Board members thanked SAC ASG members for hosting a reception prior to the board meeting and thanked SAC staff for hosting the board meeting. Mr. Hanna expressed appreciation for having the board meeting on campus.

Mr. Yarbrough gave a report on the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT) Annual Leadership Congress that he attended on October 14–17, 2015, in San Diego. He asked staff to provide the board with the figures for the student loan default rate at both colleges for the last three years, and the excel spreadsheets the district uses for multi-year projects.

Mr. Yarbrough and Ms. Alvarez indicated they are looking forward to attending the Central Plant Groundbreaking ceremony at Santa Ana College on November 3, 2015.

4.7- parking permit item. It looks as if parking permits for students are increasing by at least 10% when you calculate in the processing fee.

Is that the case and if so, was this discussed with Student presidents and our student trustee?

• The processing fee is not paid by students and staff. District Safety is absorbing the processing cost.

Is there an option left for students to just buy the parking permit directly from their respective campuses without being charged an additional fee?

• There will be no additional fees when purchased online. Students will still have the option to purchase the permit directly from the Student Business Office as they have done in the past.

The item on the agenda explains that there will be a cost savings due to not having to make the actual permit and staff time? Was this cost savings calculated in the price mentioned? Shouldn't such savings go to the cost of the permit or use it to balance out processing fees?

• The approximate cost savings is \$20,000 - \$23,000 is from the District not having to purchase and hangtag. As part of the processing fee, the vendor will supply the static window sticker permit.

Regarding the kiosk on campus, will there be someone assigned to manning it for at least the first round? Otherwise, if for whatever reason the buyer is not able to complete the transaction, they'll have to call and pay \$10!! On a \$30 permit? (Note that if they are buying it from the kiosk on campus, it defeats the argument of them not wanting to come to campus to purchase it themselves as a reason to enter into this agreement).

• Students will be encouraged to purchase their parking permit online when the student enrolls for classes or at the Student Business Office. If students encounter difficulty in purchasing their online permit, existing district staff will available to assist them. Kiosks on campus are computer terminals available to students in the Admissions/ Records and Student Business Offices.

STANDARD CLINICAL AFFILIATION AGREEMENT PHARMACY TECHNICIAN

This standard Clinical Affiliation Agreement (the "Agreement") is made and entered into this 9th day of November, 2015 by and between the Rancho Santiago Community College District, a public educational agency ("District") located at 2323 North Broadway, Santa Ana, CA 92706-1640 and Harbor Compounding Pharmacy ("Clinical Facility"), located at 2000 Harbor Blvd, Costa Mesa, CA 92627.

WHEREAS, District and Clinical Facility desire to contribute to community health education:

WHEREAS, District operates Santa Ana College ("College") and College is a duly accredited educational institution that conducts the program(s) described and identified in this Agreement (the "Program");

WHEREAS, District has obtained all necessary licenses, consents and/or approvals to conduct the Program from the State of California and any other applicable government agency;

WHEREAS, Clinical Facility operates a duly licensed health care agency at the address listed above and has obtained all necessary licenses, consents, and approvals;

WHEREAS, as part of the Program, students are required to participate in a clinical experience rotation;

WHEREAS, District desires to affiliate with the Clinical Facility in order that students may participate in a clinical experience rotation at the Clinical Facility; and

WHEREAS, District and Clinical Facility desire to enter into this Agreement to memorialize their respective rights, duties, and obligations with respect to the clinical experience rotation of students of the College's Program.

For purposes of this Agreement, the following definitions shall apply:

"District" shall refer to the Rancho Santiago Community College District, its member Colleges, the District's Governing Board, and each of their trustees, employees, agents, representatives, successors and assigns;

"College" shall refer to Santa Ana College, and each of its employees, agents, representatives and assigns;

"Clinical Facility" shall refer to Harbor Compounding Pharmacy, its parents, subsidies, related companies, and each of their officers, directors, employees, agents representatives, successors, and assigns;

The "Program" shall refer to the Clinical training in health science programs as identified and described in this Agreement; and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the following covenants, conditions and agreements, the parties hereto agree as follows:

TERMS

- 1. <u>Clinical Experience Rotation</u>. Clinical Facility agrees to provide students of the Program who are specified by College with a clinical experience rotation ("Rotation"), in accordance with standards established by governmental agencies and recognized professional accrediting agencies, and subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- 2. <u>Development of Curriculum</u>. College shall be fully responsible for the development, planning, and administration of the program, including, without limitation, programming, administration, matriculation, promotion and graduation. College acknowledges and agrees that the Rotation is intended to meet certain educational performance objectives, and College shall provide a copy of such performance objectives to Clinical Facility on or before student placement. Clinical Facility shall be fully responsible for the availability and appropriateness of the learning environment in relation to the program's written objectives.
- 3. Exposure to Bloodborne Pathogens. Program students and college faculty will comply with the final regulations issued by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration governing employee exposure to bloodborne pathogens in the workplace under Section VI(b) of the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970, which regulations became effective March 6, 1992 (the "Regulations"), including but not limited to responsibility as the employer to provide all program students with (a) information and training about the hazards associated with blood and other potentially infectious materials, (b) information and training about the protective measures to be taken to minimize the risk of occupational exposure to bloodborne pathogens, (c) training in the appropriate actions to take in an emergency involving exposure to blood and other potentially infectious materials, and (d) information as to the reasons the program student should participate in hepatitis B vaccination and post-exposure evaluation and follow-up.
- 4. <u>Applicable Procedure; Acceptance</u>. College agrees to provide Clinical Facility with a list of the name(s) of students who will be participating in a rotation.
- 5. <u>Nondiscrimination</u>. The parties agree not to discriminate in the selection, placement or evaluation of any student or faculty member because of race, creed, national origin, religion, sex, marital status, age, handicap, and/or medical condition.
- 6. <u>Academic Year</u>. The academic year consists of Fall and Spring semesters, Summer session and Winter break intersession.

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- 7. <u>Rotation Schedule</u>. The rotation schedule shall be determined by College and Clinical Facility and may be amended from time to time by agreement of the parties. The number of students in each rotation shall be limited to a number mutually agreed upon by both parties, not to exceed the number specified by the accrediting agency(s).
- 8. <u>Orientation</u>. Clinical Facility and College shall provide an orientation for assigned students participating in each rotation.
- 9. <u>Compliance with Clinical Facility Rules</u>. Clinical Facility shall make available all applicable governing instruments, policies and procedures, rules and regulations of Clinical Facility to each student participating in a rotation, and student shall comply with these rules.
 - In providing the students with the clinical rotation that is the subject of this Agreement, Clinical Facility shall comply with all applicable laws, rules, regulations, statutes, policies, procedures, and ordinances and shall be consistent with the professional standards of a health care agency.
- 10. Confidentiality of Patient Records. The Clinical Facility is a covered entity for purposes of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act ("HIPAA") and subject to 45 C.F.R. Parts 160 and 164 (the HIPAA Privacy Regulation"). Clinical Facility shall direct Students, and Instructors, to comply with the policies and procedures of the Clinical Facility, including those governing the use and disclosure of individually identifiable health information under federal law, specifically the HIPAA Privacy Regulation. Solely for the purposes of defining the Students' and Instructors' role in relation to the use and disclosure of Clinical Facility's protected health information, the Students and Instructors are defined as members of the Clinical Facility's workforce, as that term is defined by 45 C.F.R. 160.103, when engaged in activities pursuant to this Agreement. However, the Students and Instructors are not and shall not be considered to be employees of the Clinical Facility. The District and/or College will never access or request to access any Protected Health Information held or collected by or on behalf of the Clinical Facility by a Student or Instructor who is acting as part of the Facilities workforce. No services are being provided to the Clinical Facility by the District pursuant to this Agreement and, therefore, this Agreement does not create a "business associate" relationship as that term is defined in 45 C.F.R. § 160.103.
- 11. <u>Clinical Instructor (College)</u>. College agrees to designate a coordinator for each program. The coordinator, who is an academic instructor, shall be responsible for all teaching activities.
- 12. <u>Clinical Advisor (Clinical Facility)</u>. Although the Instructor of record assigns the grade for the student, Clinical Facility via a Clinical Advisor may provide input to the clinical performance and evaluation of student(s), be a resource person for College's faculty and students, and shall communicate with the clinical coordinator designated by College regarding the clinical rotation and shall arrange formal orientation to the facility for the faculty and students.

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- 13. <u>Supervision of Students</u>. The supervision, evaluation and direction of students while on site at Clinical Facility shall be the responsibility of the Clinical Advisor (Clinical Facility) or designee as guided by the instructional objectives. No direct, hands-on patient care shall be provided by participating students at Clinical Facility, except in accordance with all applicable laws, Clinical Facility rules, regulation, policies and procedures. District recognizes the patients' rights to refuse care provided by a student at Clinical Facility.
- 14. Removal of Students. Clinical Facility retains the right to exclude any student at any time from any clinical area. Any student who is asked to leave by Clinical Facility shall do so promptly and without protest. Clinical Facility shall also have the right, at any time, to request College to remove a student permanently from the rotation. Except as otherwise provided under any approachable policies, procedures, rules regulations, and/or under any law, any such removal shall not require compliance with any notice, hearing or other procedural requirements.
- 15. Patient Care. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as conferring any right or duty upon College, its students or faculty members, to control or direct patient care or operations at Clinical Facility. Clinical Facility shall maintain sole responsibility and accountability for patient care and shall provide adequate staffing in number and competency to ensure safe and continuous health care during the term of this Agreement.
- Instructor (College), he/she shall be responsible for student(s) evaluation. Unless otherwise mutually agreed between the Clinical Instructor (College) and the Clinical Advisor (Clinical Facility), Clinical Facility may be responsible for submitting input to the Clinical Instructor evaluating and appropriately documenting the performance of each student in the clinical rotation. The appropriate forms shall be provided by the Clinical Instructor. Nothing herein shall be construed as a guarantee by or obligation of Clinical Facility regarding the performance of any student during the rotation. College shall keep records on the progress and evaluation of each student's clinical experience during a rotation for a period of three (3) years following the end of the specific rotation in which the student is involved.
- 17. <u>Ongoing Communication</u>. College has the privilege of regularly scheduled meetings with Clinical Facility staff, including both selected unit personnel and administrative level representatives for the purpose of interpreting, discussing, and evaluating College's health care programs at a mutually agreed upon time.
- 18. <u>Materials</u>. College agrees to provide students with all educational material required during the clinical program.
- 19. <u>Access to Clinical Facility's Services/Facilities</u>. Clinical Facility agrees to provide students with access to the medical library, parking, lockers, food services and first aid where the Clinical Facility has those types of services/facilities available during its normal business hours.

20. No Payments or Other Remuneration. College agrees that no fees or monetary payments of any kind shall be exchanged between Clinical Facility, its agents and employees, and College, its agents, employees and students under the terms of this Agreement. Further, neither College, its staff members nor other representatives, shall attempt to bill or collect from any patient or from any other source fees for services provided to patients by said student.

The only exception shall be when Clinical Facility and College mutually agree to pay a Clinical Advisor a stipend for duties directly related to College's program.

- 21. <u>No Right to Employment</u>. The parties agree that the students of College shall not be considered employees, agents or volunteers of Clinical Facility, nor shall any student be entitled to any right, compensation, or other benefits normally afforded to employees of Clinical Facility, including but not limited to, Social Security, unemployment and workers' compensation insurance.
- 22. <u>Insurance Carried by the District</u>. District shall assure coverage of professional liability insurance for each student participating in the Rotation of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and three million dollars (\$3,000,000) in the aggregate, and said policy shall remain in full force and effect during the term hereof. District shall provide workers' compensation coverage for students participating in the rotation. These coverages are in effect while the student is on-site at Clinical Facility.
- 23. <u>Insurance Carried By Clinical Facility</u>. Clinical Facility shall secure and maintain comprehensive general liability insurance covering personal injury, property damage, and general liability claims in the amount of at least one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and three million dollars (\$3,000,000) in the aggregate with coverage for incidental contracts. A certificate of insurance must be provided that includes thirty (30) days notice of cancellation, modification, or reduction in said insurance. Clinical Facility shall deliver certificate(s) of insurance under Clinical Facility's comprehensive general liability insurance policy on or before the date of execution of this agreement. Upon request, District shall be provided a copy of said policy.

Clinical Facility shall carry professional liability insurance for itself and each of its employee(s), partners, and/or representatives providing professional services at Clinical Facility, except for District's students and College faculty, in the amount of at least one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and three million dollars (\$3,000,000) in the aggregate. Clinical Facility shall provide District with thirty (30) days written notice prior to cancellation, or reduction in said insurance. Upon request, District shall be provided a copy of said policy.

Clinical Facility shall provide workers' compensation coverage for each of its employees.

- 24. <u>Student Health Records</u>. Any student participating in a rotation shall provide verification of annual T.B. screening. This record shall be maintained in the Department of Pharmacy Technology at the College.
- 25. <u>Student Medical Care</u>. To the extent that any first aid or emergency care is required in connection with an injury or illness incurred by a student during performance of his/her clinical training during a rotation, the student shall be treated by Clinical Facility as appropriate.
- 26. Confidentiality of Student Records. Clinical Facility shall keep confidential and shall not disclose to any person or entity (i) student application; (ii) student health records or reports; and/or (iii) any student records as defined in California Education Code Section 76210 and the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, 20 U.S.C. paragraph 1232(g), concerning any student participating in the rotation, unless disclosure is authorized by (i) the student in writing, or (ii) disclosure is ordered by a court of competent jurisdiction. Clinical Facility shall adopt and enforce whatever policies and procedures are necessary to protect the confidentiality of student records as defined herein.
- 27. <u>Verification</u>. College warrants and represents that it has obtained all necessary approvals and consents from any and all agencies to enable Clinical Facility to offer the rotation to College's students participating in the Program. If requested by Clinical Facility, College will provide Clinical Facility with verification that the Program is duly licensed, duly accredited and/or certified, as applicable, by appropriate agencies. District covenants and agrees that at all times during the term hereof it shall retain such licensure, accreditation and/or certification, and its Program and faculty members shall continue to meet any and all federal, state and local requirements.
- 28. <u>Indemnification</u>. The District hereby agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the Clinical Facility, its parents, subsidiaries, directors, officers, attorneys, agents and their employees from and against claims, losses, liabilities, expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees), judgments or settlements arising from injury to person or property, including death arising from any negligence on the part of District, its Instructors, agents or employees in connection with or arising out of the acts or omissions in services performed under this agreement or any breach or default in performance of any of the District's obligations hereunder.

The Clinical Facility hereby agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the District, its Board of Trustees, employees, agents, and officers from and against claims, losses, liabilities, expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees), judgments or settlements arising from injury to person or property, including death arising from any negligence on the part of the Clinical Facility, its parents, subsidiaries, directors, officers, agents and employees in connection with or arising out of the acts or omissions in services performed under this Agreement or any breach or default in performance of any of the Clinical Facility's obligations hereunder.

Obligations pursuant to Article VIII shall survive termination or expiration of this Agreement.

- 29. <u>Governing Law</u>. This Agreement shall be governed by and constructed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.
- 30. <u>Assignment</u>. Neither party hereto may assign this Agreement or delegate its duties hereunder without the prior written consent of the other party which can and may be withheld by either party in its sole and absolute discretion.
- 31. <u>Effective Date Termination</u>.

The term of this Agreement shall become effective on November 09, 2015, and shall remain in effect for a period of five (5) years commencing on the Effective Date unless terminated in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement.

This agreement may be terminated by either Party, acting with or without cause, upon giving at least ninety (90) days prior written notice to the other Party except that any student already assigned to and accepted by the Clinical Facility shall be allowed to complete any in-progress clinical practicum assignment at the Clinical Facility.

STANDARD CLINICAL AFFILIATION AGREEMENT PHARMACY TECHNICIAN

This standard Clinical Affiliation Agreement (the "Agreement") is made and entered into this <u>9</u>th day of <u>November</u>, <u>2015</u> by and between the Rancho Santiago Community College District, a public educational agency ("District") located at 2323 North Broadway, Santa Ana, CA 92706-1640 and Custom Healthcare Compounding Pharmacy ("Clinical Facility"), located at 24022 Calle De La Plata Suite 510, Laguna Hills, CA 92653.

WHEREAS, District and Clinical Facility desire to contribute to community health education;

WHEREAS, District operates Santa Ana College ("College") and College is a duly accredited educational institution that conducts the program(s) described and identified in this Agreement (the "Program");

WHEREAS, District has obtained all necessary licenses, consents and/or approvals to conduct the Program from the State of California and any other applicable government agency;

WHEREAS, Clinical Facility operates a duly licensed health care agency at the address listed above and has obtained all necessary licenses, consents, and approvals;

WHEREAS, as part of the Program, students are required to participate in a clinical experience rotation;

WHEREAS, District desires to affiliate with the Clinical Facility in order that students may participate in a clinical experience rotation at the Clinical Facility; and

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"College" shall refer to Santa Ana College, and each of its employees, agents, representatives and assigns;

"Clinical Facility" shall refer to <u>Custom Healthcare Compounding Pharmacy</u>, its parents, subsidies, related companies, and each of their officers, directors, employees, agents representatives, successors, and assigns;

The "Program" shall refer to the Clinical training in health science programs as identified and described in this Agreement; and

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NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the following covenants, conditions and agreements, the parties hereto agree as follows:

TERMS

- 1. <u>Clinical Experience Rotation</u>. Clinical Facility agrees to provide students of the Program who are specified by College with a clinical experience rotation ("Rotation"), in accordance with standards established by governmental agencies and recognized professional accrediting agencies, and subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- 2. <u>Development of Curriculum.</u> College shall be fully responsible for the development, planning, and administration of the program, including, without limitation, programming, administration, matriculation, promotion and graduation. College acknowledges and agrees that the Rotation is intended to meet certain educational performance objectives, and College shall provide a copy of such performance objectives to Clinical Facility on or before student placement. Clinical Facility shall be fully responsible for the availability and appropriateness of the learning environment in relation to the program's written objectives.
- 3. Exposure to Bloodborne Pathogens. Program students and college faculty will comply with the final regulations issued by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration governing employee exposure to bloodborne pathogens in the workplace under Section VI(b) of the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970, which regulations became effective March 6, 1992 (the "Regulations"), including but not limited to responsibility as the employer to provide all program students with (a) information and training about the hazards associated with blood and other potentially infectious materials, (b) information and training about the protective measures to be taken to minimize the risk of occupational exposure to bloodborne pathogens, (c) training in the appropriate actions to take in an emergency involving exposure to blood and other potentially infectious materials, and (d) information as to the reasons the program student should participate in hepatitis B vaccination and post-exposure evaluation and follow-up.
- 4. <u>Applicable Procedure; Acceptance</u>. College agrees to provide Clinical Facility with a list of the name(s) of students who will be participating in a rotation.
- 5. <u>Nondiscrimination</u>. The parties agree not to discriminate in the selection, placement or evaluation of any student or faculty member because of race, creed, national origin, religion, sex, marital status, age, handicap, and/or medical condition.
- 6. <u>Academic Year</u>. The academic year consists of Fall and Spring semesters, Summer session and Winter break intersession.
- 7. <u>Rotation Schedule</u>. The rotation schedule shall be determined by College and Clinical Facility and may be amended from time to time by agreement of the parties. The number of students in each rotation shall be limited to a number mutually agreed upon by both parties, not to exceed the number specified by the accrediting agency(s).

 - In providing the students with the clinical rotation that is the subject of this Agreement, Clinical Facility shall comply with all applicable laws, rules, regulations, statutes, policies, procedures, and ordinances and shall be consistent with the professional standards of a health care agency.
- 10. Confidentiality of Patient Records. The Clinical Facility is a covered entity for purposes of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act ("HIPAA") and subject to 45 C.F.R. Parts 160 and 164 (the HIPAA Privacy Regulation"). Clinical Facility shall direct Students, and Instructors, to comply with the policies and procedures of the Clinical Facility, including those governing the use and disclosure of individually identifiable health information under federal law, specifically the HIPAA Privacy Regulation. Solely for the purposes of defining the Students' and Instructors' role in relation to the use and disclosure of Clinical Facility's protected health information, the Students and Instructors are defined as members of the Clinical Facility's workforce, as that term is defined by 45 C.F.R. 160.103, when engaged in activities pursuant to this Agreement. However, the Students and Instructors are not and shall not be considered to be employees of the Clinical Facility. The supervision, evaluation and direction of students while on site at Clinical Facility shall be the responsibility of the Clinical Advisor (Clinical Facility) or designee as guided by the instructional objectives. No direct, hands-on patient care shall be provided by participating students at Clinical Facility, except in accordance with all applicable laws, Clinical Facility rules, regulation, policies and procedures. District recognizes the patients' rights to refuse care provided by a student at Clinical Facility.
- 14. Removal of Students. Clinical Facility retains the right to exclude any student at any time from any clinical area. STUDENT AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

This Student Affiliation Agreement (this "Agreement"), dated November 09, 2015, is by and between Rancho Santiago Community College District on behalf of Santa Ana College whose principal place of business is located at 2323 N. Broadway, Santa Ana, California 92706 (the "District"), and Intergro Resources, Inc. d/b/a Intergro Rehab Services whose principal place of business is located at 1922 North Broadway, Santa Ana, CA, 92706 ("Intergro").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the District has academic programs dedicated to educating students in rehabilitation therapyrelated healthcare disciplines, and seeks to provide students in those programs with a field education experience through participation in an internship;

WHEREAS, Intergro is a contract provider of rehabilitation therapy services and employs licensed therapists and other health care personnel (collectively, "<u>Therapists</u>") to provide such services in nursing and rehabilitation centers; and

WHEREAS, the District and Intergro desire to foster the education of students in the healthcare disciplines in which Intergro provides services, including physical therapy, occupational therapy and speech/language therapy, by cooperating to provide students with appropriate internship experiences to supplement their academic studies.

- 1.1 The District shall be responsible for establishing and overseeing its rehabilitation therapy-related internship program (the "Program").
- 1.2 The District shall appoint a member of its faculty or another authorized District employee (the "Program Director") to serve as the primary liaison between the District and Intergro with respect to Intergro's participation in the Program. The District may change its Program Director from time to time during the term of this Agreement and shall provide Intergro with prompt notice of any such changes, providing Integro with the name, phone number and email address for any such new Program Director.
- 1.3 The District shall be responsible for evaluating and selecting students who are eligible to participate in the Program based on meeting the District's requirements, and to thereupon to assign eligible students to Intergro based on the number of placements available for students as conveyed by Intergro to the District from time to time (subject to mutual agreement by the District). Such students so assigned to Intergro are referred to herein as the "Students." If Intergro objects to the placement (or continued participation) of any particular Student for any reason, the District and Intergro will cooperate in good faith to resolve Intergro's objection to the satisfaction of both parties. Integro shall ultimately have the right to refuse to accept or retain assigned Students, in its absolute discretion.
- 1.4 The District shall establish and maintain ongoing communication regarding the Program with the Internship Coordinator (as defined below) and, as necessary, the applicable Field Supervisors (as defined below).
- 1.5 The District shall cause the Program Director to notify the Internship Coordinator (as hereinafter defined) of the District's assignment of Students to intern with Intergro, including the names of the assigned Students, their level of academic preparation, and the proposed dates during which the particular assigned Students are to intern with Intergro.

- 1.6 The District shall confirm that each Student obtains and maintains adequate health insurance coverage throughout the period that such Student is interning with Intergro, and shall provide evidence of such coverage to Intergro upon Intergro's request.
- 1.7 The District shall provide the Students with appropriate training regarding exposure to blood borne pathogens. Integro may ask Students to demonstrate proficiency in such skills.
- 1.8 The District shall ensure that each Student has, at all times during which the Student is interning with Intergro, professional liability insurance coverage providing for single limit coverage of not less than two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000.00) per occurrence and one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) in the aggregate. The District shall cause the applicable Students to provide evidence of such insurance coverage to Intergro upon request. Intergro shall have no financial or other responsibility to provide such insurance to the Students or to otherwise cover Students under any insurance policy.
- 1.9 The District shall direct the Students to comply with the rules, regulations, policies and procedures of Intergro applicable to its Therapists and similar personnel, as well as the rules, regulations, policies and procedures of the applicable nursing and rehabilitation centers at which the Students are located during their internship with Intergro, and to comply with all reasonable directions given by Intergro personnel who are assigned to supervise the Students during their internship. While the applicable Field Supervisor will have responsibility to supervise his or her assigned Student(s) while they are on-site, the District shall use commercially reasonable efforts to provide overall supervision of the Students during their participation in the Program. The District shall reinforce with Students: (i) the seriousness of the duties being performed by the Students during their internship, including the Students' impact on patients' well-being and the importance of punctuality and professionalism in connection with their participation in the Program; (ii) the importance of abiding by applicable laws and the policies and procedures of both Intergro and the nursing or rehabilitation center where the Students' will be working during their internships; and (iii) the confidentiality of health and other personal information of patients.
- 1.10 The District shall promptly inform Intergro in the event that a Student withdraws from the Program or otherwise is unable to complete the Program.
- 1.11 The District shall use commercially reasonable efforts to ensure that all Students have: (i) current measles, mumps, rubella, varicella and tetanus/diphtheria immunizations; (ii) annual tuberculin clearances of either a negative PPD reading or, if there has been a positive PPD in the past, a chest x-ray within normal limits; (iii) a Hepatitis B Series or a signed waiver declining immunization; and (iv) current CPR certification.
- 1.12 The District shall provide educational credits to Students, pursuant to District's rules and regulations and District shall have the discretion as to whether Students have completed requirements to receive such credit.

2. INTERGRO RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

2.1 Intergro shall cooperate with the District to participate in the Program in a manner that facilitates accomplishing the Program's goals. Intergro shall determine (in its sole discretion) its capacity to accept Students for internships from time to time, including the particular number (if any) of Students that Intergro is able to accept at any particular location at any particular time in conjunction with the Program, and to communicate the same to the Program Director. Intergro does not represent or warrant that any particular number of Students (if any) will be able to be accepted by Intergro at any particular time or in any particular location. Intergro may object to the placement (or continued participation) of any particular Student, and in such event the District and Intergro will cooperate in good faith to resolve Intergro's objection to the satisfaction of both parties, but Integro may refuse to accept or retain Students, in its absolute discretion. Intergro may from time to time require, as a condition to any particular Student's assignment to or continued participation in the Program, that such Student submit to a criminal background check. Intergro may refuse the placement of, or the continued participation of, any Student

who fails to comply with Intergro's or the nursing or rehabilitation center's applicable policies and procedures, who Intergro believes could put its patients, employees and/or visitors at risk, or who would be barred from employment by Intergro or a healthcare facility under applicable law or under the rules and regulations of the Medicare or Medicaid programs.

- 2.2 Intergro shall appoint a representative to serve as the primary liaison between the District and Intergro with respect to the Program (the "Internship Coordinator"), as well as provide one or more qualified Therapists to serve as the primary on-site supervisor of each Student who interns with Intergro (collectively, the "Field Supervisors"). The Internship Coordinator shall notify the Program Director of the name of the Field Supervisor assigned to each applicable Student participating in the Program as soon as practicable following Intergro's acceptance of the assigned Student. The Internship Coordinator shall notify the Program Director of any change in assigned Field Supervisors as soon as practicable in conjunction with any such change. The Field Supervisor assigned to an applicable Student (or other qualified Intergro personnel) will supervise the assigned Student(s) while the Student(s) are present at the nursing or rehabilitation center where the Student is interning with Intergro. A Field Supervisor's responsibilities include the following:
 - Orient the Student to Intergro and to the nursing or rehabilitation center where the Student is participating in the Program;
 - Monitor the Student's attendance and participation, and meet with the Student at regular intervals;
 - Submit evaluations of the Student's activities as contemplated by the Program; and
 - Any other responsibilities mutually agreed upon by the parties.

In the event an assigned Field Supervisor is or becomes unacceptable to the District and the District notifies the Internship Coordinator of the same in writing, Intergro will cooperate in good faith to resolve the District's concerns and, if such resolution does not occur within one week following the District's notification, Intergro shall promptly replace that Field Supervisor with another Field Supervisor if other Intergro personnel is available at the same location and is capable of adequately filling the role of Field Supervisor.

- 2.3 Intergro shall advise the District of any changes in its operation or policies that may materially affect Students' field experiences or the Program.
- 2.4 Intergro shall permit access by Students to Intergro patients and records as reasonably required to support the Students' clinical development within the Program and as permitted by applicable law, in each case as determined in Intergro's sole discretion. Intergro may refuse access to any Student who does not meet, in Intergro's sole discretion, its standards for safety, health or proper conduct or who fails to comply with Intergro's rules, requirements, policies and procedures or applicable law. Students may be required to sign confidentiality agreements.
- 2.5 Direct clinical supervision of each Student assigned to Intergro shall be provided by a properly licensed physical therapist (or occupational therapist or speech/language therapist, as the case may be) or a properly licensed physical therapist assistant (or occupational therapist assistant as the case may be) in accordance with all laws and regulations applicable in the Intergro facility setting. Such direct clinical supervision may be provided by the Field Supervisor assigned to the applicable Student or another properly licensed Intergro representative.
- 2.6 Intergro shall retain final authority for all aspects of operations and management of Intergro and the services provided to patients.

3. **GENERAL PROVISIONS**

- 3.1 <u>Non-discrimination</u>. The parties shall make no distinction or discriminate in any way among Students covered by this Agreement on the basis of race, color, sex, creed, age, handicap, national origin or any other basis prohibited by applicable law.
- 3.2 <u>Students Not Employees</u>. The parties hereto acknowledge that the Students are participating in the Program as unpaid interns and solely to obtain field experience and educational credit as part of their academic program at the District, and as such the parties hereto hereby acknowledge and agree that the Students are not, and shall not for any purposes considered to be, employees or agents of the District, Intergro or the nursing or rehabilitation center(s) at which they participate in the Program for any purpose, including workers' compensation or employee benefit programs. Students shall not receive any remuneration for their services in connection with or their participation in the Program. Students shall be responsible for all of their personal expenses, including without limitation meals, travel and incidentals, in conjunction with their participation in the Program.
- 3.3 Insurance. Each party to this Agreement shall provide and maintain, at its own expense, a program of insurance covering its activities and operations hereunder. Such program of insurance shall include, but not be limited to, professional liability insurance and comprehensive general liability insurance. The comprehensive general liability insurance shall have a minimum coverage of three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000.00) per occurrence and five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000.00) aggregate. The professional liability insurance shall carry single limit coverage of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) per occurrence and three million dollars (\$3,000,000.00) aggregate. Upon written request, a party hereto shall provide the other party with a certificate evidencing such coverage. Integro shall not be required to cover Students, the District or the acts of either Students or the District under Integro's insurance policies.
- 3.4 <u>Indemnification</u>. Each party agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the other from and against any and all claims, costs, actions, suits judgments, damages, liabilities, losses, or expenses including, without limitation, reasonable attorneys' fees and the reasonable fees of expert witnesses and other consultants), which arise or are asserted against or imposed upon or incurred by the party seeking indemnification as a consequence of any negligent or wrongful act or omission by the party from whom indemnification is sought or any of its employees, agents, or contractors. This provision shall survive termination of this Agreement. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to limit the indemnity or contribution rights that the parties may have under law. Notwithstanding anything in this Agreement to the contrary, neither party hereto shall be liable to the other party for incidental, consequential, special, exemplary or punitive damages, whether in contract or in tort, with respect to this Agreement and the transactions contemplated hereby.
- 3.5 <u>Term.</u> This Agreement shall be effective for a period of one (1) year beginning on the date of this Agreement. This Agreement will be automatically renewed annually unless otherwise indicated in writing by one of the parties at least thirty (30) days prior to the end of the term.
- 3.6 <u>Termination</u>. Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, this Agreement may be terminated by either party with or without cause upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other party.
- Arbitration. All controversies, claims and disputes arising in connection with this Agreement and the transactions contemplated hereby shall be settled by mutual consultation between the parties in good faith as promptly as practicable, but failing an amicable settlement shall be settled finally by binding arbitration in accordance with the provisions of this paragraph. Such arbitration shall be conducted in accordance with the Commercial Arbitration Rules of the American Arbitration Association ("AAA") or if the AAA is not available, any nationally recognized arbitration service mutually acceptable to the parties. The parties hereto hereby agree that the arbitration procedure provided for herein shall be the sole and exclusive method of resolving any and all of the aforesaid controversies, claims or disputes. Such arbitration may only be commenced and conducted in the state in which the District is located, unless the District and the Integro office the District is working with are in different states, then such

arbitration may only be commenced and conducted in the state in which the Integro office is located. The costs and expenses of the arbitration, including without limitation, attorneys' fees, shall be borne by the parties in the manner determined by the arbitrator. Legal action for (i) entry of judgment upon any arbitration award or (ii) adjudication of any controversy, claim or dispute arising from a breach or alleged breach of this paragraph, may be heard or tried only in the state and federal courts located in the state in which the District is located. Each of the parties hereto hereby waives any defense of lack of in personam jurisdiction of said courts and agrees that service of process in such action may be made upon each of them by mailing it certified or registered mail to the other party at the address provided for in this Agreement.

- 3.8 <u>No Agency</u>. All parties acknowledge that each is an independent contractor to the other, and nothing contained herein shall be deemed to create an agency, joint venture, franchise of partnership relation between the parties, and no party shall so hold itself out. No party hereto shall have the right to obligate or bind any other party in any manner whatsoever, and nothing contained in this Agreement shall give or is intended to give any right of any kind to third persons.
- 3.9 <u>Assignment</u>. No party hereto shall have the right, directly or indirectly, to assign, transfer, convey or encumber any of its rights under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other parties hereto, which may be granted or withheld in such other party's sole discretion, except in connection with the sale of all or substantially all of its business and, in Intergro's case, the sale of all or substantially all of the contracts pursuant to which it provides services to the nursing or rehabilitation centers at which the Students are participating in the Program. Subject to the foregoing, this Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the respective successors and assigns of the parties.
- 3.10 <u>Governing Law.</u> This Agreement shall be construed in accordance with and all disputes hereunder shall be governed by the laws of the state of in which the District is located unless the District and the Integro office the District is working with are in different states, then this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the state in which the Integro office is located.
- 3.11 <u>Severability</u>. If any term or provision of this Agreement is for any reason held to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect any other term or provision, and this Agreement shall be interpreted as if such term or provision had never been contained in this Agreement.
- 3.12 <u>Notice</u>. All notices to be given under this Agreement (which shall be in writing) shall be given at the respective addresses of the parties as set forth in the preamble to this Agreement, unless notification of a change of address is given in writing. Any notice required by this Agreement shall be deemed to have been properly received when delivered in person or when mailed by registered or certified first class mail, return receipt requested, or by Federal Express (or other nationally recognized overnight courier) to the address as given herein, or such addresses as may be designated from time to time during the term of this Agreement.
- 3.13 <u>Authority to Sign</u>. The parties singing below are authorized and empowered to execute this Agreement and bind the parties to the terms and conditions contained herein.
- 3.14 <u>No Third Party Beneficiaries</u>. This Agreement shall not create any rights, including without limitation third party beneficiary rights, in any person or entity not a party to this Agreement.
- 3.15 <u>No Waiver</u>. Any failure of a party to enforce that party's right under any provision of this Agreement shall not be construed or act as a waiver of said party's subsequent right to enforce any provisions contained herein.
- 3.16 <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement fully supersedes any and all prior agreements or understandings between the parties hereto or any of their respective affiliates with respect to the subject matter hereof, and no change in, modification of or addition, amendment or supplement to this Agreement shall be valid unless set forth in writing and signed and dated by all parties hereto subsequent to the execution of this Agreement.

- 3.17 Patient Privacy. The parties hereto affirm their commitment to comply with federal and state law regarding the use and disclosure of protected health information. Each party agrees to comply with the applicable provisions of the Administrative Simplification section of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, as codified at 42 U.S.C. § 1320d through d-8 ("HIPAA"), and the requirements of any regulations promulgated thereunder including without limitation the federal privacy regulations as contained in 45 CFR Part 164 (the "Federal Privacy Regulations") and the federal security standards as contained in 45 CFR Part 164 (the "Federal Security Regulations"), in each case as amended. Each party will promptly report to the other any use or disclosure in violation of HIPAA, the Federal Privacy Regulations, or the Federal Security Regulations of a patient's Protected Health Information which was previously disclosed to that party under this Agreement. Nothing in this Section shall require any party to waive the attorney-client, accountant-client, or any other applicable legal privilege.
- 3.18 <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. Intergro and the District will perform the services contemplated by this Agreement at all times in compliance in all material respects with applicable law. The parties expressly acknowledge and agree that nothing contained in this Agreement shall require the District to refer any patients to Intergro or the healthcare facilities that Intergro serves.

BACKGROUND

The Speech-Language Pathology Assistant was introduced in the Fall of 2001. Speech-Language pathology assistants are trained to assist in the language and speech development of communicatively disordered children and adults in educational and medical sites under the supervision of licensed speech-language pathologists. Critical to the implementation of the program is identifying and confirming sites and contractual arrangements for observation and fieldwork.

ANALYSIS

Formal agreements between the district and fieldwork experience sites will be necessary. To that end, a special agreement document was developed for this purpose. This clinical affiliation agreement covers the scope of program operations at the facility, as well as insurance and other issues relating to the liability of both parties. This agreement shall be effective for five (5) years or until termination by written notice of either party. The agreement has been reviewed by Dean Simon B. Hoffman and college staff. It carries no costs or other financial arrangements.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve this agreement renewal with Magnolia School District in Anaheim, California.

EDUCATIONAL AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into by and between the RANCHO SANTIAGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT on behalf of Santa Ana College, a public educational agency, hereinafter called the "District" and, <u>MAGNOLIA SCHOOL DISTRICT</u>, hereinafter called the "**Agency**".

PART I.

BASIS AND PURPOSE OF AGREEMENT

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the District and Agency acknowledge a public obligation to contribute to Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program education for the benefit of students and to meet community needs.

WHEREAS, the District operates Santa Ana College ("College") and the College is a duly accredited educational institution that conducts the program described and identified in this Agreement;

WHEREAS, the District provides programs in Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program education, which require clinical experience for students, hereafter called "**Students**", enrolled in these programs.

WHEREAS, the Agency has facilities suitable for the clinical needs of the District Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program.

WHEREAS, it is to benefit of both District and Agency that Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program students have opportunities for clinical experience to enhance their capabilities as practitioners.

NOW, THEREFORE, the District and Facility do covenant and agree as follows:

PART II. GENERAL RESPONSIBILITIES AND PRIVILEGES OF THE DISTRICT

- A. For the Program in General
 - 1. The District will assume full responsibility for offering Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program education programs eligible for approval by the Speech-Language Pathology & Audiology Board.

2. For Student Workers' Compensation

The District shall carry Workers' Compensation Insurance on Students of the District during clinical assignment, and keep records of clinical attendance for audit by the State Workers' Compensation Insurance Fund.

- 3. The District will designate the students enrolled in the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program to be assigned for clinical experience in the Speech-Language Pathology areas of the agency in such numbers as are mutually agreed upon by both parties.
- 4. The District will supervise, in cooperation with the Agency supervisor, all instruction and learning and clinical experience given to the students at the facility so designated and provide instructor to supervise the clinical and learning experiences given to them at the agency, provided however, that the responsibility for service to the client remain with the Agency.
- 5. The District will keep academic and clinical experience records of students participating in said program.
- 6. The District will provide and be responsible for the care and control of educational supplies and education equipment necessary for instruction, including library materials, audiovisual equipment and supplies which are not customarily available at the Agency for the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant clinical experience.
- 7. The District will be responsible for the supervision and control of the students in the activities of their clinical experience under the general supervision and delivery of service framework of the Agency.
- 8. The District will agree that the student shall be subject to requirements and restrictions specified jointly by representative of District and Agency, and subject to Agency rules and regulations governing conduct, copies of which shall be provided in advance to District by Agency.
- 9. The District will require District's Speech-Language Assistant Program instructors to obtain the approval of the Agency's Director of Speech-Language Pathology in advance of:
 - a. Student Speech-Language Pathology Assistant schedules.
 - b. Placement of student in clinical experience assignments.
 - c. Changes in clinical experience assignments.
- 10. The District will, in consultation and coordination and with the approval of the Agency's Director of Speech-Language Pathology and the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant staff, plan for the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant clinical experience to be provided to students under this agreement.

11. The District will in consultation and coordination with the Agency's Director of Speech-Language Pathology arrange for periodic conferences between appropriate representation of the District and Agency to evaluate the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant field experience program provided under this Agreement.

PART III. GENERAL RESPONSIBILITIES AND PRIVILEGES OF THE AGENCY

- A. For the Program in General
 - 1. The Agency will maintain the standards, which make it eligible for approval as a clinical area for instruction in accredited Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Programs.
 - 2. The Agency will provide staff members who hold a current state license or credential to practice speech-language pathology to supervise Speech-Language Pathology Assistant students. In addition, supervising SLP's need to have a minimum of 2 years experience as a practicing speech language pathologist.
 - 3. The administration of the service and client care at the Agency shall be the responsibility of and under the control and supervision of the Agency and shall be administered through the Agency and Agency staff.
 - 4. The Agency will provide staff that is adequate in number and quality to insure safe and continuous health care service to patients.
 - 5. The Agency will provide service facilities for learning experiences therein for students enrolled in the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program of District who are designated by District for such experience at the Agency (the field experience for any one student shall cover such period of time as may be specified by District.)
 - 6. The Agency will maintain service facilities in conformance with standards of the California State Board of Medical Examiners and the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association and permit inspection of its service facilities upon request by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association and the state Board of Medical Examiners
 - 7. The Agency will permit clinical experience in Speech-Language Pathology Assistant training by such students, either individually and/or in groups. All services of Agency herein contracted for, such services and the number of students receiving experience therein shall be by mutual agreement between parties and in accordance with the standards set forth by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association.
 - 8. The Agency will provide service areas in such a manner that there will be no conflict of learning opportunities among groups of students, and permit the district instructors and students access to service facilities, according to prearranged scheduling.

- 9. The Agency will permit its employees to participate in the educational program as resource persons and clinical experts provided such participation does not interfere with assigned duties.
- 10. The Agency will provide orientation for students and faculty to familiarize them with the facility and facility policies before assigning them to duties at the Agency.
- 11. The Agency will permit the faculty and students of the District to use its facilities for Clinical education according to approved curricula.
- 12. The Agency will permit the facility's Director of Speech-Language Pathology and other designated Speech-Language Pathology personnel to attend meetings of the District's Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program Faculty, or any committee thereof, to coordinate the clinical experience for the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program provided for under this Agreement.
- 13. The Agency will reserve the right, after consultation with the District, to refuse to accept for further Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program clinical experience any of the college students who in the agency's judgment are not participating satisfactorily, provided however, neither party shall discriminate with respect to the acceptance in or exclusion of students from the program.
- 14. The Agency will provide the educational use of supplies and equipment as are commonly available for client care.
- 15. It is understood by the parties to the Agreement that the Agency remain responsible for client care at all times.
- 16. The parties agree that the Agency shall have no monetary obligation to District, the Speech-Language Pathologist Assistant students or to Speech-Language Pathology Assistant instructors.

PART IV. **JOINT RESPONSIBILITIES AND PRIVILEGES**

A. For publications

- 1. Publication by District faculty, or Agency's staff members of any material relative to their clinical experience, that has not been approved for release by the District and Agency signers of this agreement, is prohibited.
- B. Confidentiality of Patient Records

The Clinical Facility is a covered entity for purposes of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act ("HIPAA") and subject to 45 C.F.R. Parts 160 and 164 (the HIPAA Privacy Regulation"). Clinical Facility shall direct Students, and Instructors

providing supervision at the Clinical Facility as part of the Program, to comply with the policies and procedures of the Clinical Facility, including those governing the use and disclosure of individually identifiable health information under federal law, specifically the HIPAA Privacy Regulation. Solely for the purposes of defining the Students' and Instructors' role in relation to the use and disclosure of Clinical Facility's protected health information, the Students and Instructors are defined as members of the Clinical Facility's workforce, as that term is defined by 45 C.F.R. 160.103, when engaged in activities pursuant to this Agreement. However, the Students and Instructors are not and shall not be considered to be employees of the Clinical Facility. The District and/or College will never access or request to access any Protected Health Information held or collected by or on behalf of the Clinical Facility by a Student or Instructor who is acting as part of the Facilities workforce. No services are being provided to the Clinical Facility by the District pursuant to this Agreement and, therefore, this Agreement does not create a "business associate" relationship as that term is defined in 45 C.F.R. § 160.103.

C. Indemnification

1. The District hereby agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the Clinical Facility, its parents, subsidiaries, directors, officers, attorneys, agents and their employees from and against claims, losses, liabilities, expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees), judgments or settlements arising from injury to person or property, including death arising from any negligence on the part of District, its Instructors, agents or employees in connection with or arising out of the acts or omissions in services performed under this agreement or any breach or default in performance of any of the District's obligations hereunder.

The Clinical Facility hereby agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the District, its Board of Trustees, employees, agents, and officers from and against claims, losses, liabilities, expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees), judgments or settlements arising from injury to person or property, including death arising from any negligence on the part of the Clinical Facility, its parents, subsidiaries, directors, officers, agents and employees in connection with or arising out of the acts or omissions in services performed under this Agreement or any breach or default in performance of any of the Clinical Facility's obligations hereunder.

Obligations pursuant to Article VIII shall survive termination or expiration of this Agreement.

D. Insurance:

Without limiting the indemnification obligations stated above, each party to the Agreement shall provide and maintain at its own expense a program on insurance covering its activities and operation hereunder.

<u>Insurance Carried by the District</u>. District shall assure coverage of General liability coverage of not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) in the aggregate covering personal injury, property damage, and general liability claims.

District shall assure coverage of professional liability insurance for each student participating in the Rotation of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and three million dollars (\$3,000,000) in the aggregate, and said policy shall remain in full force and effect during the term hereof. District shall provide workers' compensation coverage for students participating in the rotation. These coverages are in effect while the student is on-site at Clinical Facility.

Upon request, Clinical Facility shall be provided a copy of said policy.

Insurance Carried By Clinical Facility. Clinical Facility shall secure and maintain comprehensive general liability insurance covering personal injury, property damage, and general liability claims in the amount of at least one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and three million dollars (\$3,000,000) in the aggregate with coverage for incidental contracts. A certificate of insurance must be provided that includes thirty (30) days' notice of cancellation, modification, or reduction in said insurance. Clinical Facility shall deliver certificate(s) of insurance under Clinical Facility's comprehensive general liability insurance policy on or before the date of execution of this agreement. Upon request, District shall be provided a copy of said policy.

Clinical Facility shall carry professional liability insurance for itself and each of its employee(s), partners, and/or representatives providing professional services at Clinical Facility, except for District's students and College faculty, in the amount of at least one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and three million dollars (\$3,000,000) in the aggregate. Clinical Facility shall provide District with thirty (30) days written notice prior to cancellation, or reduction in said insurance. Upon request, District shall be provided a copy of said policy.

Clinical Facility shall provide workers' compensation coverage for each of its employees.

PART V STATUS OF SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY ASSISTANT STUDENTS

- A. Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program students shall have the status of learners and shall not be considered to be Agency employees nor shall they replace Agency staff. Any service rendered by the student during the experience is to be considered in addition to planned client care in that area. Clinical experience will be conducted as a laboratory learning experience. The Agency will provide regular staffing for client care in areas where students are obtaining clinical experience.
- B. Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program students are subject to the authority, policies, and regulations of the District. They are also subject, during clinical assignment, to applicable

agency regulations and must conform to the same standards as Agency employees in matters relating to the welfare of patients and general Agency operations. The Students are also responsible for recognizing the confidential nature of information related to clients and their records, and performance during emergency conditions. The Agency will provide copies of the rules, regulations and policies to the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program Students.

- C. Speech-Language Pathology Assistant Program students shall be responsible for proper coverage in regard to malpractice insurance, or any other liability insurance that might be required by either the District or the Agency.
- D. The District will be responsible for assuring the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant students assigned to the Agency for clinical instruction meet both District and Agency standards of health and physical fitness.

PART VI **PERIOD OF AGREEMENT**

A. The term of this Agreement shall become effective on the date signed by District, and shall remain in effect for a period of five (5) years commencing on the Effective Date unless terminated in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement.

This agreement may be terminated by either Party, acting with or without cause, upon giving at least ninety (90) days prior written notice to the other Party except that any student already assigned to and accepted by the Clinical Facility shall be allowed to complete any in-progress clinical practicum assignment at the Clinical Facility.

This Agreement shall immediately terminate if the District or the Clinical Facility's licenses, accreditations or certifications required for the Program are terminated, revoked, reduced, or any type of disciplinary action is taken against the District or the Clinical Facility by any accreditation or regulatory agency.

BACKGROUND

Attached is a list of Santa Ana College's degrees and certificates awarded for summer 2015, including comparative data for the previous year. Summer 2014 was the implementation year for Certificate Track at Santa Ana College, which now enables us to automatically award a student certificates they have earned rather than have them submit an individual petition. The first time we ran Certificate Track, we were able to capture the students' data and auto-award certificates earned over the last 10 years.

ANALYSIS

Santa Ana College awarded 254 Associate Degrees at the conclusion of the summer 2015 semester. Of those, 162 Associate of Arts, 13 were Associate of Arts Transfer, 43 were Associate in Science, and 36 Associate of Science for Transfer. This represents an increase of 20 degrees from summer 2014. The area with the most significant increase was Business Administration for Transfer which grew from 20 degrees awarded in summer 2014 to 30 degrees awarded in summer 2015.

As a result of the auto-award process launched in 2014, Santa Ana College awarded a combined 2,520 CAs or Certificates of Achievement (which require 18 units or more) and CERTs or Certificates of Proficiency (which require less than 18 units). Having to address the backlog, this year (summer 2015) we awarded 218 CAs and CERTs combined. Of those, 199 were Certificates of Achievement and 19 were Certificates of Proficiency. Summer 2015 represents a new baseline at the college for CA and CERT completion.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees confirm the list of recipients of the Santa Ana College Associate Degrees and Certificates awarded summer 2015 as presented on the attached.

BACKGROUND

Attached is a list of students who successfully completed coursework at Santiago Canyon College leading to an associate of arts degree, associate of arts for transfer degree, associate of science degree, associate of science for transfer degree, certificate of achievement, and/or certificate of proficiency for summer 2015. Also attached are the statistical tables showing degrees and certificates awarded by major.

ANALYSIS

Santiago Canyon College awarded 198 associate degrees in summer 2015, as compared to 201 in summer 2014. Santiago Canyon College awarded 29 associate in arts for transfer and associate in science for transfer degrees in summer 2015, compared to 32 in summer 2014.

Santiago Canyon College awarded 136 certificates of achievement in summer 2015, as compared to 319 in summer 2014. The decrease in certificates of proficiency is a result of the continuous work on the backlog of students who completed certificate program requirements in years past. The programs with the most significant increase in certificates are: Apprenticeship; Power Lineman and Apprenticeship; and, Surveying-Chief of the Party. A total of 42 certificates of proficiency were awarded in summer 2015, as compared to 26 in summer 2014. Notable increases were seen in General Accounting, Marketing Advertising, and Public Works: Code Enforcement Officer.

Possible scenarios to explain the difference in the IGETC (Intersegmental General Education Transfer) numbers include: students waiting to transfer in the fall semester instead of spring; students completing the requirements but not submitting a petition; and/or students not completing the required courses with satisfactory grades. Additionally, CSU will accept a grade of "D" in some areas, IGETC however will not accept a grade of "D."

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees confirm the recipients of the associate degrees and certificates for summer 2015 as presented.

Summary of Sabbatical

Academic Year: 2014-15: Full Academic Year

My first goal was to research the local schools of social work and counseling internship programs. Once I identified which universities have schools of social work and counseling that would be appropriate for Santa Ana College, I then contacted those schools and scheduled appointments to meet with the field representatives from Cal State Long Beach, Loyola Marymount, USC and Chapman Universities' to learn about their program requirements. In meeting with each field representative from each of these schools I ascertained which schools which schools would be appropriate to establish a collaborative partnership with Santa Ana College's counseling department.

I contacted program personnel through e-mails and telephone calls throughout the Fall semester and early part of spring. As a result, I was able to formalize a partnership with Cal State Long Beach School of higher education and social work, as well as Loyola Marymount school higher education and USC School of counseling social work and was able to establish M.O.U.'s with all three schools. In regards to Chapman University, I learned that their school of counseling does not have community college as an option for field work.

I, then, investigated which Los Angeles and Orange County community colleges had formal internship and part time training programs. I made contact and made on-sight visitations to the following colleges: Orange Coast College, Santa Monica College, Cerritos College, Fullerton College, Rio Hondo and Mesa College. I was able to gather a great deal of information that allowed me to develop a preliminary model that was later presented to the counseling department. I helped establish an intern/training counseling committee that assisted me to identify best practices. As a result we were able to develop a preliminary internship model that would best work for Santa Ana College and an outline of a training manual that would be work in progress to implement this academic year. I met with coordinators of various campus programs to determine the needs of a future intern, i.e. EOPS, CARE, Veterans, DSPS and general counseling. In addition, I had the opportunity to meet several times with three of Santa Ana Colleges adjunct counselors employed a multiple campuses and was able to obtain information on their training experience at those institutions. Finally, the last component of my sabbatical leave was to re-activate my L.C.S.W. license by completing 36 hours continuation education courses that included multiple workshops through the department of education and completed online courses as mandated by the California State of Behavioral Sciences; which required testing to complete these courses.

Christa Solheid's Sabbatical Leave Summary: 2014-2015

Dear Sabbatical Leave Committee members,

Thank you for the opportunity to work on this project. I have enjoyed learning how to create and produce my own lecture presentation videos, and look forward to using these skills on further materials and to help my colleagues who are interested in producing their own videos as well.

The training videos from Lynda.com were very well done, and although many of the trainings went into more detail than I might currently utilize, it was nice to review them to see what their capabilities are and I can easily go back and review specific topics as the need arises.

Creating the lecture notes is something I am pretty experienced with, yet I still had some issues with graphics, so this project gave me the opportunity to troubleshoot a lot with something I was pretty comfortable with and thus I gained a good deal of knowledge from the effort. Also, when reviewing the material in detail and keeping with the idea that relatively short, single topic presentations was the goal, the number of topics turned out to be 132, which is more than the originally estimated 90-100 topics. This added time to tasks of the project, but it was important to me that the project include all topics at the elementary and intermediate algebra levels.

One of the main obstacles I encountered was the limitation of my laptop computer due to its age. Thus, I spent some time during my leave researching what computer I should purchase that would meet my needs for this project and work for me in and out of the classroom for a few years. Although it took some time get familiar with my new computer, I am very pleased with it and it made recording and editing lectures a much nicer experience than it had been in the past.

Editing, and primarily closed captioning, required far more time to complete than I had anticipated. I did not want scripted lectures for my videos because it was important that they represent my lecture style, so I had to rely on voice recognition for the closed captioning. The capabilities of voice recognition could have been better, particularly as related to mathematical language, but this was a completely new task for me and I learned to appreciate the significance of it. I realize now how poor most of the closed captioning is for mathematical material, and I am proud of the fact that as a math instructor I understand the importance of the language that goes along with it, and I am pleased to offer these videos for our students who require captioning. Also, because I ended up having more movies than originally estimated, the additional hours to edit and close caption was significant so I still have some more corrections I want to make. Fortunately, captioning is the last part of the process of creating movies so it will be the easiest thing to modify while I review the movies and make necessary edits and corrections. I also learned of another method for captioning just a couple of days ago that I believe will make the process even quicker to complete, and I look forward with working with our staff in media to master this task as well.

As the math department has just fully implemented our redesign program and instructors are teaching in a different way, I believe many of them will be interested in creating their own materials for students and I look forward to helping them accomplish that by training them on recording, editing, and producing with Camtasia.

Finally, I want to thank you again. I am really not a person who enjoys fussing with technology of any kind. I really do just want things to work when I need them. That definitely was not the case here and I have such a wonderful feeling of accomplishment that I have dabbled with some pretty specialized programs and have created 132 algebra presentation lectures that will be a valuable tool for numerous students in algebra.

Introduction

I thank the Board for my sabbatical opportunity. My sabbatical leave involved two parts. Part one was travel to the Galapagos Islands in Ecuador and Macho Picchu in Peru. The second part of my sabbatical was to write a lab manual for our Introduction to Geology students.

Part 1-Travel.

Sixteen days of my sabbatical involved travel to the Galapagos Islands of Ecuador and then on to Macho Picchu and the Sacred Valley of the Inca in Peru.

We sailed around the Galapagos Islands on the *National Geographic Endeavour* with its naturalists. We visited eight of the Galapagos Islands, roughly following in Charles Darwin's footsteps. We observed much of the natural history of these islands including the volcanic geology, observing calderas, cinder cones, evidence of phreatic (steam) explosions and more.

In addition to the fantastic geology, I've always wanted to see the unique biology of the islands. We saw several of Darwin's finches. Each island's finch has evolved a different beak to take advantage of different food sources on different islands. Darwin's finches contributed to his "descent with modification" theory and "Origin of Species" which has been in print for one hundred and fifty-six years. Other organisms we saw included the giant Galapagos tortoises, vegetarian marine iguanas and much more.

While in the Galapagos I read "Origin", by Irving Stone. This book is a biography of Charles Darwin. He was a lackluster student in college but really came alive during his voyage on the "Beagle". It's a story I now relate to our students, that if you discover what really excites you, then you have a reason to succeed.

From Ecuador we traveled to Lima, Peru and then to Cusco, the ancient Inca capital city, situated at a little over 11,000 feet of elevation in the cloud forest. We then traveled by bus and train to Macho Picchu.

Macho Picchu is located on a knife ridge high above the Urubamba River and my first thought was, why would anyone build a city here. The view was stunning, but supplies for the city had to be carried up fifteen hundred feet from the river valley floor by hand since the Inca lacked wheeled transport. There is speculation that perhaps it was an Inca resort city.

Part 2—Introduction to Geology Laboratory Manual.

The primary goal for my sabbatical was to write an Introduction to Geology Laboratory Manual that would be free to our students. This turned out to be a much more demanding and time consuming task than I'd envisioned. At present I have a little over one-half the lab manual finished, but I plan on finishing it this semester.

I started using the partially completed lab manual this semester. On the first day of lab I informed students that there would be no expensive \$73 to \$135 lab manual to purchase. Students were quite excited about this. I have tried out the first three labs on students this semester, and so far it is working well, with a few "typo" hiccups that escaped my editing.

I have tailored our lab manual to match our students' capabilities as well as our rock and mineral collection and other lab supplies. One of the major advantages, I envision, to SCC self-publishing our own lab manual is that we can change the content quickly to accommodate our students' fast changing capabilities and experiences. This isn't something that we can do with commercial lab manuals.

BACKGROUND

Historically, RSCCD has rented classroom space from the Orange Unified School District (OUSD) to provide additional instructional facilities for both college credit and continuing education courses. This arrangement was first approved by the Board of Trustees on January 14, 1986. Renewal of the lease agreement is required for use of the space in 2015-16.

ANALYSIS

The 2015-16 cost to lease classroom space with the OUSD is \$15.23 per classroom hour (same as the 2014-15 rate). It is anticipated that the Santiago Canyon College, Orange Education Center will need to lease approximately 1,992 hours of classroom space during the 2015-16 fiscal year for a cost of \$30,338. 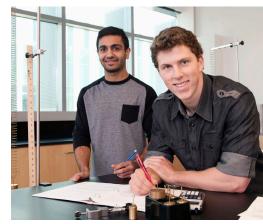

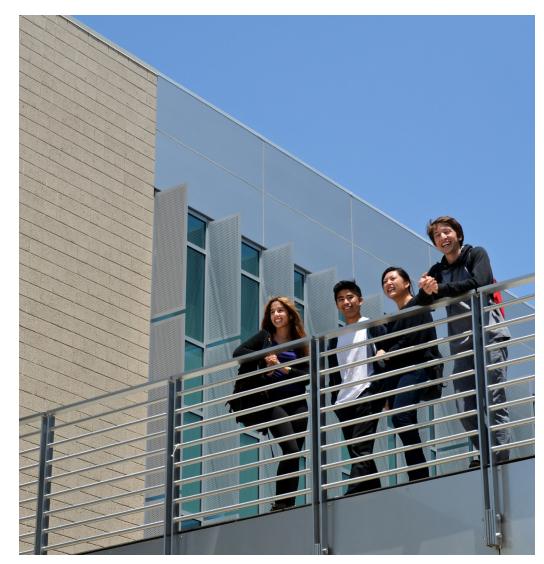

BACKGROUND:

This is an amendment to an existing agreement with Flewelling & Moody to provide additional coordination and architectural design services. On May 11, 2015, the Board of Trustees approved an agreement with Flewelling & Moody for architectural services for the Scheduled Maintenance roof replacement project at Dunlap Hall.

ANALYSIS:

During the course of the project development and design process, the architect has been requested to perform additional services for coordinating and collaborating with the two existing wireless carriers (Sprint and T-Mobile) with relocation plans for their equipment and antenna facilities on the roof of Dunlap Hall. Sprint and T-Mobile have been requested to relocate their facilities while the roof replacement work occurs which has required the architect to redesign certain details of the project to reflect the locations of where wireless antennas will remain operational during the roof Additionally, staff discovered that certain portions of the roof substrate is deteriorated and must be removed and replaced during the construction. The costs associated with this additional design work is \$4,870. The estimated construction cost at the time the original fee was set in the contract did not include the cost to remove and replace the concrete substrate of the roof. Due to the change in scope of the project, the added service for basic fee will increase by \$5,130. Under the current contract, the overall fee is 9% of the estimated construction cost which has increased from \$300,000 probable construction cost to \$357,000 awarded bid contract value. The District has reviewed the proposed additional services fee request and recommends an increase of \$10,000 to the base fee of \$27,000. The increase of \$10,000 will be a fixed fee. The new total base fee will be \$37,000. The reimbursable expense fee remains unchanged from the original contract in the amount of \$10,000. The revised total contract amount is \$47,000 (including reimbursables).

An analysis of hours and associated tasks was provided and evaluated to justify the additional fee requested. The District has reviewed the additional hours and found the added service fee to be fair and reasonable.

The agreement is funded by Scheduled Maintenance.

BACKGROUND:

This is an amendment to an existing agreement for additional architectural design services and an extension of time. On December 8, 2014 the Board of Trustees approved an agreement with HPI Architecture for professional design services for the Orange Education Center (OEC) of Santiago Canyon College located on North Batavia Street in the City of Orange. The architectural services covers all design phases, DSA approvals and through the construction administration phase, including DSA certification and close out. Additional design fee services for the project are required to reconcile square footage and estimated construction costs now that the programming phase has been completed and have progressed into schematic design. Through the course of schematic design the square footage of the building has increased from the original target of 50,000 square feet to 63,000 square feet based upon program meetings with the user groups undertaken in the program verification phase as well as due to constraints in the building structural grid. The building can be partially demolished but is constrained in the amount of demolition due to the structural design of the existing building.

The increase in square footage as well as an increase in construction cost estimates impacts the overall architectural design fee and needs to be adjusted accordingly. The construction budget has increased from a target of \$16 million to \$23 million based on the current Option 3 renovation and reduction of square footage with all current programs accommodated in the building as originally occupied, excluding the Warehouse and Publications operations. The target renovation construction budget increase has occurred due to: 1) renovation construction cost per square foot increases; 2) the increase in building square footage to reconcile assignable square footage (ASF) and gross square footage (GSF); 3) increases to meet the Child Development Center square footage exterior requirements and addition of costs for degreaser kitchen facilities to meet code; 4) new information regarding structural upgrades after further building destructive testing and investigation requirements by DSA; and 5) due to the constraints in demolition of the existing building due to the structural grid which limits the ability to reduce square footage.

ANALYSIS:

The amendment is to increase the contract by \$493,450 and to extend time. The revised total contract amount is \$2,216,650. The services covered by this agreement commenced on December 9, 2014 and the new end date has been revised from May 31, 2018 to June 30, 2019.

An analysis of hours and associated tasks was provided and evaluated to justify the additional fee requested. The District has reviewed the additional hours and found the added service fee to be fair and reasonable.

This project is funded by Measure E, Budget Stabilization, and Redevelopment Funds.

BACKGROUND

The District is currently in the last year of a five-year contract for solid waste collection and disposal service expiring June 30, 2016; therefore, it is time to re-bid this service.

ANALYSIS

Due to the need to develop a more robust contract to incorporate solid waste reduction and management goals included in the District's Sustainability Plan, it was determined to proceed by requesting and evaluating Request for Proposals (RFP) from various qualified vendors in accordance with Public Resources Code section 40059. This will allow flexibility for the District, as well as the bidders to provide the best solution based on our needs and requirements that are in the best interests of the District.

The approval of the attached Resolution No.15-21 is authorizing the procurement of Districtwide waste handling and recycling services by contract without competitive bidding. Public Resources Code section 40059 is specifically for solid waste handling services and requires a resolution be adopted by the Board if the District wishes to proceed with the RFP process for such services. The resolution was prepared by the District's legal counsel, Hugh Lee of Atkinson, Andelson, Loya, Ruud & Romo.

BACKGROUND

On November 16, 2009 the Board approved the usage of two Western States Contracting Alliance (WSCA) contracts, for the purchase of information technology equipment, goods and services on an as needed basis with Dell Marketing L.P. and Hewett Packard Company. Both contracts have expired and were replaced with new contracts that require Board approval.

ANALYSIS

The State of Minnesota, on behalf of the National Association of State Procurement Officials (NASPO) and the Western States Contracting Alliance (WSCA), awarded new contracts for computer equipment, software, peripherals and related services to Dell Marketing L.P. including Authorized Resellers, Master Price Agreement #MNWNC-108, Hewlett Packard Company including Authorized Resellers, Master Price Agreement #MNWNC-115, #MNNVP-133 and Hewlett Packard Enterprise including Authorized Resellers, Master Price Agreement #MNNVP-134. These contracts were approved for usage in California by the California Department of General Services, pursuant to California Participating Addendums.

Using these contracts will allow the District to continue to purchase information technology products including equipment, software, peripherals and related services at discounted prices, on an as-needed basis. These contracts were competitively bid to achieve cost-effective and efficient acquisition of quality products and services. Depending on the product or service, there is a minimum discount of 13.5% for Dell products/services, 12%-30% for Hewlett Packard Company products/services and 14%-40% for Hewlett Packard Enterprise products/services. Greater discounts are available based on volume purchases, reseller incentives and manufacturer promotions.

BACKGROUND

In 2011, The Santa Ana Workforce Investment Board (SA WIB) received an H-1B Technical Skills Training grant from the Department of Labor. Santa Ana College is part of the SA WIB consortium and was awarded a four-year sub-contract from the City of Santa Ana to implement the Orange County Bridge to Engineering Program to recruit students enrolled in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) courses and provide accelerated math, supported engineering cohorts, and academic and personal supports. Santa Ana College submitted a request to the SA WIB for a one-year extension of the grant project to support an additional student cohort, and the extension was approved. The performance period of the project from December 1, 2011 through November 30, 2015 was extended to November 30, 2016.

ANALYSIS

Santa Ana College sub-contracted with Growth Sector Company to continue to provide key services that are part of the project's strategies for success and completion of outcomes. Specifically, Growth Sector Company will utilize their industry expertise and experience to facilitate workshops, field trips and internships for students to their key partners. The sub-agreement between RSCCD and Growth Sector Company (#SAC-15-1030-01) was Board approved on June 15, 2015. The enclosed amendment to the agreement represents an extension to the agreement to end November 30, 2016, and the sub-award amount from \$30,000 to \$102,000.

The Project Director is Dr. Craig Takahashi and the Project Administrator is Madeline Grant.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board approve this sub-agreement amendment and that the Vice Chancellor, Business Operations/Fiscal Services or his designee be authorized to sign and enter into a related contractual agreement on behalf of the district.

FIRST AMENDMENT TO SUB-AGREEMENT BETWEEN RANCHO SANTIAGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT

AND

GROWTH SECTOR COMPANY

This **FIRST AMENDMENT** is entered into on this 9th day of November 2015, between Rancho Santiago Community College District (hereinafter "RSCCD") and Growth Sector Company (hereinafter "SUBCONTRACTOR") to amend that certain Agreement between the parties dated June 15, 2015, with a term of July 1, 2015 through November 30, 2015, (hereinafter "Term"). RSCCD and SUBCONTRACTOR may be referred to individually as a "Party" and collectively as the "Parties" in this Agreement.

WHEREAS, RSCCD received a federal sub-award from the City of Santa Ana Workforce Investment Area (Sub-Award No. A-2012-013) with an award date of February 6, 2012, CFDA No. 17.268, for its "H-1B Technical Skills Training Grant: Orange County Bridge to Engineering" (hereinafter "Grant") from the United States Department of Labor (hereinafter "PRIME SPONSOR"). The purpose of the Grant is to design and implement the Core Engineering Bridge Curriculum and to develop and provide an articulated pathway to post-secondary education to better prepare economically disadvantaged students and provide real-world experience and hands-on learning for students;

WHEREAS, RSCCD will serve as Fiscal Agent for the federal sub-award funds received under this Grant;

WHEREAS, RSCCD has the right to enter into agreements with outside entities for various services with the approval of the Board of Trustees;

WHEREAS, SUBCONTRACTOR has agreed to participate in the purpose of this Grant according to the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth;

NOW, THEREFORE it is mutually agreed by the Parties to amend the following:

ARTICLE I

2. Period of Performance

The Term for this Agreement of July 1, 2015, through November 30, 2015, shall be extended to November 30, 2016.

3. Total Cost

The total cost to RSCCD for the Term of this Agreement shall be amended from \$30,000.00 to \$102,000.00 USD. This reflects an increase of funding in the amount of **\$72,000.00** USD.

5. Budget, Payment and Invoicing

(a) <u>Budget</u>. SUBCONTRACTOR agrees that the expenditures of any and all funds under this Agreement will be in accordance with activities outlined in the revised Budget Narrative (*Exhibit B-1*), which by reference is incorporated into this Agreement. SUBCONTRACTOR agrees to expend all funds in accordance with all applicable

federal, state and local laws and regulations. SUBCONTRACTOR has the ability to adjust line item amounts in the Budget Narrative so long as the "Total Cost" (refer to Article I.3.) does not increase.

6. Reporting

(b) Final Report. SUBCONTRACTOR agrees to submit a final expenditure report and an end-of-year project report summarizing completion of the project consistent with the Scope of Work (*Exhibit A*). The final reports are due **December 15, 2016**.

9. Time Extensions

As Grant funds are only available from July 1, 2015 to November 30, 2016, time extensions for use of Grant funds beyond this period of performance should be coordinated through RSCCD and require written approval by the City of Santa Ana and/or PRIME SPONSOR.

Except as amended herein, all other terms and provisions of the Agreement, to the extent that they are not inconsistent with this **FIRST AMENDMENT**, remain unchanged.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Parties hereto certify that they have read and understand all the terms and conditions contained herein and have hereby caused this FIRST AMENDMENT to the Agreement to be executed as of the day that both Parties have signed the Amendment.

Rancho Santiago Community College District (RSCCD) Student, Staff and Community Input Regarding RSCCD Board of Trustees' Self-Evaluations

October 2015

In 2009, the RSCCD Board of Trustees implemented an annual review of its internal operations and performance. The Board invites community representatives, faculty/staff and students who interact with them on a regular basis to offer feedback. An online survey instrument is made available to individuals including (but not limited to) the associated student government officers, academic senates officers, the chancellor, vice chancellors, assistant vice chancellors, the college presidents, college vice presidents, representatives of the District's employee unions, college accreditation representatives and community members who serve on the District bond oversight committees or foundations.

The Board reviews the input prior to their own individual assessment using the same survey instrument. At the next meeting, the Board reviews its collective input and develops goals that members want to work toward during the year. The following year, the Board asks the community, staff and students to reassess them so they can evaluate the degree to which their goals have been met and to continue to refine the Board's internal operations and performance, if needed. On a regular basis, the Board Policy Committee also reviews the survey instrument, participant list, timelines and makes recommendations to the Board to ensure the established procedures are still appropriate for intended self-evaluation purposes.

The survey was disseminated to 108 individuals; 30 surveys were completed (a 28% response rate): three students, 21 faculty/staff members, five community members and one respondent who did not report his/her affiliation with the District.

Fifty percent of respondents reported that they regularly (more than 10 meetings annually) attended Board of Trustees meetings; 17% reported that they occasionally attended (6-10 meetings), 27% rarely (1-5 meetings), and 7% never attended.

Respondents were asked how useful they think the questionnaire is to the Board's self-evaluation process; 38% found the survey very useful, 31% reported somewhat useful, 28% were neutral and 3% found it not very useful to their process

Summary of Findings

The Board is most highly rated (95% of respondents "agree" or "strongly agree") for:

- Recognizing and celebrating positive accomplishments of the district and colleges (mean rating of 1.60),
- Working directly with community leaders and elected officials (local, state, national) to address issues/legislation that affect the college district (mean rating of 1.67),
- Respecting each others' opinions (mean rating of 1.68),
- Following a procedure for annual evaluation of the chancellor (mean rating of 1.70),
- Including legislative and state policy issues that will impact the district on their agenda (mean rating of 1.70),
- Participating in trustee development activities (mean rating of 1.72),
- ➤ Keeping the chancellor informed of community contacts (mean rating of 1.78), and
- ➤ Having knowledge about community college and state-related issues (mean rating of 1.86).

The Board is rated lowest (less than 80% of respondents "agree" or "strongly agree") for:

- Focusing on policy in board discussion, not administrative matters (mean rating of 2.17).
- ➤ Operating ethically without conflict of interest following established board policies (mean rating of 2.11),
- ➤ Understanding the difference between its policy and oversight roles and the roles of the chancellor and staff (mean rating of 2.04),
- Understanding the colleges' educational programs and services (mean rating of 2.14),
- Understanding its role and that of the chancellor, presidents, faculty, and staff (mean rating of 2.14), and
- ➤ Understanding the fiscal condition of the organization and providing fiscal oversight to assure the financial stability of the district (mean rating of 2.04).

Respondents were very thoughtful when given the opportunity to voice their opinions on the Board's greatest strengths, major accomplishments, and areas in which the Board could improve. There were many accolades, as well as suggestions for improvement, offered.

Comparisons with Prior Years' Findings:

In making comparisons between 2015 responses and those of the prior year, it is important to note that the number of respondents from one survey year to the next varies greatly and that percentages may fluctuate widely due to the low sample count.

The most significant increases (of at least 12 percentage points) in ratings since the prior year's survey included:

- ➤ Practicing appropriate collegial consultation (participatory governance) (+19 percentage points),
- Making decisions in the best interest of students, the colleges, and the entire district (+16 percentage points),
- ➤ Understanding the fiscal condition of the organization and providing fiscal oversight to assure the financial stability of the district (+15 percentage points),
- Understanding the budget process (+13 percentage points),
- Acting on behalf of the entire community (+13 percentage points), and
- ➤ Understanding its role and that of the chancellor, presidents, faculty, and staff (+12 percentage points).

The areas that experienced the most significant decreases in ratings (of at least 12 percentage points) since last year, specifically:

- ➤ Being knowledgeable about the mission and purpose of the institution (-15 percentage points),
- Sustaining a strong board/chancellor partnership and provides ongoing support for the chancellor to foster a strong partnership (-13 percentage points), and
- Conducting its meetings in compliance with state laws, including The Brown Act (-12 percentage points).

Other Findings:

A significant proportion of survey respondents (over 25%) indicated "not applicable" or "don't know" as their responses to some questions in the areas of "board relations with the chancellor, presidents, faculty, and staff." Three of the six areas below have shown an increase in awareness since 2014 and the remaining showed that respondents are not aware of the board's operations, planning and its work with community leaders and staff. Attention may be needed to develop and/or promote a better understanding of these issues:

- ➤ Keeping the chancellor informed of community contacts (40%, a 8 percentage point decrease).
- ➤ Completing the chancellor evaluation process and using the results to strengthen chancellor's performance and relationships (37%, a 8 percentage point decrease),
- Following a procedure for annual evaluation of the chancellor (33%, a 5 percentage point decrease),
- > Seeking the opinion of the student trustee (33%, a 16 percentage point increase),
- Following communication procedures with staff, ensuring the chancellor is informed of such communication (30%, a 3 percentage point increase), and
- Adopting a planning and evaluation process which assures that the educational needs of students and the community are effectively and efficiently met (27%, a 13 percentage point increase).

2015 Respondents' Comments

Board's greatest strengths:

- Their willingness to meet with the bargaining unit and understand all factions of RSCCD.
- Their care for the community at large and how the colleges interact with the community.
- Their community presence.
- It is clear that board members want to support student success as well as to make the RSCCD district and its colleges the best that they can be.
- Our board is a bipartisan board and they put the good of the district above their own party affiliations. There is a great spirit of cooperation with our board.
- They seem to enjoy what they are doing.
- The board is friendly, professional, and kind to others. They are respectful, good listeners. When I invited them to be part of our union meetings, they listen to us and share information with us. I am thankful to have a good communication with them.
- Continuity in the pursuit of excellence. Given the average length of service by the board members, they are well informed about the history, practices, and achievements of the district.
- The Board's greatest strength(s) can only be viewed in a rear view mirror. At one time board members were respected and appreciated. Faculty and staff sincerely believed the RSCCD Board had their best interests at heart. For the past five years the Board and employee relationships have deteriorated to the point that most employees have little respect for our seven trustees. It's unfortunate, but the District's lack of a vision and leadership focuses on to the board and creates the negative feelings throughout the District.
- Acts as a whole; engages in local community; most (not all) actively participate at college events.
- The Board holds meetings, at least monthly. Honestly, I am not sure what else could be said in terms of the "strengths" of the Board. Many individuals are frustrated by the board and believe they have little respect for staff and faculty. There was even an interesting incident where the Board President, during commencement, was standing and talking to fellow board with his back to the students. So as the students are walking in during the processional, the Board President had his back to the students. That was appalling.
- Overall, the Board consists of intelligent, committed, and level-headed professionals who genuinely care about students, the colleges, the District, and the community.
- Its ability and position to be advocates for students. Openness and willingness to listen to constituents. The experience and understanding of certain board members. It's diverse composition of membership and opinions.
- They are politically savvy.
- Continuity and knowledge base of trustees who have served for a long time.

Major accomplishments of the Board in the past year:

- They are helping our Chapter, especially Trustees John Hanna, Claudia Alvarez, Nelida (Yanez) and Jose Solorio.
- Coming together to work through a series of difficult issues and then speaking with a single voice.
- Efficient, informative, and well run meetings. Many thanks to President Labrado for his leadership as board president this year. Board members looked closely at and raised significant questions about the district's budget. In an equitable way, the board seeks to highlight and acknowledge exceptional students, classified staff, and faculty, which helps to create a true sense of community within the district. Might they also want to highlight and acknowledge exceptional administrators?
- Supporting the BA program at SAC and the implementation of the public safety improvements.
- Saudi Arabia
- Regrettably there have only been failures. Poor legal advice resulted in the Saudi debacle which caused a great deal of embarrassment to the District and will continue to be so. The Board disregarded the advice of the academic senates and pushed for the baccalaureate degree program showing their obvious lack of respect for the faculty. Most disappointing and what seems as an ongoing failure is the Board's undying loyalty to a Chancellor who does not understand transparency, appears way over his head and seems to stumble at everything he attempts to do.
- Adopting the (ill advised) Board Policy on the Baccalaureate degree against the advice of the Academic Senate. The Board of Trustees, by state law, are to "rely primarily on the advice" of the Academic Senate in matters related to curriculum and degrees. The Board had no compelling reason to disregard the advice (by Joint Resolution) of the Academic Senates. Arming District Security. Student leaders reported that the Board of Trustees informed them that they would have the opportunity to regarding the proposal then, the board reneged on that promise. Deal with Saudi Arabia: First, the trustees claim that there were several times when the board, itself, discussed the Saudi Arabia deal. However, up until recently, there were no agenda items for the board to discuss it. Thus any discussions occurred outside of the Brown Act. Second, the Board continues to accept the advice of the district's lawyer even though the lawyer admitted he gave the Foundation bad advice in regards to the Brown Act and was not an expert on international law. Third, time after time, the Chancellor informs the Board and the Foundation Board that the District and Foundation are separate. It seems the Board of Trustees now understand that the District and Foundation are not separate. Yet despite all these missteps, the Board continues to operate in such a way as to abdicate any and all responsibility to this issue.
- Overall, the Board's oversight of the District enables us to be an outstanding institutions of higher learning with a good reputation in the communities we serve.
- Uncertain. If there were, it's not well defined, shared and articulated, or demonstrated very clearly. Perhaps in advocacy and lobbying for community colleges.

Areas in which the Board could improve:

- Communication and transparency
- I would like to have them to visit our Child Development Centers and pay more attention to our Chapter because sometimes we feel different than the other chapters. We are part of the RSCCD District but we are always at the outside of the budget. I want the Board of Trustees get more information about different classifications, salaries in the Child Development centers.
- RSCCD is fortunate to have a strong board with dedicated and committed members.
- Their interaction with the public and students.
- The board needs to consistently follow its own board policies. There have been a few instances within the past year when it was shown that the board was not following one or more of its own policies. A number of board members have illustrated that they do not know the difference between collegial communication and collegial consultation. In addition, as a result of some of the questions raised and directions given by board members, some board members have illustrated that they are not as clear about their role as an oversight body as they should be. As a result, instead of helping to define a vision and/or the goals for the district, some board members seem to attempt to determine how those the vision and/or goals will be achieved. The board would benefit from additional training from the state related to 10 +1; collegial consultation; and the difference between the board's, the administration's, and the faculty's roles.
- The board should never undercut the decisions made by district/college staff by having "confidential" meetings and conversations with a few people who think it is okay to promote their own agendas outside the process and get board members to go along. In fact board members should not be having all of these side conversations and meetings at all. It destroys the integrity of the district.
- Have meetings every semester at each college site including the continuing education sites.
- To focus more on innovative and forward thinking towards the college's student progress and vision towards reaching that goal. Also, how to be competitive for SAC and SCC be the college of choice for students.
- Making sure that the contract with Saudi Arabia is a good choice for the District.
- There is a void of leadership and vision in this District and it's time to get back on track. There are also serious concerns about how the District is managed or more accurately, it's not managed. The Board needs to show some leadership themselves, recognize the problems and make the appropriate changes. Some board members may feel it is micromanaging by initiating change from the board level. Since the leader you hired has had multiple opportunities to move forward, but seems to be stuck in reverse, the burden for making improvement must then fall on the Board. The RSCCD has gone from first to worst in five years. Please pick up the pieces, make the appropriate changes and let's get us back to the successes we enjoyed for so many years.
- Certain newer board members need to work on their communication styles, tact, and diplomacy and not belittle staff. The board needs to better understand their policy role and let the Chancellor manage the district.
- Most of the Board members understand the roles of the chancellor, presidents, faculty, and staff but yet, some are allowed to make requests of staff that go beyond a matter of policy but begin to dive into the day to day activities of how staff should be working, which creates an environment of staff being micro-managed. This creates additional work that could otherwise be communicated via the chancellor. The Board should articulate and/or reaffirm its mission, goals and purpose on an annual basis or every 2-3 years. It should be rooted and grounded in data to support such and shared. This would help align the institution to work from top to bottom on common of expectations and goals.
- Better understanding of fiscal impacts at the college level.
- Keep nudging the need to hire a more ethnically diverse faculty. Classified staff, administrators, and
 counseling faculty hires yield excellent diversity; however, discipline faculty are not as diverse and do
 not adequately mirror our changing communities.

- First, the Board of Trustees needs to have a lawyer independent of any individuals associate with the district, and an expert in the area of the Brown Act - give a presentation on how the Board of Trustees should act in accordance with the Brown Act. For example, it is a violation of the Brown Act for the Trustees to have a substantive discussion of items that are not on the agenda. Thus, to state that the issue of Saudi Arabia was discussed, but just not reflected in the minutes, is wrong. The item must be agendized to be discussed. Second, the Board of Trustees should direct the Chancellor to invite the Executive Director of the CCLC and the President of the ASCCC to give a "technical assistance" presentation to the Board of Trustees to improve the Board's understand of their role and responsibilities (and that of the Academic Senate) in regards to AB 1725. Yes, the faculty do get a "veto". For those items that are "mutual consent", only when there is "mutual consent" do those items move forward. Should there be a failure to achieve mutual consent, the items do not move forward (unless necessitated by fiscal or legal reasons). Third, the Board of Trustees needs to provide a "vision" to the district. Interestingly, there is a question in the survey that states, "The board is appropriately involved in defining the vision and goals of the district." However, a trustee informed me that the Board has no role in the vision of the district. This is absurd. The Board of Trustees are the elected leaders of the district. If the Board does not provide a "vision" for the district, who can?
- Holding the Chancellor more accountable, requiring more transparency in the district budget, developing better relationships with faculty and staff.

Rancho Santiago Community College District (RSCCD) Student, Staff and Community Input Regarding RSCCD Board of Trustees' Self-Evaluations (Respondents Who Regularly Attend BOT Meetings)

October 2015

The RSCCD Board of Trustees implemented an annual review of its internal operations and performance since 2009. On a regular basis, the Board Policy Committee also reviews the survey instrument, participant list,-timelines and make recommendations to the Board to ensure the established procedures are still appropriate for intended self-evaluation purposes.

The Board invites community representatives, faculty/staff and students who interact with them on a regular basis to offer feedback. An online survey instrument is made available to individuals including (but not limited to) the associated student government officers, academic senates officers, the chancellor, vice chancellors, assistant vice chancellors, the college presidents, college vice presidents, representatives of the District's employee unions, college accreditation representatives and community members who serve on the District bond oversight committees or foundations.

The Board reviews the input prior to their own individual assessment using the same survey instrument. At the next meeting, the Board reviews its collective input and develops goals that members want to work on for the year. The following year, the Board asks the community, staff and students to reassess them so they can evaluate the degree to which their goals have been met and to continue to refine the Board's internal operations and performance, if needed.

The survey instrument was disseminated online to 108 individuals; 30 surveys were completed (a 28% response rate). Fifty percent (n=15) of respondents reported that they regularly (more than 10 meetings annually) attend Board of Trustees meetings: 1 student, 12 faculty and staff, and 2 community members. **Those data are included in this report.**

Summary of Findings

The Board is unanimously rated as satisfactory (100% of respondents "agree" or "strongly agree") in nine of the forty-four areas rated by respondents, specifically board members:

- Keeping the chancellor informed of community contacts,
- Following a procedure for annual evaluation of the chancellor,
- Working directly with community leaders and elected officials to address issues/legislation that affect the college district,
- Being knowledgeable about community college and state-related issues,
- Acting as an advocate for community colleges,
- Including legislative and state policy issues that impact the district on board agendas,
- Recognizing and celebrating positive accomplishments of the district and colleges,
- Participating in trustee development activities, and
- Respecting each other's opinions.

5.6 (14)

The Board is rated lowest (75% of respondents "agree" or "strongly agree" on issues in the area of strategic planning, relationships with staff, and its leadership, specifically board members:

- Focusing on policy in board discussion, not administrative matters (57%),
- Operating ethically without conflict of interest following established board policies (64%),
- Maintaining confidentiality of privileged information (69%),
- Understanding the difference between its policy and oversight roles and the roles of the chancellor and staff (71%),
- Understanding the colleges' educational programs and services (71%),
- Understanding its role and that of the chancellor, presidents, faculty and staff (73%), and
- Understanding the fiscal condition of the organization and provides fiscal oversight to assure the financial stability of the district (73%).

Comparisons with Prior Years' Findings:

In making comparisons between 2015 responses and those of prior years, it is important to note that the number of respondents from one survey year to the next varies greatly and that percentages may fluctuate widely due to the low response counts.

The most significant positive changes in ratings compared to the 2014 survey are related to board relations with the chancellor and community relations (advocacy):

- Completing the chancellor evaluation process and use the results to strengthen the chancellor's performance and relationships (+24 percentage points),
- Community and district employees being aware of who the elected trustees are and their role in district governance (+21 percentage points), and
- Being knowledgeable about community college and state-related issues (+20 percentage points).

The most significant negative changes in ratings compared to the 2014 survey are related to policy roles and leadership, ethics, and standard of conduct:

- Focusing on policy in board discussion, not administrative matters (-24 percentage points), and
- Operating ethically without conflict of interest following established board policies (-24 percentage points).

Other Findings:

Attention may be needed to develop and/or promote a better understanding of issues pertaining to board relations with the chancellor, presidents, faculty and staff. While this core group of respondents who regularly attended Board meetings tended to respond to all items, at least one-fifth indicated "not applicable or don't know," mainly:

- Seeking the opinion of the student trustee (27%),
- Keeping the chancellor informed of community contacts (27%),
- Completing the chancellor evaluation process and using the results to strengthen chancellor's performance and relationships (27%),
- Following communication procedures with staff ensuring the chancellor is informed of such communication (27%), and
- Sustaining a strong board/chancellor partnership and providing ongoing support for the chancellor to foster a strong partnership (20%).

To fully understand how respondents feel about the board's self-evaluation process, a question about the usefulness of the survey instrument was added. Nearly half (47%) stated the instrument was very useful, one-third (33%) found it somewhat useful, 13% were neutral and the remaining 7% did not find it very useful.

2015 Respondents' Comments

Board's greatest strengths:

- It is clear that board members want to support student success as well as to make the RSCCD district and its colleges the best that they can be.
- Our board is a bipartisan board and they put the good of the district above their own party affiliations. There is a great spirit of cooperation with our board.
- The board is friendly, professional, and kind to others. They are respectful, good listeners. When I invited them to be part of our union meetings, they listen to us and share information with us. I am thankful to have a good communication with them.
- Continuity in the pursuit of excellence. Given the average length of service by the board members, they are well informed about the history, practices, and achievements of the district.
- The Board's greatest strength(s) can only be viewed in a rear view mirror. At one time board members were respected and appreciated. Faculty and staff sincerely believed the RSCCD Board had their best interests at heart. For the past five years the Board and employee relationships have deteriorated to the point that most employees have little respect for our seven trustees. It's unfortunate, but the District's lack of a vision and leadership focuses on to the board and creates the negative feelings throughout the District.
- Acts as a whole; engages in local community; most (not all) actively participate at college events.
- The Board holds meetings, at least monthly. Honestly, I am not sure what else could be said in terms of the "strengths" of the Board. Many individuals are frustrated by the board and believe they have little respect for staff and faculty. There was even an interesting incident where the Board President, during commencement, was standing and talking to fellow board with his back to the students. So as the students are walking in during the processional, the Board President had his back to the students. That was appalling.
- Its ability and position to be advocates for students. Openness and willingness to listen to constituents. The experience and understanding of certain board members. It's diverse composition of membership and opinions.
- Continuity and knowledge base of trustees who have served for a long time.

Major accomplishments of the Board in the past year:

- They are helping our Chapter, especially Trustees John Hanna, Claudia Alvarez, Nelida (Yanez) and Jose Solorio.
- Coming together to work through a series of difficult issues and then speaking with a single voice.
- Efficient, informative, and well run meetings. Many thanks to President Labrado for his leadership as board president this year. Board members looked closely at and raised significant questions about the district's budget. In an equitable way, the board seeks to highlight and acknowledge exceptional students, classified staff, and faculty, which helps to create a true sense of community within the district. Might they also want to highlight and acknowledge exceptional administrators?
- Supporting the BA program at SAC and the implementation of the public safety improvements.
- Regrettably there have only been failures. Poor legal advice resulted in the Saudi debacle which
 caused a great deal of embarrassment to the District and will continue to be so. The Board
 disregarded the advice of the academic senates and pushed for the baccalaureate degree program
 showing their obvious lack of respect for the faculty. Most disappointing and what seems as an
 ongoing failure is the Board's undying loyalty to a Chancellor who does not understand
 transparency, appears way over his head and seems to stumble at everything he attempts to do.
- Adopting the (ill advised) Board Policy on the Baccalaureate degree against the advice of the Academic Senate. The Board of Trustees, by state law, are to "rely primarily on the advice" of the Academic Senate in matters related to curriculum and degrees. The Board had no compelling reason to disregard the advice (by Joint Resolution) of the Academic Senates. Arming District Security. Student leaders reported that the Board of Trustees informed them that they would have the opportunity to regarding the proposal then, the board reneged on that promise. Deal with Saudi Arabia: First, the trustees claim that there were several times when the board, itself, discussed the Saudi Arabia deal. However, up until recently, there were no agenda items for the board to discuss it. Thus any discussions occurred outside of the Brown Act. Second, the Board continues to accept the advice of the district's lawyer even though the lawyer admitted he gave the Foundation bad advice in regards to the Brown Act and was not an expert on international law. Third, time after time, the Chancellor informs the Board and the Foundation Board that the District and Foundation are separate. It seems the Board of Trustees now understand that the District and Foundation are not separate. Yet despite all these missteps, the Board continues to operate in such a way as to abdicate any and all responsibility to this issue.
- Uncertain. If there were, it's not well defined, shared and articulated, or demonstrated very clearly. Perhaps in advocacy and lobbying for community colleges.

Areas in which the Board could improve:

- Communication and transparency
- I would like to have them to visit our Child Development Centers and pay more attention to our Chapter because sometimes we feel different than the other chapters. We are part of the RSCCD District but we are always at the outside of the budget. I want the Board of Trustees get more information about different classifications, salaries in the Child Development centers.
- RSCCD is fortunate to have a strong board with dedicated and committed members.
- The board needs to consistently follow its own board policies. There have been a few instances within the past year when it was shown that the board was not following one or more of its own policies. A number of board members have illustrated that they do not know the difference between collegial communication and collegial consultation. In addition, as a result of some of the questions raised and directions given by board members, some board members have illustrated that they are not as clear about their role as an oversight body as they should be. As a result, instead of helping to define a vision and/or the goals for the district, some board members seem to attempt to determine how those the vision and/or goals will be achieved. The board would benefit from additional training from the state related to 10 +1; collegial consultation; and the difference between the board's, the administration's, and the faculty's roles.
- The board should never undercut the decisions made by district/college staff by having "confidential" meetings and conversations with a few people who think it is okay to promote their own agendas outside the process and get board members to go along. In fact board members should not be having all of these side conversations and meetings at all. It destroys the integrity of the district.
- Focus on innovative and forward thinking towards the college's student progress and vision towards reaching that goal. Also, how to be competitive so that SAC and SCC be the colleges of choice.
- There is a void of leadership and vision in this District and it's time to get back on track. There are serious concerns about how the District is managed or more accurately, not managed. The Board needs to show leadership, recognize the problems and make appropriate changes. Some board members may feel it is micromanaging by initiating change from the board level. Since the leader you hired has had multiple opportunities to move forward, but seems to be stuck in reverse, the burden for making improvement then falls on the Board. RSCCD has gone from first to worst in five years. Please pick up the pieces, make changes and let's get us back to the successes we enjoyed for so many years.
- Certain newer board members need to work on their communication styles, tact, and diplomacy and not belittle staff. They need to better understand their policy role and let the Chancellor manage the district.
- Most of the Board members understand the roles of the chancellor, presidents, faculty, and staff but yet, some are allowed to make requests of staff that go beyond a matter of policy but begin to dive into the day to day activities of how staff should be working, which creates an environment of staff being micro-managed. This creates additional work that could otherwise be communicated via the chancellor. The Board should articulate and/or reaffirm its mission, goals and purpose on an annual basis or every 2-3 years. It should be rooted and grounded in data to support such and shared. This would help align the institution to work from top to bottom on common of expectations and goals.
- Better understanding of fiscal impacts at the college level.
- First, the Board of Trustees needs to have a lawyer independent of any individuals associate with the district, and an expert in the area of the Brown Act give a presentation on how the Board of Trustees should act in accordance with the Brown Act. For example, it is a violation of the Brown Act for the Trustees to have a substantive discussion of items that are not on the agenda. Thus, to state that the issue of Saudi Arabia was discussed, but just not reflected in the minutes, is wrong. The item must be agendized to be discussed. Second, the Board of Trustees should direct the Chancellor to invite the Executive Director of the CCLC and the President of the ASCCC to give a "technical assistance" presentation to the Board of Trustees to improve the Board's understand of their role and responsibilities (and that of the Academic Senate) in regards to AB 1725. Yes, the faculty do get a "veto". For those items that are "mutual consent", only when there is "mutual consent" do those items move forward. Should there be a failure to achieve mutual consent, the items do not move forward (unless necessitated by fiscal or legal reasons). Third, the Board of Trustees needs to provide a "vision" to the district. Interestingly, there is a question in the survey that states, "The board is appropriately involved in defining the vision and goals of the district." However, a trustee informed me that the Board has no role in the vision of the district. This is absurd. The Board of Trustees are the elected leaders of the district. If the Board does not provide a "vision" for the district, who can?

BACKGROUND

Erlinda Martinez has notified the Chancellor of her intention to retire from the District on June 30, 2016. The Board of Trustees took action to accept her resignation at the September 28, 2015 meeting.

ANALYSIS

The administration is recommending that Community College Search Services (CCSS) be retained to assist the District with the search for the next president of Santa Ana College. It is the administration's intention to begin the search process immediately in order to ensure that the new president is able to assume office on July 1, 2016.

The District has used CCSS numerous times including the search that resulted in Chancellor Rodriquez's selection as well as the searches for both current college presidents. The use of a search consultant will enable the District to conduct an effective, nationwide search. The search consultant will take the lead on the recruitment of qualified candidates for this position and will also conduct in-depth reference checks on the finalists.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees engage Community College Search Services and authorize the Chancellor or his designee to execute the required documents to retain this firm.
