Mr. Conley reported on his recent participation in a League of Innovation conference and a legislative visit to Washington, D.C.

Mr. Hanna commended the district on pursuing a public/private relationship on Item 5.7 (Approval of Lease of Real Property for Wireless Communications Equipment at SAC) which will bring approximately \$40,000 income to the district.

Mr. Hanna thanked staff for their assistance during these difficult budget times and thanked Ms. Weidner for the Bond Oversight Committee Report to the Community.

Mr. McLoughlin asked for an overview of on-line classes the district offers.

Mr. Yarbrough asked if on-line classes offered by the district increase the district's FTES figures.

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At the board meeting held at SAC, the board moved closed session to the end of the meeting; therefore, Mr. Hanna requested when the board meeting is held at SCC, closed session be moved to the beginning of the meeting. Due to the science building dedication, Mr. Hanna requested that closed session be moved to the end of the meeting again so college staff has the opportunity to attend the board meeting.

7.0 ADJOURNMENT

The next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees will be held on April 26, 2010, at Santiago Canyon College, Room SC-105, 8045 E. Chapman Avenue, Orange, California.

Bristol St, Santa Ana, CA 92704 and the County of Orange, (hereinafter "County"), a political subdivision of the State of California, with a place of business at 511 N. Sycamore St., Santa Ana, CA 92701, which are sometimes individually referred to as "party", or collectively referred to as "parties"

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the County desires to obtain Public Service Institute (PSI) Classes; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor agrees to render such services per the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth; and

WHEREAS, the County has authorized the Purchasing Agent or designee to enter into Contract with Contractor for obtaining said services; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties mutually agree as follows:

ARTICLES

GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- E. **Delivery:** Time of delivery of services is of the essence in this Contract. County reserves the right to refuse any services and to cancel all or any part of the services that do not conform to the prescribed statement of work. Delivery shall not be deemed to be complete until all services have actually been received and accepted in writing by County
- Acceptance/Payment: Unless otherwise agreed to in writing by County, 1) acceptance shall not be deemed complete unless in writing and until all the services have actually been received or inspected to the satisfaction of County, and 2) payment shall be made in arrears after satisfactory acceptance.
- Warranty: Contractor expressly warrants that the services covered by this Contract are 1) free of liens or encumbrances, 2) merchantable and good for the ordinary purposes for which they are used, and 3) fit for the particular purpose for which they are intended. Acceptance of this order shall constitute an agreement upon Contractor's part to indemnify, defend and hold County and its indemnities as identified in paragraph "P" below, and as more fully described in paragraph "P", harmless from liability, loss, damage and expense, including reasonable counsel fees, incurred or sustained by County by reason of the failure of the services to conform to such warranties, faulty work performance, negligent or unlawful acts, and non-compliance with any applicable state or federal codes, ordinances, orders, or statutes, including the Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA) and the California Industrial Safety Act. Such remedies shall be in addition to any other remedies provided by law
- H. Patent/Copyright Materials/Proprietary Infringement: Unless otherwise expressly provided in this Contract, Contractor shall be solely responsible for clearing the right to use any patented or copyrighted materials in the performance of this Contract. Contractor warrants that any software as modified through services provided hereunder will not infringe upon or violate any patent, proprietary right, or trade secret right of any third party. Contractor agrees that, in accordance with the more specific requirement contained in paragraph "P" below, it shall indemnify, defend and hold County and County indemnities harmless from any and all such claims and be responsible for payment of all costs, damages, penalties and expenses related to or arising from such claim(s), including, but not limited to, attorney's fees, costs and expenses.
- Assignment or Sub-Contracting: The terms, covenants, and conditions contained herein shall apply to and bind the heirs, successors, executors, administrators and assigns of the parties. Furthermore, neither the performance of this Contract nor any portion thereof may be assigned or sub-contracted by Contractor without the express written consent of County. Any attempt by Contractor to assign or sub-contract the performance or any portion thereof of this Contract without the express written consent of County shall be invalid and shall constitute a breach of this Contract.
- Non-Discrimination. In the performance of this Contract, Contractor agrees that it will comply with the requirements of Section 1735 of the California Labor Code and not engage nor permit any subcontractors to engage in discrimination in employment of persons because of the race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, marital status, or sex of such persons. Contractor acknowledges that a violation of this provision shall subject Contractor to all the penalties imposed for a violation of Section 1720 et seq. of the California Labor Code.
- K. Termination: In addition to any other remedies or rights it may have by law, County has the right to terminate this Contract without penalty immediately with cause or after thirty (30) days' written notice without cause, unless otherwise specified. Cause shall be defined as any breach of Contract, or any misrepresentation or fraud on the part of the Contractor Exercise by County of its right to terminate the Contract shall relieve County of all further obligations.

- L. Consent to Breach Not Waiver: No term or provision of this Contract shall be deemed waived and no breach excused, unless such waiver or consent shall be in writing and signed by the party claimed to have waived or consented. Any consent by any party to, or waiver of, a breach by the other, whether express or implied, shall not constitute consent to, waiver of, or excuse for any other different or subsequent breach.
- M. Remedies Not Exclusive: The remedies for breach set forth in this Contract are cumulative as to one another and as to any other provided by law, rather than exclusive, and the expression of certain remedies in this Contract does not preclude resort by either party to any other remedies provided by law
- N. Independent Contractor: Contractor shall be considered an independent Contractor and neither Contractor, its employees, nor anyone working under Contractor shall be considered an agent or an employee of County Neither Contractor, its employees nor anyone working under Contractor shall qualify for workers' compensation or other fringe benefits of any kind through County
- Performance: Contractor shall perform all work under this Contract, taking necessary steps and precautions to perform the work to County's satisfaction. Contractor shall be responsible for the professional quality, technical assurance, timely completion and coordination of all documentation and other services furnished by the Contractor under this Contract. Contractor shall perform all work diligently, carefully, and in a good and workman-like manner; shall furnish all labor, supervision, machinery, equipment, materials, and supplies necessary therefor; shall at its sole expense obtain and maintain all permits and licenses required by public authorities, including those of County required in its governmental capacity, in connection with performance of the work; and, if permitted to subcontract, shall be fully responsible for all work performed by subcontractors.

P Indemnification and Insurance:

Indemnification Provisions:

Contractor agrees to indemnify, defend with counsel approved in writing by County, and hold County, its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, agents and those special districts and agencies for which County's Board of Supervisors acts as the governing Board ("County Indemnities") harmless from any claims, demands or liability of any kind or nature, including but not limited to personal injury or property damage, arising from or related to the services, products or other performance provided by Contractor pursuant to this Contract. If judgment is entered against Contractor and County by a court of competent jurisdiction because of the concurrent active negligence of County or County Indemnities, Contractor and County agree that liability will be apportioned as determined by the court. Neither party shall request a jury apportionment.

Insurance Provisions:

Prior to the provision of services under this Contract, the Contractor agrees to purchase all required insurance at Contractor's expense and to deposit with the County Certificates of Insurance, including all endorsements required herein, necessary to satisfy the County that the insurance provisions of this Contract have been complied with and to keep such insurance coverage and the certificates therefore on deposit with the County during the entire term of this Contract. In addition, all subcontractors performing work on behalf of Contractor pursuant to this Contract shall obtain insurance subject to the same terms and conditions as set forth herein for Contractor

All insurance policies required by this Contract shall declare any deductible or self insured retention (SIR) in an amount in excess of \$25,000 (\$5,000 for automobile liability), which shall specifically be approved by the County Executive Office (CEO)/Office of Risk Management. Contractor shall be responsible for reimbursement of any deductible to the insurer. Any self-insured retentions (SIRs) or deductibles shall be clearly stated on the Certificate of Insurance

If the Contractor fails to maintain insurance acceptable to the County for the full term of this Contract, the County may terminate this Contract.

Qualified Insurer:

The policy or policies of insurance must be issued by an insurer licensed to do business in the state of California (California Admitted Carrier).

Minimum insurance company ratings as determined by the most current edition of the <u>Best's Key Rating Guide/Property-Casualty/United States or ambest.com</u> shall be A- (Secure Best's Rating) and VIII (Financial Size Category).

If the carrier is a non-admitted carrier in the State of California, CEO/Office of Risk Management retains the right to approve or reject carrier after a review of the company's performance and financial ratings.

The policy or policies of insurance maintained by the Contractor shall provide the minimum limits and coverage as set forth below:

All liability insurance, except Professional Liability, required by this Contract shall be at least \$1,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence. Professional Liability may also be provided on a "Claims Made" basis. The minimum aggregate limit for the Commercial General Liability policy shall be \$2,000,000

The County shall be added as an additional insured on all insurance policies required by this Contract with respect to work done by the Contractor under the terms of this Contract (except Workers' Compensation/Employers' Liability and Professional Liability). An additional insured endorsement evidencing that the County is an additional insured shall accompany the Certificate of Insurance.

All insurance policies required by this Contract shall be primary insurance, and any insurance maintained by the County shall be excess and non-contributing with insurance provided by these policies. An endorsement evidencing that the Contractor's insurance is primary and non-contributing shall specifically accompany the Certificate of Insurance for the Commercial General Liability

All insurance policies required by this Contract shall give the County of Orange thirty (30) days' notice in the event of cancellation. This shall be evidenced by an endorsement separate from the Certificate of Insurance. In addition, the cancellation clause must include language as follows, which edits the pre-printed ACORD certificate:

SHOULD ANY OF THE ABOVE DESCRIBED POLICIES BE CANCELLED BEFORE THE EXPIRATION DATE THEREOF, THE ISSUING COMPANY WILL ENDEAVOR TO MAIL 30 DAYS WRITTEN NOTICE TO THE CERTIFICATE HOLDER NAMED TO THE LEFT BUT FAILURE TO MAIL SUCH NOTICE SHALL IMPOSE NO OBLIGATION OR LIABILITY OF ANY KIND UPON THE COMPANY, ITS AGENT OR REPRESENTATIVE.

All insurance policies required by this Contract shall waive all rights of subrogation against the County and members of the Board of Supervisors, its elected and appointed officials, officers, agents and employees when acting within the scope of their appointment or employment.

If Contractor's Professional Liability policy is a "claims made" policy, Contractor shall agree to maintain professional liability coverage for two years following completion of Contract.

The Commercial General Liability policy shall contain a severability of interests clause.

The Contractor is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the California Labor Code, which requires every employer to be insured against liability for Workers' Compensation or be self-insured in accordance with provisions of that code. The Contractor will comply with such provisions and shall furnish the County satisfactory evidence that the Contractor has secured, for the period of this Contract, statutory Workers' Compensation insurance and Employers' Liability insurance with minimum limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence. Insurance certificates should be forwarded to the agency/department address listed on the solicitation.

If the Contractor fails to provide the insurance certificates and endorsements within seven (7) days of notification by HCA/Purchasing or the agency/department purchasing division, award may be made to the next qualified Contractor

County expressly retains the right to require Contractor to increase or decrease insurance of any of the above insurance types throughout the term of this Contract. Any increase or decrease in insurance will be as deemed by County of Orange Risk Manager as appropriate to adequately protect County

County shall notify Contractor in writing of changes in the insurance requirements. If Contractor does not deposit copies of acceptable certificates of insurance and endorsements with County incorporating such changes within thirty (30) days of receipt of such notice, this Contract may be in breach without further notice to Contractor, and County shall be entitled to all legal remedies.

The procuring of such required policy or policies of insurance shall not be construed to limit Contractor's liability hereunder nor to fulfill the indemnification provisions and requirements of this Contract.

The County's Certificate of Insurance and the Special Endorsement for the County can be utilized to verify compliance with the above-mentioned insurance requirements in place of commercial insurance certificates and endorsements.

- Q. Bills and Liens: Contractor shall pay promptly all indebtedness for labor, materials and equipment used in performance of the work. Contractor shall not permit any lien or charge to attach to the work or the premises, but if any does so attach, Contractor shall promptly procure its release and, in accordance with the requirements of paragraph "P" above, indemnify, defend, and hold County harmless and be responsible for payment of all costs damages, penalties and expenses related to or arising from or related thereto
- R. Changes: Contractor shall make no changes in the work or perform any additional work without the County's specific written approval.

- S. Change of Ownership: Contractor agrees that if there is a change or transfer in ownership of Contractor's business prior to completion of this Contract, the new owners shall be required under terms of sale or other transfer to assume Contractor's duties and obligations contained in this Contract and complete them to the satisfaction of County
- Force Majeure: Contractor shall not be assessed with liquidated damages or unsatisfactory performance penalties during any delay beyond the time named for the performance of this Contract caused by any act of God, war, civil disorder, employment strike or other cause beyond its reasonable control, provided Contractor gives written notice of the cause of the delay to County within thirty-six (36) hours of the start of the delay and Contractor avails itself of any available remedies.
- Confidentiality: Contractor agrees to maintain the confidentiality of all County and County-related records and information pursuant to all statutory laws relating to privacy and confidentiality that currently exist or exist at any time during the term of this Contract. All such records and information shall be considered confidential and kept confidential by Contractor and Contractor's staff, agents and employees.
- Compliance with Laws: Contractor represents and warrants that services to be provided under this Contract shall fully comply, at Contractor's expense, with all standards, laws, statutes, restrictions, ordinances, requirements, and regulations (collectively "laws"), including, but not limited to those issued by County in its governmental capacity and all other laws applicable to the services at the time services are provided to and accepted by County Contractor acknowledges that County is relying on Contractor to ensure such compliance, and pursuant to the requirements of paragraph "P" above, Contractor agrees that it shall defend, indemnify and hold County and County Indemnities harmless from all liability, damages, costs and expenses arising from or related to a violation of such laws.
- W Freight (F.O.B Destination): Contractor assumes full responsibility for all transportation, transportation scheduling, packing, handling, insurance, and other services associated with delivery of all products deemed necessary under this Contract.
- X. Pricing: The Contract price shall include full compensation for providing all required services, as specified herein or when applicable, in the scope of services attached to this Contract, and no additional compensation will be allowed therefor, unless otherwise provided for in this Contract.
- Walver of Jury Trial: Each party acknowledges that it is aware of and has had the opportunity to seek advice of counsel of its choice with respect to its rights to trial by jury, and each party, for itself and its successors, creditors, and assigns, does hereby expressly and knowingly walve and release all such rights to trial by jury in any action, proceeding or counterclaim brought by any party hereto against the other (and/or against its officers, directors, employees, agents, or subsidiary or affiliated entities) on or with regard to any matters whatsoever arising out of or in any way connected with this Contract and/or any other claim of injury or damage.
- Z. Terms and Conditions: Contractor acknowledges that it has read and agrees to all terms and conditions included in this Contract.
- AA. **Headings:** The various headings and numbers herein, the grouping of provisions of this Contract into separate clauses and paragraphs, and the organization hereof are for the purpose of convenience only and shall not limit or otherwise affect the meaning hereof.
- BB. Severability: If any term, covenant, condition or provision of this Contract is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remainder of the provisions hereof shall remain in full force and effect and shall in no way be affected, impaired or invalidated thereby

- CC Calendar Days: Any reference to the word "day" or "days" herein shall mean calendar day or calendar days, respectively, unless otherwise expressly provided.
- DD Attorney Fees: In any action or proceeding to enforce or interpret any provision of this Contract, or where any provision hereof is validly asserted as a defense, each party shall bear its own attorney's fees, costs and expenses
- EE. Interpretation: This Contract has been negotiated at arm's length and between persons sophisticated and knowledgeable in the matters dealt with in this Contract. In addition, each party had been represented by experienced and knowledgeable independent legal counsel of its own choosing or has knowingly declined to seek such counsel despite being encouraged and given the opportunity to do so. Each party further acknowledges that it has not been influenced to any extent whatsoever in executing this Contract by any other party hereto or by any person representing it, or both. Accordingly, any rule or law (including California Civil Code Section 1654) or legal decision that would require interpretation of any ambiguities in this Contract against the party that has drafted it is not applicable and is waived. The provisions of this Contract shall be interpreted in a reasonable manner to effect the purpose of the parties and this Contract.
- Authority: The parties to this Contract represent and warrant that this Contract has been duly authorized and executed and constitutes the legally binding obligation of its respective organization or entity, enforceable in accordance with its terms.
- GG. Employee Eligibility Verification: The Contractor warrants that it fully complies with all Federal and State statutes and regulations regarding the employment of aliens and others and that all its employees performing work under this Contract meet the citizenship or alien status requirement set forth in Federal statutes and regulations. The Contractor shall obtain, from all employees performing work hereunder, all verification and other documentation of employment eligibility status required by Federal or State statutes and regulations including, but not limited to, the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, 8 U.S.C. §1324 et seq., as they currently exist and as they may be hereafter amended. The Contractor shall retain all such documentation for all covered employees for the period prescribed by the law. The Contractor shall indemnify, defend with counsel approved in writing by County, and hold harmless, the County, its agents, officers, and employees from employer sanctions and any other liability which may be assessed against the Contractor or the County or both in connection with any alleged violation of any Federal or State statutes or regulations pertaining to the eligibility for employment of any persons performing work under this Contract.

ADDITIONAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

 Scope of Contract: This Contract, together with its Attachments and Exhibits attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference, specifies the contractual terms and conditions by which County will procure and receive services from Contractor

The detailed Scope of Work (SOW) is fully set forth and incorporated herein as Attachment A.

- 2. **Term of Contract:** This Contract shall be in effect from March 1, 2016, through and including February 28, 2015. This Contract shall be in effect for the time period specified, unless this Contract is earlier terminated by the parties in accordance with Articles 5, 6, and 7.
- Precedence: The Contract documents consist of this Contract, and its Attachments and Exhibits. In the event of a conflict between the Contract documents, the order of precedence shall be the provisions of the main body of this Contract, i.e., those provisions set forth in the recitals and articles of this Contract, the Attachments and then the Exhibits.

- Subject to Fiscal Appropriations: This Contract is subject to and contingent upon applicable budgetary appropriations being approved by the County of Orange Board of Supervisors for each fiscal year during the term of this Contract. If such appropriations are not approved, this Contract shall be terminated without penalty to the County
- 5. Contingency of Funds: Contractor acknowledges that funding or portions of funding for this Contract may also be contingent upon the receipt of funds from, and/or appropriation of tunds by the State of California to County If such funding and/or appropriations are not forthcoming, or are otherwise limited, County may immediately terminate or modify this Contract without penalty

6. Termination:

A. Termination – Default: If Contractor is in default of any of its obligations under this Contract and has not commenced cure within ten (10) days after receipt of a written notice of default from County and cured such default within the time specified in the notice, the County shall immediately be entitled to either commence resolution in accordance with this paragraph or to terminate this Contract by giving written notice to take effect immediately. Default shall include failure to carry out any of the requirements of this Contract, including, but not limited to not providing enough properly skilled workers or proper materials, persistently disregarding laws and or ordinances, not proceeding with the work as agreed to herein, or otherwise substantially violating any provision of this Contract. Upon termination of the Contract with Contractor, the County may begin negotiations with a third-party contractor to provide goods and/or services as specified in this Contract.

The right of either party to terminate this Contract hereunder shall not be affected in any way by its waiver of or failure to take action with respect to any previous default.

- B. Termination Orderly: After receipt of a termination notice from the County, the Contractor shall submit to the County a termination claim, if applicable. Such claim shall be submitted promptly, but in no event later than sixty (60) days from the effective date of the termination, unless one or more extensions in writing are granted by the County upon written request of the Contractor. Upon termination County agrees to pay the Contractor for all services performed prior to termination which meet the requirements of the Contract, provided, however, that such compensation plus previously paid compensation shall not exceed the total compensation set forth in the Contract. Upon termination or other expiration of this Contract, each party shall promptly return to the other party all papers, materials, and other properties of the other held by each for purposes of execution of the Contract. In addition, each party will assist the other party in orderly termination of this Contract and the transfer of all aspects, tangible and intangible, as may be necessary for the orderly, non-disruptive business continuation of each party
- County Project Manager: The County shall appoint a Project Manager to act as liaison with Contractor during the term of this Contract. The County's Project Manager shall coordinate the activities of the County staff assigned to work with the Contractor
- 8. Contractor Project Manager: Contractor shall appoint a Project Manager to direct the Contractor's efforts in fulfilling Contractor's obligations under this Contract. The Project Manager shall be subject to approval by the County and shall not be changed without the written consent of the County's Project Manager

The Contractor's Project Manager shall be assigned to this project for the duration of this Contract and shall diligently pursue all work and services to meet the project time lines. The

County's Project Manager shall have the right to require the removal and replacement of the Contractor's Project Manager or any other Contractor's staff providing services to the County under this Contract. The County's Project Manager shall notify the Contractor in writing of such action. The Contractor shall accomplish the removal within three (3) business days after written notice by the County's Project Manager. The County's Project Manager shall review and approve the appointment of the replacement for the Contractor's Project Manager. The County is not required to provide any additional information, reason or rationale in the event it elects to request the removal of Contractor's Project Manager providing services to the County under this Contract.

- 9 **Breach of Contract:** The failure of the Contractor to comply with any of the provisions, covenants or conditions of this Contract shall be a material breach of this Contract. In such event the County may, and in addition to any other remedies available at law, in equity, or otherwise specified in this Contract:
 - a. Afford the Contractor written notice of the breach and ten (10) calendar days or such shorter time that may be specified in this Contract within which to cure the breach;
 - b. Discontinue payment to the Contractor for and during the period in which the Contractor is in breach; and
 - c. Offset against any monies billed by the Contractor but yet unpaid by the County those monies disallowed pursuant to the above.
- Conflict of Interest: The Contractor shall exercise reasonable care and diligence to prevent any actions or conditions that could result in a conflict with the best interests of the County. This obligation shall apply to the Contractor; the Contractor's employees, agents, and relatives; sub-tier Contractor's and third parties associated with accomplishing work and services hereunder. The Contractor's efforts shall include, but not be limited to establishing precautions to prevent its employees or agents from making, receiving, providing or offering gifts, entertainment, payments, loans or other considerations which could be deemed to appear to influence individuals to act contrary to the best interests of the County.
- Disputes Contract: The parties shall deal in good faith and attempt to resolve potential disputes informally if the dispute concerning a question of fact arising under the terms of this Contract is not disposed of in a reasonable period of time by the Contractor and the County's Project Manager, such matter shall be brought to the attention of the Purchasing Agent by way of the following process:
 - a. The Contractor shall submit to the assigned buyer a written demand for a final decision regarding the disposition of any dispute between the parties arising under, related to, or involving this Contract, unless the County, on its own initiative, has already rendered such a final decision.
 - b The Contractor's written demand shall be fully supported by factual information, and, if such demand involves a cost adjustment to the Contract, the Contractor shall include with the demand a written statement signed by a senior official indicating that the demand is made in good faith, that the supporting data are accurate and complete, and that the amount requested accurately reflects the Contract adjustment for which the Contractor believes the County is liable.

Pending the final resolution of any dispute arising under, related to, or involving this Contract, the Contractor agrees to diligently proceed with the performance of this Contract, including the delivery of goods and/or provision of services. The Contractor's failure to diligently proceed shall be considered a material breach of this Contract.

Any final decision of the County shall be expressly identified as such, shall be in writing, and shall be signed by the Purchasing Agent. If the County fails to render a decision within ninety (90) days after receipt of the Contractor's demand, it shall be deemed a final decision adverse to the Contractor's contentions. The County's final decision shall be conclusive and binding regarding the dispute unless the Contractor commences action in a court of competent jurisdiction to contest such decision within ninety (90) days following the date of the County's final decision or one (1) year following the accrual of the cause of action, whichever is later

- 12. Amendments Changes/Extra Work: The Contractor shall make no changes to this Contract without the County's written consent. In the event that there are new or unforeseen requirements, the County with the Contractor's concurrence has the discretion to request official changes at any time without changing the intent of this Contract.
 - If County-initiated changes or changes in laws or government regulations affect price, the Contractor's ability to deliver services, or the project schedule, the Contractor shall give the County written notice no later than seven (7) calendar days from the date the law or regulation went into effect or the date the change was proposed by the County and the Contractor was notified of the change. Such changes shall be agreed to in writing and incorporated into a Contract Amendment; said Amendment shall be issued by the County-assigned Purchasing Agent or designee, shall require the mutual consent of all parties, and may be subject to approval by the County Board of Supervisors. Nothing herein shall prohibit the Contractor from proceeding with the work as set forth in this Contract.
- 13. **Notices:** Any and all notices, requests, demands and other communications contemplated, called for, permitted, or required to be given hereunder shall be in writing, except through the course of the parties' routine exchange of information and cooperation during the terms of the work and services. Any written communications shall be deemed to have been duly given upon actual inperson delivery, if delivery is by direct hand, or upon delivery on the actual day of receipt or no greater than five (5) calendar days after being mailed by US certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid, whichever occurs first. The date of mailing shall count as the first day. All communications shall be addressed to the appropriate party at the address stated herein or such other address as the parties hereto may designate by written notice from time to time in the manner aforesaid.

1.0 <u>Services</u>. The Instructor, as an independent contractor, agrees to perform during the term of his Agreement, a Wellness Class for the City of Burbank Fire Department on behalf of the Management Services Department. The estimated number of students that will participate in the class will be approximately 140. The Wellness Class will begin in August 2009 and be completed in June 2010. The class will include the following:

The Fitness Assessment will include a 12-lead ECG, graded exercise test, blood pressure, pulmonary function, body composition assessment, and various strength and flexibility tests.

This is a fitness evaluation not a medical assessment a doctor does not evaluate the results. Students are encouraged to take their individual fitness profile to their doctor for review.

Individualized Fitness Assessment Results Profile will be provided to each participant.

A minimum of 4 lectures/workshops on health, fitness, and nutrition topic will be given during the duration of the Wellness Class. Classes will be repeated two times for each shift for a total of 6 lectures/workshops to cover each topic.

Students enrolled in the Wellness Class also have access to registered dieticians, exercise physiologists, and athletic trainers throughout the year. Individual and small group sessions will be arranged throughout the class (August 2009 through June 2010) upon request. There will be no additional costs for these services.

The Management Services Department's Assistant Management Services Director will receive an aggregate report showing the Fire Department's average fitness scores in the following areas: Cardiovascular fitness, muscular fitness, body composition, and coronary risk.

There will also be a Comprehensive blood panel analysis Westcliff Labs custom panel #2747 including: CBC CMP, MA, Lipids, GGTP, Iron, LDH, Phos, Uric Acid.

- **Compensation.** Client shall pay for services of Instructor the total fixed price of \$ 40.00 per person for California Residents and \$446.00 per person for non California residents, not to exceed a total of \$7,000.00. For each student that completes the Wellness Class there will be a \$25.00 credit per person towards the cost of registration to cover the expense of the custom blood panel #2747 provided by Westcliff Labs. No payment for expenses or labor shall be paid by Client unless it is related to services noted in Section 1 of this Agreement. Any additional increase in the cost of service must have the prior written approval and authorization of the Designated Official.
- 3.0 Payment. Client's payment to Instructor shall be made within thirty (30) days of the date of Instructor's invoice.

- 4.0 <u>Independent Contractor</u>. Instructor is retained and employed by Client only to the extent set forth in this Agreement, and the Instructor's relationship to the Client is that of an independent contractor. Instructor shall be free to dispose of all portions of Instructor's time and activities which Instructor is not obligated to devote to the Client in such a manner and to such persons, firms, or corporations as the Instructor sees fit except as expressly provided in this Agreement. Instructor shall not be considered to have the status of an employee under this Agreement or be entitled to participate in any insurance, medical care, vacation, sick leave, or other benefits provided for Client's officers or employees.
- 5.0 <u>Indemnification</u>. Both parties shall take all reasonable precautions to prevent the occurrence of any injury, including death, to any person or any damage to any property arising out of the acts or omissions of the parties, its agents, employees, or subcontractors.

Both parties to this Agreement shall agree to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the other party, its officers, agents, employees, and volunteers, from and against all loss, cost, and expense arising out of any liability or claim of liability, sustained or claimed to have been sustained, arising out of the activities, or the performance or nonperformance of obligations under this Agreement, of the indemnifying party, or those of any of its officers, agents, employees, or volunteers. The provisions of this Article do not apply to any damage or losses caused solely by the negligence of the non-indemnifying party or any of its agents or employees.

- 6.0 <u>Termination of Agreement</u>. Either party may terminate this Agreement at any time during the term of the Agreement by giving the other party thirty (30) days notice in writing. AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

THIS AFFILIATION AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made and entered into as of _______, 2010 (the "Effective Date") between Rancho Santiago Community College District, on behalf of Santa Ana College (hereinafter the "District"), and Eisenhower Medical Center ("Hospital").

RECITALS:

- A. District offers to enrolled students an educational program in the field of occupational therapy.
- B. District desires to provide to its students a clinical learning experience through the application of knowledge and skills in actual patient-centered situations in a hospital facility.
- C. Hospital has agreed to undertake training activities and to make its facilities available to identified students of District for such purposes.

Now, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein, the parties hereby agree as follows:

1. RESPONSIBILITIES OF DISTRICT.

- 1.1. Clinical Program. District shall be responsible for the implementation and operation of the clinical component of its program at Facility ("Program"), which Program shall be approved in advance by Hospital. Such responsibilities shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

- 1.1.3. preparation of student/patient assignments and rotation plans for each student and coordination of same with Facility;
- 1.1.4. continuing oral and written communication with Facility regarding student performance and evaluation, absences and assignments of students, and other pertinent information;
 - 1.1.5. supervision of students and their performance at Facility;

- 1.1.6. participation, with the students, in Facility's Quality Assurance and related programs; and
- 1.1.7. performance of such other duties as may from time to time be agreed to between District and Facility.

All students, faculty, employees, agents and representatives of District participating in the Program while on Facility premises ("Program Participants") shall be accountable to Facility management staff. District shall be responsible for causing all Program Participants to comply with the terms of this Agreement. District shall also provide Hospital with evidence of appropriate education, experience and competence of Program participants. In addition District shall assure that students meet the requirements of Exhibit A, attached hereto and fully incorporated by this reference.

2. RESPONSIBILITIES OF HOSPITAL.

- 2.1. Hospital shall accept the students assigned to the Program by District and cooperate in the orientation of all Program Participants to Facility. Hospital shall provide the opportunities for such students, who shall be supervised by District and Hospital, to observe and assist in various aspects of patient care. Facility shall coordinate District's rotation and assignment schedule with its own schedule and those of other educational institutions. Hospital shall at all times retain ultimate control of the Facility and responsibility for patient care.
- 2.2. Upon the request of District, Facility shall assist District in the evaluation of each Program Participant's performance in the Program. However, District shall at all times remain solely responsible for the evaluation and grading of Program Participants.
- 3. **MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITIES.** The parties shall cooperate to fulfill the following mutual responsibilities:
- 3.1. Students shall be treated as trainees who have no expectation of receiving compensation or future employment from Hospital or District.
- 3.2. Any courtesy appointments to faculty or staff by either the District or Hospital shall be without entitlement of the individual to compensation or benefits for the appointed party.

4. WITHDRAWAL OF PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS.

- 4.1. Hospital may immediately remove from the premises any Program Participant who poses an immediate threat or danger to personnel or to the quality of medical services or for unprofessional behavior.
- 4.2. Hospital may request District to withdraw or dismiss a Program Participant from the Program at Facility when his or her clinical performance is unsatisfactory to

Hospital or his or her behavior, in Hospital's discretion, is disruptive or detrimental to Facility and/or its patients. In such event, said Program Participant's participation in the Program shall immediately cease. Subject to the provisions of Subsection 4.1. above, it is understood that only District can dismiss the Program Participant from the Program at Facility.

- 5. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR. The parties hereby acknowledge that they are independent contractors, and neither the District nor any of its agents, representatives, students or employees or Program Participants shall be considered agents, representatives, or employees of Hospital. In no event shall this Agreement be construed as establishing a partnership or joint venture or similar relationship between the parties hereto. District shall be liable for its own debts, obligations, acts and omissions, including the payment of all required withholding, social security and other taxes or benefits. No Program Participant shall look to Hospital for any salaries, insurance or other benefits. The provisions set forth herein shall survive expiration or other termination of this Agreement regardless of the cause of such termination.
- 6. Non-Discrimination. There shall be no discrimination on the basis of race, national origin, religion, creed, sex, age, veteran status, disability or other legally protected classification in either the selection of students, or as to any aspect of the clinical training; provided, however, that with respect to disability, the disability must not be such as would, even with reasonable accommodation, in and of itself preclude the student's effective participation in the Program.

7. CONFIDENTIALITY.

- 7.1. Hospital Information. District recognizes and acknowledges that, by virtue of entering into this Agreement and fulfilling the terms of this Agreement, District and Program Participants may have access to certain information of Hospital that is confidential and constitutes valuable, special and unique property of Hospital. District agrees that neither District nor any Program Participant will at any time, (either during or subsequent to the term of this Agreement), disclose to others, use, copy or permit to be copied, without Hospital's express prior written consent, except in connection with the performance of District's and Program Participant's duties hereunder, any confidential or proprietary information of Hospital, including, without limitation, information which concerns Facility's patients, costs, or treatment methods developed by Hospital for the Facility, and which is not otherwise available to the public.
- 7.2. Terms of Agreement. Except for disclosure to District's legal counsel, accountant or financial advisors (none of whom shall be associated or affiliated in any way with Hospital or any of its affiliates), neither District nor any Program Participant shall disclose the terms of this Agreement to any person, unless disclosure thereof is required by law or otherwise authorized by this Agreement or consented to by Hospital in writing. Unauthorized disclosure of the terms of this Agreement shall be a material breach of this Agreement and shall provide Hospital with the option of pursuing remedies for breach, or, notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, immediately terminating this Agreement upon written notice to District.

- 7.3. Patient Information. Neither District nor any Program Participant shall disclose to any third party, except where permitted or required by law or where such disclosure is expressly approved by Hospital in writing, any medical record or other patient information regarding Facility patients, and District and Program Participant shall comply with all federal and state laws and regulations, and all bylaws, rules, regulations, and policies of Facility and Facility's medical staff, regarding the confidentiality of such information. District acknowledges that in receiving or otherwise dealing with any records or information from Hospital about Facility's patients receiving treatment for alcohol or drug abuse, District and Program Participant are bound by the provisions of the federal regulations governing Confidentiality of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Patient Records, 42 C.F.R. Part 2, as amended from time to time.
- Privacy of Health Information. District acknowledges that Facility must comply with the applicable provisions of the Administrative Simplification section of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, codified at 42 U.S.C. § 1320 through d-8 ("HIPAA"), and the requirements of any regulations promulgated thereunder, including, without limitation, the federal privacy regulations as contained in 45 C.F.R. Parts 160 and 164, and the federal security standards as contained in 45 C.F.R. Parts 160, 162 and 164 (collectively, the "Regulations"). Accordingly, Hospital may only disclose Protected Health Information, as defined in 45 C.F.R. 164.501, or Individually Identifiable Health Information, as defined in 42 U.S.C. § 1320d(6) (collectively, "Protected Health Information") to a student for purposes of providing treatment to Facility patients or training the student to be a health care provider. A student may only request or use Protected Health Information about a Facility patient for treatment and Hospital training program purposes. A student may only disclose Protected Health Information about a Facility patient for treatment purposes to other health care providers involved in the patient's treatment or to Hospital's workforce members involved in the student's training program for hospital's training program purposes. A student shall not disclose Protected Health Information to District or its faculty, employees, agents or representatives unless direct patient identifiers are removed to create a limited data set in accordance with the limited data set standard at 45 C.F.R § 164.514(e) and the disclosure is pursuant to a limited data set use agreement between Hospital and District that satisfies Hospital's obligations under the limited data set standard. A student may disclose a patient's health information that has been deidentified in accordance with the de-identification standard at 45 C.F.R. § 164.514(a) - (c) to District or its faculty, employees, agents or representatives for District's use in evaluating the student.

District, students and other Program Participants shall not request, use or further disclose any Protected Health Information other than for the treatment and training purposes specified in this Agreement. District and Program Participants will implement appropriate safeguards to prevent the request for, use or disclosure of Protected Health Information other than as permitted by this Agreement. District will promptly report to Hospital any uses or disclosures, of which District or Program Participants become aware, of Protected Health Information in violation of this Agreement. In the event that District contracts with any agents or independent contractors to whom District provides Protected Health Information, District shall include provisions in such

agreements pursuant to which District and such agents or independent contractors agree to the same restrictions and conditions that apply to District with respect to Protected Health Information. District will make its internal practices, books and records relating to the use and disclosure of Protected Health Information available to the Secretary of the United States Department of Health and Human Services to the extent required for determining compliance with HIPAA and the Regulations.

In the event a Facility patient (or the patient's personal representative) requests access to Protected Health Information in a Designated Record Set (as defined in 45 C.F.R. § 164.501) of Hospital from District or a Program Participant, District or the Program Participant shall immediately forward such request and any such Protected Health Information in its, his or her possession to Hospital. If a Facility patient (or the patient's personal representative) requests an amendment of Protected Health Information in a Designated Record Set of Hospital from District or a Program Participant, then District shall or the Program Participant shall immediately forward such request and any such Protected Health Information in its, his or her possession to Hospital. Further, District or Program Participant shall incorporate any amendment approved by Hospital into any amended Protected Health Information in District's or Program Participant's possession.

If District or a Program Participant receives a request for an accounting of disclosures of Protected Health Information from a Facility patient (or the patient's personal representative), then District or the Program Participant shall within five days forward the request to Hospital. District shall assist Hospital to determine whether any such request for an accounting is a request for an accounting of Hospital's disclosures or of District's disclosures. If Hospital determines that the request is a request for an accounting of District's disclosures and District is a Covered Entity (as defined in 45 C.F.R. § 160.103), then District shall provide the patient with the accounting required by 45 C.F.R. § 164.528. If Hospital determines that the request is a request for an accounting of Hospital's disclosures, then District and Program Participants shall within 10 days forward any information in District's or Program Participants' possession that is required for Hospital to make the accounting required by 45 C.F.R. § 164.528.

No attorney-client, accountant-client or other legal or equitable privilege shall be deemed to have been waived by District, Hospital or Facility by virtue of this Subsection.

- 7.5. Audit. District shall, within five business days of a written request from Hospital, make available during normal business hours at District or Hospital all records, books, agreements, systems, policies and procedures relating to the use or disclosure of PHI for the purpose of allowing Hospital to audit and determine District's compliance with this Section 7. If Hospital discovers any violation of this Section 7, District shall promptly remedy such violation following receipt of written notice describing the violation from Hospital and shall certify in writing that it cured the violation.
- 7.6. Survival. The provisions set forth in this Section 7 shall survive expiration or other termination of this Agreement, regardless of the cause of such termination.

8. INSURANCE.

8.1. District and Hospital shall secure and maintain at all times during the Term, at their respective sole expense, commercial general liability insurance, workers compensation and employers liability insurance and professional liability insurance (such coverage to include, without limitation, claims based on a violation of Subsection 7.4. or any applicable State law or regulation concerning the privacy of patient information, if such insurance is reasonably available) covering themselves and their respective employees. District shall either provide coverage on behalf of Program Participants (students) or require Program Participants (students) to secure such coverage. If Program Participants (students) provide coverage on their own behalf, such coverage must be placed with an insurer approved by Hospital. Such coverage provided by District and Hospital may be afforded via commercial insurance, self-insurance, a captive, or some combination thereof at limits acceptable to the other party. Such insurance shall not be cancelable except upon 30 days' prior written notice to the other party. Such coverage shall be primary and non-contributory. Upon either party's request, the other party shall provide a certificate of insurance evidencing such coverage.

9. TERM; TERMINATION.

- 9.1. **Term.** The initial term of this Agreement shall be for three (3) years, commencing on the Effective Date. This Agreement may be renewed through the mutual agreement of the parties.
- 9.2. **Termination.** Except as otherwise provided herein, either party may terminate this Agreement at any time without cause upon at least 30 days' prior written notice, provided that all students currently enrolled in the Program at Facility at the time of notice of termination shall be given the opportunity to complete their clinical Program at Facility, such completion not to exceed three (3) months.
- 9.3. Effect of Expiration or Other Termination. Upon expiration or other termination of this Agreement, District shall and shall cause Program Participants to either return or destroy all Protected Health Information received from Hospital or created or received by District or Program Participants on behalf of Hospital, and which District or Program Participants still maintain in any form. Notwithstanding the foregoing, to the extent that Facility agrees that it is not feasible to return or destroy such Protected Health Information, the terms and provisions of Section 7 of this Agreement shall survive termination of this Agreement and such Protected Health Information shall be used or disclosed solely for such purpose or purposes which prevented the return or destruction of such Protected Health Information.
- 10. ENTIRE AGREEMENT. This Agreement and its accompanying Exhibits contain the entire understanding of the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersede all prior agreements, oral or written, and all other communications between the parties relating to such subject matter. This Agreement may not be amended or modified except by mutual written

agreement. All continuing covenants, duties and obligations herein shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement.

- 11. **SEVERABILITY.** If any provision of this Agreement is held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect in accordance with its terms disregarding such unenforceable or invalid provision.
- 12. INDEMNIFICATION. District shall indemnify and hold Hospital harmless from and against any and all liability and costs, including attorneys' fees, resulting from a breach of Subsection 7.4. by District, Program Participants, District's agents or subcontractors. All parties to this Agreement shall agree to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the other part, its officers, agents, employees, students and volunteers, from and against all loss, cost, and expense arising out of any liability or claim of liability, sustained or claimed to have been sustained, arising out of the activities, or the performance or nonperformance of obligations under this Agreement, of the indemnifying party, or those of any of its officers, agents, employees, students or volunteers. The provisions of this Article do not apply to any damage or losses caused solely by the negligence or intentional acts of the non-indemnifying party or any of its agents or employees.
- with, or in relation to this Agreement, or any amendment hereof, or the breach hereof shall be determined and settled by arbitration in Riverside County, California, in accordance with the rules of commercial arbitration of the Judicial Arbitration and Mediation Service and applying the laws of the State. Any award rendered by the arbitrator shall be final and binding upon each of the parties, and judgment thereon may be entered in any court having jurisdiction thereof. The costs shall be borne equally by both parties. During the pendency of any such arbitration and until final judgment thereon has been entered, this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect unless otherwise terminated as provided hereunder. The provisions set forth herein shall survive expiration or other termination of this Agreement regardless of the cause of such termination.
- ATTORNEY'S FEES. In the event any attorney is engaged by either party to this Agreement with regard to any legal action, arbitration, or other proceeding brought by either party for the enforcement of this Agreement, or because of an alleged dispute, breach, default or misrepresentation in connection with any of the provisions of this Agreement, the prevailing party, whether at trial or upon appeal, will be entitled to recover reasonable attorneys' fees and other costs and expenses incurred, in addition to any other relief to which it may be entitled.
- 15. CAPTIONS. The captions contained herein are used solely for convenience and shall not be deemed to define or limit the provisions of this Agreement.

- 16. NO WAIVER. Any failure of a party to enforce that party's right under any provision of this Agreement shall not be construed or act as waiver of said party's subsequent right to enforce any of the provisions contained herein.
- 17. GOVERNING LAW. This Agreement shall be governed and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California. The provisions set forth herein shall survive expiration or other termination of this Agreement regardless of the cause of such termination.
- 18. ASSIGNMENT; BINDING EFFECT. District may not assign or transfer any of its rights, duties or obligations under this Agreement, in whole or in part, without the prior written consent of Hospital. For purposes of this Agreement, the transfer of ownership of all or a portion of the shares, partnership interests, or other ownership interests of District, in a single transaction or a series of transactions, which results in the replacement of 50% or more of the shareholders, partners, members or owners, as the case may be, of District as they existed on the commencement date of this Agreement shall be deemed an assignment hereunder. This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of, and be binding upon, the parties hereto and their respective successors and permitted assigns. This Agreement is assignable by Hospital without consent or notice.
- 19. NOTICES. All notices hereunder by either party to the other shall be in writing, delivered personally, by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, or by overnight courier, and shall be deemed to have been duly given when delivered personally or when deposited in the United States mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the other party at their last known address.

- 1. **GENERAL UNDERSTANDINGS**. Subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement:
 - 1.1 The number of students enrolled in the Santa Ana College (Rancho Santiago Community College District) programs/schools, as stated in Attachment A, to be covered by this Agreement shall be decided by mutual agreement of the parties hereto. The days and hours of experience shall be planned by the COLLEGE, and the COUNTY Director of the Community Health Agency, or designee, within the regular working hours of the COUNTY
 - 1.2 The COUNTY Director of the Community Health Agency, or designee, shall coordinate with the COLLEGE in planning the days and hours of student experience and shall have final approval of such plans.
 Geographical areas of assignment shall be the responsibility of COUNTY
 - 1.3 The COLLEGE and COUNTY agree to promote the exchange of information by mutual participation in new or expanded programs, research or other pertinent concerns coming within the philosophies and policies of the COLLEGE or COUNTY. The parties furthermore agree to cooperate in the concurrent and terminal evaluation of student experience.
 - HIPAA REGULATIONS: The COLLEGE hereby verifies knowledge of HIPAA standards and codes relating thereto as they apply to patient care, the COLLEGE, and COLLEGE programs, and states that all students and instructors will be instructed in accordance therewith. A strict code of confidentiality is to be maintained. All information obtained from client/patient records is to be held in confidence. No copies of client/patient records shall be made, and no records or copies thereof are to be removed from COUNTY Clients/Patients will not be identified in any manner in reports of case studies undertaken by students. The COLLEGE will prohibit the publication by the students of any material

- relative to their clinical learning experience that has not been approved for release for publication by both the COUNTY and the COLLEGE.
- 1.5 COUNTY will provide orientation for students and instructors to inform them as to rules and regulations of COUNTY, including ethical practice and drug abuse. Students and instructors are to be subject to said rules and regulations for as long as they are performing or participating in any manner under this Agreement. If the conduct or health of a student or instructor should be such as to impair their participation in the COLLEGE'S program, or unfavorably affect the COUNTY program, such student or instructor shall be suspended from further participation under this Agreement pending a conference between the COLLEGE and COUNTY representatives. Such request for suspension and subsequent conference will be in writing and include a statement of the reason(s) student or instructor has been suspended. Thereafter, remedial actions as may be deemed necessary shall be taken by the COLLEGE with five (5) days of receipt of the written request.
- 1.6. Students or instructors who suffer illness or injury while at the COUNTY will be referred to their individual health care provider, and/or returned to the COLLEGE campus as soon as conditions permit. If a life threatening emergency occurs, the student or instructor will be assisted to the nearest health care emergency service. Except as herein provided, COUNTY shall have no obligation to furnish medical or surgical care to any student or instructor.
- 1.7 Instructors selected by the COLLEGE for Performance under this

 Agreement shall be subject to the approval by COUNTY. The COLLEGE

 will allow adequate time for orientation of new faculty to the COUNTY.

 Faculty salary shall be paid by the COLLEGE.
- 1.8 It is mutually agreed and understood that the provision of facilities by COUNTY is contingent upon and limited by the availability of such facility/facilities and availability of coordinating County staff

1.9 The COLLEGE will inform students and instructors that they are not employees of the COUNTY and will not receive compensation from COUNTY

1.10 BACKGROUND CHECK.

- 1 10.1 COUNTY will require a background check, in accordance with the County Live Scan Policy C-33, BACKGROUND CHECK POLICY, for all students prior to permitting the student to participate in the educational experience program at Riverside County facilities.
- 1.10.2 COUNTY will accept background checks completed by the COLLEGE for all students participating in the educational experience program at Riverside County facilities.
- 1.10.3 Students shall complete and sign the appropriate release/waiver form(s) prior to the COUNTY accessing background check information.
- 1.10.4 COUNTY understands and agrees that the information received related to background check shall not be stored electronically and will be destroyed after the student's acceptance is determined.

 Destruction of this information shall be to the extent that the identity of the individual can no longer be determined.

2. RESPONSIBILITIES OF COLLEGE.

The COLLEGE shall:

- 2.1 Assume responsibility for the professional preparation of the student(s) and compliance of the curriculum with the education standards set forth by the appropriate profession association.
- 2.2 Be responsible for the instruction, guidance, and supervision of the COLLEGE students while at the COUNTY pursuant to this Agreement.

- 2.3 Notify students that conformance is required to all applicable COUNTY policies, procedures, regulations, and all requirements and restrictions specified jointly by representatives of the COLLEGE and the COUNTY.
- 2.4 Provide to COUNTY a copy of the performance objectives for the clinical experience annually, and assurance that the participating students are theoretically prepared to meet those objectives.
- 2.5 Require participating students to wear appropriate dress when at the COUNTY
 - 2.6 Be responsible for damages caused by the negligence of its officers, agents and employees occurring in the performance of this agreement. COUNTY shall be responsible for damages caused by the negligence of its officers, agents and employees occurring in the performance of this agreement. It is the intention of the COLLEGE and COUNTY that the provision of this paragraph be interpreted to impose on each party responsibility for the negligence of their respective officers, agents and employees.
 - 2.7 No later than two weeks before the beginning of activities covered by this Agreement provide the following information for each student/instructor covered by this Agreement:
 - 2.7.1 Student's/instructor's name.
 - 2.7.2 A brief introduction to the student/instructor
 - 2.7.3 Written evidence of the student's/instructor's health status.
 - 2.7.3.1 An annual physical examination by a physician (if working in Family Care Center clinic).
 - 2.7.3.2 Tuberculin (Mantoux) PPD skin test within the previous three (3) months. If the student or instructor has a history of a positive PPD, a written report of a Chest X-Ray (CXR) performed within the last three (3) months must be submitted.

 - 2.7.3.5.4 Receive the necessary doses of measlescontaining vaccine (MMR) to meet the requirement of having received two_doses of measles vaccine (minimum of twenty-eight days apart).
 - **2.7.3.5.5** Other requirements as currently required by the Public Health Officer.

- 2.8 COLLEGE hereby insures that participating students have met all departmental regulations for admission and have been informed of all COUNTY requirements.
- 2.9 COLLEGE shall provide all equipment and supplies needed for clinical instruction at the COUNTY. The student's name/identification badge shall be provided by the COLLEGE.

3. INSURANCE.

- 3.1 Warrant that certificates satisfactory to the COUNTY Risk Manager evidencing the maintenance of the following required relevant insurance coverage shall be filed with COUNTY Contracts Administration prior to performance of any of the terms of this Agreement:
 - **3.1.1** General Liability coverage with a limit of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and aggregate of three million dollars (\$3,000,000).
 - 3.1.2 Worker's Compensation coverage covering COLLEGE'S full liability is provided for instructors assigned by the COLLEGE to participate in this agreement.
 - **3.1.3** Student Accident Policy is provided to assigned students.
 - 3.1.4 Further, said certificate(s) and policies of insurance shall contain the covenant of the insurance carrier(s) that thirty (30) days written notice shall be given to COUNTY prior to any modification, cancellations, expiration or reduction in coverage of such insurance. In the event of any such modification, expiration or reduction in coverage and on the effective date thereof, this Agreement shall terminate forthwith, unless COUNTY receives prior to such effective date, another properly executed original certificate

of insurance and original copies of endorsements or certified original policies including all endorsements and attachments thereto evidencing coverage's set forth herein and the insurance required herein is in full force and effect. The original endorsements for each policy and the certificate of insurance shall be signed by an individual authorized by the insurance carrier to do so on its behalf.

4. RESPONSIBILITIES OF COUNTY.

COUNTY shall:

- 4.1 Designate a Coordinator of Clinical Education who will be responsible for planning and implementation of the clinical education experience. The aforementioned individual shall meet the criteria established by the State's legislative and regulatory agency and the appropriate licensing associations for the supervision of students in the clinical education setting.
- 4.2 Provide the Coordinator of Education or Instructor with time to plan and implement the clinical education experience including, when feasible, time to attend relevant meetings and conference.
- 4.3 Provide to each student specific clinical experience opportunities/projects consistent with the program objectives. COUNTY shall provide for observation, participation, and independent activity in the COUNTY program and will assist in obtaining this in related voluntary agencies where possible.
- 4.4 To structure the clinical experience as needed to meet the objectives of the clinical education experience and professional preparation of students,

subject to and within the constraints of physical environment, patient load and/or experience available.

- 4.5 Advise the COLLEGE of any changes in personnel, operation, or policies which may affect the clinical education experience.
- 4.6 Provide assigned students, whenever possible the use of the library resources, reference materials and other specialized learning experience.
- 4.7 Make available/provide students with copies of the Department's rules and regulations, policies and procedures with which the student is expected to comply
- 4.8 Upon reasonable request, permit the COLLEGE and/or appropriate agencies charged with the responsibility of accrediting or approving the training program to inspect the clinical facilities, services available for clinical experience, student records and other materials pertaining to the clinical training.

6.1 The COLLEGE shall indemnify and hold harmless the COUNTY, its agencies, districts and departments, their respective officers, elected and

6.2 The COUNTY shall indemnify and hold harmless the COLLEGE, its agencies, districts and departments, their respective officers, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents and representatives from any liability, claim, damage or action whatsoever, based or asserted upon any act or omission of COUNT"Y, its agencies, districts and departments, their respective officers, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents and representatives arising out of or in any way relating to this Agreement, including but not limited to property damage, bodily injury, or death.

7. <u>TERMINATION</u>.

- 7.1 This Agreement shall be effective from date of execution through June 30, 2011 renewable annually through June 30, 2015. Either party shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon three months' written notice to the other party provided, however, that said termination may occur only at the end of an academic quarter in which students are registered. The party desiring termination shall arrange for a conference with the other participating party
- 7.2 There shall be an annual review of this Agreement each year prior to May 1st for the purpose of determining if the Agreement shall be continued, terminated, or modified.

- 8. <u>VENUE</u>. Any action at law or in equity brought by either of the parties hereto for the purpose of enforcing a right or rights provided for by this Agreement shall be tried in a court of competent jurisdiction in the County of Riverside, State of California, and the parties hereby waive all provisions of law providing for a change of venue in such proceedings in any other county
- 9. ENTIRE AGREEMENT This Agreement is intended by the parties hereto as a final expression of their understanding with respect to the subject matter hereof and as a complete and exclusive statement of the terms and conditions thereof, and supersedes any and all prior and contemporaneous Agreement and understandings, oral or written, in connection therewith. The Agreement may be changed or modified only upon the written consent of the parties hereto.
- 10. <u>LICENSE</u>. COLLEGE verifies upon acceptance of the terms of this Agreement execution thereof, possession of any current and valid licenses required for compliance with any local, State and Federal laws and regulations pertaining to the intent and scope of services of this Agreement.
- 11. OSHA REGULATIONS. COLLEGE is hereby verifies knowledge of the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) standards and codes as set forth by the U.S. Department of Labor, and the derivative Cal/OSHA standards, laws and regulations relating thereto as they apply to the COLLEGE and COLLEGE programs, and states that all students and instructors will be instructed in accordance therewith.

BACKGROUND

Attached is a list of students who have completed coursework at Santa Ana College leading to the Associate Degree and/or Certificate for fall 2009.

ANALYSIS

Santa Ana College awarded 375 Associate Degrees at the conclusion of the fall 2009 semester, 252 Associate in Arts and 123 Associate in Science. This is 27 down from fall 2008 in which 402 Associate Degrees were conferred. The areas that showed the most significant decrease were Business Administration, Liberal Arts – University Transfer, and Occupational Therapy. However, the areas that showed significant increases were Liberal Arts, Public Fire Service, and Registered Nursing.

Santa Ana College awarded 340 Certificates of Achievement/Accomplishment at the conclusion the fall 2009 semester, compared to 195 awarded at the conclusion of fall 2008. The areas with the most significant increase in certificates were the CSU General Education certificate and the IGETC General Education. This significant increase is due to the fact that this is the first full term that the State Chancellors Office has allowed SAC to issue CSU and IGETC certificates.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees ratify the recipients of the Santa Ana College Associate Degree and Certificates for fall 2009 as presented on the attached.

BACKGROUND

Attached is a list of students who successfully completed coursework at Santiago Canyon College leading to an Associate Degree, Certificate of Achievement, and/or Certificate for Fall 2009. Also attached are the statistical tables showing Degrees, Certificates of Achievement, and Certificates awarded by major.

ANALYSIS

Santiago Canyon College awarded 159 Associate Degrees in Fall 2009 as compared to 195 last Fall, a decrease of 22%. The area of Liberal Arts was a significant factor with a 35% decrease in the number awarded last Fall. Increases were seen in Business Administration, Business Management, Marketing, and Water Utility Sciences: Water Treatment.

Students are staying at the community college for several reasons including, the reduction of admission openings at CSU and UC campuses, the decrease in course availability, and the increased fees in all systems. Of the students who submitted a petition to graduate with the intent to earn an Associate Degree, CSU Certification, and/or IGETC Certification for the Fall, our data indicates that over 110 did not complete the necessary requirements. The petitions for these students were moved to the Spring 2010 semester and will be reevaluated at the end of the Spring 2010 semester.

Santiago Canyon College awarded 215 Certificates of Achievement in Fall 2009 as compared to 85 in Fall 2008. The substantial increase is noted as a result of offering a Certificate of Achievement in CSU General Education Breadth and IGETC General Education Breadth. Excluding the CSU and IGETC Certificates of Achievement there was still a 12% increase over last year. Another area of substantial increase is in Public Works: Construction Inspection with a total of 31 awarded versus 7 last Fall. Increases were also seen in American Sign Language, Apprenticeship Electricity: Power Lineman and Industrial options, Cosmetology, Public Works: Management, Survey/Mapping Sciences: Land Surveyor, and Water Utility Sciences: Water Distribution and Water Treatment. Decreases were seen in Apprenticeship Surveying: Chainman and Chief of the Party, Gemology, Public Works, and Wastewater/Environmental Sanitation.

Santiago Canyon College awarded 14 Certificates in Fall 2009 as compared to 1 last Fall. The most significant increase seen in Survey/Mapping: Land Surveyor in Training with 5 Certificates received in the Fall 2009 compared to 0 in Fall 2008.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees ratify the recipients of the Associate Degrees, Certificates of Achievements, and Certificates for the Fall 2009 as presented.

BACKGROUND

Santiago Canyon College contracts with Hair California Beauty Academy to provide credit-bearing cosmetology training leading to qualifying for the state board licensing exams for SCC students. This agreement is up for renewal for the 2010/2011 academic and fiscal year.

ANALYSIS

Hair California Beauty Academy will continue to provide vocational education instruction in cosmetology, with the intent of preparing students for careers as licensed cosmetologists, cosmeticians/estheticians, manicurists and barbers. The private school contracts to provide instruction for up to the following maximum number of student positive attendance hours at the rate of reimbursement per hour:

VOCATIONAL COSMETOLOGY EDUCATION AGREEMENT 2010-11

This Agreement is made and entered into this _____ day of _____, 2010, by and between the Rancho Santiago Community College District (hereinafter referred to as "District") and Hair California Beauty Academy (hereinafter referred to as "Contractor") located at 1110 N. Tustin Street, Orange, CA 92867-5910.

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the District, through Santiago Canyon College, intends to provide a vocational education program for the benefit of eligible students of the District, under the State Plan for Vocational Education and the Federal Vocational and Technical Education Act of 1998, through this agreement with the Contractor in order to prepare such students for the vocations of licensed cosmetologist, licensed manicurist and/or licensed Cosmetician/Esthetician and it being understood that such program shall be so designed and conducted that it may lead to a California State License in Cosmetology, Manicurist, or Cosmetician/Esthetician for such students; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees for Rancho Santiago Community College District has approved the contracting out of the cosmetology program pursuant to Education Code 78015; and

WHEREAS, the District has an obligation under Sections 55607, 55620, and 55630 of Title 5 to report on vocational education contracts with Private Postsecondary institutions to the State Chancellor's Office; and

WHEREAS, the District also intends to limit the hours of instruction to a maximum of 162,777 student positive attendance hours, the enrollment pattern may consist of full-time students (a maximum of 8 hours per day, forty hours per week) or part-time students attending less than 8 hours per day, but shall not exceed 162,777 total student attendance hours for the Agreement. The total number of students enrolled shall not exceed a number at which the District funded program may operate effectively; and

WHEREAS, Contractor represents that it is a non-public vocational school with extensive capabilities and experience in vocational instruction and training and holds a current institutional approval issued by the Council for Private Post-secondary and Vocational Education in accordance with the provisions of California Education Code 94311 and the Council For Private Postsecondary and Vocational Education approves the course(s) or program(s): Cosmetology, Manicuring, Cosmetician/Esthetician, Barbering; and

WHEREAS, Contractor represents that each instructor of the Contractor in this program possesses a certificate of authorization for service in a California Private Postsecondary

Educational Institution pursuant to California Education Code 94311(d)(3); or a valid license to teach issued by the State Board of Cosmetology; and valid minimum qualifications for faculty to teach in cosmetology as stated and required by Administrative Regulations Title V, Section 55530(e) and approved by the Rancho Santiago Community College Board of Trustees.

WHEREAS, Contractor represents that its financial resources are adequate to insure operation for the duration of the student training period and the Contractor operates on the basis of sound administrative policies and adheres to non-discriminatory practices and does not and shall not discriminate on the basis of sex, race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, age, citizenship, medical condition, physical handicap or marital status; and

WHEREAS, Contractor represents that its physical facilities meet requirements of State and local safety and health regulations and its equipment and instructional materials are adequate and suitable for the courses offered and the number of students in attendance; and

WHEREAS, Contractor represents that is maintains current, accurate records of both student attendance based on time cards and progress. The Contractor consents to inspection of these records by authorized representatives of the District, California Community College Board of Governors, other regulatory and administrative agencies and the State Board of Cosmetology; and

WHEREAS, Contractor represents that it is free of any pending or existing proceedings against its license or that of any of its instructors; or in the alternative, that it can show to the satisfaction of the District by way of written evidence that such proceedings are without merit and will be disposed of in favor of the license;

WHEREAS, the District intends to provide, for the benefit of selected, eligible students of the District, a vocational education program under the State Plan for Vocational Education through this agreement with the Contractor, in order to prepare such students for the vocation of Cosmetology, it being understood that such program shall be so designed and conducted that it may lead to a California State License in Cosmetology for such students; and,

WHEREAS, the Contractor operates as a private, post-secondary, vocational school offering instruction and training in Cosmetology;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the conditions, covenants, terms agreements and recitals contained herein, it is mutually agreed as follows:

- 1. All of the above recitals are true and correct.
- 2. The Contractor shall comply with all provisions of The California Education Code and Title 5 of the California Code of Administrative Regulations applicable to said Contractor's school to which the District's students are to be assigned, including, but not limited to the holding by Contractor of this valid certificate of course approval and a license as a private, post-secondary vocational school for instruction and training in cosmetology; it being agreed that

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- a. The Contractor shall submit to the District evidence of compliance with this certificate and license requirement prior to the assignment by the District of any of its students to the Contractor's school; and
- b. The Contractor shall continue to operate such a school during the term of this Contract.
- 3. The Contractor's school shall either be currently accredited by an accrediting agency recognized by the United States Office of Education or shall conform to the applicable portion of the Western Association of School and Colleges guidelines on contractual relationships with nonaccredited organizations.
- 4. The Contractor shall provide, operate, and maintain at its school, physical facilities that comply with requirements of all federal and state laws and statues including safety and health regulations, applicable to its operations as a private, post-secondary vocational school for instruction and training in cosmetology.
- 5. The Contractor shall provide and maintain at its school, approved equipment and instructional materials for the courses offered, and the number of students in attendance.
- 6. The Contractor shall comply with applicable provisions of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended, and, prior to the assignment by the District of any of its students to the Contractor's school, shall submit to the District evidence of such compliance.
- 7. The Contractor shall comply with applicable provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and ADA (the Americans With Disabilities Act), and, prior to the assignment by the District of any of its students to the Contractor's school, shall submit to the District evidence of such compliance. Contractor agrees that it will not unlawfully discriminate against any person because of race, color, religious creed, national origin, ancestry, physical handicap, medical condition, marital status or sex of such person and shall provide reasonable accommodations.
- 8. All parties to this Agreement shall agree to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the other party, its officers, agents, employees, and volunteers, from and against all loss, cost, and expense arising out of any liability or claim of liability, sustained or claimed to have been sustained, arising out of the activities, or the performance or nonperformance of obligations under this Agreement, of the indemnifying party, or those of any of its officers, agents, employees, or volunteers. The provisions of this Article do not apply to any damage or losses caused solely by the negligence or intentional acts of the non-indemnifying party or any of its agents or employees.
- 9. The District and the Contractor shall comply with all applicable general provisions of the California State Plan for Vocational Education and all special provisions in such Plan relating to instruction in the vocational area of which cosmetology is a part.
- 10. The District shall enroll a maximum number of students up to capacity with no minimum in the Contractor's school; it being understood that the District does NOT guarantee any set number of students will be enrolled in the Contractor's school at any time.

- 11. The Contractor shall provide for sixteen hundred (1600) hours of approved instruction and training per student in cosmetology or four hundred (400) hours of approved manicuring instruction per student or six hundred (600) hours of approved Cosmetician/Esthetician instruction per student or fifteen hundred (1500) hours of barbering instruction per student constitutes the State prescribed educational program to be completed prior to the Board Examination and License of students. For each District student, Contractor shall provide staff, facilities, non-personal equipment, supervision and related services required for such instruction and training for each of the students of the District authorized to attend the Contractor's school located at 1110 N. Tustin Avenue, Orange, CA 92867 as established elsewhere in this contract; and it being further understood that the actual number of hours of such instruction and training available to any such authorized student at the expense of the District shall be limited by the period of time between the enrollment date of the student and the final termination date of this contract and the limitations on hours of instruction as established elsewhere in this Contract.
 - a. The sixteen hundred (1600) hours of approved instruction and training per student in cosmetology or four hundred (400) hours of approved manicuring instruction per student or six hundred (600) hours of approved Cosmetician/Esthetician instruction per student or fifteen hundred (1500) hours of barbering instruction of approved instruction and training as detailed above for the respective fields shall be in accordance with applicable requirements of appropriate California State Board(s) or licensing agencies having responsibility for admission to examination for a certificate and/or a license in those fields.
 - b. The sixteen hundred (1600) hours of approved instruction and training per student in cosmetology or four hundred (400) hours of approved manicuring instruction per student or six hundred (600) hours of approved Cosmetician/Esthetician instruction per student or fifteen hundred (1500) hours of barbering instruction of approved instruction and training shall be given in a proportionate manner over a period of three college semesters or two college semester and a summer session from the date of enrollment for a full-time forty (40) hours per week student. A student who attends part-time may complete the program in any other combination until a total of 1600 hours in cosmetology or 400 hours in manicuring or 600 hours in Cosmetician/Esthetician or 1500 hours in barbering has been completed. Instruction and training for an individual student shall be limited to eight (8) hours on any day for a minimum of 20-24 hours and a maximum of 40 hours in any calendar week. Instruction time shall be provided by the Contractor for all students who wish such instruction during the school holidays (excluding legal holidays), winter recess and summer vacation provided such instructional time does not exceed the total hours stipulated within this Agreement.
 - c. The scope, content, and scheduling of the instruction and training to be provided under this Contract shall be subject to the prior written approval of the authorized representative of the District, it being understood that the District, acting through its representative, has the right to modify the scope, content, and/or scheduling of

- instruction and training, if, in the opinion of such representative, modification is necessary to achieve the vocational objective of the instruction and training.
- d. The sixteen hundred (1600) hours of approved instruction and training per student in cosmetology or four hundred (400) hours of approved manicuring instruction per student or six hundred (600) hours of approved Cosmetician/Esthetician instruction per student or fifteen hundred (1500) hours of approved barbering instruction and training shall be given under the direct supervision of California licensed cosmetology instructors holding valid California teaching credentials authorizing services in the area of cosmetology in vocational programs in a community college or possessing equivalent qualifications as established by the District, proof of minimum qualifications to be maintained by the District, and all District students while engaged in such instruction and training shall be under the immediate supervision and control of such instructors. As stated and required in the Administrative Code, Title V, Section 55630(e), all instructors employed by the private agency shall enter into an "Agreement for Teaching Services" (provided separately).
- e. Should it become necessary for one or more District student(s) to transfer to the Contractor from schools and colleges, both public and private, that are accredited and hold valid certificates of course approval and licenses as private, post-secondary, vocational schools for instruction and training in cosmetology, the Contractor agrees to accredit each of such students with one hour of credit for each and every hour of approved instruction and/or training received by, or credited to, such student in the former program.
- f. Any student of the District who completes sixteen hundred (1600) hours of approved instruction and training in cosmetology or four hundred (400) hours of approved manicuring instruction or six hundred (600) hours of approved Cosmetician/Esthetician instruction or fifteen hundred (1500) hours of barbering, and has not had the minimum instruction and training required for certification to take the examination for a certificate of registration and/or license because of deficiency in one or more areas of required expertise, shall receive from the Contractor such instruction, training, and preparation as may be necessary, forthwith, at no cost to either the student or the District.
- g. The Contractor shall participate in a program review and validation conducted by the District and at the discretion of the District. Said program review shall include, but is not limited to, advisory committee minutes, student completion statistics, student surveys, student evaluations, a review of Contractor's curriculum, units of instruction, methods of instruction, instructional supplies and materials, physical resources, record keeping process and practices, governance, and Contractor-District relationship. In the event a program review is requested, Contractor shall be given at least sixty (60) days written notice. Contractor shall complete a self-appraisal in the format supplied by District and submit said self-appraisal to District thirty (30) days prior to a site visitation by District representatives.

- 12. The Contractor shall provide, without additional charges to the District or the District's students covered by the Contract, all necessary instructional materials and supplies as ordinarily supplied by the District without cost to students in this or other vocational offerings of said District; and may require students covered by this Contract to purchase such offerings of said types and/or kinds of instructional materials as the District ordinarily requires students in this or other vocational offerings of said District to furnish without cost to said District; it being agreed that each student covered by this Contract shall furnish his/her personal textbook(s) and personal tools and/or equipment and uniforms. All material and equipment supplied by the Contractor shall remain the property of the Contractor and shall not be removed from the Contractor's premises without the permission of the Contractor.
- 13. The District shall pay to the Contractor \$2.25 for each hour of approved attendance by authorized students of the District covered by this Contract, pursuant to the terms and conditions noted hereinafter.
 - a. District payments shall be made monthly, and shall be based upon a certification of the hours of such attendance during the previous calendar month at the Contractor's place of instruction and training; it being agreed that each certification shall be on forms supplied by the District, and shall be based upon daily attendance records maintained by the Contractor, and subject to review and/or audit by an authorized representative of the District.
 - b. The Contractor shall submit and certify monthly statements and billings to Santiago Canyon College, 8045, E. Chapman Avenue, Orange CA 92869

 Attention: Dean, Career Education or designee, at the end of each month on the forms provided by the District (See, attachment). Billings shall include evidence of positive attendance in accordance with State Regulations. All billings shall be accompanied by attendance sheets verifying the number of enrollees and number of actual hours of instruction given. It is the responsibility of Contractor to ensure that delivery is made to the appropriate office.
 - c. Records of enrollee attendance shall be maintained by the Contractor for a period of five (5) years and shall be available for review by the District, its staff, its auditor, the Office of Private Post Secondary Education, and the staff of the Vocational Education Unit of the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office.
 - d. The Contractor shall not be reimbursed for more than a total of sixteen hundred (1600) hours of instruction and/or training for any one student.
 - e. In the event a District student withdraws from the program of instruction, or, because of failure to attend scheduled instruction, is dropped from the program, the District shall be responsible to the Contractor for payment for only the actual hours of authorized attendance of such student prior to the drop or withdrawal date.

- f. In the event that the District determines that the total direct and indirect cost to provide the same sixteen hundred (1600) hour program of instruction and training, or a recognized portion thereof, in an operating school of the District, or the tuition the Contractor charges its private students fro such program or potion thereof, is less than the amount computed as noted herein before, the Contractor agrees to enter into an amendment to this Contract to provide for a reduction in hourly rate to produce no more than the lower of such total cost of instruction or tuition.
- g. Contractor states that 55% of the above hourly rate represents actual costs of instructors, including all salary related benefits, 8% of the above hourly rate represents rental of equipment, and 27% of the above hourly rate represents rental of facilities.
- h. The District shall enroll a maximum number of students up to capacity with no minimum in the Contractor's school; it being understood that the District does NOT guarantee any set number of students will be enrolled in the Contractor's school at any time.
- i. Contractor shall submit with their monthly statement a copy of any site visitation reports made by the State Board of Cosmetology.
- 14. Except as noted in this Contract, the Contractor shall not charge students receiving instruction and training under this Contract additional cost for tuition, supplies, and/or equipment for any instruction and/or training to be provided in accordance with this Contract.
- 15. The Contractor agrees to accept new students during each enrollment period established by the District.
- 16. The District shall provide the normal administrative functions relating to admissions, counseling, registration, permanent achievement records, program monitoring, and awarding evidence(s) of completion; it being understood that during such times as any District student is in attendance in the Contractor's school, such student will be subject to the Contractor's rules and regulations relating to conduct, health, and safety; and operating procedures; it being understood that disciplinary action leading to suspension or dismissal of a District student shall be taken only by the District after consultation with the Contractor.
- 17. The Contractor will provide those administrative functions essential for the operation of his/her facility at his/her own expense.
- 18. The Contractor and the District shall ensure that ancillary and support services as relating to counseling, guidance and placement are provided for the students.
- 19. The Contractor shall maintain accurate records of attendance and progress for each student and evaluations of each student at the request of the District, and shall submit to the District such information from such records as is requested by the authorized

- representative(s) of the District; it being understood that such submittals may be upon a regular schedule and /or upon special requests and it being further understood that there shall be no release of information from such records to any party other than such representative(s). Contractor shall insure that such information shall be used only for purposes directly related to the academic or professional goals of the District.
- 20. The District shall be financially committed to the cosmetology program only for the amount of monies adopted by the Rancho Santiago Community College District Board of Trustees for this program during the 2010-2011 fiscal year that starts on July 1, 2010 and expires on June 30, 2011. In the event that monies are exhausted, the Contractor's school agrees to continue the program for each student enrolled for the reminder of the contract period or until the student has completed the course, whichever comes first, at no additional cost to the District or the student.
- 21. The Contractor shall permit inspections by authorized representatives of the District, the Bureau of School Approvals of the California State Board of Finance, the California Community Colleges, and/or any state, county, or local licensing board and/or agency having jurisdiction in matters relating to the operation of the Contractor's school; it being understood that when such inspections are made, it shall be made possible for said representatives to evaluate course offerings; examine, and, is required, audit school records; interview students and others; and/or evaluate physical plant, instructional aids equipment, and classes in session.
- 22. Contractor will obtain and maintain all workers' compensation insurance required by law for employees in the operation of this program.
- 23. Contractor provides, when required by law and at the Contractor's own expense workers' compensation insurance coverage for any student.
- 24. The Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless the District and its Board of Trustees, the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges, and the State of California, and their respective officers, agents and employees of each such entity against any and all claims and liabilities for death or injury to any person and/or loss, and/or damage to any property arising out of, or in any manner connected with the making of and/or performance of this Contract by Contractor.
 - a. In satisfaction of this requirement, the Contractor, in order to protect said entities, officers, agents, and employees, shall secure and maintain, at the Contractor's expense, a policy of general liability insurance with limits of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence for personal injury or death, and not less than twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for property damage.
 - i. Said policy shall be obtained from a reliable insurance carrier authorized to do such general liability and property damage insurance business in the State of California.
 - ii. Said policy shall expressly name District, its entities, officers, agents, and employees, the Board of Governor's of the California Community

Colleges and the State of California and their agents, employees, and officers as additional insured.

- iii. Said policy shall provide that the District shall be given not less than ten (10) days written notice of any cancellation, modification, or reduction of policy coverage.
- Contractor shall provide to the District a certificate of insurance covering the contract period and stating the required coverage.
- v. A copy of said policy shall be furnished at all times to the District; and said copy shall be kept up to date by the Contractor.
- b. In satisfaction of this requirement, the Contractor shall, upon request of any such entities, officers, agents, and/or employees, come in and defend said entities and/or individuals against any claims or legal action arising out of, or in any manner connected with, the making of and/or performance of this contract by the Contractor.
- c. Such insurance afforded by this policy for the District, the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges, the State of California, and their officers, agents, and employees shall be primary and any insurance carried by the District, the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges, the State of California and their officers, agents, and employees shall be excess and noncontributory.
- 25. The Contractor shall not use, without prior written approval of the District, the name "Rancho Santiago Community College District" or "Santiago Canyon College" or any of said District's administrative units, singly or in combination, in any printing or posted materials referring to the Contractor's school and/or the course of instruction.
- 26. This Contract shall automatically terminate June 30, 2011, it being agreed that either party to this Contract may terminate the Contract at the end of any enrollment term by giving thirty (30) days prior written notice to the other party; and it being agreed that at the time of termination of this Contract neither party shall have any obligation to the other party other than payment for authorized services rendered and submittal of required records covering such services prior to the date of termination. The Contractor shall notify the District of any change in facility location during the period of this Agreement. Facilities must be within the geographical boundaries of the District. The District reserves the right to terminate this Agreement due to a facility change which the District determines to be inadequate for instructional purposes or is outside the district boundaries.
- 27. The District and the Contractor reserve the right to terminate this Agreement by giving thirty (30) days prior written notice. In addition, the District may terminate this Agreement due to budgetary restraints identified by the Board of Trustees, thirty (30) days after giving written notice. Should a termination notice be provided, no new students will be accepted after the notice has been served on the other party.

- 28. This Contract may be amended and/or extended by mutual consent of the parties hereto, it being understood that any amendment shall not be effective until stated in written form and signed by the parties hereto.
- 29. Any notice given under this Contract shall be deemed given when personally served upon the Chancellor of the District or upon the Contractor, or when sent certified mail, return receipt requested and deposited in the mails of Orange County in a sealed envelope with postage thereon prepaid from one party to the other addressed as follows:

- 30. Contractor shall provide all students who complete the program and pass the State Board of Cosmetology examinations with job placement services. Such placement records shall be kept and recorded to the District annually.
- 31. Should the District exercise its right to terminate this Agreement, students currently enrolled shall have the option to complete the current semester or summer school session at a cost not to exceed the rate per student instructional hour as set forth herein. Such fees to be paid directly to the Contractor by the student.
- 32. The Contractor shall be in compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 as amended, Title IX of the Education Amendments to the Higher Education Act of 1972 as amended, Section 04 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 as amended, U.S. Presidential Executive Order 11246, and the intent of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges affirmative action resolution adopted April 12, 1973, and all applicable local, state, and federal health and safety regulations.
- 33. This Contract shall be valid and effective upon the approval of the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges.

In order to coordinate the layout of these projects, it is necessary to hire a Construction Surveying firm to provide layout for the various projects.

ANALYSIS:

The District requested proposals from four professional surveying firms and received proposals from RBF Consulting, Adkan Engineers, North American Land Surveying and MVE Civil Solutions

All of these firms have extensive experience in construction surveying. The cost proposals were as follows:

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Based on a review of the required staffing plan, it is recommended that Adkan be utilized as the construction surveying firm for these Santiago Canyon College projects. The cost for these construction surveying services is \$106,000. The decision to recommend Adkan is based on several factors, including 16-hour notification to be on site as opposed to 48-hour notice for other candidates, experience with the certification of NCAA swimming pools, as well as the ability to mobilize four days sooner than other firms.

Seville Construction is currently managing the construction of the Science Building and the Maintenance and Operations Building at Santiago Canyon College

The Rancho Santiago Community College District (RSCCD) Strategic Technology Plan is a dynamic document that is reviewed and revised annually in order to respond to rapid changes in technology. The Strategic Technology Plan is a collaborative project developed by the Technology Advisory Group, which includes representatives from Santa Ana College (credit and non-credit), Santiago Canyon College (credit and non-credit) and the District Office.

The plan's intention is to unify goals into one central document as they relate to technology, including those of the colleges', as well as of the district Information Technology Services Office. Primarily, this document outlines the assumptions made during the committee's planning process and describes the broad areas of technology.

Strategic Technology Plan 2009-2012

I. Introduction

The Rancho Santiago Community College District (RSCCD) Strategic Technology Plan (STP) is a collaboration of the District Operations Center (DOC), Santa Ana College (SAC) and Santiago Canyon College (SCC). The current plan was written by members of the Technology Advisory Group (TAG). Through weekly meetings and collaborative research, the plan was completed in April, 2010. Each member of TAG participated in the development of this plan, providing valuable input in their area of expertise. Also, considerable effort was made to align the STP with the colleges' educational mission to optimize technology for student learning and promote successful student outcomes.

The STP shall remain a "living document" that is reviewed and updated periodically and used as an assessment guide for current and future technology needs at the colleges and within the district. A copy of the plan will be submitted by TAG to the SAC and SCC college councils, advisory committees and to the RSCCD Chancellor's Cabinet to update the committees on the technology implementation milestones achieved, as well as the technology challenges that face the colleges and district.

With the amount of technology information rapidly changing, the RSCCD recognizes the importance technology plays in the lives of its students and employees. Because information and communications technologies serve as the basis for influencing how people work, learn, communicate and do business, RSCCD is constantly evaluating and strategizing cost-effective ways to meet the technology expectations and demands of its students and workforce while being mindful of its budget.

The purpose of the STP is to serve as a benchmark for information and communication technologies currently being used throughout the district. This benchmark will be used to establish technology guidelines, standards and policies that will help guide the DOC, SAC, SCC and the college's non-credit educational centers, Centennial Education Center (CEC) and Orange Education Center (OEC), respond to the future technological needs of their faculty, staff and students. The plan, however, remains flexible to accommodate rapidly evolving technology and funding issues that may face the colleges and/or district.

The STP also includes administrative procedures and recommendations that need to be followed in order for the colleges and district to maintain the students and employees expectations for technology. These procedures and recommendations outline the budgetary requirements required to maintain currency in technology and infrastructure. The plan includes future staffing needs that require consideration to support the Colleges' growth in technology.

Another purpose of the STP is to create alignment between SAC and SCC's technology plans, along with the California Community Colleges (CCC) Technology III Plan (2007-2010).

II. Planning Elements

A. Technology Advisory Group (TAG)

In Fall 2007, RSCCD established a district Technology Advisory Group (TAG) that meets once a month to discuss, evaluate, recommend and share information and ideas related to the information and communication technologies used within the district.

Members of TAG include administrators, faculty and classified staff from both colleges and the district offices who are immersed in the implementation of technology or oversee technology functions as a part of their regular job. Current TAG members include:

Any technology recommendation or decision made by TAG is forwarded to RSCCD's Chancellor's Cabinet for approval.

B. Information Technology Services (ITS) Structure

RSCCD maintains a centralized and collaborative Information Technology Services (ITS) department led by the Assistant Vice Chancellor. One of the primary missions of ITS, is to provide its students and employees with quality technology services and systems that foster learning, productivity and collaboration.

The majority of ITS systems and services are centrally run from the DOC, but the department provides technical services and staffing to SAC, SCC and all of the educational centers and training sites within the district. ITS is responsible for operating and maintaining the physical infrastructure required to service the district's computer and telephone networks. The department also oversees the core business and communication systems that include email, telephone, student information, financial, and human resources.

The department is divided into four areas, which include Application Systems, Network Administration and Academic Support departments at SAC and SCC. Below is a list of services and responsibilities provided district wide by the individual ITS departments:

- Host and maintain application servers
- Host and maintain enterprise storage systems
- Design, implement and maintain network and infrastructure equipment
- Develop strategies to manage network growth and internet bandwidth usage
- Develop mechanisms that provide a safe and reliable network (e.g. firewalls, antivirus, intrusion systems)
- Perform backups of enterprise data
- Maintain telecommunication system
- Maintain physical cable plant

Academic Support

- Provide site-licensed operating system and business application software
- Install instructional software and equipment for faculty
- Procure and maintain academic servers
- Provide technical expertise of hardware/software specifications to colleges that meet district standards and instructional requirements
- Develop system and maintains instructional inventory of hardware and software
- Develop effective system in deploying, maintaining and monitoring classroom equipment and software
- Provide technical assistance to faculty, staff, and students on an as-needed basis
- Procure and maintain college computers, servers and printers
- Collaborate with Media Systems department to support classrooms

C. Guiding Principles for Technology

If RSCCD is to be successful in implementing its vision of technology and accomplishing its strategic goals, it is important for TAG to create a list of guiding principles that will define and direct the criteria for decision making in regards to purchasing and using information technology.

Below is a list of TAG's guiding principles:

- Our colleges strive to provide leadership in technology for the communities they serve.
- Students and the community deserve the best technology that is available.
- Technology can enhance RSCCD's ability to provide multiple modes of access and a consistent delivery of all services.
- Continuous assessment of technology services is vital for ongoing improvement.
- Critical district wide services/data must be standards-based, reliable and secure.
- Ease-of-use must be a factor in selecting and implementing new technology.
- Intra-district communication is a mission-critical element.
- Technology planning must be a major factor in local and district wide funding decisions.
- Funding for the development and upgrading of infrastructure must be considered in the budgeting process
- ITS provides a district wide coordinating function.

- The integrity of data must be assured and safeguarded.
- Staffing should increase in proportion to the implementation and application needs of technology.

D. Assumptions

A primary reason that TAG has developed the STP is to insure that RSCCD looks to the future and develops progressive learning and working environments for its students and employees in order to foster positive student learning outcomes through the use of technology. Below is a list of planning assumptions developed based upon the input provided by members of TAG. The assumptions include the current internal and external environmental factors that affect the development and implementation of STP. As assumptions change, the STP is to be modified accordingly. Therefore, an annual review of the STP will occur.

Student Assumptions:

- Students need access to resources and services at any time from any location.
- Student expectations and skills vary widely but are generally increasing.
- All electronic instructional materials and services meet or exceed Americans with Disabilities Act accessibility guidelines.
- Technology supports successful instruction.
- Technology is similar to and at relative parity with other local colleges.

Employee Assumptions:

- Faculty members expect current technology to support and enhance instruction.
- Technology requires more specialized staffing.
- Technology requires continuous employee training.
- Technology redefines work culture and environment.
- Staff development and communication is dependent on technology.

Support Assumptions:

- District wide technology cooperation will become increasingly critical.
- The demand for *general* technology support and adaptive technology support will continue to increase.
- Assess technology to assure the Americans with Disabilities (ADA) Act Standards are being met.
- Continually evaluate technology to improve and streamline business processes.
- Meet the growing demand for emerging technologies.
- Employ the most highly qualified technical support staff possible.

Resource Assumptions:

- The need for technology will always be greater than the resources provided.
- Due to the extreme budget crisis, the funds allocated for technology enhancements may be reduced.
- Federal stimulus money may be available for infrastructure updates and expansion.
- In order to make the most effective use of resources, a coordinated plan (like the STP) is needed for the design, deployment and use of technology.

General Assumptions:

- Demand for electronic access and communication will increase.
- Technology-related costs will continue to increase.
- A balance between a secure and service-oriented environment will be provided.
- Security will become more important for data integrity.

- Continuous updates in infrastructure, hardware and software will be provided.
- Reliance on the internet to accomplish essential functions will increase.
- Our electronic communication includes email, internet, intranet, mobile phones, PDAs, telephone conferencing, videoconferencing, wireless and remote access.
- New and easy-to-use technology will be implemented for all employees.

E. Assessment of Technology

Incorporating an assessment process into the STP fosters a more collaborative environment between the district and the colleges, creating an atmosphere where new technology and ideas can be presented and discussed. The results of technology sharing will continually help TAG develop a centralized process for managing innovation, implementing new ideas in technology, and evaluating its current technology standards.

A key component of the plan is imbedding a mechanism to evaluate and assess its purpose. On a regular basis, information is gathered through our research department, surveys, focus groups, managerial reviews, professional observations, program reviews, faculty/department advisory groups, and planning portfolios to help TAG evaluate and prioritize the technology needs of the district and colleges in order to allocate resources appropriately, better serving students and employees.

F. Resource planning and obsolescence

The development of technology standards and a centralized planning process allows TAG to be mindful of its budgets for future technology. With the regular assessment of technology incorporated into the STP, TAG plans and develops yearly timelines to coordinate the replacement and reallocation of computers, software, and hardware that have become obsolete.

III. Standards

Creating technology standards allows the district to consolidate and streamline business processes, leverage its buying power, and provide better support and training. The district recognizes the importance of allowing flexibility to create collaborative environments among its faculty and staff to explore new technologies that could benefit departments, programs, colleges or the district as a whole.

A. Network Infrastructure

One of the biggest challenges an educational institution faces is managing and maintaining its IT network infrastructure. The challenge also holds true for RSCCD, where demands, both internal and external, continue to increase as more administrative functions and business processes are automated or web-based. A secure, reliable, 24/7 connection to the district network and internet is a necessity. It is also important for the network infrastructure to be designed in a way that allows for scalability and growth. The district is mindful of its resources and continues to look for ways to maintain its network resources in a responsible manner, and it adopts proven technology rather than base its infrastructure on the latest fad.

RSCCD's network infrastructure is based on CISCO equipment, which manages the network traffic between the district operations center, colleges, and educational centers over a redundant *gigaman* connection and fiber backbone. An industry-accepted network management tool monitors RSCCD's equipment health, including traffic collisions, hardware outages, and application failures.

RSCCD's connection to the World Wide Web (WWW) is provided by the Corporation for Educational Network Initiatives in California (CENIC), which provides network connectivity to educational campuses statewide.

RSCCD is moving toward a "Same Sign On" strategy, which will use its existing Active Directory (AD) system for authentication for services that primarily involve its employees, such as for email. Services for students, like Blackboard and WebAdvisor, use the Lightweight Directory Access Protocol (LDAP) system. Once the "Same Sign On" capacity is in place, all passwords will be changed in one place for all corresponding services simultaneously, then encrypted, and stored in both authentication systems.

Offering wireless access to the district and college networks is increasingly important as more mobile devices and laptop computers are used as learning tools, by faculty, staff, and students. Accessibility to a secure wireless connection will continue to expand in public areas, WI-FI hot spots, academic classrooms and other venues, such as the library, athletic fields, and administrative buildings as budget allows.

Centralized services provided by the Network team within ITS include:

Email—the email infrastructure is based on Microsoft Exchange 2003 which resides on a cluster of servers running Windows 2003. This system currently supports full-time faculty, staff and part-time instructors, which is approximately 4000 accounts. We also maintain gateway servers to ward off spam and viruses.

Remote—the district provides remote access through dedicated remote access appliances which provide a secure tunnel from the end-user to the district. With remote access, an employee gains a secure access to email, private directories, district intranet, etc.

Servers/Virtual Servers—the district maintains over 100 servers, both physical and virtual. As new systems are required, ITS determines if the server requires a virtual or physical solution. Virtualization saves power and space, while providing flexibility to meet users' demands. A routine patch schedule exists that coincides with Microsoft's "patch Tuesday" to keep current with the latest security updates and threat protection. In addition, the district maintains several Linux servers.

Centralized Storage—the district's centralized storage solution is comprised of both storage area network (SAN) and network attached storage (NAS) solutions. As the systems grow, ITS evaluates which systems fit best on either the SAN or NAS in order to centralize storage and backup. All are backed up on a virtual tape system, as well as on a physical tape system. Since these solutions house our enterprise data, the backups include an offsite storage rotation.

Antivirus/spyware—The antivirus and firewall product Symantec End Point is leveled at centrally managed environments to protect servers and workstations. ITS uses an antivirus server that monitors client workstations for threats and notifies the network team of viruses to be eliminated. If a serious threat arises, ITS has the ability to take immediate action to shut down individual work stations to prevent further infection.

Telecommunications— In summer 2009, RSCCD implemented a new Voice over Internet Protocol (VOIP) system from CISCO. Their product, Cisco Unified Communications Manager (CUCM) is an enterprise-class IP telephone call processing system that provides traditional telephony features, as well as advance capabilities, such as mobility, presence, preference, and rich conferencing services. The new system replaces the old PBX and Centrex systems, reducing monthly costs.

At a minimum, the supporting electronics are on the following replacement cycle:

B. Computers

Generally a computer user falls into one of three types: Heavy, Moderate, or Light. Determining a user type depends on two key factors: how computation intensive a task will be, and how quickly the task must be executed.

Heavy users

- Require computers to have fast and reliable processors to complete timely tasks.
- Require computers with large amounts of memory to run one or multiple applications at once.
- Use their computers more than 75 percent of the time.

Examples of a heavy user include, but are not limited to: jobs/tasks that are graphic or computation intensive in nature, such as graphic design, CAD/CAM, and business and computer classes.

Moderate users

- Require computers that have average to above average processors to perform their daily tasks.
- Require computers that have average to above average amounts of memory to run one or multiple applications at once.

Examples of a moderate user include, but are not limited to: jobs/tasks that are somewhat graphic, computationally intensive, very graphic, or computation intensive, but not very time sensitive, such as everyday office tasks. The majority of academic computers, placed in classrooms and labs, and employee computers fall into this category.

Light users

- Require computers that have average processors to perform their daily tasks.
- Require computers that have average amounts of memory to run one or multiple applications at once.
- Light users tasks are not graphic, computation intensive or time sensitive in nature.

Examples of a light user include, but are not limited to: jobs that require access to the internet and tasks such as word processing, spreadsheet calculations, and basic database management. Additionally, it includes all computers used for basic functions, such as registering for classes online.

The useful life of equipment for heavy users is the shortest, followed by moderate users, and then by light users, which have the longest useful life. Because of this, equipment that is no longer suitable for the heavy users' high need for computing power may still be serviceable for the moderate or light users' lesser needs for computing power, and therefore can be recycled.

Establishing life cycles for technology helps the district to determine what equipment is obsolete or nearing the end of its service life, requiring its replacement. A comprehensive technology life cycle policy enables the college to predict costs and use funds more efficiently.

There are three main technologies with defined life cycles:

- Computers with monitors Academic & Administrative
- Network Printers Academic & Administrative
- Servers Academic & Administrative

In order to define a life cycle for a given technology, both the service life and the useful life of the technology must be considered. Service life is the amount of time that the technology typically lasts before requiring maintenance and repairs beyond its value. Useful life of the technology is the amount of time before the technology is rendered obsolete by advances in that technology. Useful life, unlike service life, is a floating value determined primarily by the users' needs.

Because the useful life of technology is determined by the users' needs, equipment that is no longer useful to a user with heavy demands may be useful to another user with lesser demands. This means it is possible to redeploy technology that is obsolete in one role into another role where it is still useful. By redeploying old technology, significant cost saving can be realized.

C. Media Services

Media Services serves two primary purposes with each college managing the operation differently.

- Media Production develops and creates audio, video, PowerPoint slides, rich media, and web
 presentation for faculty. Training of faculty and staff is included in their responsibilities.
- Media Systems provides support of Audio Visual (AV) equipment. This includes checkout
 of equipment, such as digital cameras, laptops, portable projectors and other related AV
 equipment. Upon request, they may deliver and/or setup up equipment for classrooms
 instruction and special events. They provide requirements for classroom mediation and work
 with vendors to install equipment.

Media Services and Academic Support work together to assess the classroom needs before purchases of media equipment. During installation, they continue to work together, to ensure all components operate correctly.

The following items are considered and discussed when mediating a district facility or classroom:

- Functionality
- Future capability
- Current equipment

- Room layout
- Lighting
- Sound
- Electrical outlets—ceiling and wall or floor
- Network Access and includes wireless

While the majority of the SAC and SCC classrooms are mediated, the district is continually working toward complete mediation of all classrooms on the college campuses. Mediation has become an important element in the faculty's teaching practices, and the colleges have recognized the importance of classroom mediation. Therefore, media needs will be identified and subsequent installation required, consisting of a network jack, a projector placement and an instructor station, in all future classroom building construction.

D. Software

Most employee computers run on the Windows operating system and feature Microsoft Office Suite, which includes Excel, Word, PowerPoint and Outlook, for daily computing needs since it is the most widely used set of programs in business and industry and considered the de-facto standard. Outlook is used for district email, professional contact information, and managing one's schedule and task list. Every user's Outlook is configured to connect with the back end server (exchange) that stores users' data. The server is backed up routinely, and staff can access their data from anywhere using the district remote access (remote.rsccd.org).

The two academic computing staffs in conjunction with the network staff have agreed on a core set of software in order to minimize any configuration collisions. The core software is funded by ITS, and as updates are released, the academic computing staff, with input from the colleges and coordination with the network staff, develop a plan to install the latest versions. Essentially, the updating process consists of three factors: First, if the curriculum demands the newest version, then academic labs and their associated faculty will receive the updated software. Second, the newest software versions will be the standard on all new computers. Finally, faculty and staff needs will be evaluated to determine if their computers need the updated software.

A summary of the "core" set of software programs as defined by the colleges' Academic Computing Directors and the Networking Department are:

- Operating System
- Internet Explorer
- Microsoft Office
- Datatel Staff
- Adobe Reader
- Apple Quick Time Player
- Windows Real Player
- Flash

Other applications included on every computer are the free web programs: Adobe Reader, Apple Quick Time Player, Windows Real Player, Flash and Internet Explorer (IE) for web browsing.

Academic departments purchase necessary licenses for specialized software outside the core standard software. Academic Support will install the software on the required computers.

Although the Windows operating system is installed on the majority of computers district wide, ITS supports Macintosh computers used for specific work or academic environments, such as publishing and professional video production. It is appropriate for students interested in these professional fields to learn the Macintosh operating system and its applications in order to prepare for successful careers.

IV. Technology and Instruction

In regards to the changing technology and the gap in faculty knowledge of these new technologies, the colleges and ITS frequently receive requests to purchase or provide technology/software so that faculty can enhance instruction. Some of the requested technologies have stabilized, some are older technologies not worthy of support, and some are so new they need to be researched. TAG has the responsibility to wade through these issues to appropriately promote technology in the classroom and online instruction. ITS is committed to support and promote the technologies researched and recommended by TAG.

Under the direction of the colleges' Offices of Distance Education, ITS supports the Blackboard system. However, TAG and ITS recognize and respect that the curriculum developed using these technologies are solely managed by the colleges.

V. ERP Systems

According to the California Community Colleges Technology III plan, "Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) systems integrate, or attempt to integrate, all data and processes of an organization into a unified system. A typical ERP system will use multiple components of computer software and hardware to achieve the integration." This has proven true at RSCCD in that we have several software and hardware systems that comprise our ERP.

Datatel—Fully integrated solutions for Admissions and Records, Financial Aid, Financials, and Human resources. These solutions leverage the same comprehensive data to maximize departmental efficiencies by improving departmental workflows, business processes, productivity, and efficiency across the entire district. Datatel is comprised of several unix and windows servers, providing "near" 24/7 access via the WebAdvisor product.

Blackboard—designed to meet the needs of both students and faculty to work inside and outside the classroom in ways that make sense to learning. The Blackboard solution is used for our on-line curriculum, hybrid sections, and as supplemental to the traditional "brick-and-mortar" classes. The district has chosen to have Blackboard host this solution. Information is ported from Datatel to the Blackboard system.

OCDE—Orange County Department of Education (OCDE) houses our payroll system which includes entering position and related pay for employees, tracking leave accrual and usage, and tracking timesheet hours.

CurricuNet—designed to automate the entire process of submitting course and program proposals to the State Chancellor's Office via the web providing a streamlined process for a cumbersome process. Once

Course descriptions are approved by the State, they are then imported into Datatel. CurricuNet holds the history while Datatel holds the current descriptions.

CCC Apply—Our online application solution was product developed by XAP corporation with the support of the State Chancellor's Office and used by many of the California Community Colleges. Datatel has an integration solution to import the data into Datatel.

Astra Schedule—an interactive scheduling system that assists coordination of academic, event, and resource scheduling functions.

CI Track—An attendance tracking system to track the time students spend in open-entry/opend exit labs, tutoring centers, fitness centers, and Math labs, English labs, and computer labs.

These solutions contain the mission critical data for the entire district, therefore it is imperative that both the software and hardware are up-to-date, tested, and patched, and that the hardware is budgeted to rely on growth and upgrades.

With the implementation of Datatel, a committee of individuals from key departments was formed to test patches to these systems. With the software so tightly integrated, if a patch was not tested, the error will have a rippling effect, traveling through all the systems. Patches are loaded into a test environment on a monthly basis. This team tests patches and gives the approval to move patches into the production environment. This process is scheduled to occur monthly so the district does not fall behind on patches.

When there are patches to the operating system these solutions run on, they are first certified by the vendor. For example, if Oracle or HP updates their software, Datatel will first certify that their software has been tested on the new platform, then ITS will ask the committee to perform its tests. Once the committee is satisfied and has given ITS approval, the new operating system patches are moved into the production environment.

VI. Web Presence

The district is represented on the internet by three main web sites and a series of niche web sites that are department or division specific. The majority of these sites are created, maintained and hosted on district servers. RSCCD also hosts two intranets for employee communication.

External Sites

RSCCD's three main external web sites include the district (www.rsccd.edu), SAC (www.sac.edu) and SCC (www.sac.edu). Each web site has its own distinct design, features location specific information and is maintained by content managers who use various content management systems to keep the web site's information current. Both SAC and SCC have established web committees, made up of administrators, faculty and staff, who meet regularly to review content, brainstorm and discuss web site enhancements and troubleshoot technical issues that affect the web site.

The RSCCD web site is maintained by a group of content managers from the different departments featured on the web site. The district does not have an established web site committee, but major changes or upgrades to the web site are done in collaboration between ITS and the district's Public Affairs/Governmental Relations department.

All three external site designs reflect the personality of each college and/or district location. The primary purposes of these websites are to provide visitors with:

- Current information on the college's and/or district's educational programs and services.
- Easy way to access enrollment information and register for courses online.
- Important contact numbers.
- Upcoming event information.
- Employment information.

One of the biggest challenges ITS faces is the various ways these three sites are maintained. Currently, all three are updated using different content management systems. Because these sites are large and need to be refreshed regularly it would benefit the district and ITS to deploy an easy to use content management system for cost savings and reduction in staff training. By implementing one content management system SAC, SCC and RSCCD's web sites could share centralized information (calendars, newsrooms, image galleries, etc.) and be programmed similarly, but look distinctively different. This would also allow ITS to develop standardized procedures to insure all of the college and district web pages meet the accessibility standards that are in the Americans With Disabilities Act.

Intranets

The district hosts two intranets that provide resources for employees. RSCCD has a district-wide intranet which hosts employee-related information and resources, enrollment figures and trends, discussion forums to collect employee feedback on district-related topics, as well as benefit enrollment information.

InsideSAC provides information and services to SAC faculty and staff. This site is managed by the Associate Dean of Information & Learning Resources.

Niche Sites

The district also hosts niche web sites for several economic development and education programs who are affiliated with the district. These web sites are typically .com or .org sites and are supported with various levels of district resources. At this time there are no formalized style guides for these sites, but the district expects a certain level of professionalism. RSCCD has no formal governance over these sites, but work with department or program administrators when issues arise. Support of these sites are based on availability of staff. These sites include:

VII. Training & Staff Support

Computer and software training and staff support will be determined independently at each district location.

Training and Support

There are three ITS Helpdesks that serve employees at all locations. Services that are provided are assistance with computers, printers, servers, peripherals, department applications, telephone additions and changes.

Distance Ed Helpdesk

At SAC, the Center for Learning & Instruction and a resource specialist is available during the daytime for telephone and onsite faculty support. Students are assisted by Distance Education staff.

At SCC, the alternate media specialist, provides basic support and training to faculty using Blackboard and/or teaching online. He leads workshops on Blackboard and other technologies during FLEX week and throughout the semesters. Staff from the Tutoring Center provides support to students through the Blackboard Helpdesk (blackboard@sccollege.edu).

Academic Computing

At SAC, Information & Learning Resources is responsible for training faculty and staff on generic software programs such as new releases of MS Office, web publishing, creation of multimedia presentations, development of rich media and other programs as they occur (CCC Confer, web submission for publications). The Academic Computing Center under the Business Division is responsible for student training. The library does student training via credit classes and workshops and at point of use.

At SCC, responsibility for training of faculty and staff is shared by ITS, the Web Task Force, and the Technology Committee. ITS offers FLEX programs on the standard software programs, such as MS Office, Outlook, and PowerPoint. The Web Task Force offers FLEX programs and workshops on web publishing. The Technology Committee publishes a newsletter with technology information and coordinates workshops and presentations on instructional and classroom technology.

TAG realizes that Training and Staff support are important to successfully integrating technology with curriculum and administrative services. The committee has agreed to develop a proposal for the training and support for faculty and staff over the next three years.

Section III 2010 -2011 Goal

Network, Infrastructure, and Cable Plant

Upgrade to Exchange 2010

Exchange 2010 has been released from Microsoft. The strategy is to wait a reasonable amount of time for other companies to test and essentially debug the latest version from Microsoft. Sufficient time has passed and ITS recommends upgrading to Exchange 2010 the summer of 2010. The funding includes hardware and licensing costs.

Upgrade wireless network at SAC

The district as a whole has an outdated wireless system. The current access points cannot accept the latest technologies produced by current laptop manufacturers. ITS and TAG are requesting \$300,000 to replace the wireless system at SAC. ITS will hire a consultant to understand the varying needs of the campus, write a scope of work document including a design of where the access points should be located, assist ITS in evaluating the results, and manage the product implementation. This system will become the standard for the other locations and funds to upgrade the other locations will be requested in the future.

Replace Remote System

The services provided by the address remote.rsccd.org are provided by a pair of hardware appliances from Juniper Networks. The current hardware is currently considered end-of-life by Juniper. The hardware we have is no longer being manufactured, hardware repair/support services will eventually become unavailable and software updates for the appliances will only address security vulnerabilities and not feature updates. The prevalence of remote users using updated operating systems (ie. Microsoft Windows 7) require us to replace the appliances. The appliances were purchased with the capacity needed at the time, which the district is projected to outgrow.

Business Resumption Plan

The district's main server room is located at SAC and the district is at risk if a situation arose, such as a flood or loss of power, which makes the room inoperable. With the new Maintenance and Operations building at SCC, ITS has an opportunity to develop a secondary server room as a recovery site. Equipment will be purchased to recover major district-wide applications (e.g. Datatel, email, and websites) in the event of a significant disaster. THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this <u>27th</u> of <u>April, 2010</u> by and between <u>Louis Torelli</u> herein after referred to as INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR and the RANCHO SANTIAGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT, hereafter referred to as DISTRICT.

WHEREAS the Governing Board has determined that the INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR is specially trained and experienced and competent to perform the special services required, and

WHEREAS the DISTRICT under the terms of this agreement hereby agrees to pay the INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR for services at <u>Twenty Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars & No Cents (\$23,500.00)</u>.

The contracted services are to commence on or about <u>April 27, 2010</u> and to be completed on or about, but not later than <u>June 30, 2010</u>.

WHEREAS the INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR in the performance of this agreement shall be and act as an INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR providing the necessary tools and equipment and provide the Board of Trustees a final finished report and/or product within the prescribed time allocated, and

WHEREAS the INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR shall assume all other expenses incurred in connection with the performance of this contract and the DISTRICT shall not be responsible for payment of any other expenses. The fees specified, unless otherwise indicated and agreed to, shall be the only obligation of the DISTRICT. While engaged in carrying out and complying with any of the terms and conditions of this agreement, the INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR is not an officer, agent or employee of the DISTRICT, and

WHEREAS the INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR shall provide worker's compensation insurance or self-insure services, and

WHEREAS the INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR shall indemnify and hold harmless the DISTRICT, its officers, agents, and employees from every claim or demand made, and every liability, loss, damages, or expense, of any nature whatsoever, which may be incurred by reason of:

a) Contractor agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the Rancho Santiago Community District (District), its officers, agents, employees, and volunteers from all loss, cost, and expense arising out of any liability or claim of liability for personal injury, bodily injury to persons, contractual liability and damage to property sustained or claimed to have been sustained arising of activities of the Contractor, its subcontractors, or those of any of its officers, agents, or employees, whether such act is authorized by this Agreement or not; and Contractor shall pay for any and all damage to the property, done or caused by such persons. District assumes no responsibility whatsoever for any property placed on the premises. Contractor further agrees to waive all rights of subrogation against the District. The provisions of the Article do not apply to any damage or losses caused by the negligence of the District or any of its agents or employees.

WHEREAS upon mutual agreement in writing of the parties hereto, this agreement may be terminated for any reason, and

WHEREAS the parties to this agreement, under penalty of perjury, certify that all of the above items are to the best of their knowledge true and correct statements.

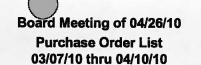
