.

RANCHO SANTIAGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT EDUCATIONAL ADMINISTRATOR EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

- 1. Parties. The Rancho Santiago Community College District ("District"), on the one hand, and Janneth Linnell ("Administrator"), on the other hand, hereby enter into this Educational Administrator Employment Agreement ("Agreement") pursuant to sub-section "a" of Section 72411 of the Education Code. District and Administrator are referred to herein individually as "Party" and collectively as "Parties."
- 2. <u>Position</u>. District hereby employs Administrator in the position of Executive Director, Child Development Services ("Position"). Administrator is an "academic employee" as defined in sub-section "a" of Section 87001 of the Education Code, is an "educational administrator" as defined in sub-section "b" of Section 87002 of the Education Code, and is a "management employee" as defined in sub-section "g" of Section 3540.1 of the Government Code.
- 3. <u>Term.</u> District agrees to employ Administrator, and Administrator agrees to serve in the Position, for the period commencing August 19, 2013 and ending June 30, 2015. If, prior to June 30 of any other year other than the last year of this Agreement the District does not send or deliver a written notice to Administrator that this Agreement shall not be extended for an additional year, then this Agreement automatically shall be extended for one more year. Any notice of non-reemployment in the position must be given by the District at least six (6) months in advance of the date of termination of this Agreement. If notice of non-reemployment is not given by the District at least six (6) months in advance of the date of termination of this Agreement, then the Agreement shall be extended for one (1) additional year pursuant to Education Code Section 72411(c).
- 4. <u>General Terms and Conditions of Employment</u>. This Agreement is subject to all applicable laws of the State of California, the regulations of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges, and the rules, regulations, policies, and procedures of the District. These laws, rules, regulations, policies, and procedures, which may be amended, augmented, or repealed from time-to-time, are incorporated into this Agreement.
- 5. <u>Duties and Responsibilities</u>. Administrator agrees to perform all of the duties, and accepts all of the responsibilities, as specified in the job description for the Position, and all duties and responsibilities which may be delegated or assigned to Administrator by the Board of Trustees, the Chancellor, or any supervising administrators. Administrator is expected to devote full efforts and energies to the Position. At any time during the term of this Agreement, the Board of Trustees may adopt or amend the job description for the Position. Administrator may undertake outside professional activities, including consulting, speaking, and writing, either with or without compensation, provided that such activities do not impair the effectiveness of Administrator or interfere with Administrator's duties. In those cases in which Administrator engages in outside professional activities which generate compensation for services provided, Administrator shall utilize vacation days.
- 6. Transfer, Reassignment, or Title Change. The Chancellor, with the approval of the Board of Trustees, may transfer or reassign Administrator to any position within the District for which Administrator is qualified, and may change the title of the Position, during the Page 1 of 5

term of this Agreement, but there shall be no loss of compensation by Administrator due to such discretionary transfer, reassignment, or title change.

- 598,397.41 per academic year (July 1 through June 30), pro-rated if less than a full academic year, paid on a monthly basis. District reserves the right to increase the salary of Administrator during the term of this Agreement, but any such increase shall not be construed as an indication that this Agreement will be renewed or extended. Administrator agrees that District also reserves the right to decrease the salary of Administrator during the term of this Agreement as long as such decrease, on a percentage basis, is no more than what is implemented on a general basis for regular, full-time faculty of the District. Administrator is an exempt employee and is not eligible for overtime pay or compensatory time off.
- 8. <u>Work Year</u>. Administrator is a full-time employee of the District with a work year of 12 months per year. Administrator is entitled to be absent during District-designated holidays.
- 9. <u>Health and Welfare Benefits</u>. District shall provide Administrator with the same health and welfare benefits as currently approved or as subsequently modified by the Board of Trustees for all District administrators.
- 10. <u>Vacation</u>. Administrator shall accrue two and one-quarter vacation days for each month of service. Administrator may not accumulate more than 54 days of unused vacation as of July 1 of any academic year.
- 11. <u>Leaves</u>. Administrator shall be entitled to leaves of absence as provided by law or Board Policy, as may be amended from time-to-time.
- 12. <u>Teaching Assignments</u>. Subject to Board approval, and presuming that Administrator meets minimum qualifications, Administrator may serve as an instructor in no more than one class per semester for additional compensation, provided that such teaching does not impair Administrator's service in the Position.
- 13. <u>Professional Meetings and Activities</u>. Prior approval by the Chancellor shall be obtained for Administrator to attend any meeting or activity related to Administrator's employment in the Position. The reasonable and necessary expenses of attendance by Administrator at such a meeting or activity shall be paid by District only if approved by the Chancellor and the Board of Trustees.
- 14. <u>Evaluation</u>. Administrator shall be evaluated in writing at any time by Administrator's immediate supervisor, pursuant to Board Policy and procedures, utilizing established goals and objectives, self-assessments, the job description for the Position, and input from other employees.
- 15. Retreat Rights. If Administrator's first date of paid service was prior to July 1, 1990, Administrator's rights to faculty tenure are governed by the laws of the State of California in effect as of June 30, 1990. The retreat rights for Administrator, if hired on or after July 1, 1990, and if Administrator does not have faculty tenure in the District, shall be in accordance with Section 87458 of the Education Code. Administrator has the responsibility to present the

necessary transcripts and materials to District pursuant to Board policy and procedures in order to maintain any current faculty service area or acquire faculty service areas.

- 16. Return to Tenured Faculty Position. If Administrator has tenure in the District, and if Administrator has not been dismissed pursuant to Section 20 of this Agreement, then Administrator will be entitled to return to a tenured faculty position upon termination or expiration of this Agreement.
- Pursuant to Section 72411.5 of the Education Code, if Administrator does not have faculty tenure in the District, then the grounds for dismissal or for imposition of penalties on Administrator during the term of this Agreement shall be dishonesty, insubordination, incompetence, unsatisfactory performance, unprofessional conduct, inability to perform, persistent or serious violation of law or of Board Policy or procedures, or any material and substantial breach of this Agreement. Administrator shall be entitled to due process protections as required by law.
- 18. <u>Dismissal or Imposition of Penalties During the Term of this Agreement If</u>
 <u>Tenured</u>. Pursuant to Section 72411.5 of the *Education Code*, if Administrator has faculty tenure in the District, then the grounds for dismissal or for imposition of penalties on Administrator during the term of this Agreement shall be in accordance with the statutory provisions applicable to tenured faculty members as set forth in Section 87732 of the *Education Code*. Administrator shall be entitled to due process protections as required by law.
- 19. Resignation. Administrator may resign from District employment at any time during the term of this Agreement upon 90 days prior written notice to the Board of Trustees, or upon a shorter period of time as may be approved by the Board of Trustees.
- 20. <u>Buy-Out of Agreement</u>. Pursuant to Section 53260 of the *Government Code*, except if District terminates this Agreement pursuant to Sections 17 or 18 of this Agreement, the maximum cash settlement that Administrator may receive shall be an amount equal to the monthly salary of Administrator multiplied by the number of months left on the unexpired term of this Agreement. However, if the unexpired term of this Agreement is greater than 18 months, the maximum cash settlement shall be an amount equal to the monthly salary of Administrator multiplied by 18. Any cash settlement shall not include any other non-cash items except health benefits which may be continued for the same duration of time as covered in the settlement or until Administrator finds other employment, whichever comes first. If the unexpired term is greater than 18 months, then the maximum time for continued health benefits paid for by District shall be 18 months.
- Administrator agrees to undergo a comprehensive physical and/or psychiatric examination to determine if Administrator is able, with or without reasonable accommodation, to perform the essential functions of the Position. The costs of any such examination shall be paid for by District. A confidential written report regarding any such examination shall be filed with the Board of Trustees or the Chancellor indicating whether Administrator is able, with or without reasonable accommodation, to perform the essential functions of the Position.

- 22. <u>Severability</u>. If any provision of this Agreement is ruled to be contrary to law, all other provisions of this Agreement shall continue to remain in full force and effect.
- 23. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement contains the entire agreement and understanding between the Parties. There are no terms, conditions, or oral understandings not contained in this Agreement.
- 24. <u>Amendment.</u> This Agreement may be modified or superseded only by a written amendment executed by both Parties.
- 25. Mandatory Mediation and Arbitration. Except as otherwise prohibited by law, the Parties agree that any dispute, claim, or controversy arising out of the Parties' employment relationship, including, but not limited to, alleged violations of federal, state, or local statutes, including those prohibiting harassment and discrimination, and any other claims, including alleged violations of any provisions of the Education Code, which cannot be resolved through informal and confidential discussions, shall be submitted to mediation, and if mediation if unsuccessful, to binding arbitration before a neutral Arbitrator. The mediator and any necessary Arbitrator shall be selected through Judicial Arbitration & Mediation Services/Endispute (JAMS). Attachment "A" to this Agreement sets forth the procedures to be utilized and is hereby incorporated by reference into this Agreement as if fully set forth within. The Parties agree that they have carefully read Attachment "A," knowingly agree to all of its contents, and knowingly agree to the covenant to mediate and arbitrate all employment disputes contained in Attachment "A".
- 26. Ratification. The Parties agree that this Agreement is not binding or enforceable unless and until it is duly ratified by the Board of Trustees.

ATTACHMENT "A"

ALTERNATIVE DISPUTE RESOLUTION PROCEDURE

Covenant to Mediate And Arbitrate All Employment Disputes. We, the undersigned, do hereby agree and covenant to submit all manner of causes of action, controversies, differences, claims or demands of any kind relating to or growing out of this contract of employment to a two-step dispute resolution process administered by Judicial Arbitration & Mediation Services/Endispute (hereinafter "J.A.M.S."). This two-step process shall begin with mediation before a retired judge or justice from the J.A.M.S. panel followed, if necessary, by binding arbitration before the same or another retired judge or justice from the J.A.M.S. panel to be agreed upon. The Employee and the District hereby agree that any dispute, claim or controversy arising out of the employment relationship, including, but not limited to, alleged violations of the individual Employment Agreement, alleged violation(s) of federal, state and/or local statutes, including those prohibiting harassment and discrimination, (Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 as amended; The Age Discrimination In Employment Act; The Americans With Disabilities Act; The Equal Pay Act, The Civil Rights Acts of 1866, 1871 and 1991; Title IX in 20 U.S.C. section 1681; The Rehabilitation Act of 1983; The Fair Employment and Housing Act, etc.) and any other claims, including alleged violations of any federal and/or state constitutional provisions and of any provisions in the Education Code, which cannot be resolved through informal and confidential discussions, SHALL BE SUBMITTED TO MEDIATION, AND IF MEDIATION IS UNSUCCESSFUL, TO BINDING ARBITRATION BEFORE A NEUTRAL ARBITRATOR. The parties to this agreement fully and completely understand that the effect of this agreement will result in the waiver of any right to trial by jury that may otherwise have been available to the parties absent this agreement and also waiver of any right to appeal. With this understanding, the parties freely, knowingly and voluntarily enter into this agreement with knowledge of it consequences including the waiver of trial by jury and the waiver of any right to appeal.

Step 1 Mediation.

Initiating Mediation. Any party to this agreement may demand mediation by serving a written demand in person or by registered, certified or federal express mail and also serving a copy of the demand and of the dispute resolution agreement on the Chief Operating Officer, Operations Manager or Contract Dispute Resolution Administrator at the nearest or most convenient office of J.A.M.S, within thirty (30) calendar days of an act or omission causing a dispute between the parties. The written demand shall set forth the names, addresses, telephone number and fax numbers of all parties to the contract of employment and brief synopsis of the claim, controversy, difference, or disputed matters and a proposed solution to the problem.

Selection of Mediator. Within ten (10) days of service of the demand upon J.A.M.S., the Administrator will contact all interested parties to select a mutually agreeable mediator. If the parties have no particular mediator in mind, or cannot agree on a mediator, the Administrator will submit a list of mediators, and their resumes numbering one more than there are parties.

Each party may then strike one name and the Administrator will designate the mediator from the list of remaining names.

Enforcement of Agreement. Failure of any party to participate in this mediation process or to designate or strike a name for mediator will not operate to delay or prevent this mediation process. The parties hereby agree that the mediation provisions of this agreement may be enforced by the same manner as an arbitration agreement. The mediation provisions may be enforced by petition to any court or general jurisdiction for the appointment of a mediator in the same manner as a petition for the appointment of an arbitrator. Further the parties agree the court may award attorneys fees and costs to the prevailing party in any proceeding to enforce this mediation agreement.

Hearings — Scheduling/Parties Present. After the mediator has been selected, the parties shall promptly agree upon a date and time for the initial conference with the mediator, but no later than thirty (30) days after the date the mediator was selected. The parties understand and agree that, besides counsel retained at each party's own expense, a representative from each side with full settlement authority will be present at all mediation conferences unless excused by the mediator. In addition, each party may bring such additional persons as needed to respond to questions, contribute information and participate in the negotiations. The number of additional persons may be agreed upon in advance with the assistance and advice of the mediator.

Discovery. In the event any party has substantial need for information in the possession of another party to prepare for the mediation conference(s), the parties shall attempt in good faith to agree upon procedures for the expeditious exchange of information with the help if the mediator, if required. The parties will have no right to formal discovery at this time.

Position Papers. No later than one week before the first scheduled mediation session, each party shall deliver a concise written summary of its position together with any appropriate documents, views and a proposed solution to the matters in controversy to the mediator and also serve a copy on all other parties.

Participation by Mediator. Once familiar with the case, the mediator will, if requested by the parties, given an opinion of the probable outcome of the case and the range of value, both in terms of settlement and arbitration hearing, if the matter were to be litigated before an arbitrator. The mediator will, without an instruction from the parties to the contrary, give recommendations on terms of possible settlement conditions to be imposed upon the parties (if appropriate). The mediator's opinion shall be based on the material and information then available to all parties, excluding any information given to the mediator in confidence during a separate caucus. The opinions and recommendations of the mediator are not binding on the parties.

Fees and Costs. The fees and costs of the mediation shall conform to the then current fee schedule at J.A.M.S. and, in the absence of an agreement to the contrary, will be borne by the District.

Confidentiality of Proceedings. The mediation process is to be considered settlement negotiation for the purpose of all state and federal rules protecting disclosures made during such conferences from later discovery or use in evidence. The parties hereto agree that the provisions of California Evidence Code § 1119 shall apply to any mediation conducted hereunder. Subdivisions (a), (b), and (c) of California Evidence Code § 1119 provide as follows:

Except as otherwise provided in this chapter:

- (a) No evidence of anything said or any admissions made for the purpose of, in the course of, or pursuant to, a mediation or a mediation consultation is admissible or subject to discovery, and disclosure of the evidence shall not be compelled, in any arbitration, administrative adjudication, civil action, or other noncriminal proceeding in which, pursuant to law, testimony can be compelled to be given.
- (b) No writing, as defined in Section 250, that is prepared for the purpose of, in the course of, or pursuant to, a mediation or a mediation consultation, is admissible, or subject to discovery, and disclosure of the writing shall not be compelled, in any arbitration, administrative adjudication, civil action, or other noncriminal proceeding in which, pursuant to law, testimony can be compelled to be given.
- (c) All communications, negotiations, or settlement discussions by and between participants in the course of a mediation or a mediation consultation shall remain confidential.

The entire procedure is confidential, and no stenographic or other record shall be made except to memorialize a settlement record. All conduct, statements, promises, offers, views and opinions, oral or written, made during the mediation by any party or a party's agent, employee, or attorney are confidential. No fact used or referenced in the mediation or settlement process will be inadmissible or non-discoverable simply because it was used or referenced in the mediation process.

Termination of Mediation Process. The mediation process shall continue until the matter is resolved or the mediator makes a good faith finding that all settlement possibilities have been exhausted and there is no possibility of resolution, short of referring the matter to the adjudication phase of this dispute resolution process. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the employee or the District may terminate the mediation process after the mediator has incurred fourteen (14) hours of time on the process.

Step 2. Arbitration

Should any disputes remain existent between the parties after completion of the mediation resolution process set forth above, then the parties shall, within thirty (30) calendar days after termination of the mediation process, submit such disputes to binding arbitration administered by J.A.M.S.

Initiating Arbitration. Arbitration shall be initiated in the following manner:

- a. Unless barred by the statute of limitations, any party bound by this arbitration agreement may initiate an arbitration at any time after mediation procedures as hereinabove described have been exhausted by serving, as in a civil action, all parties with notice of the nature of the claim and a demand for arbitration. A claim shall be waived and forever barred if on the date the demand for arbitration is received, the claim, if asserted in a civil action, would be barred by the applicable state (federal) statute of limitations, and
- b. The claimant shall file a copy of the Demand for Arbitration and Notice of Claim at any regional office of J.A.M.S., together with the appropriate filing fee as provided in the existing fee schedule.
- c. If the responding party desires to file a response and/or counterclaim, they must do so within thirty (30) days of service of the demand. Failure to file a counterclaim or response will not operate to delay the arbitration proceedings.
- d. After the filing of the claim, response and counterclaim, no further claims or counterclaims may be made except on motion to the arbitrator.

Appointment and Powers of Arbitrator. The case shall be submitted to a single arbitrator chosen by the parties from a list of retired judges and justices at J.A.M.S. Should the parties be unable to agree on a choice of arbitrator within thirty (30) days from the demand for arbitration, then either party may request the Contract Arbitration Administrator at said service to furnish a list of three names and each side may strike one name, thereby nominating the remaining person as replacement arbitrator. If more than one name remains, the Contract Arbitration Administrator of J.A.M.S. will choose an arbitrator from the list of remaining names.

If the designated arbitrator shall die, become incapable of, unwilling to, or unable to serve or proceed with the arbitration, the party or parties appointing said arbitrator shall have the power to appoint another in his or her stead under the procedures prescribed herein, and such substituted arbitrator shall have all such powers as if he or she had been originally appointed herein.

The arbitrator shall have full power to make such regulations and to give such orders and directions in all respects, as he or she shall deem expedient, as well as in respect to the matters and differences referred to them and also with respect to the mode and times of executing and performing any of the acts, deeds, matters, and things which may be awarded or directed to be done.

Should either party refuse or neglect to appoint said arbitrator or to furnish the arbitrator with any papers or information demanded, the arbitrator is empowered by both parties to proceed exparte.

The arbitrator shall have the authority and power to request the production of any books or records in the possession or control of either of the parties and to order that either party shall in the meantime have access to and be permitted to inspect and take copies of all or any of the same relating to the matters in difference. This authority and power is subject to, and no greater than, the provisions for document discovery in the California Civil Procedure Code, is subject to appropriate objections by either party, and in no way extends to privileged or protected materials.

The arbitrator shall have the authority and power to proceed ex parte in the event that either party shall fail, after reasonable notice, to attend hearings before him or her.

The arbitrator may grant any remedy or relief that the arbitrator deems just and equitable and within the scope of the agreement of the parties, including, but not limited to, specific performance of a contract. An arbitrator may include an injunction or orders for specific performance of part or all of an award.

Costs and Fees. Each party shall be responsible for its own costs and expense of the arbitration, and the costs and fees of J.A.M.S. shall be borne by the District.

Pre-Hearing. Once the arbitrator is chosen, the Contract Arbitration Administrator at J.A.M.S. may be authorized and directed upon application of any party to schedule a pre-hearing conference with the arbitrator for the purpose of narrowing the issues, establishing a discovery schedule, arranging an acceptable procedure for any law and motion proceedings and in all respects arranging for the most expeditious hearing possible of the matters in dispute.

Discovery. Discovery shall be at the discretion of the arbitrator and allowed only upon a showing of good cause, utilizing the following guidelines:

- (a) The arbitrator shall have discretion to order pre-hearing exchange of information, including but not limited to, the production of requested documents and exchanges of summaries of testimony of proposed witnesses.
- (b) The deposition of the claimant(s) and respondent(s) shall be allowed as a matter of right. One set of form interrogatories approved by the Judicial Council shall be allowed. There shall be an early and prompt designation and exchange of the names and addresses of expert witnesses who may be called upon to testify at the arbitration hearing. The experts' depositions and all other discovery including additional depositions shall be allowed only upon a showing of good cause. It shall in no event exceed the discovery permitted by the California Code of Civil Procedure.

Evidence. Judicial Rules relating to the Order of Proof, the conduct of the hearing and the presentation and admissibility of evidence will not be applicable in this proceeding. Any relevant evidence, including hearsay, shall be admitted by the arbitrator if it is the sort of evidence upon which responsible persons are accustomed to rely in the conduct of serious affairs, regardless of the admissibility of such evidence in a court of law.

Time Limits. The award shall be made in writing by the arbitrator on or before the thirtieth day following the conclusion of the arbitration.

Reasoned Opinion. In rendering the award, the arbitrator must set forth the findings of fact and the conclusion(s) based thereon.

Applicable Law. The arbitration shall follow the substantive law of California and any relevant federal law. This shall include the provisions of statutory law dealing with arbitration, as it may exist at the time of the demand for arbitration, insofar as said provisions are not in conflict with this agreement and specifically excepting therefrom sections of the statutory law dealing with discovery and sections requiring notice of hearing date by registered or certified mail.

Notice. Each party shall be deemed to have consented that any papers, notices or process necessary or proper for the initiation or continuation of an arbitration under these rules; for any court action in connection therewith; or for the entry of judgement on any award made under these rules, may be served on a party by mail, addressed to the party or representative at the last known address, or by personal service, provided that reasonable opportunity to be heard with regard thereto has been granted to the party. The arbitrator and/or the parties may consent to the use of FAX transmission, e-mail, or other written forms or electronic communication to give the notices required by these rules.

Finality of Award. The award of the arbitrator shall be final and binding upon the parties without appeal or review except as permitted by the arbitration laws of California. Application may be had by any party to any court of general jurisdiction for entry and enforcement of judgment based on said award.

BACKGROUND

The Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program was introduced in the fall of 2001. Speech-language pathology assistants are trained to assist in the language and speech development of communicatively disordered children and adults in educational and medical sites under the supervision of licensed speech-language pathologists. Critical to the implementation of the program is identifying and confirming sites and contractual arrangements for observation and fieldwork.

ANALYSIS

Formal agreements between the district and fieldwork experience sites are necessary. To that end, a special agreement document has been developed for this purpose. This clinical affiliation agreement covers the scope of program operations at the facility, as well as insurance and other issues relating to the liability of both parties. This agreement shall be effective for five (5) years or until termination by written notice of either party. The agreement has been reviewed by Dean Simon B. Hoffman and college staff. It carries no costs or other financial arrangements.

AGREEMENT

Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into by and between the Rancho Santiago Community College District on behalf of Santa Ana College, a public educational agency, hereinafter called the District and, **SADDLEBACK UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT** hereinafter called the Agency.

PART I.

BASIS AND PURPOSE OF AGREEMENT

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the District and Agency acknowledge a public obligation to contribute to Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program education for the benefit of students and to meet community needs.

WHEREAS, the District provides programs in Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program education, which require clinical experience for students enrolled in these programs.

WHEREAS, the Agency has facilities suitable for the clinical needs of the District Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program.

WHEREAS, it is to benefit of both District and Agency that Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program students have opportunities for clinical experience to enhance their capabilities as practitioners.

NOW, THEREFORE, the District and Facility do covenant and agree as follows:

PART II. GENERAL RESPONSIBILITIES AND PRIVILEGES OF THE DISTRICT

- A. For the Program in General
 - 1. The District will assume full responsibility for offering Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program education programs eligible for approval by the Speech-Language Pathology & Audiology Board.
 - 2. For Student Workers' Compensation

The District shall carry Workers' Compensation Insurance on Students of the District during clinical assignment, and keep records of clinical attendance for audit by the State Workers' Compensation Insurance Fund.

- 3. The District will designate the students enrolled in the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program to be assigned for clinical experience in the Speech-Language Pathology areas of the agency in such numbers as are mutually agreed upon by both parties.
- 4. The District will supervise, in cooperation with the Agency supervisor, all instruction and learning and clinical experience given to the students at the facility so designated and provide instructor to supervise the clinical and learning experiences given to them at the agency, provided however, that the responsibility for service to the client remain with the Agency.
- 5. The District will keep academic and clinical experience records of students participating in said program.
- 6. The District will provide and be responsible for the care and control of educational supplies and education equipment necessary for instruction, including library materials, audiovisual equipment and supplies which are not customarily available at the Agency for the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant clinical experience.
- 7. The District will be responsible for the supervision and control of the students in the activities of their clinical experience under the general supervision and delivery of service framework of the Agency.
- 8. The District will agree that the student shall be subject to requirements and restrictions specified jointly by representative of District and Agency, and subject to Agency rules and regulations governing conduct, copies of which shall be provided in advance to District by Agency.
- 9. The District will require District's Speech-Language Assistant Program instructors to obtain the approval of the Agency's Director of Speech-Language Pathology in advance of:
 - a. Student Speech-Language Pathology Assistant schedules.
 - b. Placement of student in clinical experience assignments.
 - c. Changes in clinical experience assignments.
- 10. The District will, in consultation and coordination and with the approval of the Agency's Director of Speech-Language Pathology and the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant staff, plan for the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant clinical experience to be provided to students under this agreement.
- 11. The District will in consultation and coordination with the Agency's Director of Speech-Language Pathology arrange for periodic conferences between appropriate representation of the District and Agency to evaluate the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant field experience program provided under this Agreement.

PART III. GENERAL RESPONSIBILITIES AND PRIVILEGES OF THE AGENCY

A. For the Program in General

- 1. The Agency will maintain the standards, which make it eligible for approval as a clinical area for instruction in accredited Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Programs.
- 2. The Agency will provide staff members who hold a current state license or credential to practice speech-language pathology to supervise Speech-Language Pathology Assistant students. In addition, supervising SLP's need to have a minimum of 2 years experience as a practicing speech language pathologist.
- 3. The administration of the service and client care at the Agency shall be the responsibility of and under the control and supervision of the Agency and shall be administered through the Agency and Agency staff.
- 4. The Agency will provide staff that is adequate in number and quality to insure safe and continuous health care service to patients.
- 5. The Agency will provide service facilities for learning experiences therein for students enrolled in the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program of District who are designated by District for such experience at the Agency (the field experience for any one student shall cover such period of time as may be specified by District.)
- 6. The Agency will maintain service facilities in conformance with standards of the California State Board of Medical Examiners and the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association and permit inspection of its service facilities upon request by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association and the state Board of Medical Examiners
- 7. The Agency will permit clinical experience in Speech-Language Pathology Assistant training by such students, either individually and/or in groups. All services of Agency herein contracted for, such services and the number of students receiving experience therein shall be by mutual agreement between parties and in accordance with the standards set forth by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association.
- 8. The Agency will provide service areas in such a manner that there will be no conflict of learning opportunities among groups of students, and permit the district instructors and students access to service facilities, according to prearranged scheduling.
- 9. The Agency will permit its employees to participate in the educational program as resource persons and clinical experts provided such participation does not interfere with assigned duties.
- 10. The Agency will provide orientation for students and faculty to familiarize them with the facility and facility policies before assigning them to duties at the Agency.

- 11. The Agency will permit the faculty and students of the District to use its facilities for Clinical education according to approved curricula.
- 12. The Agency will permit the facility's Director of Speech-Language Pathology and other designated Speech-Language Pathology personnel to attend meetings of the District's Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program Faculty, or any committee thereof, to coordinate the clinical experience for the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program provided for under this Agreement.
- 13. The Agency will reserve the right, after consultation with the District, to refuse to accept for further Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program clinical experience any of the college students who in the agency's judgment are not participating satisfactorily, provided however, neither party shall discriminate with respect to the acceptance in or exclusion of students from the program.
- 14. The Agency will provide the educational use of supplies and equipment as are commonly available for client care.
- 15. It is understood by the parties to the Agreement that the Agency remain responsible for client care at all times.
- 16. The parties agree that the Agency shall have no monetary obligation to District, the Speech-Language Pathologist Assistant students or to Speech-Language Pathology Assistant instructors.

PART IV. JOINT RESPONSIBILITIES AND PRIVILEGES

A. For publications

1. Publication by District faculty, or Agency's staff members of any material relative to their clinical experience, that has not been approved for release by the District and Agency signers of this agreement, is prohibited.

B. Indemnification

All parties to this Agreement shall agree to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the other party, its officers, agents, employees, and volunteers, from and against all loss, cost, and expense arising out of any liability or claim of liability, sustained or claimed to have been sustained, arising out of the activities, or the performance or nonperformance of obligations under this Agreement, of the indemnifying party, or those of any of its officers, agents, employees, or volunteers. The provisions of this Article do not apply to any damage or losses caused solely by the negligence or intentional acts of the non-indemnifying party or any of its agents or employees.

C. Insurance:

Without limiting the indemnification obligations stated above, each party to the Agreement shall provide and maintain at its own expense a program on insurance covering its activities and operation hereunder. Such program of insurance shall include, but not be limited to commercial general liability and professional liability. The general and professional liability insurance shall have a minimum coverage of \$1,000,000 per occurrence.

Proof of insurance coverage shall be furnished to either party upon written request.

PART V STATUS OF SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY ASSISTANT STUDENTS

- A. Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program students shall have the status of learners and shall not be considered to be Agency employees nor shall they replace Agency staff. Any service rendered by the student during the experience is to be considered in addition to planned client care in that area. Clinical experience will be conducted as a laboratory learning experience. The Agency will provide regular staffing for client care in areas where students are obtaining clinical experience.
- B. Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program students are subject to the authority, policies, and regulations of the District. They are also subject, during clinical assignment, to applicable agency regulations and must conform to the same standards as Agency employees in matters relating to the welfare of patients and general Agency operations.
- C. Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program students shall be responsible for proper coverage in regard to malpractice insurance, or any other liability insurance that might be required by either the District or the Agency.
- D. The District will be responsible for assuring the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant students assigned to the Agency for clinical instruction meet both District and Agency standards of health and physical fitness.

PART VI PERIOD OF AGREEMENT

A. This agreement shall be effective as of the date signed by District, and shall continue in effect for five years, unless terminated earlier at will or without cause by written notice of either party. The said termination shall become effective only at the close of an academic year, but not before one year after receipt of said notice. This Agreement may be modified or revised at any time by mutual consent.

BACKGROUND

Attached are lists comparing degrees and certificates earned for spring 2012 and spring 2013. Also attached, please find a list of students who have completed coursework at Santa Ana College leading to the Associate Degree and/or Certificate for spring 2013.

ANALYSIS

Santa Ana College awarded 963 Associate Degrees at the conclusion of the spring 2013 semester, 707 Associate of Arts, 42 Associate of Arts Transfer and 214 Associate in Science. This is up 82 degrees over spring 2012 in which 881 Associate Degrees were conferred. The area that shows significant increase is Public Fire Service which grew from 33 degrees awarded in spring 2012 to 48 awarded in spring 2013.

Santa Ana College awarded 745 Certificates of Achievement/Accomplishment at the conclusion of the spring 2013 semester. This is up 23 certificates over spring 2012 in which 722 Certificates of Achievement/Accomplishment were conferred. The area with the most significant increase in certificates is CSU General Education which awarded 381 certificates. This is an increase of 43 from the 338 certificates awarded at the conclusion of spring 2012.

BACKGROUND

Attached is a list of students who successfully completed coursework at Santiago Canyon College leading to an associate degree, certificate of achievement, and/or certificate of proficiency for spring 2013. Also attached are the statistical tables showing degrees and certificates awarded.

ANALYSIS

Santiago Canyon College awarded 810 associate degrees in spring 2013, compared to 564 in spring 2012. The degrees with the most significant increase are the associate in arts for transfer and associate in science for transfer programs. Santiago Canyon College awarded 75 associate in arts for transfer and associate in science for transfer degrees for spring 2013, compared to 2 in spring 2012. Business Administration and Psychology were the two programs with the highest associate in arts for transfer and associate in science for transfer numbers. The other programs with a significant increase are Liberal Arts: Arts, Humanities & Communication, Liberal Arts: Math & Science, and Liberal Arts: Social & Behavioral Sciences. The number of students who received multiple degrees increased dramatically. This was the most significant contribution to the increase in the number of degrees awarded. In spring 2013 there were 212 students who received two or more degrees, compared to 139 in spring 2012.

Santiago Canyon College awarded 566 Certificates of Achievement in spring 2013, as compared to 496 in spring 2012. Notable increases are seen in Apprenticeship Electricity (Power Lineman), Apprenticeship Surveying (Chainman & Chief of Party), CSU and IGETC General Education Breadth. The increase in the certificate numbers are due to the continued work on the backlog of students who completed apprenticeship program requirements in years past. A total of 39 Certificates of Proficiency were awarded in spring 2013, as compared to 28 in spring 2012. The increase in the certificate of proficiency numbers is due to the first cohort of students completing the After School Program Associate Teacher program.

The difference in the CSU and IGETC numbers continues to be a reflection of the new associate in arts for transfer and associate in science for transfer programs. Students must earn either CSU or IGETC-CSU Option General Education Certification to be awarded one of these degrees. These programs popularity adds to the increase of degrees and CSU certifications that are being awarded. As Santiago Canyon College adds to the list of majors within the associate in arts for transfer and associate in science for transfer programs, we will continue to see an increase in these programs.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees confirm the recipients of the associate degrees and certificates for spring 2013.

RACKCDOUND

BACKGROUND

This is a request to modify the Master Cost Agreement originally approved at the June 17, 2013, RSCCD Board meeting between the Santiago Canyon College, and the Southwest Carpenters Training Fund/Southern California Carpentry Joint Apprenticeship and Training Committee, SCC 13-007.

ANALYSIS

This modification represents an adjustment of the remaining balance at the end of the year as a result of training trusts producing fewer positive attendance hours. Consequently, the funds are reallocated to those trusts who submitted positive attendance hours beyond what was budgeted for the year.

RECOMMENDATION

PROJECT MANAGEMENT AND PLANNING CONSULTANT SERVICES AGREEMENT

This AGREEMENT is made and entered into this 10TH day of SEPTEMBER in the year 2013, between the RANCHO SANTIAGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT, hereinafter referred to as "DISTRICT"), and HMC Group, hereinafter referred to as "CONSULTANT". The DISTRICT and the CONSULTANT are sometimes referred to herein as a "PARTY" and collectively as the "PARTIES". This AGREEMENT is made with reference to the following facts:

WHEREAS, the DISTRICT requires services and/or advice of a highly specialized and technical nature in connection with certain financial, economic, accounting, consulting and/or administrative matters; and

WHEREAS, such services and advice are not available within the DISTRICT, and cannot be performed satisfactorily by DISTRICT employees; and

WHEREAS, CONSULTANT possesses the necessary expert knowledge, experience, and ability to perform services not available through DISTRICT personnel; and

WHEREAS, CONSULTANT is specially experienced and competent to provide to the DISTRICT certain specialized services and/or advice in one or more of the foregoing areas; and

WHEREAS, DISTRICT desires to obtain specialized services and/or advice to COMPLETE THE UPDATE OF THE DISTRICT COMPREHENSIVE MASTER PLAN, hereinafter referred to as the "PROJECT", located in the DISTRICT; and

WHEREAS, CONSULTANT has indicated its willingness and commitment to provide its specialized services and/or advice to the DISTRICT on the terms hereafter set forth in this AGREEMENT.

NOW, THEREFORE, the PARTIES hereto agree that the above recitals are true and correct, and further as follows:

ARTICLE I SCOPE AND SERVICES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Services to be Provided by the CONSULTANT. The CONSULTANT shall provide to the DISTRICT on the terms set forth herein all the services articulated in the CONSULTANT's proposal which is attached hereto and incorporated herein as **EXHIBIT "A"** (the "CONSULTANT's WORK PLAN"). Where the CONSULTANT's WORK PLAN consists of a proposal or quote submitted in response to a Request for Proposals ("RFP") from the DISTRICT, the CONSULTANT's WORK PLAN shall be considered to include the DISTRICT's RFP. The DISTRICT and CONSULTANT expressly agree to incorporate the terms and conditions of the DISTRICT's RFP into this AGREEMENT by this reference and the PARTIES understand that the RFP shall constitute a binding part this AGREEMENT. In the event of a discrepancy, inconsistency, or other difference between the terms of the RFP or the CONSULTANT'S WORK PLAN with this AGREEMENT, the PARTIES agree that the terms of this AGREEMENT shall be controlling.
- 2. <u>Classification</u>: To the extent it is determined under applicable law that CONSULTANT fails to meet the statutory prerequisites for classification as a professional expert operating under a

personal services agreement, CONSULTANT resigns any and all rights and privileges derived from this AGREEMENT and any resulting relationship, which resignation is deemed accepted under such circumstances by the DISTRICT.

- 3. <u>Contract Term.</u> The effective period of this AGREEMENT is to be September 10, 2013 through June 30, 2014.
- 4. If any claim, demand, dispute or lawsuit arises related in any manner to the PROJECT (collectively, "CLAIM"), but unrelated to the services furnished pursuant to this AGREEMENT, the CONSULTANT agrees to cooperate and provide any reasonably requested services as directed by the DISTRICT or DISTRICT's legal counsel. Any documents or information provided to CONSULTANT or prepared, reproduced, maintained and/or managed by CONSULTANT related to a CLAIM are, and shall remain, confidential. Any communications, work performed or services provided related to a CLAIM for DISTRICT's legal counsel, or at the direction or request of DISTRICT's legal counsel, shall be protected by any applicable privilege including, but not limited to, the attorney-client privilege, attorney work product doctrine, and joint defense privilege. CONSULTANT shall not provide, release or distribute any information or documents related to a CLAIM to any person or entity without prior written consent from the DISTRICT or DISTRICT's legal counsel. All documents, reports or information related to at CLAIM, even if prepared by CONSULTANT, shall remain sole property of the DISTRICT in accordance with Article VII of this AGREEMENT.
- 5. <u>CONSULTANT's Certifications, Representations and Warranties.</u> CONSULTANT makes the following certifications, representations, and warranties for the benefit of the DISTRICT and CONSULTANT acknowledges and agrees that the DISTRICT, in deciding to engage CONSULTANT pursuant to this AGREEMENT, is relying upon the truth and validity of the following certifications, representations and warranties and their effectiveness throughout the term of this AGREEMENT and the course of CONSULTANT's engagement hereunder:
 - a. CONSULTANT is qualified in all respects to provide to the DISTRICT all of the services contemplated by this AGREEMENT and, to the extent required by any applicable laws, CONSULTANT has all such licenses and/or governmental approvals as would be required to carry out and perform for the benefit of the DISTRICT, such services as are called for hereunder.
 - b. CONSULTANT, in providing the services and in otherwise carrying out its obligations to the DISTRICT under this AGREEMENT, shall, at all times, comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules, regulations, and ordinances, including workers' compensation and equal protection and non-discrimination laws.
- 6. CONSULTANT has been selected to perform the work herein because of the skills and expertise of key individuals. Services under this AGREEMENT shall be performed only by competent personnel under this supervision of and/or in the employment of the CONSULTANT. CONSULTANT shall conform to DISTRICT's reasonable requests regarding assignment of personnel. All personnel, including those assigned at DISTRICT's request, shall be supervised by CONSULTANT.

CONSULTANT shall not change any of the key personnel without prior written approval by the DISTRICT, unless said personnel cease to be employed by CONSULTANT. In either case, DISTRICT shall be allowed to interview and approve replacement personnel. CONSULTANT agrees that reassignment of any of the listed personnel during the AGREEMENT period shall only be with other professional personnel who have equivalent experience and shall require prior consultation and written approval by the DISTRICT. Any costs associated with reassignment of personnel shall be borne exclusively by CONSULTANT and CONSULTANT shall not charge the DISTRICT for the cost of training or "bringing up to speed" replacement personnel.

If any designated lead or key person fails to perform to the satisfaction of the DISTRICT, then upon written notice the CONSULTANT shall immediately remove that person from the PROJECT and provide a temporary replacement. CONSULTANT shall within thirty (30) work days, provide a permanent replacement person acceptable to the DISTRICT. DISTRICT may condition its approval of replacement personnel upon a reasonable transition period wherein new personnel will learn the Program and Projects and get "up to speed" at CONSULTANT's cost.

CONSULTANT represents that the CONSULTANT has no existing interest and will not acquire any interest, direct or indirect, which would create a conflict of interest in violation of any applicable laws, and that no person having any such interest shall be employed by CONSULTANT.

ARTICLE II COMPENSATION TO THE CONSULTANT

- 1. The DISTRICT shall compensate the CONSULTANT as follows:
- a. The DISTRICT agrees to pay the CONSULTANT in accordance with the fee, rate and/or price schedule information set forth in **EXHIBIT** "A" for the services performed pursuant to this AGREEMENT. In no event shall the total payment to CONSULTANT exceed **TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND AND SEVENTY-FIVE** and **0/100 DOLLARS** (\$25,075.) for performing the services required by this AGREEMENT and **EXHIBIT** "A".
- b. CONSULTANT shall invoice costs monthly, or another periodic basis approved by the DISTRICT, for the services provided pursuant to this AGREEMENT from the time the CONSULTANT begins work on the PROJECT. All costs must be supported by an invoice, receipt, or other acceptable documentation as determined by the DISTRICT.
- c. Except as expressly provided herein, CONSULTANT agrees that no other compensation, fringe benefits, or other remuneration is due to CONSULTANT by the DISTRICT for services rendered under this AGREEMENT. CONSULTANT shall not apply for or receive statutory benefits available to employees of the DISTRICT because CONSULTANT is not an employee of the DISTRICT; rather, CONSULTANT is operating under a personal services agreement pursuant to Education Code Section 88003.1(b)(2) and has only the rights defined by this AGREEMENT.
- d. Unless specifically requested in writing by the DISTRICT, CONSULTANT shall not invoice the DISTRICT for any services pursuant to this AGREEMENT performed during any holiday officially recognized or designated by the DISTRICT, or any other days when the DISTRICT offices are closed, and DISTRICT will not pay for any costs incurred by CONSULTANT during such DISTRICT holidays.

ARTICLE III REIMBURSABLE EXPENSES

- 1. Reimbursable expenses are in addition to compensation for basic and extra services, and shall be paid to the CONSULTANT at one and one-tenth (1.1) times the expenses incurred by the CONSULTANT, the CONSULTANT's employees and consultants for the following specified items unless otherwise approved by the DISTRICT in writing:
 - a. Approved reproduction of reports and/or other documents otherwise not covered in the agreement and approved in advance by District.

- b. Fees advanced for securing approval of authorities in connection with the services rendered pursuant to this AGREEMENT.
- c. Express shipping, overnight mail, messenger, courier, or delivery services approved in advance by the District.
- d. Mileage at IRS Rate if site exceeds more than 25 miles from the District.
- e. Out of town travel approved in advance by District.
- 2. Reimbursable expenses are estimated to be FIVE THOUSAND and 0/100 DOLLARS (\$5,000), and this amount shall not be exceeded without the prior written approval of the DISTRICT.
- 3. DISTRICT will provide CONSULTANT with basic general conditions reasonably required to perform its services under this AGREEMENT including office space, computer and other general office equipment. If CONSULTANT requires any additional equipment or supplies not provided by the DISTRICT, the CONSULTANT shall notify the DISTRICT in writing. No reimbursable expenses other than those set forth in this AGREEMENT shall be incurred by CONSULTANT without prior written consent by the DISTRICT. CONSULTANT shall not be entitled to reimbursement for any costs if CONSULTANT fails to comply with the requirements set forth in this Paragraph.

ARTICLE IV TERMINATION

- 1. This AGREEMENT may be terminated by either PARTY upon fourteen (14) days written notice to the other PARTY in the event of a substantial failure of performance by such other PARTY, including insolvency of CONSULTANT; or if the DISTRICT should decide to abandon or indefinitely postpone the PROJECT.
- 2. In the event of a termination based upon abandonment or postponement by DISTRICT, the DISTRICT shall pay to the CONSULTANT for all services performed and all expenses incurred under this AGREEMENT supported by documentary evidence, including payroll records, and expense reports up until the date of the abandonment or postponement plus any sums due the CONSULTANT for Board approved extra services. In ascertaining the services actually rendered hereunder up to the date of termination of this AGREEMENT, consideration shall be given to both completed work and work in process of completion and to complete and incomplete drawings and other documents whether delivered to the DISTRICT or in the possession of the CONSULTANT. In the event termination is for a substantial failure of performance, all damages and costs associated with the termination, including increased consultant and replacement consultant costs shall be deducted from payments to the CONSULTANT.
- 3. In the event a termination for cause is determined to have been made wrongfully or without cause, then the termination shall be treated as a termination for convenience in accordance with Article IV, Paragraph 4 below, and CONSULTANT shall have no greater rights than it would have had if a termination for convenience had been effected in the first instance. No other loss, cost, damage, expense or liability may be claimed, requested or recovered by CONSULTANT.
- 4. This AGREEMENT may be terminated without cause by DISTRICT upon twenty (20) days written notice to the CONSULTANT. In the event of a termination without cause, the DISTRICT shall pay to the CONSULTANT for all services performed and all expenses incurred under this AGREEMENT supported by documentary evidence, including payroll records, and expense reports up until the date of notice of termination plus any sums due the CONSULTANT for Board approved extra

services. In ascertaining the services actually rendered hereunder up to the date of termination of this AGREEMENT, consideration shall be given to both completed work and work in process of completion and to other documents whether delivered to the DISTRICT or in the possession of the CONSULTANT.

- 5. In the event of a dispute between the PARTIES as to performance of the work or the interpretation of this AGREEMENT, or payment or nonpayment for work performed or not performed, the PARTIES shall attempt to resolve the dispute. Pending resolution of this dispute, CONSULTANT agrees to continue the work diligently to completion. If the dispute is not resolved, CONSULTANT agrees it will neither rescind the AGREEMENT nor stop the progress of the work, but CONSULTANT's sole remedy shall be to submit such controversy to determination by a court having competent jurisdiction of the dispute, after the PROJECT has been completed, and not before. The PARTIES may agree in writing to submit any dispute between the PARTIES to arbitration. The DISTRICT agrees to pay the CONSULTANT the undisputed amounts due under this AGREEMENT.
- 6. THE PARTIES UNDERSTAND AND AGREE THAT ARTICLE IV OF THIS AGREEMENT SHALL GOVERN ALL TERMINATION RIGHTS AND PROCEDURES BETWEEN THE PARTIES. ANY TERMINATION PROVISION THAT IS ATTACHED TO THIS AGREEMENT AS AN EXHIBIT SHALL BE VOID AND UNENFORCEABLE BETWEEN THE PARTIES.

ARTICLE V ADDITIONAL CONSULTANT SERVICES

- 1. CONSULTANT shall notify the DISTRICT in writing of the need for additional services required due to circumstances beyond the CONSULTANT's control. CONSULTANT shall obtain written authorization from the DISTRICT before rendering such services. The DISTRICT may require CONSULTANT to perform additional services which are, in the DISTRICT's discretion, necessary. Compensation for such services shall be negotiated and approved in writing by the DISTRICT. Such services shall include:
 - a. Making material revisions in reports or other documents when such revisions are required by the enactment or revision of laws, rules or regulations subsequent to the preparation and completion of such documents.
 - b. Preparing reports and other documentation and supporting data, and providing other services in connection with project modifications required by causes beyond the control of the CONSULTANT which are not the result of the direct or indirect negligence, errors or omissions on the part of CONSULTANT;
 - c. If the DISTRICT requests additional shifts to complete the services articulated in **EXHIBIT** "A" where the requests for additional shifts does not arise from the direct or indirect negligence, errors or omissions on the part of CONSULTANT and the CONSULTANT's compensation is expressly conditioned on the lack of fault of the CONSULTANT;
 - d. Providing any other services not otherwise included in this AGREEMENT or not customarily furnished in accordance with the generally accepted practice in the CONSULTANT's industry.

ARTICLE VI ACCOUNTING RECORDS OF THE CONSULTANT

1. Records of the CONSULTANT's direct personnel and reimbursable expenses pertaining to any extra services provided by the CONSULTANT, which are in addition to those services already

required by this AGREEMENT, and any records of accounts between the DISTRICT and CONSULTANT shall be kept on a generally recognized accounting basis and shall be available to the DISTRICT or DISTRICT's authorized representative at mutually convenient times.

ARTICLE VII REPORTS AND/OR OTHER DOCUMENTS

1. The reports and/or other documents that are prepared, reproduced, maintained and/or managed by the CONSULTANT or CONSULTANT's consultants in accordance with this AGREEMENT, shall be and remain the property of the DISTRICT (hereinafter "PROPERTY"). The DISTRICT may provide the CONSULTANT with a written request for the return of its PROPERTY at any time. Upon CONSULTANT's receipt of the DISTRICT's written request, CONSULTANT shall return the requested PROPERTY to the DISTRICT within five (5) calendar days.

ARTICLE VIII INDEMNITY & INSURANCE

- 1. To the fullest extent permitted by law, CONSULTANT agrees to indemnify, and hold DISTRICT entirely harmless from all liability arising out of:
 - a. <u>Workers' Compensation and Employers Liability</u>: Any and all claims under Workers' Compensation acts and other employee benefit acts with respect to CONSULTANT's employees or CONSULTANT's subcontractor's employees arising out of CONSULTANT's work under this AGREEMENT; and
 - General Liability: If arising out of, pertaining to, or relating to the negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct of the CONSULTANT, the CONSULTANT shall indemnify and hold the DISTRICT harmless from any liability for damages for (1) death or bodily injury to person; (2) injury to, loss or theft of property; (3) any failure or alleged failure to comply with any provision of law or (4) any other loss, damage or expense arising under either (1), (2), or (3) above, sustained by the CONSULTANT or the DISTRICT, or any person, firm or corporation employed by the CONSULTANT or the DISTRICT upon or in connection with the PROJECT, except for liability resulting from the sole or active negligence, or willful misconduct of the DISTRICT, its officers, employees, agents or independent consultants who are directly employed by the DISTRICT. The CONSULTANT, at its own expense, cost, and risk, shall defend any and all claims, actions, suits, or other proceedings that may be brought or instituted against the DISTRICT (other than professional negligence covered by section c below), its officers, agents or employees that arise out of, pertain to, or relate to the negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct of the CONSULTANT, and shall pay or satisfy any judgment that may be rendered against the DISTRICT, its officers, agents or employees in any action, suit or other proceedings as a result thereof; and
 - c. <u>Professional Liability</u>: If arising out of, pertaining to, or relating to the negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct of the CONSULTANT, the CONSULTANT shall indemnify and hold the DISTRICT harmless from any loss, injury to, death of persons or damage to property caused by any act, neglect, default or omission of the CONSULTANT, or any person, firm or corporation employed by the CONSULTANT, either directly or by independent contract, including all damages due to loss or theft, sustained by any person, firm or corporation including the DISTRICT, arising out of, or in any way connected with the PROJECT, including injury or damage either on or off DISTRICT property; but not for any loss, injury, death or damages caused by sole or active negligence, or willful misconduct of the DISTRICT. With regard to the CONSULTANT's obligation to indemnify for acts of professional negligence, such obligation

does not include the obligation to provide defense counsel or to pay for the defense of actions or proceedings brought against the DISTRICT, but rather to reimburse the DISTRICT for attorney's fees and costs incurred by the DISTRICT in defending such actions or proceedings brought against the DISTRICT that arise out of, pertain to, or relate to the negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct of the CONSULTANT.

- d. THE PARTIES UNDERSTAND AND AGREE THAT ARTICLE VIII, SECTION 1 OF THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE THE SOLE INDEMNITY, AS DEFINED BY CALIFORNIA CIVIL CODE §2772, GOVERNING THIS AGREEMENT. ANY OTHER INDEMNITY THAT IS ATTACHED TO THIS AGREEMENT AS AN EXHIBIT SHALL BE VOID AND UNENFORCEABLE BETWEEN THE PARTIES.
- e. ANY ATTEMPT TO LIMIT THE CONSULTANT'S LIABILITY TO THE DISTRICT IN AN ATTACHED EXHIBIT SHALL BE VOID AND UNENFORCEABLE BETWEEN THE DISTRICT AND THE CONSULTANT. IN NO EVENT SHALL THE CONSULTANT'S LIABILITY BE LIMITED TO ANY AMOUNT INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO, THE AMOUNT OF FEES RECEIVED BY THE CONSULTANT FOR PERFORMING SERVICES RELATED TO THIS AGREEMENT.
- 2. CONSULTANT shall purchase and maintain policies of insurance with an insurer or insurers, qualified to do business in the State of California and acceptable to DISTRICT which will protect CONSULTANT and DISTRICT from claims which may arise out of or result from CONSULTANT's actions or inactions relating to the AGREEMENT, whether such actions or inactions be by themselves or by any subcontractor or by anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them, or by anyone for whose acts any of them may be liable. The aforementioned insurance shall include coverage for:
 - a. The CONSULTANT shall carry Workers' Compensation and Employers Liability Insurance in accordance with the laws of the State of California. However, such amount shall not be less than ONE MILLION DOLLARS (\$1,000,000).
 - b. Comprehensive general and auto liability insurance with limits of not less than ONE MILLION DOLLARS (\$1,000,000) combined single limit, bodily injury and property damage liability per occurrence, including:
 - 1. Owned, non-owned and hired vehicles;
 - 2. Blanket contractual;
 - 3. Broad form property damage;
 - 4. Products/completed operations; and
 - 5. Personal injury.
 - c. Professional liability insurance, including contractual liability, with limits of ONE MILLION DOLLARS (\$1,000,000), per claim. Such insurance shall be maintained during the term of this AGREEMENT and renewed for a period of at least five (5) years thereafter and/or at rates consistent with the time of execution of this AGREEMENT adjusted for inflation. In the event that CONSULTANT subcontracts any portion of CONSULTANT's duties, CONSULTANT shall require any such subcontractor to purchase and maintain insurance coverage as provided in this subparagraph. Failure to maintain professional liability insurance is a material breach of this AGREEMENT and grounds for immediate termination.
 - d. Each policy of insurance required in Article VIII, Section 2 (b) above shall name DISTRICT and its officers, agents and employees as additional insureds; shall state that, with

respect to the operations of CONSULTANT hereunder, such policy is primary and any insurance carried by DISTRICT is excess and non-contributory with such primary insurance; shall state that not less than thirty (30) days written notice shall be given to DISTRICT prior to cancellation; and, shall waive all rights of subrogation. CONSULTANT shall notify DISTRICT in the event of material change in, or failure to renew, each policy. Prior to commencing work, CONSULTANT shall deliver to DISTRICT certificates of insurance as evidence of compliance with the requirements herein. In the event CONSULTANT fails to secure or maintain any policy of insurance required hereby, DISTRICT may, at its sole discretion, secure such policy of insurance in the name of and for the account of CONSULTANT, and in such event CONSULTANT shall reimburse DISTRICT upon demand for the cost thereof.

ARTICLE IX MISCELLANEOUS

- 1. CONSULTANT, in the performance of this AGREEMENT, shall be and act as an independent contractor. CONSULTANT understands and agrees that CONSULTANT and all of CONSULTANT's employees shall not be considered officers, employees or agents of the DISTRICT, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of the DISTRICT and/or to which DISTRICT's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Workers' Compensation. CONSULTANT assumes the full responsibility for the acts and/or omissions of CONSULTANT's employees or agents as they relate to the services to be provided under this AGREEMENT. CONSULTANT shall assume full responsibility for payment of any applicable prevailing wages and all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes for the respective CONSULTANT's employees.
- 2. Nothing contained in this AGREEMENT shall create a contractual relationship with or a cause of action in favor of any third party against either the DISTRICT or CONSULTANT.
- 3. The DISTRICT and CONSULTANT, respectively, bind themselves, their partners, officers, successors, assigns and legal representatives to the other PARTY to this AGREEMENT with respect to the terms of this AGREEMENT. CONSULTANT shall not assign this AGREEMENT.
 - 4. This AGREEMENT shall be governed by the laws of the State of California.
- 5. THIS AGREEMENT SHALL NOT INCLUDE OR INCORPORATE THE TERMS OF ANY GENERAL CONDITIONS, CONDITIONS, MASTER AGREEMENT OR ANY OTHER BOILERPLATE TERMS OR FORM DOCUMENTS PREPARED BY THE CONSULTANT. THE ATTACHMENT OF ANY SUCH DOCUMENT TO THIS AGREEMENT AS EXHIBIT "A" SHALL NOT BE INTERPRETED OR CONSTRUED TO INCORPORATE SUCH TERMS INTO THIS AGREEMENT UNLESS THE DISTRICT APPROVES OF SUCH INCORPORATION IN A SEPARATE WRITING SIGNED BY THE DISTRICT. ANY REFERENCE TO SUCH BOILERPLATE TERMS AND CONDITIONS IN THE PROPOSAL OR QUOTE SUBMITTED BY THE CONSULTANT SHALL BE NULL AND VOID AND HAVE NO EFFECT UPON THIS AGREEMENT. PROPOSALS, QUOTES, STATEMENT OF QUALIFICATIONS AND OTHER SIMILAR DOCUMENTS PREPARED BY THE CONSULTANT MAY BE INCORPORATED INTO THIS AGREEMENT AS EXHIBIT "A" BUT SUCH INCORPORATION SHALL BE STRICTLY LIMITED TO THOSE PORTIONS DESCRIBING THE CONSULTANT'S SCOPE OF WORK, RATE AND PRICE SCHEDULE AND QUALIFICATIONS.

- 6. The PARTIES have had the opportunity to, and have to the extent each deemed appropriate, obtained legal counsel concerning the content and meaning of this AGREEMENT. Each of the PARTIES agrees and represents that no promise, inducement or agreement not herein expressed has been made to effectuate this AGREEMENT. This AGREEMENT represents the entire AGREEMENT between the DISTRICT and CONSULTANT and supersedes all prior negotiations, representations or agreements, either written or oral. This AGREEMENT may be amended or modified only by an agreement in writing signed by both the DISTRICT and the CONSULTANT.
- 7. The rule of construction that any ambiguities are to be resolved against the drafting PARTY shall not be employed in the interpretation of this AGREEMENT. It is expressly understood and agreed that the PARTIES to this AGREEMENT have participated equally, or have had equal opportunity to participate, in the drafting hereof.
 - 8. Time is of the essence with respect to all provisions of this AGREEMENT.
- 9. If either PARTY becomes involved in litigation arising out of this AGREEMENT or the performance thereof, each PARTY shall bear its own litigation costs and expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees.
- 10. All exhibits referenced herein and attached hereto shall be deemed incorporated into and made a part of this AGREEMENT by each reference as though fully set forth in each instance in the text hereof unless otherwise excluded by the terms of this AGREEMENT. In the event that the provisions of any exhibit conflict with the terms of this AGREEMENT, the terms of this AGREEMENT shall control.
- 11. This AGREEMENT may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, and the counterparts shall constitute one and the same instrument, all of which shall be sufficient evidence of this AGREEMENT.
- 12. <u>Confidentiality</u>: The CONSULTANT shall not disclose or permit the disclosure of any confidential information, except to its agents, employees and other consultants who need such confidential information in order to properly perform their duties relative to this AGREEMENT.
- 13. <u>Severability</u>: If any portion of this AGREEMENT is held as a matter of law to be unenforceable, the remainder of this AGREEMENT shall be enforceable without such provisions.
- 14. Notices: All notices or demands to be given under this AGREEMENT by either PARTY to the other shall be in writing and given either by: (a) personal service; or (b) by U.S. Mail, mailed either by registered, overnight, or certified mail, return receipt requested, with postage prepaid. Service shall be considered given when received if personally served or if mailed on the fifth day after deposit in any U.S. Post Office. The address to which notices or demands may be given by either PARTY may be changed by written notice given in accordance with the notice provisions of this Paragraph. On November 13, 2012, the Board of Trustees awarded a contract to WoodCliff Corporation for Bid # 1180 for perimeter site improvements at Santa Ana College.

ANALYSIS

During the course of construction for the project, the contractor has had to undertake additional work related to concrete sidewalks, storm drains and lighting. The majority of the change order costs are associated with additional concrete work and the addition of circuits for site lighting.

Change Order #5 increases the contract by \$37,744. The revised contract amount is \$5,587,229. Staff was able to negotiate a savings of \$56,435. The costs indicated in the change order are considered fair, reasonable and within industry standards by the architect, construction manager and staff. Total change orders for the project are 8.76% of construction cost. Pursuant to Administrative Regulation 3504, staff has approved this change order.

The Board Policy Committee is recommending that our policies be updated and revised to conform to the CCLC model structure.

BP 2015 Student Member

Reference:

Education Code Section 72023.5

The Board shall include one non-voting student member. The term of office shall be one year commencing June 1.

The student member shall be enrolled in and maintain a minimum of five (5) semester units in the District at the time of nomination and throughout the term of service. The student member is not required to give up employment with the District. The student shall maintain the standards of scholarship and eligibility criteria enumerated in Administrative Regulation 9006.

The student member shall be seated with the Board and shall be recognized as a full member of the Board at meetings. The student member is entitled to participate in discussion of issues and receive all materials presented to members of the Board (except for closed session). The student member shall be entitled to any mileage allowance necessary to attend board meetings and reimbursement for travel (see BP 2735) to the same extent as publicly elected trustees.

The student member shall have the privilege to cast an advisory vote, although the vote shall not be included in determining the vote required to carry any measure before the board. The student member may, prior to the vote on any item before the Board, advise the President of the Board that the student member would like to cast his/her vote first as a means of providing advice to the Board.

The student member shall not be liable for any acts of the Governing Board. <u>The student member shall be bound by Code of Ethics/Standards of Practice (BP 2715).</u>

On or before May 15 of each year, the Board shall consider whether to afford the student member any of the following privileges:

- The privilege to make and second motions;
- The privilege to attend closed sessions, other than closed sessions on personnel or collective bargaining matters;
- The privilege to receive compensation for meeting attendance and the amount of that compensation, up to the amount prescribed by Education Code Section 72425.
- The privilege to serve a term commencing on May 15.
- The privilege to serve on Board committees.

All Rancho Santiago Community College District board members, <u>including the student trustee</u>, are committed to maintaining the highest standards of conduct and ethical behavior. The Board believes that in promoting trust, confidence, and integrity in the working relationship between Trustees, administrators, faculty and Staff. The Board and its individual Trustees are committed to the following:

- In all decisions the Board will consider the educational welfare and equality of opportunity of all students in the District.
- Trustees are elected to represent the interests and serve the needs of the entire District and to promote the mission of Rancho Santiago Community College District.
- Trustees are non-partisan elected officials and will always put District and college priorities before their own political or personal priorities.
- Trustees hold a public trust that requires and will ensure that their actions avoid conflicts of interest and any appearance of impropriety.
- Trustees will speak on behalf of the Board only when granted such authority by a majority of the Board.
- Trustees shall be respectful of others in any discussions related to the district and colleges.
- Trustees clearly articulate to the Chancellor the Board's expectations, will support the work and
 efforts of the Chancellor, and keep the Chancellor informed of matters related to the district and
 colleges.
- Trustees will respect the confidentiality of all privileged information.
- Trustees will uphold the letter and spirit of the Ralph M. Brown Act and make all official decisions and actions of the Board of Trustees in open and public meetings.
- Trustees will remain informed about the district, educational issues, and responsibilities of trusteeship, and will work in the best interest of the entire district.

The President of the Board, in consultation with the Chancellor, is authorized to consult with legal counsel when they become aware of or are informed about actual or perceived violations of pertinent laws and regulations, including but not limited to conflict of interest, open and public meetings, confidentiality of closed session information, and use of public resources. Violations of law may be referred to the District Attorney or Attorney General as provided for in law.

Violations of the board's policy code of ethics will be addressed by the President of the Board, who will first discuss the violation with the trustee to reach a resolution. If resolution is not achieved and further action is deemed necessary, the president may appoint an ad hoc committee to examine the matter and recommend further courses of action to the board. Sanctions will be determined by the board officers and may include a recommendation to the board to censure of the trustee. If the President of the Board is perceived to have violated the code, the vice president of the board is authorized to pursue resolution.

BP 2716 Political Activity

The Board of Trustees of the Rancho Santiago Community College District shall abide by all State laws, Education and Government codes relating to political activities and solicitation of political contributions.

Six months prior to every general election, the Board will seek college counsel to provide the latest legal status of laws and regulations relating to solicitation of political contributions and political activities by Board members, officers, and employees of the college. This status report will be distributed to all Board members and employees groups.

Members of the Board shall not use District funds, services, eommunication resources, supplies, or equipment to urge the passage or defeat of any ballot measure or candidate, including, but not limited to, any candidate for election to the governing board.

Initiative or referendum measures may be drafted on an area of legitimate interest to the district. The Board may by resolution express the Board's position on ballot measures. Public resources may be used only for informational efforts regarding the possible effects of ballot District bond issues or other ballot measures.

BP 3820 Gifts, Grants and Bequests - BP3208

Legal Reference: Education Code 72122

The Governing Board may accept on behalf of the district any bequest or gift of money or property for a purpose deemed by the Governing Board to be suitable and in support of the district's academic mission, and to utilize such money or property so designated.

The Chancellor shall establish procedures for district acceptance of gifts, grants and bequests, and shall establish criteria for usability and maintenance. Gifts which entail high maintenance costs shall be avoided.

All gifts shall be accepted on behalf of the district as a whole, not by a particular department. At the discretion of the Chancellor, the gift may be used in a particular facility.

Equipment gifts will not be replaced with district funds; if replacement is desired, the items will be submitted for consideration under new equipment.

The District shall assume no responsibility for appraising the value of gifts made to the District.

Acceptance of a gift shall not be considered endorsement by the District of a product, enterprise or entity.

<u>BP 6010</u> Equitable Opportunities for Business Enterprises - BP3301

The Governing Board of Rancho Santiago Community College District recognizes the importance of enhancing business opportunities and the value of continuing to expand our pool of qualified vendors and contractors. In this regard, our policy is to vigorously contribute to achieving the goals established for the California Community College System, regarding purchasing goods and services from businesses owned by minorities, women, and disabled veterans.

The district shall continue to adhere to other regulations which are equally important to protecting the public interest (for instance competitive bidding, prudent risk management, etc.).

<u>BP 6011</u> Interaction With And Solicitation From Private Businesses - BP3311

RSCCD shall proactively interact with private businesses within our service area of Orange County, and with other businesses on a national and international basis. The <u>Governing</u> Board of Trustees encourages the development of business and industry relationships which are mutually beneficial, and which are fiscally and logistically prudent, and consistent with the District's mission and priorities.

Following are some examples of the benefits offered by RSCCD which businesses will be encouraged to pursue:

- Quality instruction for staff members in credit and non-credit courses available through our regular college, Public Service Institute, and Community Service curriculum
- 2. Quality Contract Education programs tailored to specific organization needs
- 3. Use of RSCCD facilities for community service activities in which businesses may be participants (e.g. blood drives, bone marrow drives, AIDs education, voter registration etc.)
- 4. Partnerships and joint ventures in commercial opportunities like presentations of seminars and open entry courses on current topics
- 5. Partnerships and collaborations in economic development efforts which enhance community tax revenues or employment opportunities
- 6. Sharing in the results of general demographic research or specific focused research projects.

Following are some examples of the benefits of business interaction which RSCCD or its Foundation will pursue:

- Service by business representatives on Industry Advisory Councils for the improvement of curriculum and instruction and professional staff development
- Monetary contributions from businesses to be used for the purchase or improvement of facilities, equipment, and supplies to enhance the instruction and overall development of our students and staff.

It is acknowledged that the institution's primary mission is the education of students. Accordingly, it is our policy that businesses and staff members be made clearly aware that none of the interactions and collaborations described above will improperly distract from our primary mission, or in any way violate any other Board policies or any of the public regulations by which the District is governed.

It is also acknowledged that some of the businesses from which RSCCD may solicit donations may be current or prospective vendors. It is our policy that donors and staff members be made clearly aware that making donations to the district in no way improves or lessens a vendors' chances of receiving an award of business from the district, or of receiving any other economic concessions from the district.

A copy of this policy will be made available to vendors.

<u>BP 6012</u> Environmentally Preferable Purchase and Practices - BP3406

Reference: AB 939

The district office, colleges and educational sites of the Rancho Santiago Community College District shall continually strive to minimize the generation of waste through utilization of waste prevention techniques, reuse of materials, collection/recycling and composting. The District shall support markets for recycled materials through the procurement of recycled content products whenever possible.

In pursuit of the goal of reducing energy use and costs affiliated with energy consumption, the District shall purchase, whenever financially practical, only those appliances and products that have met ENERGY STAR specifications for energy efficiency or an equivalent standard. The Chancellor shall establish appropriate procedures to ensure that the purchase of single and bulk equipment meet the guidelines of this policy.

The <u>Governing</u> Board of <u>Trustees</u> delegates authority to the Chancellor to establish administrative procedures that will direct the District to engage in sustainable building practices for new buildings or major renovation projects in excess of 5,000 square feet of occupied space. New buildings and renovations of this size will meet or exceed the United States Building Green Building Council's (USGBC) Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) silver rating or an equivalent standard. Buildings need not be certified but shall earn all the necessary points outlined in USGBC's LEED standards for certification, or a similar set of standards.

Whenever it is deemed appropriate and economically feasible, the District shall also pursue sustainable building practices for new construction and major renovation projects between 1,000 and 5,000 square feet of occupied space.

BP 6013 Energy and Water Conservation - BP3508

Reference: California Code of Regulations - Chapter 4, Section 57200-57205

The Rancho Santiago Community College District's <u>Governing Board of Trustees</u> recognizes the necessity and urgency of the reduction of energy and water usage. The administration is directed to develop ways of maintaining a constant check on consumption to reduce water and energy usage. Fossil fuels, from which nearly all the nation's energy is currently produced, are non-renewable resources which are becoming increasingly scarce and expensive. Dry years illustrate that water is not an unlimited resource in California. It is the aim of the Rancho Santiago Community College District to conserve energy and water in a manner which will serve as an example for the community. It is expected that each and every member of the District's staff will exemplify the spirit and rule of this policy while serving the District.

The <u>Governing</u> Board of Trustees delegates authority to the Chancellor to establish administrative procedures that will direct the District's energy and water conservation efforts.

BP 6014 Location of District-Sponsored Events - BP7003

The <u>Governing</u> Board of <u>Trustees</u> of the Rancho Santiago Community College District supports the businesses located in its service area. To promote goodwill within the RSCCD service area, the <u>Governing</u> Board of <u>Trustees</u> prefers and encourages that district-sponsored events for board members, <u>faculty</u>, <u>and/or</u> staff <u>and students</u> be held within the geographical boundaries of the district, when possible and when such event is held in a for-profit hospitality facility, such as a restaurant or hotel.

The Chancellor shall ensure that notice of this policy be provided to faculty, staff, and student organizations at the beginning of each academic year.

BP 6015 Food and Meeting Refreshments - BP3103

Reference: Education Code 85266. Warrants for district expense

The <u>Governing</u> Board of Trustees encourages participation and awareness of district programs and activities through direct personal contact with individuals, community groups, students, staff and professional associations. The <u>Governing</u> Board of Trustees believes that the serving of refreshments and food at district activities facilitates communication and increases public awareness and public participation in district sponsored meetings, events, activities, and programs.

The <u>Governing</u> Board of Trustees authorizes the Chancellor, or the Chancellor's designee, to approve the serving of refreshments and/or food at the following meetings or activities:

- Functions for volunteers and retiring employees
- Activities honoring individuals in education
- Educational events sponsored by the Board
- Seminars and workshops sponsored by the Board
- Board appointed committee meetings
- Group planning and operational meetings
- Student and student program recognition ceremonies
- Other activities as designated by the Board Chancellor

The cost of food and refreshments, which are served at duly authorized activities, shall be paid from district funds and shall meet all legal and district requirements for the expenditures of district funds.

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BP <u>6100</u> Delegation of Authority to Negotiate and Accept Discounts and Price Reductions - BP3308

Legal References: Education Code 70902D Education Code Sections 70902(d), 81655, and 81656

In accordance with the delegation provisions of Education Code Section 70902D, the Board of Trustees delegates to the chief fiscal officer or his/her designee the authority to accept price reductions or discounts to existing contracts, as long as the nature and quality of the good and services purchased are not altered in any material respect.

If it is in the interest of the District to alter the nature of the goods or services ordered, in concert with a price reduction, this can be done with the approval of the Chancellor or the chief fiscal officer. If the purchase of the goods or services required advance approval of the Board of Trustees per BP3306, however, and a price reduction was made in concert with a decision to alter the nature of the goods and services, the circumstances of the revised purchase will be reported to the Board of Trustees.

The Board delegates to the Chancellor the authority to supervise the general business procedures of the District to assure the proper administration of property and contracts; the budget, audit and accounting of funds; the acquisition of supplies, equipment and property; and the protection of assets and persons. All transactions shall comply with applicable laws and regulations, and with the California Community Colleges Budget and Accounting Manual.

No contract shall constitute an enforceable obligation against the District until it has been approved or ratified by the Board. (See BP 6340 titled Contracts).

The Chancellor shall make appropriate periodic reports to the Board and shall keep the Board fully advised regarding the financial status of the District.

<u>BP 6200 Policy on Budget Preparation Development Process - BP3201</u>

The budget and expenditures of the Rancho Santiago Community College District reflect and support its visions and mission statements, district and college master plans, and other planning documents.

The statutory authority and responsibility for the budget resides with the <u>Governing</u> Board of Trustees who will make final budgetary decisions.

The Chancellor will consult with the District's budget committee as an ex-officio member to develop the budget procedures and compile a recommended budget. The District's budget committee will include the college Presidents, the Vice Chancellor of Fiscal Services, and all college constituent groups.

The Chancellor shall direct the preparation of the budget in accordance with the Education Code and shall hold public hearings on the budget in compliance with applicable law and time lines.

The budget development process will allow for majority and minority recommendations to be forwarded to the Board of Trustees for consideration.

The budget development structure will be consistent with state law and the regulations of the Board of Governors, California Community Colleges. The budget will be itemized to set forth the necessary revenues and expenditures by functions and objects in each of the funds.

Each year, the Chancellor shall present to the Board a budget, prepared in accordance with Title 5 and the California Community Colleges Budget and Accounting Manual. The schedule for presentation and review of budget proposals shall comply with state law and regulations, and provide adequate time for Board study.

Budget development shall meet the following criteria:

- The annual budget shall support the District's master and educational plans.
- Assumptions upon which the budget is based are presented to the Board for review.
- A schedule is provided to the Board each year that includes dates for presentation of the tentative budget, required public hearing(s), Board study session(s), and approval of the final budget. At the public hearings, interested persons may appear and address the Board regarding the proposed budget or any item in the proposed budget.

A system of fiscal control shall be established to govern the administration of the budget and the expenditure of funds.

The Chancellor shall not permit expenditures of funds to exceed the major budget classification allowance against which the proposed expenditure is the proper charge. The Chancellor shall set up and operate budget controls for all departments, and shall administer the budget in conformity with legal requirements and the actions of the Coverning Board.

The budget shall be managed in accordance with Title 5 and the California Community Colleges Budget and Accounting Manual. Budget revisions shall be made only in accordance with these policies and as provided by law.

Revenues accruing to the District in excess of amounts budgeted shall be added to the District's reserve for contingencies. They are available for appropriation only upon a resolution of the Board that sets forth the need according to major budget classifications in accordance with applicable law.

Board approval is required for changes between major expenditure classifications. Transfers from the reserve for contingencies to any expenditure classification must be approved by a two-thirds vote of the members of the Board. Transfers between expenditure classifications must be approved by a majority vote of the members of the Board.

The Chancellor and fiscal staff are expected to confer with the appropriate specialists of the Office of the Orange County Superintendent of Schools, the California State Board of Community Colleges, auditors, and other knowledgeable persons or groups in order to assure that the best business practices are followed.

The Chancellor shall establish procedures to assure that the District's fiscal management is in accordance with the principles contained in Title 5 Section 58311, including:

- Adequate internal controls exist.
- Fiscal objectives, procedures, and constraints are communicated to the Board and employees.
- Adjustments to the budget are made in a timely manner, when necessary.
- The management information system provides timely, accurate, and reliable fiscal information.
- Responsibility and accountability for fiscal management are clearly delineated.

The books and records of the District shall be maintained pursuant to the California Community Colleges Budget and Accounting Manual.

As required by law, the Board shall be presented with a quarterly report showing the financial and budgetary conditions of the District.

As required by the Budget and Accounting Manual, expenditures shall be recognized in the accounting period in which the liability is incurred, and shall be limited to the amount budgeted for each major classification of accounts and to the total amount of the budget for each fund.

- Safety of principal is the foremost objective of the investment program. Investments shall be undertaken in a manner that seeks to ensure the preservation of capital.
- The investments shall remain sufficiently liquid to meet all operating obligations of the district.

• The investments shall be done with the objective of attaining a market rate of return, taking into account risks and liquidity needs.

Investments shall be made with judgment and care, which persons of prudence, discretion and intelligence would exercise for the safety of capital and reasonable income.

The Vice Chancellor of Business and Fiscal Services shall develop and maintain written administrative procedures for the operation of the investment program which are consistent with this investment policy.

Administrators and employees involved in the investment process shall refrain from personal business activity that could conflict with the proper execution of the investment activity or which could impair their ability to make impartial investment decisions.

No such purchase shall exceed the amounts specified by Section 20651 of the California Public Contract Code as amended from time to time.

All such transactions shall be reviewed by the Board every 60 days.

Purchasing General Policy Statement - BP3300

The Governing Board recognizes that money and money management comprise the foundation support of the whole district program. To make that support as effective as possible, the Governing Board intends:

- 1. to encourage advance planning through the best possible budget procedures;
- 2. to explore all practical sources of potential income;
- 3. to guide the expenditure of funds so as to extract the greatest educational returns;
- 4. to expect quality accounting and reporting procedures, and recognize the need for cost effective systems to support this requirement;
- 5. to maintain the level of unit expenditure needed to provide quality education within the ability of the community to pay.
- 6. to ensure that the value of goods and services is adequate for the amount of money expended; and, that specifications for material and equipment are determined (when appropriate).

Cooperative Purchasing by State Contract With Department General Services and Other Public Agencies - BP3304

The Director of Purchasing is authorized to make purchases through the State of California Cooperative Purchasing Program operated by the Department of General Service, and via liaison systems established with other state, county, and city public agencies. These types of purchases will be executed when they are in the best interest of the district relative to optimum pricing, delivery, and purchasing logistics.

Purchasing Code of Ethics and Control Guidelines - BP3302

It is the policy of the Governing Board to adopt the concepts in the suggested Purchasing Code of Ethics and recommended policies and procedures of the California Association of School Business Officials (CASBO). These standards are included in periodic revisions to the "School Purchasing Handbook." The following Code of Ethics is based on the CASBO model.

PURCHASING CODE OF ETHICS

It is the policy of staff and <u>Governing</u> Board of Trustees members:

- 1. To regard public service as a sacred trust, giving primary consideration to the interests of the college district and the community by which we are employed.
- 2. To purchase without prejudice, seeking to obtain the maximum benefit for each tax dollar expended.
- 3. To avoid any unfair, questionable, or unethical practices.
- 4. To respect our obligations and to require that obligations to our college district be respected.
- 5. To accord vendor representatives the same courteous treatment we would like to receive.
- 6. To strive constantly for the improvement of our purchasing methods and the materials we buy.
- 7. To assist purchasing agents of other public entities in the performance of their duties whenever possible.
- 8. To conduct ourselves with fairness and dignity, avoid conflicts of interest, and demand honesty in buying and selling.
- 9. To cooperate with all organizations and individuals engaged in enhancing the development of the purchasing profession.
- 10. To remember that we act as representatives of the college district and to govern ourselves accordingly.
- 11. To negotiate the lowest purchase prices feasible while maintaining quality products and service.
- 12. To adhere to all laws and regulations and to be strong advocates for the success of women, minority, and disabled veteran-owned businesses.
- 13. Members of the <u>Governing Board of Trustees</u> and any district employee shall not be financially interested in any contract made by them in their official capacity; nor, shall any member of the <u>Governing Board of Trustees</u> and any district employee be purchasers of any sale or vendors of any purchase to the district in which they are financially interested.

A. The Board will expend monies in the best interest of the district by:

- 2. Establishing complete and comprehensive specifications.
- 3. Performing sufficient and timely planning to provide for the execution of all prudent purchasing procedures.
- 4. Adhering to the district's Code of Ethics.
- 5. Per Policy 3304 when in the best interest of the district.
- B. The Board will comply with all federal and state laws, rules and regulations, including a commitment to:
 - 1. Secure responsible bidders and vendors by giving vendors an equal opportunity.
 - 2. Implement programs per the State Chancellor's Office in an effort to achieve or exceed targeted volumes of business with minority, women, and disabled veteran-owned enterprises.

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BP 6332 Competitive Bidding and Quotation Policies

- BP3307

Reference: Public Contract Code 20105 - 20113 and 20651 - 20654; Government Contract Code 53060

A. Competitive bids are required for all public works (i.e., construction, alterations, repairs, or improvements) with costs of \$ 15,000 or more, and for all purchases of materials, supplies, and equipment with costs as per BP3306, C-1, or more (sales taxes included) with the following exceptions:

- 1. "Emergency Work" as defined by the Education Code, where time is of the essence. This is work necessary to permit the continuance of classes, and/or avoid danger to life or property.
- 2. "Sole Source" situations as defined by existing case law, in those instances where "competitive proposals would be unavailing or not produce an advantage."
- 3. Purchases through public corporations in those instances "when the Board has determined it to be in the best interests of the district," or via cooperative purchasing as described in BP3304.
- 4. "Special Services and Advice" consulting as defined by the Government Contract Code, where persons specially trained in financial, economic, accounting, architectural, engineering, legal, or administrative matters are needed by the District.
- 5. Informal bidding procedures for public works projects under the Uniform Public Construction Cost Accounting Act as described in BP3310.
- B. When elements of both the "Services" and "Equipment/Supply" spending categories are combined (e.g. a printing project where the vendor provides a service and materials) the higher limit (as per BP3306, C,1) applies for bid requirement purposes.
- C. Integral projects cannot be separated into separate components to circumvent the competitive bidding requirements.
- D. Except for the items at A1-A3 above, requesting competitive quotations is preferable on those purchases which do require competitive bids, and is mandatory for those purchases over \$ 15,000 (unless the conditions at A1-A3 apply, or time is a critical constraint). Generally two (2) or three (3) quotes should be obtained. However, this will vary depending on the nature of the product, the urgency of need, and the responsiveness of vendors. The adequacy of competitive quotes shall be based on the Purchasing Director's judgment.

E. Regarding item A4, Government Contract Code Section 53060 allows for the award of contracts for Special Services and Advice without competitive bidding. However, it will be District practice that all purchases estimated to be \$ 15,000 or more will be subject to the procedure at section D above, unless that requirement is waived by the Chancellor or a Vice Chancellor in the Chancellor's absence.

F. The Board delegates to the responsible managers authorization to make any "emergency work" purchases with cost below the amounts where competitive bids are required. Those "emergency work" purchases, with cost at or above the amounts where competitive bids are required, can be performed without competitive bidding as long as they are pre-approved by the Board and the Orange County Superintendent of Schools or executed in accordance with policy BP3310.

A standard shall be established for administrative use of technology hardware and software, and all purchases will adhere to these standards.

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<u>BP 6340</u> Contracts -Equal Employment Opportunity Provision - BP3100

Reference: Education Code Sections 81641 et seq.; Public Contract Code Sections 20650 et seq.

The Board delegates to the Chancellor the authority to enter into contracts on behalf of the District and to establish administrative procedures for contract awards and management, subject to the following:

- Contracts are not enforceable obligations until they are ratified by the Board.
- Contracts for work to be done, services to be performed or for goods, equipment or supplies to be furnished or sold to the District that exceed the amounts specified in Public Contract Code Section 20651 shall require prior approval by the Board.
- When bids are required according to Public Contract Code Section 20651, the Board shall award each such contract to the lowest responsible bidder who meets the specifications published by the District and who shall give such security as the Board requires, or reject all bids.

If the Chancellor concludes that the best interests of the District will be served by pre-qualification of bidders in accordance with Public Contract Code Section 20651.5, pre-qualification may be conducted in accordance with procedures that provide for a uniform system of rating on the basis of a questionnaire and financial statements.

If the best interests of the District will be served by a contract, lease, requisition or purchase order though any other public corporation or agency in accordance with Public Contract Code Section 20652, the Chancellor is authorized to proceed with a contract.

It is the policy of the Governing Board of Rancho Santiago Community College District to require from any bidding vendor or contractor, prior to the awarding of a contract, an affidavit that such vendor or contractor does comply with all Federal and State regulations pertaining to fair employment practices and will make every effort to follow the affirmative action guidelines as set forth by the district. Such Certificate of Compliance is to be required in all cases where the Rancho Santiago Community College District is legally required to advertise for bids prior to contract.

BP 6400 Audits - BP3104

Legal Reference: Education Code 84040(b) and 84040.3

The Governing Board of Trustees will assure sound fiscal management practices, via fiscal accountability.

The <u>Governing</u> Board <u>of Trustees</u> shall provide for an annual audit of all funds, books and accounts of the district, in accordance with the regulations of <u>the Board of Governors</u> <u>Title 5</u>. The <u>Chancellor shall assure that an outside audit is completed. The audit shall be made by certified public accountants licensed by the State Board of Accountancy.</u>

The <u>Governing</u> Board of Trustees shall review the annual audit at one of its regularly scheduled public meetings. The <u>Governing</u> Board of Trustees shall cause a Request for Proposal (RFP) of auditing services to be issued for the recruitment of an independent auditor every three (3) years, or more frequently if the Board deems it necessary.

The Vice Chancellor of Business and Fiscal Services shall review the RFP's and recommend candidates for interviewing by the <u>Governing</u> Board of Trustees <u>or a committee designated by the Board</u>.

The <u>Governing</u> Board of Trustees shall interview the recommended candidate firms and select the independent auditor.

The <u>Governing</u> Board of Trustees shall meet with the independent auditor prior to the commencement of auditing work, which is to be done for the fiscal year, to discuss the scope and purpose of the annual audit.

Administrators and employees involved in the auditing process shall refrain from activity that could conflict or compromise the execution of the audit or the independence of the auditor.

BP 6450 Wireless or Cellular Telephone Use (new)

Reference: Vehicle Code Sections 12810.3, 23123, and 23124; Internal Revenue Code (I.R.C.) Sections 274(d)(4) and 280F(d)(4)

The Chancellor shall determine if it is in the best interests of the District to provide a cellular or wireless phone at District expense.

<u>Cellular telephones provided by the District for compensatory reasons are classified by the Internal Revenue Service as a fringe benefit, the value of which must be included in an employee's gross income.</u>

The value of a cellular telephone provided by the District primarily for non-compensatory business purposes is excludable from an employee's income. Record keeping of business and personal use of District-issued cellular telephones shall not generally be required when the telephones are issued for non-compensatory business reasons.

Motor vehicle drivers may not use wireless or cellular telephones while operating their vehicles without a hands-free listening device and shall comply with all requirements of California law regarding the use of wireless or cellular telephones in vehicles.

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BP 6500 Property Management - BP3518

References: Education Code Sections 81300 et seg.

The Chancellor is delegated the authority to act as the Board's negotiator regarding all property management matters that are necessary for the benefit of the District. No transaction regarding the lease, sale, use or exchange of real property by the District shall be enforceable until acted on by the Board itself.

The Chancellor shall establish such procedures as may be necessary to assure compliance with all applicable laws relating to the sale, lease, use or exchange of real property by the District.

<u>BP 6501</u> Plant Maintenance and Operations General Policy Statement - BP3500

An effective educational program requires clean, healthful, safe, businesslike, functional and attractive facilities. The Campus Services staff is charged with the responsibility of caring for and protecting these facilities. In order to carry out the efficient maintenance and operation of these facilities, the Campus Services staff must work cooperatively with students, staff and administrators.

BP 6502 Outside Governing Agencies - BP3507

Legal Reference: Education Code 81130, 81132, 81133, 81142; California Code of Regulations - Title 24

The operation of district facilities requires the adherence to codes, laws and regulations imposed by outside governing agencies. District facilities shall be constructed, maintained and operated within the provisions of government agencies having jurisdiction.

BP 6503 Inventory Control - BP3400

References: Education Code 60500, 60510, 60521, and 81450 - 81455

The <u>Governing</u> Board of Trustees authorizes an inventory system for the control of district fixed assets. The inventory system shall be adequate to meet basic and required internal control, accounting and risk management requirements.

The Vice Chancellor of Business and Fiscal Services or designee are responsible for the development, implementation, and reconciliation of Rancho Santiago Community College District's inventory system.

The <u>Governing</u> Board of Trustees shall adopt adequate procedures and staff resources to maintain records and controls for all district moveable equipment. This includes all district direct and auxiliary operations and services, and all related activities supervised by the Chancellor and sanctioned by the <u>Governing</u> Board of Trustees. All district managers and staff shall be responsible and accountable for inventory control in their area.

All district managers and staff shall be responsible and accountable for inventory control in their area.

BP 6505 Inventory Order Quantity and Storage Controls - BP3404

Revised 01/24/00

The District does not maintain a central store of inventory items, except for a small dollar office supply inventory managed by the Bookstore. District policy shall be to maintain only minimal central warehouse storage, primarily for emergency storage, and for departments to order inventory in a manner which will minimize inventory carrying costs and the risk of obsolescence.

Departments should not request orders for inventory needs beyond the current fiscal period, unless there is some substantial economic benefit. The Director of Purchasing Services shall be contacted regarding exceptions and is responsible for managing the District-wide coordination of inventory orders in an effort to reduce cost and adhere to all code regulations.

Items stored at college and district office locations should be minimal and under the ultimate responsibility of the college president, vice Chancellor, or designee.

Items which are obsolete or temporarily out of service and excess inventory items are stored in an off-site warehouse. For security and segregation of duties, this warehouse is managed by the Director of Purchasing.

<u>BP 6506 Company District Property, Security, Privacy and Searches - BP3601</u>

District property included but not limited to desks, storage areas, work areas, lockers, file cabinets, credenzas, computer systems, office telephones, modems, facsimile machines, duplicating machines and district vehicles are the district's property and must be maintained according to this policy. All such areas and items must be kept clean and are to be used only for work purposes, except as provided in this policy. The district reserves the right, at all times, and without prior notice, to inspect and search any and all district property for the purpose of determining whether this policy or any other district policy has been violated, or whether such inspection and investigation is necessary for purposes of promoting safety in the workplace or compliance with state and federal laws. Such inspections may be conducted during or after business hours and in the presence or absence of the employee.

The district's computer systems and other technical resources, including any voice mail or E-mail systems, are provided for use in the pursuit of the district's business and are to be reviewed, monitored and used only

in that pursuit, except as provided in this policy. As a result, computer data, voice mail and E-mail are readily available to numerous persons. If, during the course of employment, an employee performs or transmits work on the district's computer systems, or other technical resources, that work may be subject to the investigation, search and review of others in accordance with this policy. In addition, any electronically stored communications that an employee either sends or receives from others may be retrieved and reviewed where such investigation serves the legitimate business interests and obligations of the district.

The district recognizes that employees may occasionally find it necessary to use the district's telephones for personal business. Such call must be kept to a minimum and should be made only during break or lunch periods. Official telephone records may be used to monitor this policy.

Employees of the district are otherwise permitted to use district's equipment for occasional, non-district purposes with permission from their direct supervisors. Nevertheless, the employee has no right of privacy as to any information or file maintained in or on district's property or transmitted or stored through district's computer systems, voice mail, E-mail or other technical resources. For purposes of inspecting, investigating or searching employee's computerized files or transmissions, voice mail, or E-mail, the district may override any applicable passwords or codes in accordance with the best interests of the district, its employees, or its clients, customers or visitors. All bills and other documentation related to the use of district equipment or property are the property of the district and may be reviewed and used for purposes that the district considers appropriate.

Employees may access only files or programs, whether computerized or not, that they have permission to enter. Unauthorized review, duplication, dissemination, removal, damage or alteration of files, passwords, computer systems or programs, or other property of district, or improper use of information obtained by unauthorized means, may be grounds for disciplinary action, up to and including termination.

<u>BP 6507</u> Information Technology Services - Copyright of Software - BP3600

Unauthorized copying of software is illegal. Copyright law protects software authors and publishers, just as patent law protects inventors.

Unauthorized copying of software by individuals can harm the entire academic community. If unauthorized copying proliferates on a campus, the institution may incur legal liability.

Unauthorized copying of software is a violation of district policies.

BP 6520 Security for District Property - BP3510

Legal Reference: Education Code Section 81600 et seg.

The Chancellor shall establish procedures necessary to manage, control and protect the assets of the district including but not limited to ensuring sufficient security to protect property, equipment, and information from theft, loss, or significant damage.

BP 6521 Disaster Recovery - BP3602

A contingency plan to ensure that critical data and information technologies services can be sustained during the course of a disaster should be in place. The plan should be comprehensive and tested at least once a year.

BP 6540 District Property & Liability Protection Insurance BP4603

Legal-Reference: Education Code 70902; 75202; 72506 and 81601 et seq.

The Rancho Santiago Community College District Board of Trustees directs the Chancellor to develop and review procedures, every two years or more often if necessary, that insure the safety of students, employees, and the public while on or in district property.

The district shall provide for Chancellor shall be responsible to secure insurance coverage for the District as required by law, which shall include but is not limited to the liabilities described in Education Code Section 72506 as follows: following perils,

- Liability insurance for damages for death, injury to persons, or damage or loss of property
- Liability insurance for the personal liability of the members of the <u>Governing</u> Board of <u>Trustees</u> and other officers and employees of the District for damages for death, injury to a person, or damage or loss of property caused by the negligent act or omission of the member, officer, or employee when acting within the scope of his or her employment
- Loss or damage to real property including district vehicles
- Losses resulting from crime
- Workers compensation insurance
- Loss or damage from other perils

<u>Coverage may be obtained</u> either through the purchase of insurance, self-insurance, or participation in a joint powers authority pursuant to Education Code Section 81603. If the district elects to participate in a joint powers authority, the regulations required by that authority shall be followed.

It shall be the policy of the Board of Trustees of the Rancho Santiago Community College District to maintain a Risk Management Program consistent with all legal requirements pertaining thereto and within the financial capability of the district, providing a program of protection and/or insurance against:

Loss, damage or disability as mandated by the Education, Government, Labor, Insurance, and other pertinent Codes of the State of California, to include, but not limited to loss or damage to the real and personal property of the district, liability of the district and/or the personal liability of members of the Board of Trustees and employees of the district for damages to persons or property, including injury or death, losses due to employee dishonesty, Workers' Compensation Employer's liability, and the provision of a program of health and welfare benefits for employees to the limits established by the Board of Trustees.

Bonding of Personnel - BP4604

All district employees who handle funds shall be covered for \$500,000 under a blanket fidelity bond purchased by the Governing Board or in lieu of a bond, by insurance of no less than \$500,000 per occurrence.

BP 6550 Disposal of Property - BP3405

The <u>Governing</u> Board of <u>Trustees</u> authorizes the Vice Chancellor of Business and Fiscal Services or designee to sell, donate, or dispose of obsolete equipment and material in accordance with state laws. Any item valued under \$5,000, prior to it being declared surplus, will be offered first as a donation to public schools and qualified non-profit charitable organizations preferably located within the Rancho Santiago Community College District service area. All sales of surplus personal property shall be reported to the Board on a periodic basis. This policy shall not be construed as authorizing any representative of the District to dispose of surplus real property at any time.

BP 6600 Capital Construction - BP3504

Legal Reference: Education Code 81005, 81820; Title 5, Section 57150 et seq.

The Chancellor is responsible for planning and administrative management of the district's capital outlay and construction program.

District construction projects shall be supervised by the Chancellor. The District Vice Chancellor of Business Operations and Fiscal Services shall monitor the progress of all construction work including inspection of workmanship, completion of work to meet specifications, and the suitability of proposed changes to the scope and original design of the work. The Vice Chancellor of Business Operations and Fiscal Services shall assure compliance with laws related to use of state funds to acquire and convert existing buildings.

The Board shall approve and submit to the Board of Governors a five year capital construction plan as required by law. The Chancellor or designee shall annually update the plan and present it to the <u>Governing</u> Board of <u>Trustees</u> for approval. The plan shall address, but is not limited to, the criteria contained in law.

Five Year Capital Construction Plan - BP3506

Adopted 01/17/95

The district shall prepare and submit to the Board of Covernors of the California Community Colleges a plan that reflects capital construction for the five year period commencing with the next proposed year of funding. The Five Year Plan shall be subject to review through shared governance and approval of the Board of Trustees and shall be submitted annually at a regularly scheduled Board meeting in advance of the statemendated due date.

BP 6601 Facility Modification and New Construction—BP3511

Reference: Education Code 81130, 81132, 81133, 81142; California Code of Regulations - Title 24

Campus Services shall oversee, coordinate and approve all facility modifications and new construction to insure compliance with district standards, architectural specifications, and code compliance.

Efforts shall be made to schedule construction activities to minimize disruption of district service and classroom operations.

Facility modification is defined as any addition to, removal of, or alteration made to existing facilities. Maintenance funds are not intended for funding such projects. Separate procedures and funding shall be available for facility modifications and new construction.

The <u>Governing</u> Board of Trustees shall review and approve facility modification and construction projects included in the facility modification and capital outlay process.

Projects that are not included as part of the regular facility modification approval process shall be treated as exceptions and require approval of the College Coordinating Board and Chancellor.

All facilities constructed by the district shall comply with applicable Public Contract Codes, California Code of Regulations, and the Education Code.

<u>BP 6603</u> Informal Bidding Procedures Under the Uniform Public Construction Cost Accounting Act - BP3310

Reference: Public Contract Code Section 22000, et seq

The Governing Board of Rancho Santiago Community College District elects to be subject to the uniform public construction cost accounting procedures set forth in Public Contract Code 22000 et seq.

The Board also adopts the alternative bidding and contracting procedures for Public Works projects as specified in Public Contract Code 22000 et seq.

BP 6604 Deferred Maintenance - BP3512

The district shall participate in state funding programs for the replacement of major building and utility components. Staff shall prepare for Chancellor review the required forms and/or a prioritized list of projects recommended for funding for the next fiscal year and for a five-year plan. The district's Deferred Maintenance Plan for which state funding is being requested shall be subject to review and approval of the <u>Governing Board of Trustees</u>.

<u>BP 6605</u> Selection of Architects - BP3503

Architects shall be selected by the <u>Governing Board of Trustees</u> based upon the recommendations of the Chancellor employing the rating elements noted below or any other unranked elements deemed appropriate:

- Responsiveness to RFP breadth and depth of response
- Professional reputation of firm · Community college/school district experience
- Experience with the Division of State Architecture · Satisfaction of prior/current clients
- Adequacy of firm's support staff and/or sub-contractors
- Experience in meeting schedules and deadlines
- Accuracy of firm's cost estimates
- Evidence of ability to prioritize project and begin the job in a timely fashion
- Proposed methodology to be utilized in design of project as it relates to involvement of faculty, staff, management, and other interested parties
- Aesthetics and functionality of projects
- Site evaluations of projects
- Proposed fees
- Firms located in the District or Orange County (for locally-funded projects)
- Veteran owned firms

Architects are hired on a project basis to perform all tasks from preliminary planning through completion of construction.

The Selection of Architects' Policy is intended for major capital outlay projects and may be waived for minor remodeling and construction projects with approval of the Chancellor.

BP 6620 Naming District Properties and Facilities - BP9025

The <u>Governing</u> Board of Trustees retains authority for naming college land reserves, roads, sites, colleges, campuses, athletic fields, buildings, major centers, and other highly visible properties or facilities. No commitment for naming shall be made prior to Board approval of the proposed name. Proposed names may be provided by the Chancellor, trustees, and any other source.

The Chancellor will establish and implement procedures that provide name proposals for the <u>Governing</u> Board's of <u>Trustees'</u> consideration. For each naming proposal occasion, the Chancellor will be mindful of timelines that allow for appropriate consultation.

Naming of portions of buildings, small outdoor areas, and other minor properties or facilities may be approved by the Chancellor.

BP 6700 Civic Center and Other Use of District Facilities Use - BP1330

Reference: Education Code Sections 82537 and 82542

The state law, Civic Center Act, permits the Governing Board of the district to grant the use of buildings or grounds for public, literary, scientific, recreational, or educational meetings, or for the discussion of matters of general or public interest.

The Governing Board may also establish such terms and conditions of usage as it deems proper, subject to limitations, requirements, and restrictions set forth in the Education Code of the State of California.

There is a Civic Center at each of the colleges and the District Office. The Civic Centers are the classrooms and public meeting areas at each location. Use of the Civic Center shall be granted as provided by law. The Chancellor shall establish procedures regarding the use of District property and facilities, including property designated by the District as a Civic Center, by community groups, outside contractors, and others.

The administrative procedure shall reflect the requirements of applicable law, including Education Code Section 82537, regarding Civic Centers. The procedures shall include reasonable rules regarding the time, place, and manner of use of District facilities. They shall assure that persons or organizations using District property are charged such fees as are authorized by law. Public use of District property shall not interfere with scheduled instructional programs or other activities of the District on behalf of students.

No group or organization may use District property to unlawfully discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, disability, sex (i.e., gender), gender identity, gender expression, or sexual orientation, or the perception that a person has one or more of the foregoing characteristics, or because a person associates with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics, or on any basis prohibited by law.

Use of the District's Civic Centers will be only for the purposes described by the California Legislature in Education Code Section 82537(a). These purposes include use by associations "formed for recreational, educational, political, economic, artistic, or moral activities of the public school districts" in order to "engage in supervised recreational activities" or "meet and discuss, from time to time, as they may desire, any subjects and questions which in their judgment appertain to the educational, political, economic, artistic, and moral interests of the citizens of the communities in which they reside" (Education Code Section 82537(a)). In granting permission to use the Civic Centers, the District will not discriminate on the basis of viewpoint with regard to organizations engaging in expressive activities on the topics and subject matters articulated above.

BP 6740 Citizens Oversight Committee (new)

If a bond measure has been authorized pursuant to the conditions of Proposition 39 as defined in the California Constitution, the [CEO] shall establish a Citizens Oversight Committee in accordance with the applicable law and necessary regulations.

BP 6750 Vehicle Operation and Parking - BP3501

Legal Reference: Education Code 76360; Vehicle Code Section 21113

This policy is intended to promote safe and orderly movement of traffic within district property and the safe and orderly parking of vehicles and bicycles.

The Chancellor shall establish such administrative procedures regarding vehicles and parking on campus as are necessary for the orderly operation of the instructional program. No person shall drive any vehicle or leave any vehicle unattended on the campus except in accordance with such procedures.

All applicable provisions of the California Vehicle Code are expressly applicable both on and off paved roadways.

Parking of motor vehicles and bicycles is limited to specifically designated areas. Vehicles or bicycles parked in violation of the provisions of this code are subject to fines, towing, or impoundment.

All persons who enter the colleges are charged with knowledge of the provisions of this procedure and are subject to the penalties for violations of such provisions.

A fee for parking motorized vehicles on district-operated premises shall be charged to all students and employees at sites where such a fee is required. Revenue from this source shall be used per Education Code requirements.

In accordance with Section 21113a of the California Vehicle Code, it shall be a misdemeanor for any person to do any act forbidden or fail to perform any act required in these procedures.

Parking fees may be established in accordance with these board policies. (See BP 5030 titled Fees.)

The district shall provide transportation for use by staff and students for official district and college business.

Vehicles shall be maintained in a clean and safe condition in accordance with applicable codes and regulations.

BP 6752 Donation of Vehicles - BP4608

All district vehicles shall be legally registered with Rancho Santiago Community College listed as the legal owner. No employee shall accept possession of a vehicle on the district's behalf without documentation required to legally transfer ownership to the district.

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BP 6800 Safety (new)

The Chancellor shall establish administrative procedures to ensure the safety of employees and students on District sites, including the following:

- Compliance with the United States Department of Transportation regulations implementing the Federal Omnibus Transportation Employee Testing Act of 1991. Specifically, the District shall comply with the regulations of the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and, if applicable, the Federal Transit Administration (FTA). Compliance with these policies and procedures may be a condition of employment.
- Establishment of an Injury and Illness Prevention Program in compliance with applicable OSHA regulations and state law. These procedures shall promote an active and aggressive program to reduce and/or control safety and health risks.
- Establishment of a Hazardous Material Communications Program, which shall include review of all chemicals or materials received by the District for hazardous properties, instruction for employees and students on the safe handling of such materials, and proper disposal methods for hazardous materials.
- Prohibition of the use of tobacco in all public buildings.

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BP 6900 Auxiliary Services Bookstores - BP3226

Reference: Education Code Section 81676; Civil Code Section 1798.90

The district shall operate a bookstore(s) for the benefit of students, faculty and staff, and establish a bookstore fund designated to receive the proceeds derived from the bookstore's operations. All necessary expenses including salaries, wages and cost of capital improvements for the bookstore may be paid from bookstore revenue. The district shall maintain a bank account for the bookstore(s) established in accordance with applicable laws and restrictions. The bookstore(s) shall be a part of the community college and shall support the district's mission.

The Governing Board has established a food service operation which is contracted out to a private vendor. The food service operation shall be for the general benefits of students, faculty and staff, shall be maintained in a professional manner, and shall comply with all applicable health and safety codes.

Any monies received from the contractor for the food service operation shall be deposited into the diversified fund of Auxiliary Services.
