

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

I. INTRODUCTION

This Executive Summary report presents the main findings from a telephone study conducted by Gene Bregman & Associates on behalf of the Rancho Santiago Community College District (RSCCD). A total of 600 likely voters in a November, 2008 election throughout the Rancho Santiago Community College District were interviewed from June 13 - 15, 2008. A survey of this size has a margin of error ranging from +/- 2.4% to +/- 4.0%, depending on response levels to a particular question. If a difference is not mentioned in this report, it can be assumed to be not statistically significant, not meaningful to the discussion, or both.

Particular attention has been paid to the differences among all voters in the District, those who live in the Orange Unified School District, and those who live in the combined Garden Grove/Santa Ana Unified School Districts area. Summary charts can be found attached to this Executive Summary report.

II. SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

1. Most people with an opinion gave "excellent" or "good" job ratings to California community colleges, in general, (62 percent), the Rancho Santiago Community College District (54 percent), Santa Ana College (51 percent) and Santiago Canyon College (50 percent). Among the rest of the respondents, most were unable to voice an opinion and very few had negative opinions about each entity.

Opinions of the District were more positive among those who said an immediate family member had attended one of the schools in the District and those who remembered the 2002 bond measure. Positive ratings were lower among men 50 and over.

Opinions of Santa Ana College were more positive among those who said an immediate family member had attended the College, residents of the Garden Grove/Santa Ana Unified School District area, residents of the City



of Santa Ana, and those under 40 years of age. Once again, positive ratings were lower among men 50 and over.

Opinions of Santiago Canyon College were more positive among those who said an immediate family member had attended the College, those who remembered the 2002 bond measure and those under 40 years of age. As with the previous ratings, positive ratings were lower among men 50 and over.

2. Most voters said that the main role that community colleges play today is "getting students started on their education after high school and preparing them for four year colleges" (63 percent), and a majority also said this should be their main role in the future (56 percent). In most other studies where we have asked this question, most people said the future role should be "providing vocational training both to prepare students for the job market and to keep the current local workforce up-to-date."

Voters were evenly divided between the two choices on the future role of community colleges among those who remembered the 2002 bond measure, those registered as Independents or with "other" parties, and Democratic men over 50.

 76 percent said that their local community college had at least "some need" for more money, including 37 percent who said there was a "great need" for more money.

More people said there was a "great need" among those identifying themselves as Hispanic or Asian, renters, residents of the area encompassing the Garden Grove and Santa Ana Unified School Districts, residents of the City of Santa Ana, those who said someone in their family had attended Santa Ana College, those under 40 years of age, and those who vote only in higher turnout elections.

Fewer voters said there was a great need among registered Republicans, Whites, people who vote in all or nearly all elections, residents of the City of Anaheim, voters in the Orange Unified School District, and homeowners.



4. Somewhat fewer people (69 percent), said there was at least some need for "the modernization and upgrading of existing local community college facilities," including 29 percent who said this was a "great need."

More people said there was a "great need" among those identifying themselves as Hispanic or Asian, renters, residents of the area encompassing the Garden Grove and Santa Ana Unified School Districts, residents of the City of Santa Ana, women under 50 years of age, and those who vote only in higher turnout elections.

Fewer voters said the local community college had a great need to upgrade facilities among registered Republicans, Whites, people who vote in all or nearly all elections, residents of the City of Anaheim, voters in the Orange Unified School District, and homeowners.

5. When asked about the need for the District "to build additional facilities to relieve overcrowding," fewer voters (63 percent) said there was at least some need, although those saying there was a "great need" (31 percent) was about equal to the proportion saying there was a great need for modernizing and upgrading facilities.

More people said there was a "great need" among those identifying themselves as Hispanic or Asian, residents of the area encompassing the Garden Grove and Santa Ana Unified School Districts, residents of the City of Santa Ana, and those who vote only in higher turnout elections.

Lower percentages said the local community college had a great need to build additional facilities among registered Republicans, Whites, people who vote in all or nearly all elections, residents of the City of Anaheim, and voters in the Orange Unified School District.

6. When first asked to vote on a possible bond measure for the Rancho Santiago Community College District, overall support was below the 55 percent threshold needed for passage for a bond measure bearing a \$25 per \$100,000 assessed value tax (Yes = 51 percent). Support reached the 55 percent threshold with a \$16 tax rate (58 percent), increasing to 67 percent when the tax rate dropped to \$8.

Support was slightly higher in the Garden Grove/Santa Ana USD area, (\$25 = 53 percent, \$16 = 59 percent, \$8 = 68 percent), than in the Orange USD area (\$25 = 49 percent, \$16 = 57 percent, \$8 = 64 percent).

Support in all vote questions was higher among those who describe themselves as Asian, renters, those who vote less frequently, those who said that they or an immediate family member had attended either Santa Ana or Santiago Canyon College, registered Democrats, and those under 40 years of age.

Support was lower among residents of the City of Anaheim, homeowners, those who had no family member attending either of the District's colleges, those who vote in every or nearly every election, those who identify themselves as White or Hispanic, and those registered as Republicans, independents or with some "other" party.

7. About two-thirds of the voters (68 percent) either did not remember the 2002 bond measure (61 percent) or remembered it but had no opinion a bout how the District was spending the bond money (7 percent). For the rest, 16 percent said the District was doing an "excellent" or "good" job spending the bond money, with just 5 percent saying it was doing a "poor" job.

Fewer people remembered the 2002 bond among undecided voters, those who said that no immediate family member had attended either District college, those who have lived in the area for less than ten years, and non-Whites.

- 8. While voters responded favorably to each of seven recent programs and accomplishments of the District, the largest proportions said their opinions of the District became much more favorable because of two items:
 - The District's colleges train thousands of health care professionals, including nurses, paramedics, occupational therapists, medical technologists, pharmacy technicians, and others every year (Much more favorable = 46 percent)



Last year, nearly 3,000 District graduates transferred to University
of California and California State University campuses to continue
their education and get their 4-year degrees, with about 4,000
students earning either associate degrees or professional
certificates (Much more favorable = 46 percent)

Among those people who did not support the bond measure at first but became supporters at the end of the interview, reactions were most favorable for the items concerning 3,000 students transferring to four year colleges and that "The District wants to build an off-campus Firefighters Training Academy alongside the Sheriff's Training Academy to create a unique public safety complex to serve the needs of Orange County residents for many years to come."

Those who had a family member who attended a District college, renters, and those describing themselves as Asian reacted more favorably to most items.

Garden Grove/Santa Ana residents reacted more favorably to the District's Digital Media Center.

Women more often than men reacted favorably to three items: 3,000 students transferring to four-year colleges; the fact that RSCCD is one of the fastest growing districts in the state and is now the fourth largest in California; and the Orange County Sheriff's Regional Training Academy providing state-of-the-art training for 800 new law enforcement officers each year.

- 9. Among 13 problems that could be addressed by the bond measure, two-thirds or more of the voters said that 8 were either "extremely serious" or "very serious" problems, including five where about one-third said the problem was "extremely serious." These five were:
 - The building that currently provides courses for the nursing and pharmacy programs has science labs that have corroded equipment that simply cannot be safely used (Extremely serious problem= 35 percent)



- Schools need to add or improve outside lighting to increase safety and security on campus, especially for women taking classes after work and at night (Extremely serious problem = 34 percent)
- Classrooms need to be made safe from asbestos and other hazards Extremely serious = 34 percent)
- Santa Ana College is especially overcrowded; in fact, the school was built for 10 to 15,000 students, but currently serves over 35,000 students, and enrollment continues to increase (Extremely serious = 33 percent)
- Since the Colleges do not have the facilities to provide all the classes that are needed, students often cannot graduate on time (Extremely serious = 32 percent)

Most items were more often said to be serious problems by: renters than owners; non-Whites than Whites; women than men; those under 50 than those 50 and over; and Democrats rather than Republicans.

In addition, those people who had a family member who attended either Santa Ana College or Santiago Canyon College more often said that three problems were serious: Santa Ana College being built for 10-15,000 students but now having more than 35,000 students, and increasing; technology and infrastructure wiring being unable to handle the computers that all students should be using; and inadequate parking facilities affecting neighborhood residents and forcing students to miss classes when they could not find a place to park.

10. The most effective reasons to oppose a new bond measure were that "the last bond measure was supposed to pay for all these improvements; we shouldn't be asked again to increase our taxes" (Much more likely to oppose = 36 percent) and "With the economy in near-recession conditions and gas prices at record levels, the last thing we need is to pay higher taxes" (35 percent).

The belief that the last bond was supposed to pay for the improvements was more effective among residents of the Garden Grove/Santa Ana USD area than among residents of the Orange USD area.



City of Santa Ana residents reacted more strongly than other voters to the argument that they did not trust the District because the last bond paid for building the Sheriff's Training Academy instead of the new science building.

Those people who had no family member attending the District's colleges were more influenced by the argument that "taxes are already too high without this tax increase."

Voters 50 and over more often did not trust the District, either in general or because of the science building/Sheriff's Training academy issue.

Homeowners and the most frequent voters (those who vote in all or nearly all elections) reacted more positively to many of the opposition arguments.

- 11. Among all voters, more than four people in ten said that five of the reasons to support the bond measure would make them "much more likely" to vote in favor of it. Perhaps of even greater importance, every reason was more effective in the Garden Grove/Santa Ana USD area than in the Orange USD area. The five most effective reasons were:
 - "This bond will help give students access to the classrooms, labs, equipment and technological advancements needed to help them prepare to be competitive in the job market" (Total Much More Favorable = 44 percent; Garden Grove/Santa Ana USD= 52 percent)
 - "None of this money will go to pay administrators" (Total Much More Favorable = 44 percent; Garden Grove/Santa Ana USD= 52 percent)
 - "All the money raised by this measure will be used here in our local community" (Total Much More Favorable = 44 percent; Garden Grove/Santa Ana USD= 50 percent)
 - "Passage of this measure will allow the Rancho Santiago Community College District to qualify for millions of dollars in state matching funds that otherwise would be lost to other community college districts" (Total Much More Favorable = 43 percent; Garden Grove/Santa Ana USD= 48 percent)



 "Passage of this measure will enable more students to transfer to four year colleges" (Total Much More Favorable = 43 percent; Garden Grove/Santa Ana USD= 48 percent)

Most reasons were viewed more positively by renters, those who had a family member who attended either District college, voters under 40 years of age, and registered Democrats.

Most reasons were less effective with homeowners, those who had no family tie to either college, Whites, residents of the City of Anaheim, registered Republicans, and men 50 and over.

The reason that "without this measure, the Rancho Santiago Community College District will not have the facilities for local residents to take the job training and career development courses they need" was more effective with women than men and with those who lived in the area for less than 10 years.

Women also were more often favorably influenced by another job-related statement: "This bond will help give students access to the classrooms, labs, equipment and technological advancements needed to help them prepare to be competitive in the job market."

Those who had lived in the area for less than 10 years also reacted more positively than other voters to the statement that "An independent citizens' oversight committee has certified that the money from the existing bond has been spent properly; they also will make sure that the money from this bond is spent properly."

12. Having heard about the problems that could be addressed by the bond, as well as reasons to vote for and against it, overall support remained slightly below the 55 percent threshold needed for passage for a bond measure bearing a \$25 per \$100,000 assessed value tax (Yes = 54 percent). Overall, there also were slight increases in support for bonds at tax rates of \$16 (60 percent) and \$8 (68 percent).

Support stayed slightly higher in the Garden Grove/Santa Ana USD area, (\$25 = 56 percent, \$16 = 60 percent, \$8 = 70 percent), than in the Orange USD area (\$25 = 52 percent, \$16 = 58 percent, \$8 = 67 percent).



Support in at least some of the vote questions was higher among those who describe themselves as Asian, renters, those who vote less frequently, those who said that they or an immediate family member had attended either Santa Ana or Santiago Canyon College, registered Democrats, those under 40 years of age, and those who have never voted by absentee ballot.

Support was lower among residents of the City of Anaheim, homeowners, those who had no family member attending either of the District's colleges, those who vote in every or nearly every election, those who identify themselves as White, those registered as Republicans, independents or with some "other" party, men 50 and over, and those who have lived in the area for more than 20 years.

13. The most believable people on this issue to RSCCD voters were "teachers in the Rancho Santiago Community College District (Very believable = 37 percent), "students in the Rancho Santiago Community College District (Very believable = 35 percent), and local firefighters (Very believable = 34 percent). Also particularly believable were "doctors and nurses who work at local hospitals" (32 percent), Emergency Medical Technicians (32 percent), and "local police officers" (29 percent).

Among those who changed their vote to become "yes" voters at the end of the interview, teachers and students were most believable. Among those who changed their vote from "yes" at the beginning to either "no" or "undecided" at the end of the interview, firefighters, EMTs, police, and doctors and nurses were most believable.

Teachers and students at District colleges were more believable to those with a family member who had attended one of the colleges, and those less than 40 years of age. Students were much less frequently believable to those 65 and over and to registered Republicans.

The RSCCD Board of Trustees was less believable to those 65 and over and those who have lived in the area for more than 20 years.

III. CONCLUSIONS

The Rancho Santiago Community College District is faced with several choices for measures to put before District voters in the November, 2008 election. There could be one districtwide measure or the District could be divided into two SFID areas for placement of different measures in each area or a measure in only one of the two areas.

As District leadership considers these options, it is important to point out the positive and negative factors learned in the survey. First, there is a base of goodwill that the District and its member Colleges enjoy in the community. Majorities of voters said that California community colleges, in general, and the District and each of its individual colleges are doing either an excellent or a good job. Relatively few voters remember the 2002 bond measure, and among those who do remember it, most say the district is doing a good job spending the money from the bonds. Further, most people felt that the colleges are meeting their main objective. They said that California community colleges currently have, and in the future should have as their top priority, to prepare students to continue with their educations at four year colleges and universities.

Voters also react positively to the programs and accomplishments of the District, as well as many of the reasons for supporting the bond measure. However, voters are only somewhat aware of the needs of these colleges. While reactions are generally quite positive towards the overall needs as well as the specific problems that will be addressed by the bond measure, the intensity level evident in voters' responses indicates that they are not yet aware of the immediacy of these needs.

In addition, although the reasons to oppose a bond measure did not receive as strong a reaction as did the reasons to support a bond measure, significant proportions of voters found a few of the opposition statements to be effective.

When deciding on a course of action for the November ballot, several questions are worth noting. In particular, residents of what would be an SFID area encompassing the Garden Grove and Santa Ana Unified School District boundaries have only slightly higher "yes" vote totals than those living in the rest of the District. However, these voters' predisposition to support a measure for the RSCCD can be seen by more awareness that the District and its colleges have a great need for more money, to modernize and upgrade facilities, and to build additional facilities to relieve overcrowding. More important, every reason to support a bond measure was more effective with these voters than with voters living within the boundaries of the Orange Unified School District.



The survey tested bond measures with tax rates of \$25, \$16 and \$8 per \$100,000 of assessed value. Falling short of the 55 percent required to pass a bond measure under the terms of Proposition 39, makes a measure with a tax rate at the highest level to be problematic, at best. A measure with a tax rate at or below the \$16 tested in the survey, would have a much better chance for success, especially if confined to an SFID encompassing the Garden Grove and Santa Ana Unified School Districts, where it received support from 59 percent of the survey participants in the first ballot. For a measure confined to a separate SFID, encompassing the Orange Unified School District area, lower levels of support for various questions in the survey, when combined with this area's voting history, points towards a separate measure (if any at all) with a tax rate no greater than \$8 or \$9 per \$100,000 assessed value.

In short, we believe the Rancho Santiago Community College District has some good options for this Fall. However, voters' lack of specific knowledge of the Colleges' programs, accomplishments and needs must be addressed over the next few months. Obtaining super-majority voter approval for a tax measure is never easy. It requires hard work in all areas of the community. Assuming that the District's supporters can provide the needed resources to have a professional, proficient, and well-managed campaign, with adequate volunteers from the community, we are optimistic about the District's chances for passage of a bond measure (or measures) in November, 2008.

Summary of Findings RSCCD Phone Survey

Procedural Overview

This survey was conducted on June 16 and 17 between 2:00 pm and 9:00 p.m. Fifty surveys were completed by questioning individuals selected randomly among Vietnamese voters in the district who have voted in at least one of the last four elections. Of the 50 surveys, 43 were completed with residents of the Santa Ana or Garden Grove Unified School Districts and seven were completed among residents of the Orange U.S.D. All surveys were completed in Vietnamese.

Results Overview

In GGUSD and SAUSD, 72% of the respondents answered that they would (definitely or probably) support a bond on the first question when the cost was \$25 per \$100,000 of assessed value. The response was 76% for \$15/\$100,000 and 86% for \$8/\$100,000.

On the second question, the same universe supported a bond by 79% at \$25/\$100,000; by 81% at \$15/\$100,000; and by 90% at \$8/\$100,000.

- Fewer Vietnamese remember the bond from 2006 (16% compared to 39%).
- In general, this survey shows that Vietnamese seem more hesitant to give negative
- A larger percentage of renters were included in the Vietnamese survey (56% to 24%), however, in the areas surveyed, we would expect to find more renters than homeowners.








Current Main Role of Community Colleges



What Should the Future Main Role of Community Colleges Be?









Need to Modernize/Upgrade Local Community College Facilities







Need for District to Build New Facilities to Relieve Overcrowding
