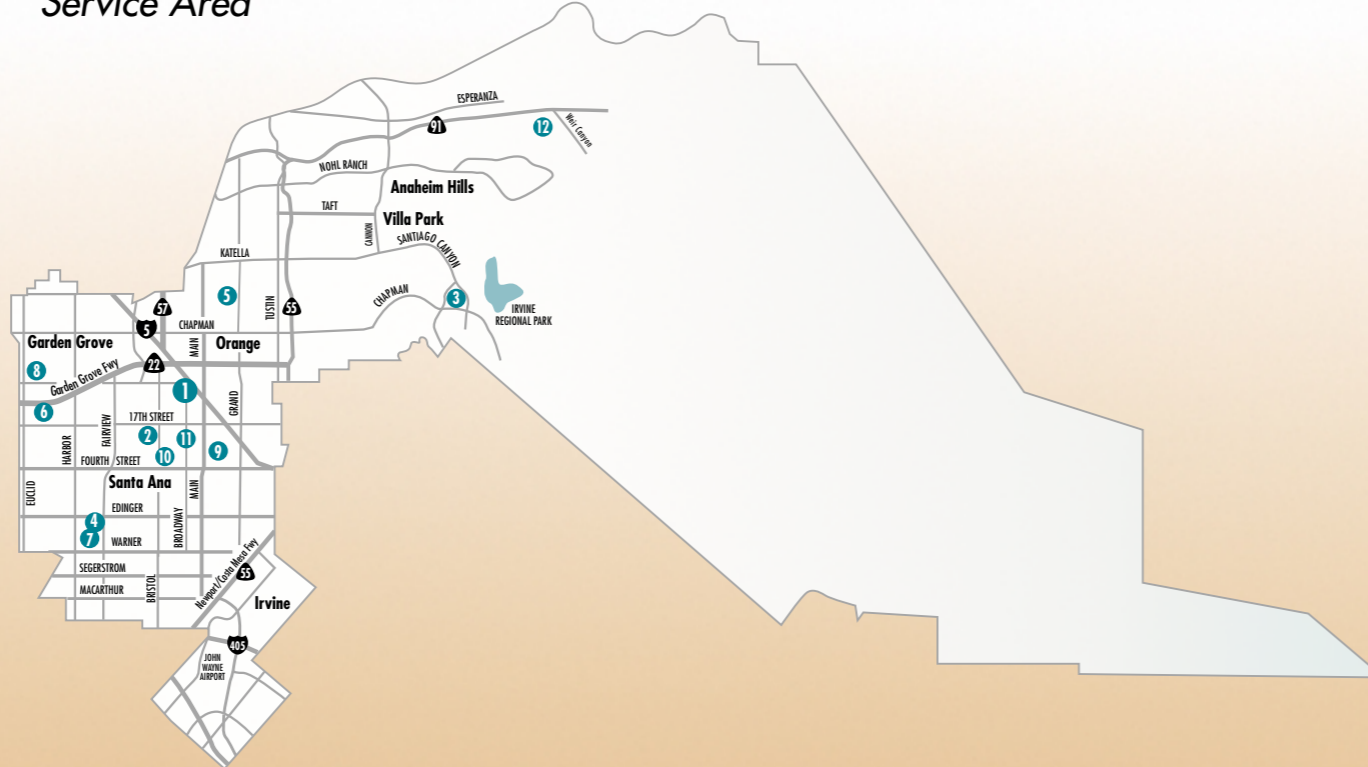

Today, the district serves a population of nearly 700,000 residents in the communities of Anaheim Hills, Garden Grove, Irvine, Orange,

Santa Ana, Tustin and Villa Park.

Encompassing 24 percent of Orange County's total area (193 square miles), the district maintains 12 facilities including its operation center.

### Community Support and Dividends

The college district is funded through a combination of state revenue, federal funds, local property taxes, student fees and state lottery proceeds. Funding is received based on a number of factors, including the number of students served.

The college district helps the whole county by creating a skilled workforce providing essential services such as:

The district's mission is to respond to the educational needs of an ever-changing community and to provide programs and services that reflect academic excellence. Its colleges promote open access and celebrate the diversity within its community, students and employees.



**Focused on learning**

Accomplished, knowledgeable faculty with a passion for teaching and genuine interest in student success is the district's foundation.

Academic instruction and workforce training includes:

- Lower division transfer curricula

- Non-credit adult education

Instruction is offered in over 150 programs that lead to an associate degree or certificate. The district ranks as California's second highest producer of minority graduates, ranking sixth nationally in this category. It also ranks 30th among the top one hundred associate degree producers in the nation.

College and Santiago Canyon College students successfully transferred to a baccalaureate-granting institution. Both colleges' academic standards are rigorously reviewed and each is accredited through the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. Serving the academic preparation and occupational training needs of area residents, convenient non-credit instruction is offered at four continuing education centers and more than 100 community sites. Accounting for 32 percent of its total enrollments, the district ranks as California's third highest community college provider of adult non-credit education.

**Our History**

In 1915, Santa Ana Junior College opened its doors to 25 students in downtown Santa Ana. A bond issue in 1945 paved the way for development of Santa Ana College at the corner of 17th and Bristol Street, at that time a rural outskirts of the city.

Responding to population growth and new educational needs, Rancho Santiago Community College District was formed in 1971, encompassing both the Santa Ana



Unified and Orange Unified School Districts. In 1998, it officially became a multi-college district with the establishment of Santiago Canyon College in Orange.
