BACKGROUND

September 11, 2001 was a day of tragedy for the United States as it came under attack. Nineteen men hijacked four fuel-loaded U.S. commercial airplanes bound for west coast destinations and 2,977 people were killed in New York City, Washington, D.C. and Shanksville, Pennsylvania. Of those killed, 403 were first responders who were at each location to help those who were trapped and injured.

First responders throughout the country put themselves in harm's way every day to keep its citizens and communities safe. Many have fallen in the line of duty.

ANALYSIS

The officers on the Rancho Santiago Community College District campuses, as well as local police officers and firefighters in the communities within our district, are ready and able every day of the year to do whatever is necessary to protect our students. On behalf of the Rancho Santiago Community College District, the board of trustees would like to honor and express appreciation to the first responders who every day work to insure the safety of our students and communities. WHEREAS, in Orange County and in the Rancho Santiago Community College District, we rely on our first responders – both fire and police departments – to respond to dangerous fires, floods, earthquakes, and other natural and man-made disasters and incidents; and

WHEREAS, The Rancho Santiago Community College District, has a proud history of partnership with public safety agencies. For over 47 years, Santa Ana College has enjoyed a successful partnership with the Orange County Sheriff's Department as evidenced by the Orange County Sheriff's Regional Training Academy in Tustin; and

WHEREAS, Santa Ana College is also home to one the state's largest and oldest fire technology programs, the Santa Ana College Fire Academy program administered under the guidance of the Orange County Fire Chiefs' Association;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Trustees of the Rancho Santiago Community College District that the first responders who protect the public in Orange County and especially the cities served by the District -- Anaheim Hills, Orange, Santa Ana, Villa Park, and portions of Anaheim, Costa Mesa, Irvine, Fountain Valley, Garden Grove, and Tustin – as well as the District's own Security and Public Safety officers are to be commended for their timely response in times of crisis and their courageous efforts on behalf of area residents. The appreciation and thanks of the District, its employees, and its students are hereby conveyed by the adoption of this Resolution.





4.10 – Approval of Disposal of Surplus Vehicle

• On June 25, 2018 the Board of Trustees approved the agreement with TLC Auctions to provide off-site auctions for the District's surplus property which includes vehicles. We reached out to auctioneers throughout Orange County, Los Angeles County and San Diego County who do business with other K-14 districts and are familiar with our policies and procedures for donation and auction of surplus property. Based on our research and contact with other community college districts, most use the services of TLC Auctioneers.

The majority of the auctioneer services we contacted charge a higher percentage rate and most do not package surplus items; pick up or hold auctions unless the auction can be held on District property, this option includes having staff manage the property collection; tagging; inventory; staging and disbursements. The 45% commission fee charged by TLC Auctions includes but is not limited to transportation of surplus items and vehicles, tagging, inventorying, set-up, advertising, marketing, clerking, cashiering, completing required DMV paperwork, bookkeeping and all other related functions. Their performance and service to our District over the years have been excellent.

4.11 – Independent Contractor – Interact Communications

The term "applied not enrolled" refers to students that have applied to attend SAC through CCCApply, but have not yet actually registered for a class. Reasons for applying and not registering may include:

- Applied during Early Registration and then decided to attend another school
- Registration window/appointment has not yet opened

CLINICAL TRAINING AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

(Without School Instructor on Entity Premises)

This Clinical Training Affiliation Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into as of the later of **September 12, 2018** or the execution of the Agreement by both parties (the "Effective Date") by and between **Lakeview Senior Center**, **located in Irvine**, **California** ("Entity"), and **Rancho Santiago Community College District**, **located in Santa Ana**, **California** ("School").

RECITALS

A Entity is a Senior Center meeting the needs of seniors and families.

B School is an institution of higher learning authorized pursuant to California law to offer health care program(s) and to maintain classes and such program(s) at Entity for the purpose of providing clinical training for students in such classes.

C Entity operates clinical facilities which are suitable for School's clinical training programs ("the Program(s)") in the area of **Nursing and Health Science programs.** School desires to establish the Program(s) at Entity for the students of the School enrolled in the Program(s). Entity desires to support the Program(s) to assist in training students of School.

D. The purpose of this Agreement is to set forth the terms and conditions pursuant to which the parties will institute the Program(s) at Entity.

AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises set forth herein and for such other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. **RESPONSIBILITIES OF SCHOOL**

1.1 <u>Academic Responsibility.</u> School shall develop the Program(s) curriculum and shall be responsible for offering a health care education Program eligible, if necessary, for accreditation and approval by any state board or agency.

1.2 <u>Number of Students</u>. School shall designate and notify Entity of the students who are enrolled and in good standing in the Program(s) to be assigned for clinical training at Entity in such numbers as are mutually agreed upon between Entity and School. School and Entity will also mutually agree to the dates and length of the Program(s).

1.3 <u>Orientation</u>. School shall provide orientation to all students and faculty and ensure that all students receive clinical instruction and have necessary basic skills prior to the clinical experience at Entity.

1.4 <u>Discipline</u>. School shall be responsible for counseling, controlling, disciplining and all activities of students at Entity.

1.5 <u>Documentation</u>. School shall maintain all attendance and academic records of students participating in the Program(s). School shall implement and maintain an evaluation process of the students' progress throughout the Program(s).

1.6 <u>Background Check.</u> School shall conduct a background check on each student. At a minimum, the background check shall include the following: verification of identity (social security trace); criminal background check in all counties of residence and employment for the last seven (7) years; motor vehicle records trace; and Office of Inspector General ("OIG") sanction trace.

1.7 <u>Health Clearance</u>. School shall ensure that each Student complies with Entity's requirements for immunizations, tests, and required education including but not limited to: (a) an annual health examination, (b) Proof of TB skin test (Mantoux) within previous 12 months, repeated annually, If known skin test positive, baseline chest x-ray, annual symptom screen and repeat CXR if annual symptom review is positive. (c) Proof of immunization or immune titers to Rubeola, Rubella and Varicella, (d) proof of Tetanus, Diptheria, and Acellular Pertussis (Tdap) immunization, (e) proof of Hepatitis B vaccine, and (f) proof of annual Influenza vaccination, or declination statement for (b)-(f). School, if applicable, shall provide (a) proof of Aerosol Transmissible Disease (ATD) training on placement and at least annually including elements required by the Cal/OSHA ATD Standard, and (b) proof of Bloodborne Pathogen training prior to a Student's first clinical day and at least annually thereafter including elements required by the Cal/OSHA Bloodborne Pathogen Standard.

1.8 <u>Entity Policies and Procedures</u>. School shall ensure that each student is aware of and understands all applicable Entity policies and procedures and shall require each student to conform to all such Entity policies, procedures, regulations, standards for health, safety, cooperation, ethical behavior, and any additional requirements and restrictions agreed upon by representatives of Entity and School. School shall instruct students that they are not permitted to interfere with the activity or judgment of the health care providers at Entity in administering care to patients in the context of training.

1.9 <u>Supplies and Equipment</u>. School shall provide and be responsible for the care and control of educational supplies, materials, and equipment used for instruction during the Program(s). School shall also be responsible, as between Entity and School, for the cost of travel expenses and transportation, if any, incurred by students as a result of the Program(s).

1.10 <u>Confidentiality</u>. School shall instruct students regarding confidentiality of patient information, including compliance with and legal obligations pursuant to the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, and the implementation regulations thereunder. No student shall have access to or have the right to review any medical record or quality assurance or peer review information except where necessary in the regular course of the Program(s). School shall ensure that all students maintain the confidentiality of any and all patient and other information received in the course of the Program(s). Further, School shall ensure that students do not discuss, transmit, or narrate in any form any patient information of a personal nature, medical or otherwise, except as a necessary part of the patient's treatment plan or the Program(s).

1.11 Insurance. School shall ensure that all students maintain professional liability insurance coverage (either independently or as an additional insured on School's policy) at a minimum of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) in aggregate throughout the course of this Agreement. Further, School agrees to maintain professional and comprehensive general liability insurance at a minimum of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) in aggregate throughout the course of this Agreement. Further, School agrees to maintain professional and comprehensive general liability insurance at a minimum of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) in aggregate throughout the course of this Agreement. Further, School shall ensure that such policies provide for notification to Entity at least thirty (30) days in advance of any material modification or cancellation of such coverage. School also agrees to maintain statutory Workers' Compensation coverage on any

individuals characterized as employees of School working at Entity pursuant to this Agreement at all times during the course of this Agreement. School shall provide certificates evidencing all coverage referred to in this section within thirty (30) days of execution of this Agreement and thereafter, on an annual basis except that, with respect to students, such evidence will be provided prior to the date when any new student commences participation in the Program(s).

1.12 <u>Indemnification</u>. Except as otherwise may be provided in this Agreement, each party shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend the other party from any and all loss, liability, claim, lawsuit, injury, expense or damage whatsoever including but not limited to attorneys' fees and court costs, arising out of, incident to or in any manner occasioned by the performance or nonperformance by such indemnifying party, its agents, employees, servants, students, or subcontractors, of any covenant or condition of this Agreement or by the negligence, improper conduct or intentional acts or omissions of such indemnifying parties, its agents, employees, servants, students, or subcontractors.

1.13 <u>Accreditation</u>. School shall at all times during the course of this Agreement be licensed or qualified to offer the Program(s) to students.

2. **RESPONSIBILITIES OF ENTITY**

2.1 <u>Access</u>. Entity shall permit nonexclusive access to the Program(s) to those students designated by School as eligible for participation in the Program(s) at Entity provided such access does not unreasonably interfere with the regular activities at Entity. Entity agrees to provide qualified students with access to clinical areas and patient care opportunities as appropriate to the level of understanding and education of such students and as appropriate to the provision of quality care and privacy of Entity patients.

2.2 <u>Implementation of Program(s)</u>. Entity agrees to cooperate with and assist in the planning and implementation of the Program(s) at Entity for the benefit of students from School.

2.3 <u>Instruction</u>. Entity shall instruct students in their clinical training at Entity with the supervision of a fully licensed professional, if applicable, relevant to the students' specific course of clinical training.

2.4 <u>Accreditation</u>. Entity shall maintain Entity so that it conforms to the requirements of the California Department of Public Health and the Governing bodies.

2.5 <u>Patient Care</u>. Pursuant to the California Code of Regulations ("CCR"), Title 22, Section 70713, School understands and agrees that Entity, with its Medical Staff, retains professional and administrative responsibility for Services rendered to Entity patients. Further, School and students shall conduct their respective activities hereunder consistent with relevant law and regulation, the Medical Staff Bylaws, the Medical Staff Rules and Regulations, Entity policy and procedures, Emergency Medical Treatment and Active Labor Act ("EMTALA"), Title 22, the standards and requirements under the Joint Commission, professional standards, Entity philosophy and values and the Ethical and Religious Directives for Catholic Health Facilities. The parties understand and agree that this provision is intended to fulfill requirements of the Regulatory Bodies and state law and is not intended to modify the independent contractor relationship nor indemnification requirements between the parties herein.

2.6 <u>Space and Storage</u>. At Entity's discretion, it will provide students with classroom space within Entity and an acceptable amount of storage space for School's instructional materials for use in the Program(s), subject to reasonable availability.

2.7 <u>Removal of Students</u>. Entity shall have the absolute right to determine who will administer care to its patients. In the event that any student, in the sole discretion of Entity, fails to perform satisfactorily, fails to follow Entity policies, procedures and regulations, or fails to meet Entity standards for health, safety, security, cooperation or ethical behavior, Entity shall have the right to request that School withdraw the student from the Program(s). School shall comply with Entity's request within five (5) days of receipt of notice from Entity. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in the event of any emergency or if any student represents a threat to patient safety or personnel, Entity may immediately exclude any student from Entity until final resolution of the matter with School.

2.8 <u>Documentation</u>. Entity agrees to make available to qualified students of School a copy of its policies and procedures, rules and regulations, and other relevant information in order that students obtain the benefit of such documentation and in order that students comply with such policies and rules. Such copy is available at Entity's facility for review.

2.9 <u>First Aid</u>. Entity shall be available to provide necessary emergency health care or first aid, within its capacity, to students participating in the Program(s). Any emergency health care or first aid provided by Entity shall be billed to the student or School at Entity's normal billing rate for private-pay patients. Except as herein provided, Entity shall have no obligation to furnish medical or surgical care to any student.

2.10 <u>Statement of Adequate Staffing</u>. Entity acknowledges that it has adequate staffing and that students participating in the Program(s) shall not be substituted for staff necessary for reasonable staffing coverage.

2.11 <u>Authority</u>. Entity shall maintain at all times full authority over and responsibility for care of its patients and may intervene and/or redirect students when appropriate or necessary.

2.12 <u>Insurance</u>. Entity agrees to maintain professional and comprehensive or commercial general liability insurance at a minimum of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) in aggregate throughout the course of this Agreement. Entity also agrees to maintain statutory Workers' Compensation coverage for their employees. Entity shall ensure that such policies provide for notification to School at least thirty (30) days in advance of any material modification or cancellation of such coverage. Entity shall provide certificates evidencing all coverage referred to in this section within ten (10) days of execution of this Agreement and thereafter, on an annual basis.

3. RELATIONSHIP OF THE PARTIES

3.1 <u>Term</u>. The term of this Agreement shall commence as of the Effective Date and shall continue for **Three (3)** year(s) unless terminated sooner as provided herein.

3.2 <u>Termination</u>. Either party may terminate this Agreement at any time and for any reason upon at least thirty (30) days prior written notice to the other party. To the extent reasonably possible, Entity will attempt to limit its termination of this Agreement without cause so as to allow the completion of student training for the then current academic year by any student who, at the date of mailing of said notice by Entity, was satisfactorily participating in the Program(s).

3.3 <u>Independent Contractor</u>. In the performance of the obligations under this Agreement, it is mutually understood and agreed that School is at all times acting and performing as an independent contractor. Nothing in this Agreement is intended nor shall be construed to create between Entity and School an employer/employee relationship, a joint venture relationship, or a lease or landlord/tenant relationship. Students shall maintain the status of learners and neither this Agreement nor any acts pursuant to it shall be deemed to create an employment or agency relationship between Entity and any student. Therefore, the parties understand and agree that Entity is not responsible in any way, directly or indirectly, for any employment-related benefits for students. Such benefits not covered include but are not limited to, salaries, vacation time, sick leave, Workers' Compensation, and health benefits. The sole interest of Entity is to assure that services to its patients are performed in a competent and satisfactory manner. No relationship of employer and employee is created by this Agreement, and neither School nor any student enrolled in School's Program(s), whether as a shareholder, partner, employee, independent contractor, subcontractor or otherwise, shall have any claim under this Agreement or otherwise against Entity for vacation pay, sick leave, retirement benefits, Social Security, Workers' Compensation, disability or unemployment benefits. School shall indemnify and hold harmless Entity from any and all liability for fees, compensation, wages and benefits of itself or its students, and from taxes on business income and other costs and expenses of an employer that Entity would incur if, contrary to the parties' intention, School or its students are determined to be employees of Entity.

3.4 <u>Role of Students</u>. It is not the intention of School or Entity that any student occupy the position of third-party beneficiary of any obligations assumed by Entity or School pursuant to this Agreement.

3.5 <u>Publicity</u>. Neither School nor Entity shall cause to be published or disseminate any advertising materials, either printed or electronically transmitted, which identifies the other party or its facilities with respect to the Program(s) without the prior written consent of the other party.

3.6 <u>Records</u>. It is understood and agreed that all records, other than student evaluation records and information, shall remain the property of Entity.

4. GENERAL PROVISIONS

4.1 <u>Entire Agreement: Amendment</u>. This Agreement including the attachments and exhibits hereto contains the complete and full agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede all other agreements relative to the subject matter hereof by and between the parties. This Agreement may be amended but only by an instrument in writing signed by both parties to the Agreement. The parties agree to amend this Agreement to the extent reasonably necessary for Entity or its affiliates to comply with its tax-exempt bond obligations and covenants, to maintain tax-exempt status, and to qualify for tax-exempt financing.

4.2 <u>Assignment</u>. School shall not subcontract, assign its rights or delegate its duties under this Agreement without the prior written consent of Entity. This Agreement shall be binding on and inure to the benefit of successors and permitted assigns of each party.

4.3 <u>Governing Law</u>. This Agreement shall be governed by and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of California. Any action arising out of this Agreement shall be instituted and prosecuted only in a court of proper jurisdiction in Orange County, California.

4.4 <u>Non-Discrimination</u>. Neither party shall unlawfully discriminate against any student on the basis of race, age, religion, sex, color, creed, national origin, handicap, disability or sexual preference. In addition, the parties will fully comply with any and all applicable local, state and federal anti-discrimination regulations, statutes and judicial decisions.

4.5 <u>Notices</u>. Any and all notices permitted or required by this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given (a) on the date personally delivered; (b) three business days after being mailed by United States post, certified and return receipt requested; or (c) one business day after being sent by nationally recognized overnight courier, properly addressed as follows or such other address as may later be designated by the party:

4.6 <u>Severability</u>. The provisions of this Agreement shall be deemed severable and if any portion shall be held invalid, illegal or unenforceable for any reason, the remainder of this Agreement shall be effective and binding upon the parties.

4.7 <u>Waiver</u>. Any waiver of any terms, covenants and/or conditions hereof must be in writing and signed by the parties hereto. A waiver of any of the terms, covenants and/or conditions hereof shall not be construed as a waiver of any other terms, covenants and/or conditions hereof nor shall any waiver constitute a continuing waiver.

BACKGROUND

Students in the Nursing, Health Sciences, Occupational Therapy, Speech Language Pathology, and Pharmacy Technician programs are required to participate in clinical rotation activities at sites throughout the community in order to gain practical field experiences and to apply knowledge and skills learned in college classes. The proposed Affiliation Agreement and Business Associate Agreement Renewals with Orange County Global Medical Center, Inc. will yield appropriate clinical rotation activities for the Nursing, Health Sciences, Occupational Therapy, Speech Language Pathology, and Pharmacy Technician programs.

ANALYSIS

The Affiliation Agreement and Business Associate Agreement Renewals with Orange County Global Medical Center, Inc. covers the scope of the program's operations of the facility, as well as other issues relating to the responsibilities for both parties. The Affiliation Agreement and Business Associate Agreement Renewals with Orange County Global Medical Center, Inc. has been reviewed by the college and district. The Affiliation Agreement and Business Associate Agreement Renewals with Orange County Global Medical Center, Inc. carries no costs or other financial arrangements and is in effect for three (3) years.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve this Affiliation Agreement and Business Associate Agreement Renewals with Orange County Global Medical Center, Inc., located in Santa Ana, California, as presented.

AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

THIS AFFILIATION AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made and entered into as of October 1, 2018 (the "Effective Date") between **Rancho Santiago Community College District, on behalf of Santa Ana College** ("District"), and **Orange County Global Medical Center, Inc.**, a California corporation, doing business as Orange County Global Medical Center ("Hospital").

RECITALS:

A. District offers to enrolled students a degree program in the fields of Nursing, Health Sciences, Occupational Therapy, Speech Language Pathology, and Pharmacy Technicians.

B. Hospital operates a comprehensive inpatient acute care facility licensed in the State of California ("State").

C. District desires to provide to its students a clinical learning experience through the application of knowledge and skills in actual patient-centered situations in an acute care facility.

D. Hospital has agreed to undertake training activities and to make its facility available to identified students of District for such purposes.

Now, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein, the parties hereby agree as follows:

1. **Responsibilities of District.**

a. **Clinical Program.** District shall be responsible for the implementation and operation of the clinical component of its program at Hospital ("Program"), which Program shall be approved in advance by Hospital. Such responsibilities shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

Hospital;

(1) orientation of students and faculty to the clinical experience at

(2) provision of classroom theory and practical instruction to students prior to their clinical assignments at Hospital;

(3) preparation of student/patient assignments and rotation plans for each student and coordination of same with Hospital;

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(4) continuing oral and written communication with Hospital regarding student performance and evaluation, absences and assignments of students, and other pertinent information;

(5) supervision of students and their performance at Hospital, except for Health Sciences, Occupational Therapy, Speech Language Pathology, and Pharmacy Technicians students, who are supervised by Hospital Departmental personnel.

(6) participation, with the students, in Hospital's Quality Assurance and related programs; and

(7) performance of such other duties as may from time to time be agreed to between District and Hospital.

All students, faculty, employees, agents and representatives of District participating in the Program while on Hospital premises ("Program Participants") shall be accountable to Hospital's Administrator. District shall be responsible for causing all Program Participants to comply with the terms of this Agreement.

b. **Health of Program Participants.** District shall provide to Hospital satisfactory evidence that each Program Participant is free from contagious disease and does not otherwise present a health hazard to Hospital patients, employees, volunteers or guests prior to his or her participation in the Program. Such evidence shall include without limitation the completion of a two step tuberculin skin test (within the last twelve months) or evidence that each Program Participant is free of symptoms of pulmonary disease if the skin test is positive, a chest x-ray following a positive TB test result, and physical examination and evidence of immunity from rubella, measles and chicken pox. District and/or the Program Participant shall be responsible for arranging for the Program Participant's medical care and/or treatment, if necessary, including transportation in case of illness or injury while participating in the Program at Hospital. In no event shall Hospital be financially or otherwise responsible for said medical care and treatment.

c. **Dress Code; Meals.** District shall require the students assigned to Hospital to dress in accordance with dress and personal appearance standards approved by District. Such standards shall be in accordance with Hospital's standards regarding same. Program Participants shall pay for their own meals at Hospital.

d. **Performance of Services.** All faculty provided by District shall be duly licensed, certified or otherwise qualified to participate in the Program at Hospital. District shall have a specially designated staff for the performance of the services specified herein. District and all Program Participants shall perform its and their duties and services hereunder in accordance with all relevant local, state, and federal laws and shall comply with the standards

and guidelines of all applicable accrediting bodies and the bylaws, rules and regulations of Hospital and any rules and regulations of District as may be in effect from time to time. Neither District nor any Program Participant shall interfere with or adversely affect the operation of Hospital or the performance of services therein.

OSHA Compliance. District shall be responsible for compliance by e. Program Participants with the final regulations issued by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration governing employee exposure to bloodborne pathogens in the workplace under Section VI(b) of the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970, which regulations became effective March 6, 1992, and as may be amended or superseded from time to time (the "Regulations"), including, but not limited to accepting the same level of responsibility as "the employer" would have to provide all employees with (1) information and training about the hazards associated with blood and other potentially infectious materials, (2) information and training about the protective measures to be taken to minimize the risk of occupational exposure to bloodborne pathogens, (3) training in the appropriate actions to take in an emergency involving exposure to blood and other potentially infectious materials, and (4) information as to the reasons the employee should participate in hepatitis B vaccination and post-exposure evaluation and follow-up. District's responsibility with respect to the Regulations also shall include the provision of the hepatitis B vaccination or documentation of declination in accordance with the Regulations.

f. **Training.** Prior to a student's first assignment at Hospital, the assignment of a District employee, agent or representative to work at Hospital or the first date of service (after the Effective Date) of a faculty member at Hospital, District shall require that the individual complete training regarding Hospital's patient information privacy policies and practices provided by Hospital and achieve a passing score (as defined by Hospital from time to time) on the post test. District shall maintain training records for a minimum of six years, including, without limitation, the names of those students, District employees, agents, representatives and faculty members that completed the training with the applicable date ("Training Records"). Further, District shall make the Training Records available to Hospital promptly, and without charge, upon Hospital's request.

g. **Certification.** Prior to a student's first assignment at Hospital, School shall provide proof of current/valid CPR certification ("Certification"), Healthcare Provider Level, for all students in direct patient care positions, per Hospital guidelines. Such Certification shall be provided to Hospital upon renewal/update of Certification.

h. **Criminal Background Verification.** School acknowledges that each student shall be required to submit to a criminal background check as a condition of participation in the Program and shall assist Hospital as reasonably requested to assure the timely completion of this review. Hospital shall have the right to require the withdrawal of any Program Participant

in the event that Program Participant fails to meet the standards established by Hospital for acceptable criminal history.

2. **Responsibilities of Hospital.**

a. Hospital shall accept the students and faculty assigned to the Program by District and cooperate in the orientation of all Program Participants to Hospital. Hospital shall provide the opportunities for such students, who shall be supervised by District and Hospital, to observe and assist in various aspects of acute care patient care. Hospital shall coordinate District's rotation and assignment schedule with its own schedule and those of other educational institutions. Hospital shall at all times retain ultimate control of the Hospital and responsibility for patient care.

b. Upon the request of District, Hospital shall assist District in the evaluation of each Program Participant's performance in the Program. However, District shall at all times remain solely responsible for the evaluation and grading of Program Participants.

3. **MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITIES.** The parties shall cooperate to fulfill the following mutual responsibilities:

a. Students shall be treated as trainees who have no expectation of receiving compensation or future employment from Hospital or District.

b. Any courtesy appointments to faculty or staff by either the District or Hospital shall be without entitlement of the individual to compensation or benefits for the appointed party.

4. WITHDRAWAL OF PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS.

a. Hospital may immediately remove from the premises any Program Participant who poses an immediate threat or danger to personnel or to the quality of medical services or for unprofessional behavior.

b. Hospital may request District to withdraw or dismiss a Program Participant from the Program at Hospital when his or her clinical performance is unsatisfactory to Hospital or his or her behavior, in Hospital's discretion, is disruptive or detrimental to Hospital and/or its patients. In such event, said Program Participant's participation in the Program shall immediately cease. Subject to the provisions of Subsection 4.a. above, it is understood that only District can dismiss the Program Participant from the Program at Hospital.

5. **INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR.** The parties hereby acknowledge that they are independent contractors, and neither the District nor any of its agents, representatives, students or employees or Program Participants shall be considered agents, representatives, or employees

of Hospital. In no event shall this Agreement be construed as establishing a partnership or joint venture or similar relationship between the parties hereto. District shall be liable for its own debts, obligations, acts and omissions, including the payment of all required withholding, social security and other taxes or benefits. No Program Participant shall look to Hospital for any salaries, insurance or other benefits. The provisions set forth herein shall survive expiration or other termination of this Agreement regardless of the cause of such termination.

6. **NON-DISCRIMINATION.** There shall be no discrimination on the basis of race, national origin, religion, creed, sex, age, sexual orientation, veteran status, disability or other legally protected classification in either the selection of students, or as to any aspect of the clinical training; provided, however, that with respect to disability, the disability must not be such as would, even with reasonable accommodation, in and of itself preclude the student's effective participation in the Program. The Rancho Santiago Community College District complies with all Federal and State rules and regulations and does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, gender or disability. This holds true for all students who are interested in participating in educational programs and/or extracurricular school activities. Harassment of any employee/student with regard to race, color, national origin, gender or disability is strictly prohibited. Inquiries regarding compliance and/or grievance procedures may be directed to the District's Title IX Officer and/or Section 504/ADA Coordinator.

7. CONFIDENTIALITY.

a. **Hospital Information.** District recognizes and acknowledges that, by virtue of entering into this Agreement and fulfilling the terms of this Agreement, District and Program Participants may have access to certain information of Hospital that is confidential and constitutes valuable, special and unique property of Hospital. District agrees that neither District nor any Program Participant will at any time, (either during or subsequent to the term of this Agreement), disclose to others, use, copy or permit to be copied, without Hospital's express prior written consent, except in connection with the performance of District's and Program Participant's duties hereunder, any confidential or proprietary information of Hospital, including, without limitation, information which concerns Hospital's patients, costs, or treatment methods developed by Hospital, and which is not otherwise available to the public.

b. **Terms of Agreement.** Except for disclosure to District's legal counsel, accountant or financial advisors (none of whom shall be associated or affiliated in any way with Hospital or any of its affiliates), neither District nor any Program Participant shall disclose the terms of this Agreement to any person, unless disclosure thereof is required by law or otherwise authorized by this Agreement or consented to by Hospital in writing. Unauthorized disclosure of the terms of this Agreement shall be a material breach of this Agreement and shall provide Hospital with the option of pursuing remedies for breach, or, notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, immediately terminating this Agreement upon written notice to District.

c. **Patient Information.** Neither District nor any Program Participant shall disclose to any third party, except where permitted or required by law or where such disclosure is expressly approved by Hospital in writing, any medical record or other patient information regarding Hospital patients, and District and Program Participant shall comply with all federal and state laws and regulations, and all bylaws, rules, regulations, and policies of Hospital and Hospital's medical staff, regarding the confidentiality of such information. District acknowledges that in receiving or otherwise dealing with any records or information from Hospital about Hospital's patients receiving treatment for alcohol or drug abuse, District and Program Participant are bound by the provisions of the federal regulations governing Confidentiality of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Patient Records, 42 C.F.R. Part 2, as amended from time to time.

d. **Privacy of Health Information.** District acknowledges that Hospital must comply with the applicable provisions of the Administrative Simplification section of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, codified at 42 U.S.C. § 1320 through d-8 ("HIPAA"), and the requirements of any regulations promulgated thereunder, including, without limitation, the federal privacy regulations as contained in 45 C.F.R. Parts 160 and 164, and the federal security standards as contained in 45 C.F.R. Parts 160, 162 and 164 (collectively, the "Regulations"). Accordingly, Hospital may only disclose Protected Health Information, as defined in 45 C.F.R. 164.501, or Individually Identifiable Health Information, as defined in 42 U.S.C. § 1320d(6) (collectively, "Protected Health Information") to a student for purposes of providing treatment to Hospital patients or training the student to be a health care provider. A student may only request or use Protected Health Information about a Hospital patient for treatment and Hospital training program purposes. A student may only disclose Protected Health Information about a Hospital patient for treatment purposes to other health care providers involved in the patient's treatment or to Hospital's workforce members involved in the student's training program for hospital's training program purposes. A student shall not disclose Protected Health Information to District or its faculty, employees, agents or representatives unless direct patient identifiers are removed to create a limited data set in accordance with the limited data set standard at 45 C.F.R § 164.514(e) and the disclosure is pursuant to a limited data set use agreement between Hospital and District that satisfies Hospital's obligations under the limited data set standard. A student may disclose a patient's health information that has been deidentified in accordance with the de-identification standard at 45 C.F.R. § 164.514(a) - (c) to District or its faculty, employees, agents or representatives for District's use in evaluating the student.

District, students and other Program Participants shall not request, use or further disclose any Protected Health Information other than for the treatment and training purposes specified in this Agreement. District and Program Participants will implement appropriate safeguards to prevent the request for, use or disclosure of Protected Health Information other than as permitted by this Agreement. District will promptly report to Hospital any uses or disclosures, of which District or Program Participants become aware, of Protected Health Information in violation of this Agreement. In the event that District contracts with any agents or independent contractors to whom District provides Protected Health Information, District shall include provisions in such agreements pursuant to which District and such agents or independent contractors agree to the same restrictions and conditions that apply to District with respect to Protected Health Information. District will make its internal practices, books and records relating to the use and disclosure of Protected Health Information available to the Secretary of the United States Department of Health and Human Services to the extent required for determining compliance with HIPAA and the Regulations.

In the event a Hospital patient (or the patient's personal representative) requests access to Protected Health Information in a Designated Record Set (as defined in 45 C.F.R. § 164.501) of Hospital from District or a Program Participant, District or the Program Participant shall immediately forward such request and any such Protected Health Information in its, his or her possession to Hospital. If a Hospital patient (or the patient's personal representative) requests an amendment of Protected Health Information in a Designated Record Set of Hospital from District or a Program Participant, then District shall or the Program Participant shall immediately forward such request and any such Protected Health Information in its, his or her possession to Hospital. Further, District or Program Participant shall incorporate any amendment approved by Hospital into any amended Protected Health Information in District's or Program Participant's possession.

If District or a Program Participant receives a request for an accounting of disclosures of Protected Health Information from a Hospital patient (or the patient's personal representative), then District or the Program Participant shall within five days forward the request to Hospital. District shall assist Hospital to determine whether any such request for an accounting is a request for an accounting of Hospital's disclosures or of District's disclosures. If Hospital determines that the request is a request for an accounting of District's disclosures and District is a Covered Entity (as defined in 45 C.F.R. § 160.103), then District shall provide the patient with the accounting required by 45 C.F.R. § 164.528. If Hospital determines that the request is a request for an accounting of Hospital's disclosures, then District and Program Participants shall within 10 days forward any information in District's or Program Participants' possession that is required for Hospital to make the accounting required by 45 C.F.R. § 164.528.

No attorney-client, accountant-client or other legal or equitable privilege shall be deemed to have been waived by District or Hospital by virtue of this Subsection.

e. **Audit.** District shall, within five business days of a written request from Hospital, make available during normal business hours at District or Hospital all records, books, agreements, systems, policies and procedures relating to the use or disclosure of Protected Health Information for the purpose of allowing Hospital to audit and determine District's compliance with this Section 7. If Hospital discovers any violation of this Section 7, District shall promptly remedy such violation following receipt of written notice describing the violation from Hospital and shall certify in writing that it cured the violation.

f. **Survival.** The provisions set forth in this Section 7 shall survive expiration or other termination of this Agreement, regardless of the cause of such termination.

8. INSURANCE.

a. District and Hospital shall secure and maintain at all times during the Term, at their respective sole expense, commercial general liability insurance, (such coverage to include, without limitation, claims based on a violation of Subsection 7.d. or any applicable State law or regulation concerning the privacy of patient information, if such insurance is reasonably available) covering themselves and their respective employees. District shall either provide coverage on behalf of Program Participants (students) or require Program Participants (students) to secure such coverage. If Program Participants (students) provide coverage on their own behalf, such coverage must be placed with an insurer approved by Hospital. Such coverage provided by District and Hospital may be afforded via commercial insurance, self-insurance, a captive, or some combination thereof at limits of at least \$1,000,000 per occurrence. Such insurance shall not be cancelable except upon 30 days' prior written notice to the other party. Such coverage shall be primary and non-contributory. Upon either party's request, the other party shall provide a certificate of insurance evidencing such coverage.

b. District and Hospital shall each secure and maintain at all times during the Term, at their respective sole expense, workers' compensation and employers' liability insurance covering their respective employees. Such coverage provided by District and Hospital may be afforded via commercial insurance or self-insurance at the following limits:

Workers' Compensation:	Statutory limits
Employers' Liability:	\$1,000,000 each accident;
	\$1,000,000 disease policy limit;
	\$1,000,000 disease each employee

Upon either party's request, the other party shall provide a certificate of insurance evidencing such coverage. District shall either provide coverage on behalf of Program Participants (students) or require Program Participants (students) to secure health insurance coverage. If Program Participants (students) provide coverage on their own behalf, such coverage must be placed with an insurer approved by Hospital.

c. District and Hospital each shall secure and maintain at all times during the Term, at their respective sole expense, professional liability insurance (medical malpractice), (such coverage to include, without limitation, claims based on a violation of Subsection 7.d. or

any applicable State law or regulation concerning the privacy of patient information, if such insurance is reasonably available) covering themselves and their respective employees. District shall either provide coverage on behalf of Program Participants (students) or require Program Participants (students) to secure such coverage. If Program Participants (students) provide coverage on their own behalf, such coverage must be placed with an insurer approved by Hospital. Such coverage provided by District and Hospital may be afforded via commercial insurance, self-insurance, a captive, or some combination thereof at limits of at least \$1,000,000 per claim/occurrence and \$3,000,000 aggregate. Upon either party's request, the other party shall provide a certificate of insurance evidencing such coverage.

This coverage shall be either (1) on an occurrence basis or (2) on a claims-made basis. If the coverage is on a claims-made basis, both District and Hospital hereby agree that prior to the effective date of termination of their respective current insurance coverage, both parties shall purchase, at their respective expense, either a replacement policy annually thereafter having a retroactive date no later than the Effective Date or tail coverage in the above stated amounts for all claims arising out of incidents occurring prior to termination of the respective parties current coverage or prior to termination of this Agreement. Upon either party's request, the other party shall provide a certificate of insurance evidencing such coverage.

9. **TERM; TERMINATION.**

a. **Term.** The initial term of this Agreement shall be three (3) years, commencing on the Effective Date.

b. **Termination.** Except as otherwise provided herein, either party may terminate this Agreement at any time without cause upon at least thirty (30) days' prior written notice, provided that all students currently enrolled in the Program at Hospital at the time of notice of termination shall be given the opportunity to complete their clinical Program at Hospital, such completion not to exceed three (3) months.

c. **Effect of Expiration or Other Termination.** Upon expiration or other termination of this Agreement, District shall and shall cause Program Participants to either return or destroy all Protected Health Information received from Hospital or created or received by District or Program Participants on behalf of Hospital, and which District or Program Participants still maintain in any form. Notwithstanding the foregoing, to the extent that Hospital agrees that it is not feasible to return or destroy such Protected Health Information, the terms and provisions of Section 7 of this Agreement shall survive termination of this Agreement and such Protected Health Information shall be used or disclosed solely for such purpose or purposes which prevented the return or destruction of such Protected Health Information.

10. **ENTIRE AGREEMENT.** This Agreement and its accompanying Exhibits contain the entire understanding of the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersede all

prior agreements, oral or written, and all other communications between the parties relating to such subject matter. This Agreement may not be amended or modified except by mutual written agreement. All continuing covenants, duties and obligations herein shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement.

11. **SEVERABILITY.** If any provision of this Agreement is held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect in accordance with its terms disregarding such unenforceable or invalid provision.

12. **INDEMNIFICATION.** Each party agrees to indemnify, hold harmless, and defend the other party, its officers, directors and employees, from and against all loss, claims, liabilities, damages and expenses, including without limitation reasonable attorneys' fees, whether or not covered by insurance, incurring by the other party in defending or compromising actions brought against the other party, its officers, directors, employees or agents, arising out of or related to the act or omissions of the indemnifying party, its agents or representatives, other than any liability, loss, damages, claims, causes of action, and expense (including attorneys' fees) and judgments that are the result of the other party's breach of this Agreement, negligence, or willful misconduct of the other party. The provisions set forth herein shall survive expiration or other termination of this Agreement, regardless of the cause of such termination.

13. **VENUE.** The parties agree that Orange County, California shall be the only proper venue for disputes related to this Agreement.

14. **ATTORNEYS' FEES.** If legal action, arbitration, or other proceeding is commenced by either party arising under, out of or in connection with, or in relation to this Agreement, or any amendment hereof, or the breach hereof, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover its costs and reasonable attorneys' fees from the other party, in addition to any other relief granted.

15. **CAPTIONS.** The captions contained herein are used solely for convenience and shall not be deemed to define or limit the provisions of this Agreement.

16. **NO WAIVER.** Any failure of a party to enforce that party's right under any provision of this Agreement shall not be construed or act as a waiver of said party's subsequent right to enforce any of the provisions contained herein.

17. **GOVERNING LAW.** This Agreement shall be governed and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California. The provisions set forth herein shall survive expiration or other termination of this Agreement regardless of the cause of such termination.

18.

18. **ASSIGNMENT; BINDING EFFECT.** School may not assign or transfer any of its rights, duties or obligations under this Agreement, in whole or in part, without the prior written

consent of Hospital, and any assignment or transfer by School without consent shall be null and void. For purposes of this Agreement, the transfer of ownership of all or a portion of the shares, partnership interests, or other ownership interests of School, in a single transaction or a series of transactions, where more than fifty percent (50%) of the outstanding voting power of the School is acquired by a person or entity or School of related persons or entities that was not the holder of at least fifty percent (50%) of the outstanding voting power of the School on the Effective Date, shall be deemed an assignment hereunder. This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of, and be binding upon, the parties hereto and their respective successors and permitted assigns. This Agreement is assignable by Hospital without consent or notice.

19. **NOTICES.** All notices hereunder by either party to the other shall be in writing, delivered personally, by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, or by overnight courier, and shall be deemed to have been duly given when delivered personally or when deposited in the United States mail, postage prepaid, addressed as follows:

20. **STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY.** For and in consideration of the benefit provided the undersigned in the form of experience in evaluation and treatment of patients of Hospital, School, its successors and/or assigns do hereby covenant and agree to assume all risks of, and be solely responsible for, any injury or loss sustained by the Student while participating in the Program operated by School at Hospital, unless such injury or loss arises solely of Hospital's gross negligence or willful misconduct.

21. **CONFIDENTIALITY STATEMENT.** The School hereby acknowledges its responsibility under applicable federal law and the Agreement between School and Hospital, to ensure the student (1) keeps confidential any information regarding Hospital patients and proprietary information of Hospital; (2) agrees, under penalty of law, not to reveal to any person or persons except authorized clinical staff and associated personnel any specific information regarding any patient and further agrees not to reveal to any third party any confidential information of Hospital, except as required by law or as authorized by Hospital; and (3) agrees to comply with any patient information privacy policies and procedures of the School and Hospital.

22. **MASTER LIST OF CONTRACTS.** Hospital shall maintain a master list of contracts that is maintained and updated centrally and is available for review by the Secretary of the United States Department of Health and Human Services upon request.

BUSINESS ASSOCIATE AGREEMENT

This Business Associate Agreement is entered into and made a part of all agreements, existing now or in the future (collectively the "Agreement") by and between **Orange County Global Medical Center**, **Inc.**, a California corporation, doing business as Orange County Global Medical Center ("Covered Entity"), and **Rancho Santiago Community College District / on behalf of Santa Ana College** ("Business Associate") as of October 1, 2018 ("Effective Date").

RECITALS

A. Covered Entity and Business Associate have entered into an agreement for Business Associate to provide a service to Covered Entity ("Service Agreement") whereby Protected Health Information may be created, received, maintained, or transmitted by Business Associate on Covered Entity's behalf. The parties desire to comply with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, Public Law 104-191 ("HIPAA"), the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act, Public Law 111-005 (the "HITECH Act"), California Civil Code §1798.82 and other state and federal laws and regulations, as applicable, including the Privacy, Security, Breach Notification, and Enforcement Rules at 45 C.F.R. Part 160 and Part 164 (together, the "HIPAA Rules").

B. The HIPAA Rules require a Covered Entity to enter into a Business Associate Agreement with a Business Associate prior to the Disclosure of Protected Health Information, as set forth in, but not limited to, 45 C.F.R. §§164.314(a), 164.502(e) and 164.504(e).

1. **DEFINITIONS**

1.1 The following terms used in this Agreement shall have the same meaning as those terms in the HIPAA Rules: Breach, Data Aggregation, Designated Record Set, Disclosure, Electronic Protected Health Information, Health Care Operations, Individual, Minimum Necessary, Notice of Privacy Practices, Protected Health Information, Required by Law, Secretary, Security Incident, Subcontractor, Unsecured Protected Health Information, and Use.

2. OBLIGATIONS AND ACTIVITIES OF BUSINESS ASSOCIATE

2.1 <u>Use and Disclosure</u>. Business Associate agrees to not use or disclose Protected Health Information other than as permitted or required by this Agreement or as Required by Law.

2.2 <u>Safeguards</u>. Business Associate agrees to use appropriate safeguards, and comply with Subpart C of 45 C.F.R. Part 164 with respect to Electronic Protected Health Information, to prevent Use or Disclosure of Protected Health Information other than as provided for by this Agreement.

2.3 <u>Reporting</u>. Business Associate agrees to promptly report to Covered Entity any Use or Disclosure of Protected Health Information not provided for by this Agreement of which it becomes aware, including Breaches of Unsecured Protected Health Information as required at 45 C.F.R. §164.410, and any Security Incident of which it becomes aware.

2.4 <u>Agents and Subcontractors</u>. In accordance with 45 C.F.R. §§164.502(e)(1)(ii) and 164.308(b)(2), if applicable, Business Associate agrees to ensure that any agent or Subcontractor that receives, creates, maintains, or transmits Protected Health Information on behalf of the Business Associate Business Associate Agreement

agrees to the same restrictions, conditions, and requirements that apply to the Business Associate with respect to such information.

2.5 <u>Access by Individuals</u>. Business Associate agrees to make available Protected Health Information in a Designated Record Set to the Covered Entity or, if so directed by the Covered Entity, to the Individual or Individual's designee as necessary to satisfy Covered Entity's obligations under 45 C.F.R. §164.524.

2.6 <u>Amendment</u>. Business Associate agrees to make any amendment(s) to Protected Health Information in a Designated Record Set as directed or agreed to by the Covered Entity pursuant to 45 C.F.R. §164.526, or take other measures as necessary to satisfy Covered Entity's obligations under 45 C.F.R. §164.526.

2.7 <u>Accounting</u>. Business Associate agrees to maintain and make available to the Covered Entity, or if so directed by the Covered Entity, to the Individual or the Individual's designee, the information necessary for Covered Entity to satisfy its obligations under 45 C.F.R. §164.528.

2.8 <u>Delegated Duties</u>. To the extent the Business Associate is to carry out one or more of Covered Entity 's obligation(s) under Subpart E of 45 C.F.R. Part 164, Business Associate agrees to comply with the requirements of Subpart E that apply to the Covered Entity in the performance of such obligation(s).

2.9 <u>Governmental Access to Records</u>. Business Associate agrees to make its internal practices, books, and records available to the Secretary for purposes of determining compliance with the HIPAA Rules.

2.10 <u>Mitigation</u>. The Business Associate agrees to timely act to mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful effects that are known to Business Associate of a Use or Disclosure of Protected Health Information held by Business Associate in violation of the requirements of this Agreement.

3. PERMITTED USES AND DISCLOSURES BY BUSINESS ASSOCIATE

3.1 Except as otherwise limited by the terms of the Affiliation Agreement or this Agreement, Business Associate may use or disclose Protected Health Information as necessary to perform the services set forth in the Affiliation Agreement or as Required by Law.

3.2 Business Associate shall not use Protected Health Information to de-identify the information, except with the prior written authorization of the Covered Entity and consistent with the requirements of 45 C.F.R. §164.514.

3.3 Business Associate shall use only the Minimum Necessary amount of Protected Health Information to perform the specified functions, activities, or services set forth in the Affiliation Agreement, consistent with Covered Entity's Minimum Necessary policies and procedures.

3.4 Business Associate shall not use or disclose Protected Health Information in a manner that would violate Subpart E of 45 C.F.R. Part 164 if done by Covered Entity, except for the specific Uses and Disclosures set forth below:

(a) Business Associate may use Protected Health Information for the proper management and administration of the Business Associate or to carry out the legal responsibilities of the Business Associate.

(b) Business Associate may disclose Protected Health Information for the proper management and administration of Business Associate or to carry out the legal responsibilities of the Business Associate, provided the Disclosures are Required by Law, or Business Associate obtains reasonable assurances from the person to whom the information is disclosed that the information will remain confidential and used or further disclosed only as Required by Law or for the purposes for which it was disclosed to the person, and the person notifies Business Associate of any instances of which it is aware in which the confidentiality of the information has been breached.

3.5 Business Associate shall not use Protected Health Information to provide Data Aggregation services, except with the prior written authorization of the Covered Entity.

3.6 Business Associate shall not use or disclose Protected Health Information for fundraising or marketing purposes, except with the prior written authorization of the Covered Entity and consistent with the requirements of 45 C.F.R. §164.514(f) and §164.508(a)(3).

3.7 Business Associate shall not disclose Protected Health Information to a health plan for payment or Health Care Operations purposes if the Business Associate has received written notice from the Individual or the Covered Entity that the Individual has made this special restriction and has paid out of pocket in full for the health care item or service to which the Protected Health Information solely relates, as required by 45 C.F.R. §164.522.

3.8 Business Associate shall not directly or indirectly receive remuneration in exchange for Protected Health Information, except with the prior written authorization of the Covered Entity.

4. OBLIGATIONS OF COVERED ENTITY

4.1 Covered Entity shall notify Business Associate of any limitation(s) in the Notice of Privacy Practices of Covered Entity under 45 C.F.R. §164.520, to the extent that such limitation may affect Business Associate's use or Disclosure of Protected Health Information.

4.2 Covered Entity shall notify Business Associate of any changes in, or revocation of, the permission by an Individual to use or disclose his or her Protected Health Information, to the extent that such changes may affect Business Associate's Use or Disclosure of Protected Health Information.

4.3 Covered Entity shall notify Business Associate of any restriction on the Use or Disclosure of Protected Health Information that Covered Entity has agreed to or is required to abide by under 45 C.F.R. §164.522, to the extent that such restriction may affect Business Associate's Use or Disclosure of Protected Health Information.

4.4 Covered Entity shall not request Business Associate to use or disclose Protected Health Information in any manner that would not be permissible under Subpart E of 45 C.F.R. Part 164 if done by Covered Entity, except as permitted in paragraph 3.4.

5. TERM AND TERMINATION

5.1 <u>Term</u>. The Term of this Agreement shall be effective as of the Effective Date and shall terminate upon the termination of the Affiliation Agreement or on the date Covered Entity terminates this Agreement for cause as authorized in paragraph 5.2, whichever is sooner.

5.2 <u>Termination for Cause</u>. Business Associate authorizes termination of this Agreement by Covered Entity if Covered Entity determines Business Associate has violated a material term of the Agreement and Business Associate has not cured the breach or ended the violation within the time specified by Covered Entity.

5.3 <u>Breach Pattern or Practice by Agent or Subcontractor</u>. If Business Associate knows of a pattern of activity or practice of its agent or Subcontractor that constitutes a material breach or violation of the Subcontractor's obligation under its contract or other arrangement with Business Associate, Business Associate shall take reasonable steps to cure the breach or end the violation, as applicable, and, if such steps are unsuccessful, terminate the contract or arrangement, if feasible.

5.4 <u>Breach Pattern or Practice by Covered Entity</u>. Business Associate shall provide written notice to Covered Entity of any pattern of activity or practice of the Covered Entity that Business Associate believes constitutes a material breach or violation of the Covered Entity's obligations under the HIPAA Rules within five (5) business days of discovery and shall meet with the Covered Entity to discuss and attempt to resolve the problem or end the violation.

5.5 <u>Obligations of Business Associate upon Termination</u>. Upon termination of this Agreement for any reason, Business Associate, with respect to Protected Health Information received from Covered Entity, or created, maintained, or received by Business Associate on behalf of Covered Entity, shall:

(a) Retain only that Protected Health Information which is necessary for Business Associate to continue its proper management and administration or to carry out its legal responsibilities;

(b) Return to Covered Entity or, if agreed to by Covered Entity, destroy the remaining Protected Health Information, including derivatives thereof, that the Business Associate or its agents or Subcontractors still maintains in any form;

(c) Continue to use appropriate safeguards and comply with Subpart C of 45 C.F.R. Part 164 with respect to Electronic Protected Health Information to prevent use or Disclosure of the Protected Health Information, other than as provided for in this paragraph 5.5, for as long as Business Associate retains the Protected Health Information;

(d) Not use or disclose the Protected Health Information retained by Business Associate other than for the purposes for which such Protected Health Information was retained and subject to the same conditions set out at paragraph 3.4 (a) and (b) which applied prior to termination; and

(e) Return to Covered Entity or, if agreed to by Covered Entity, destroy the Protected Health Information retained by Business Associate when it is no longer needed by Business Associate for its proper management and administration or to carry out its legal responsibilities.

6. INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE

6.1 <u>Indemnification</u>. Business Associate hereby agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Covered Entity and its affiliates, and their respective officers, directors, shareholders, employees and agents from and against any and all liability, loss, fines, penalties, damage, claims or causes of action and expenses associated therewith (including, without limitation, court costs and attorneys' fees) caused directly or indirectly by Business Associate's breach of its obligations under this Agreement. Covered Entity may enforce Business Associate's obligations hereunder by seeking equitable relief, without bond, which remedy shall be nonexclusive.

6.2 Insurance. Business Associate shall obtain insurance for itself and all its employees, agents, and Subcontractors in an amount not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) annual aggregate which shall cover, among other things, Breaches. Business Associate shall provide Covered Entity with certificates of insurance or other written evidence of the insurance policy or policies required herein prior to the execution of the Agreement (or as shortly thereafter as is practicable) and as of each annual renewal of such insurance policies during the period of such coverage. Further, in the event of any modification, termination, expiration, non-renewal or cancellation of any of such insurance policies, Business Associate shall give written notice thereof to Covered Entity not more than ten (10) days following Business Associate's receipt of such notification. In the event Business Associate fails to procure, maintain or pay for the insurance required under this paragraph 6.2, Covered Entity shall have the right, but not the obligation, to obtain such insurance. In such event, Business Associate shall promptly reimburse Covered Entity for the cost thereof upon written request, and failure to repay the same upon demand by Covered Entity shall constitute a material breach of the Agreement.

7. MISCELLANEOUS

7.1 <u>Regulatory References</u>. A reference in this Agreement to a section in the HIPAA Rules means the section as in effect or as amended.

7.2 <u>Amendment to Comply with Law</u>. The Parties agree to take such action as is necessary to amend this Agreement from time to time as is necessary for compliance with the requirements of the HIPAA Rules and any other applicable law, rules, or regulations that might modify the terms and conditions herein.

7.3 <u>Interpretation</u>. Any ambiguity in this Agreement shall be interpreted to permit compliance with the HIPAA Rules. In the event any provision of this Agreement conflicts with the provisions of the Service Agreement, the provisions in this Agreement shall be deemed to control and such conflicting provision or part thereof shall be deemed removed and replaced with the governing provision herein to the extent necessary to reconcile the conflict.

7.4 <u>Data Ownership</u>. Business Associate acknowledges that it has no ownership rights with respect to the Protected Health Information.

7.5 <u>Confidentiality</u>. Business Associate shall cooperate with Covered Entity to preserve and protect the confidentiality of Protected Health Information accessed or used pursuant to the Agreement and shall not disclose or testify about such information during or after the termination of the Agreement except as Required By Law;

7.6 <u>Assistance in Litigation or Administrative Proceedings</u>. Business Associate shall make itself, and any Subcontractors, employees or agents assisting Business Associate in the performance of its obligations under this Agreement available to Covered Entity at no cost to provide testimony in any capacity in the event of litigation, administrative proceedings, or other legal action commenced or contemplated against Covered Entity, its directors, officers or employees based upon a claimed violation of the HIPAA Rules or other federal or state law relating to security and privacy, except where Business Associate or its Subcontractor, employee or agent is a named adverse party.

7.7 <u>Audits; Inspection and Enforcement</u>. Within ten (10) days of a written request by Covered Entity, Business Associate and its agents or Subcontractors shall permit Covered Entity to conduct a reasonable inspection of the facilities, systems, books, records, agreements, policies and procedures relating to the use or disclosure of Protected Health Information pursuant to this Agreement for the purpose of determining whether Business Associate has complied with the terms and conditions contained herein. The fact that Covered Entity inspects, fails to inspect, or has the right to such inspection does not relieve Business Associate of its responsibility to comply with this Agreement, nor does it constitute acceptance of such practice or a waiver of Covered Entity's enforcement rights under this Agreement. Business Associate shall notify Covered Entity in writing within ten (10) days of receipt of notice that Business Associate has become the subject of an audit, compliance review, or complaint investigation by the Office for Civil Rights.

7.8 <u>Disclaimer</u>. Covered Entity makes no warranty or representation that compliance by Business Associate with this Arrangement, the HIPAA Rules, or any other state or federal security or privacy law will be adequate or satisfactory for Business Associate's own purposes. Business Associate is solely responsible for all decisions made by Business Associate regarding the safeguarding of Protected Health Information.

7.9 <u>No Waiver</u>. Failure or delay on the part of either party to exercise any right, power, privilege or remedy hereunder shall not constitute a waiver thereof. No provision of this Agreement may be waived by either party except by a writing signed by both parties.

7.10 <u>Notices</u>. All notices required or permitted under this Business Associate Agreement shall be in writing and sent to the other party as directed below or as otherwise directed by either party. All such notices shall be deemed validly given upon receipt of such notice by certified mail, return receipt requested or personal or courier delivery and sent to the following address:

Integrated Testing Program with NCLEX-RN® Review Course Agreement

Participant Pay Arrangement

This agreement (the "Agreement") is entered into as of the 21st day of September 2018 ("**Effective Date**") by and between Kaplan Test Prep, a division of Kaplan, Inc., ("**Kaplan**,") and **Rancho Santiago Community College District on Behalf of Santa Ana College** ("**SCHOOL**") with its principal office at West 17th Street, Santa Ana, CA 92706 (each, a "**Party**" and collectively, "**Parties**").

WHEREAS Kaplan has developed programs to evaluate the nursing knowledge of Participants in an undergraduate program leading to RN licensure and to prepare Participants for the NCLEX-RN[®] examination; and

WHEREAS, SCHOOL desires to provide Kaplan's programs to SCHOOL's nursing Participants;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows:

1. **DEFINITIONS**:

 - vii. **Skills Modules** means online modules that provide didactic training, video instruction, and quizzes to enforce key skills such as intradermal medication administration, temperature, and venipuncture.
 - viii. *Nursing School Basics* means comprehensive but concise reviews of basic nursing content with easy-to-understand outlines, tables, and graphs. *Nursing School Basics* is available in digital and hard copy formats.

- ix. **Nursing Assessment Test** means an end-of-program test that evaluates Participants' mastery of the content areas taught in a basic nursing curriculum.
- x. **Predictive Tests 1 and 2** means end-of-program tests that predict Participant success on the NCLEX-RN exam.
- c. The NCLEX-RN Course includes the following, each of which is a "Course Element":
 - i. NCLEX-RN®Review Course means NCLEX-RN review instruction provided by Kaplan Faculty either in an in-person, classroom format ("Live NCLEX-RN® Review Course") or in a real-time, live online format by Kaplan Faculty with online moderators to guide question and answer flow ("Live Online NCLEX-RN® Review Course").
 - ii. **NCLEX-RN® Qbank** means on online, practice test tool that allows Participants to choose from exam style questions to create customized practice tests based on test plan areas.
 - iii. **Question Trainer Tests** means online practice tests with individualized feedback that increase in length and difficulty made up of one thousand (1,000) questions in total.
 - iv. *Content Review for the NCLEX-RN*® means a review of nursing content organized by the categories used in the NCLEX-RN® exam. *Content Review for the NCLEX-RN*® is available in digital formats.
 - v. **Online NCLEX Study Center** means online videos consisting of 1) content review for the NCLEX-RN® and 2) Review of the same questions taught in the Live or Live Online class.
 - vi. **Readiness Test** means a test that determines Participants' readiness to take the NCLEX-RN® exam.
- d. **Administrator Website** means a web-based service through which SCHOOL can obtain data and reports from Kaplan's systems relating to their Participants progress and performance in the Service. Reporting data include: percent correct, percentile by category, answer change analysis, time per question and level of question difficulty by system, school, cohort and individual Participant.
- e. **Kaplan Faculty** means part-time Kaplan employees trained to teach the Kaplan NCLEX-RN® Review Course.
- f. **Kaplan Materials** means all Kaplan books, videos, online question banks (qbanks), tests, quizzes, questions and other Kaplan content, in electronic and hard copy formats, used in the Service.
- g. **Kaplan Nursing Consultant** means a full-time Kaplan employee with nurse educator background who consults with SCHOOL faculty and administrators to maximize effectiveness of the service. Kaplan Nursing Consultant may train nursing faculty on the use of IT Program and Course Elements, review, analyze and make recommendations based on data reports generated from Kaplan's online systems, and advise SCHOOL on how to integrate the Service into SCHOOL's curriculum.
- h. **Kaplan Online Assets** means Kaplan Materials that are accessed via the internet. Kaplan Online Assets are stored on Kaplan's technology system ("**Kaplan Systems**").
- i. **Kaplan Account Manager** means full-time Kaplan employee who provides administrative support to SCHOOL for roster submission, test administration, invoicing and payment, and related issues.
- j. **Participants** means any nursing Participant identified to Kaplan by SCHOOL in an Initial Roster or Updated Roster (defined below).

2. KAPLAN OBLIGATIONS

a. Deliver the NCLEX –RN Review Course to Participants.

- i. If School has submitted twenty (20) or more participants on a Roster per scheduled Course to Kaplan, Kaplan will deliver the classroom component of the NCLEX –RN Review Course to Participants Live, On Site (In-Person).
- ii. If there are fewer than twenty (20) Participants submitted on a Roster, SCHOOL's Participants may join an existing Live Online NCLEX-RN® Review Course.
- b. Provide training on the Service to SCHOOL faculty. The Kaplan Nursing Consultant shall provide on-site training at a mutually agreed upon time. At SCHOOL's request, Kaplan will reasonably schedule supplemental consultations and additional faculty training.
- c. Provide an orientation to Participants.
- d. Assign a Kaplan Account Manager to SCHOOL.
- e. Customize Kaplan's standardized end-of-course exams to SCHOOL'S curriculum. SCHOOL must submit a customization request in writing via email to Kaplan Nursing at least 12 weeks prior to the start of the Academic Term for which the customized test is needed ("Customization Request"). Customization Requests must provide all information reasonable requested by Kaplan. Customizations are limited to one per test.
- f. Provide Participants license and login credentials to Kaplan Online Assets. Participant access to Kaplan Systems is personal to Participant and Participant may not share login credentials to Kaplan Systems with any other person.
- g. Provide SCHOOL a limited number of licenses and login credential to Kaplan Online Assets. SCHOOL may use Kaplan Materials as teaching aids however SCHOOL may not copy, otherwise reproduce, modify or alter Kaplan Materials without the prior, written consent of Kaplan. SCHOOL may not share login credentials to Kaplan Systems with any Participant or any person not a faculty member or administrator at SCHOOL.
- h. Provide SCHOOL license and login credentials to the Administrator Website. SCHOOL may not share login credentials to the Administrator Website with any Participant or any person not a faculty member or administrator at SCHOOL.
- i. Kaplan may modify, enhance or change Service and any aspect of the Service, Program Element or Course Element at its sole discretion during the term (collectively, "**Enhancements**"), however Kaplan will make reasonable efforts to give advance notice of any Modifications and in no event will an Enhancement materially degrade the Service. Kaplan shall in its discretion assign the Kaplan NCLEX Faculty, Kaplan Nursing Consultant(s) and Kaplan Account Manager(s) used in providing the Service to SCHOOL.

3. SCHOOL OBLIGATIONS

a. Standard start dates for SCHOOL's academic terms ("Academic Terms") are:

August and February

- b. SCHOOL shall require its student body to purchase the Services and shall provide Kaplan with an initial roster of Participants ("Initial Roster") for each group of Participants who are scheduled to graduate at the same time ("Cohort"). Unless otherwise agreed by the Parties, the Initial Roster must be provided not later than 30 days after the start of the Academic Term to which the Roster applies, which shall be referred to as the "Deadline." SCHOOL may add or remove Participants from an Initial Roster by written notification to the Kaplan Account Manager on or before the Deadline. On the day following the Deadline, the Initial Roster shall become an "Official Roster."
- c. The first Academic Term for which SCHOOL will provide Initial Rosters will be August 2018

- d. For each subsequent Academic Term, SCHOOL shall provide Kaplan updated rosters for each existing Cohort ("**Updated Rosters**") that will reflect any adds or drops to that Cohort. SCHOOL must also provide Initial Rosters for any new Cohorts (e.g., group of Participants beginning their studies with SCHOOL). Updated Rosters and Initial Rosters must be provided by the Deadline, following which such Rosters shall become Official Rosters. All Initial Roster and Updated Rosters must include all Participants in the Cohort.
- e. Initial Rosters and the Updated Rosters shall provide all information reasonably required by Kaplan, including: Participant first name, last name, email address, and anticipated graduation date. A sample Roster form is attached as **Exhibit A**.
- f. Each Participant on Official Roster shall pay a **Tuition Fee directly to Kaplan through an established payment portal. Tuition Fees to be paid by Participant** are set forth in the attached **Exhibit B**. For the avoidance of doubt, if a Participant is studying for more than one Academic Term, Participants will pay more than one Tuition Fee for each Academic Term.
 - i. Notwithstanding the foregoing, once Participant has paid the **Anticipated Fees**, Participant shall have no further obligation to pay Tuition Fees so long as that Participant is registered at SCHOOL and identified on the applicable Official Roster as Fully Paid. Anticipated Fees are the total Tuition Fees that Participant will pay, under the relevant pricing terms set forth in Exhibit B, for each Participant in a Cohort from the Cohort's start of the IT Program to the Cohort's scheduled graduation from SCHOOL. Thus, if a Participant studies for a Term longer than other Participants in that Cohort, Participant shall not pay additional fees (i.e., in addition to the Anticipated Fees) for the remaining Term(s) if the Participant has Fully Paid.
- g. If after the Deadline has passed SCHOOL adds one or more Participants or an entirely new cohort for that Academic Term, Participants shall be required to pay Kaplan the same Tuition Fee as if the Participant had been added prior to the Deadline.
- h. If SCHOOL does not timely provide any Roster by the Deadline, Participants will remain obligated to pay Kaplan the Tuition Fees during the Forecasted Term, with the exception of Participants who dropped prior to the relevant Deadline, and SCHOOL must provide Kaplan the dates of all adds and drops.
- i. Participants shall pay Kaplan the full amount in U.S. dollars **through the established payment portal based on the payment deadline for each academic term.** Kaplan shall cease any Services for any Participant that has not timely made required payments.
- j. SCHOOL shall designate a person to serve as Kaplan's principal contact at SCHOOL.
- k. SCHOOL shall administer Secured Benchmark Tests in a secure, proctored setting and SCHOOL shall take all reasonable precautions to prevent cheating on any Kaplan tests. SCHOOL acknowledges that Secured Benchmark Tests are normed and that cheating by Participants at SCHOOL impairs a valuable asset of Kaplan.
- 1. SCHOOL shall provide a classroom(s) at SCHOOL at reasonable cost upon a schedule mutually agreed upon by the Parties for all Elements designed to be delivered on-site or in a classroom.
- m. SCHOOL will mutually determine NCLEX review course dates at least 90 days in advance of expected delivery with the Kaplan Account Manager.
- n. SCHOOL shall ensure that all SCHOOL faculty who use SERVICES participate in training provided by the Kaplan Nursing Consultant.
- o. SCHOOL shall require all Participants to attend or watch Service orientations provided by Kaplan.

4. INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY

- a. SCHOOL acknowledges that Program Elements, Course Elements, Kaplan Materials, Kaplan Online Assets, Kaplan Systems and all intellectual property rights thereto (collectively, **Kaplan IP**") are and shall remain the sole and exclusive property of Kaplan and its licensors. If requested by Kaplan, SCHOOL shall execute whatever documents may reasonably be required to confirm the ownership rights of Kaplan IP. SCHOOL agrees that SCHOOL, its officers, employees and agents will not make any copies of or otherwise reproduce Kaplan IP without the prior, written consent of Kaplan.
- b. SCHOOL shall use best efforts to prevent Participants from copying, reproducing or otherwise infringing Kaplan IP. SCHOOL shall promptly notify Kaplan if it becomes aware of any possible infringement of Kaplan's ownership rights in and to the Kaplan IP and SCHOOL shall cooperate with Kaplan in good faith in taking whatever legal or other action may be appropriate under the circumstances in the event of a possible infringement.
- c. SCHOOL shall not use Kaplan's logo and any other Kaplan trademark without the prior, written consent of Kaplan except as otherwise agreed herein.

5. CONFIDENTIALITY

- a. The Parties shall hold in confidence, and shall not disclose to any person outside its organization, Confidential Information of the other Party. The receiving Party shall use such Confidential Information only for the purpose of performing its obligations under this Agreement, and shall not use or exploit such Confidential Information for its own benefit or the benefit of any other Party without the prior written consent of the disclosing Party. The term "Confidential Information" means information that a Party has designated as confidential to the other Party as well as any and all information relating to the research, development, products, pricing, methods of manufacture, trade secrets, business plans, customers, finances, and personnel data related to the business or affairs of the Party knew before it was disclosed by the disclosing Party; (b) which has become publicly known through no wrongful act of either Party; (c) which was developed independently by either Party; or (iv) which was disclosed to the receiving Party by someone with no duty of confidentiality to the disclosing Party.
- b. Except as otherwise set forth herein, neither of the parties will issue any press release(s) or make any public announcement(s) relating in any way whatsoever to this Agreement or the relationship established by this Agreement without the express prior written consent of the other Party. For the purposes of this Agreement, discussions with potential Participants in the normal course of business as contemplated by this Agreement shall not constitute a public announcement or press release.

6. REPRESENTATION, WARRANTIES & INDEMNITIES

- a. Kaplan warrants and represents that: (a) it has the necessary rights to enter into this Agreement; (b) its entry into this Agreement will not cause any breach of its obligations to third parties; (c) to the best of its knowledge, no Kaplan IP infringes any personal, intellectual property or other rights of any third party. Kaplan agrees to indemnify and hold harmless SCHOOL and its trustees officers, employees and agents from and against all third party claims, damages, costs and expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and litigation expenses) arising out of or as a result of Kaplan's breach of this Agreement, any breach of Kaplan's representations and warranties herein, or any claims resulting from or arising out of the infringement of any third party intellectual property rights by Kaplan Materials.
- b. SCHOOL warrants and represents that: (a) it has the necessary rights to enter into this Agreement; (b) its entry into this Agreement will not cause any breach of its obligations to third parties; and (c) in performing its obligations hereunder, it will comply with all laws, rules and

regulations of all governmental bodies having jurisdiction thereof. SCHOOL agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Kaplan and its subsidiaries, affiliates, directors, shareholders, officers, employees and agents from and against all third party claims, damages, costs and expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and litigation expenses) arising out of or as a result of SCHOOL's breach of this Agreement, any breach of its representations and warranties herein, any claims arising from data SCHOOL provides to Kaplan, and any claims resulting or arising out of or related to any injuries, damages or any other actions or claims, whether in contract, tort or any other theory of recovery, due to its negligence or malfeasance in operating, maintaining, servicing or otherwise controlling or owning the premises on or off-campus where the Service is provided.

7. TERM AND TERMINATION

- a. The term of this Agreement shall begin on the Effective Date and initially continue for two consecutive years ("**Contract Term**"). Sixty days prior to the end of the initial Contract Term and any subsequent Contract Term, Kaplan shall notify SCHOOL of any changes in terms ("**Terms Change Notice**"). Unless either Party sends the other Party written notice of termination within 30 days prior to the end of the applicable Contract Term, the Agreement shall automatically renew at the end of the applicable Contract Term for an additional two year period any terms in the Terms Change Notice shall automatically become part of this Agreement and shall control in the event of any conflict between them and any other provisions of the Agreement.
- b. If either Party terminates the Agreement under section 7(a) during an Academic Term, both Parties shall fulfill their obligations under this Agreement, including SCHOOL's payment obligations, for the remainder of that Academic Term.
- c. Upon termination of this Agreement, SCHOOL shall, at its sole expense, deliver to Kaplan all of the Kaplan Materials then in its possession or control and shall cease to make any of the Program Elements, Course Elements, Kaplan Materials, or Kaplan Online Assets available to Participants, SCHOOL Participants or any other persons. For termination under section 7(a) or 7(b), SCHOOL must take all action described in the preceding sentence by the end of the Academic Term in which the termination became effective; whereas for termination under 7(c), SCHOOL must take all such actions within 10 days of termination.
- d. During any Contract Term, SCHOOL shall not enter into any other contract, except as agreed in writing by Kaplan, for services similar to the Service.
- 8. **GOVERNING LAW; JURISDICTION:** This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of New York, exclusive of its choice of law provisions. Both Parties consent to the exclusive jurisdiction of the federal and state courts of New York, New York.
- 9. LIMITATION OF LIABILITY: EXCEPT FOR LIABILITY ARISING AS A RESULT OF GROSS NEGLIGENCE OR WILFULL MISCONDUCT OF KAPLAN, IN NO EVENT SHALL KAPLAN BE LIABLE TO SCHOOLFOR ANY SPECIAL, CONSEQUENTIAL, INCIDENTAL, INDIRECT, OR PUNITIVE DAMAGES, HOWEVER CAUSED AND ON ANY THEORY OF LIABILITY, ARISING OUT OF THIS AGREEMENT, WHETHER OR NOT KAPLAN IS ADVISED OF THE POSSIBILITY OF SUCH DAMAGES, AND NOTWITHSTANDING ANY FAILURE OF ESSENTIAL PURPOSE OF ANY LIMITED REMEDY.
- 10. **DISCLAIMER OF WARRANTIES:** EXCEPT AS SPECIFIED IN THIS AGREEMENT, KAPLAN MAKES NO WARRANTY IN CONNECTION WITH THE SUBJECT MATTER OF THIS AGREEMENT OR OPERATION OF ITS WEBSITES AND HEREBY DISCLAIMS ANY AND ALL WARRANTIES, INCLUDING WITHOUT LIMITATION, IMPLIED WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY, NON-INFRINGEMENT AND FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE.

11. GENERAL PROVISIONS

a. This Agreement may not be assigned without the prior written permission of other Party. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Kaplan may assign its rights and delegate its duties under this Agreement to any subsidiary, parent or affiliated company of Kaplan if such entity agrees to be bound by all of the terms hereof.

- b. This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, which together shall constitute one Agreement. A facsimile signature on this Agreement shall constitute an original signature.
- c. The captions and headings in this Agreement have been inserted solely for convenience of reference and shall not affect the interpretation of this Agreement.
- d. This Agreement sets forth the entire agreement and understanding between the parties as to the subject matter of this Agreement and merges all prior discussions between them.
- e. Kaplan and SCHOOL are entering this Agreement as independent contractors. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be deemed to create a partnership, joint venture, agency, employment, fiduciary or other relationship between Kaplan and SCHOOL.
- f. Kaplan shall not be liable for any damages caused by its failure or delay in performing its duties hereunder if such failure was due to causes beyond Kaplan's control, including, but not limited to, acts of God, acts of public enemy, acts of U.S. or foreign government, fires floods, earthquakes, epidemics, strikes, embargoes, or severely inclement weather condition.
- g. Kaplan shall provide and maintain at its own expense a program of insurance covering its activities and operation hereunder. Such program of insurance shall include, but not be limited to commercial general liability. The general liability insurance shall have a minimum coverage of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate.
- h. Any written notice permitted or required by this Agreement shall be sent or delivered to the Party to receive the same by Federal Express, DHL or other carrier, charges prepaid, or by facsimile transmission (including confirmation thereof) as set forth below (or as otherwise shall be designated by like notice):

The proposed Clinical Training Affiliation Agreement (With School Instructor on Hospital Premises) Renewal with Children's Hospital of Orange County will yield appropriate clinical rotation activities for the Nursing program.

ANALYSIS

CLINICAL TRAINING AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

(With School Instructor on Hospital Premises)

This Clinical Training Affiliation Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into and effective on October 1, 2018 ("Effective Date") by and between Children's Hospital of Orange County, a California non-profit public benefit corporation dba CHOC Children's Hospital ("Hospital") and Rancho Santiago Community College District on behalf of Santa Ana College ("School"). This Agreement will remain effective for the term as set forth in Section 4.1.

ARTICLE I RECITALS

1.1. <u>Hospital</u>. Hospital is a California nonprofit public benefit corporation that operates a general acute care hospital accredited in accordance with the standards of The Joint Commission and licensed by the California Department of Health Care Services.

1.2. <u>School</u>. School is an institution of higher learning authorized pursuant to California law to offer health care program(s) (the "Program(s)") listed on **Exhibit A**, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference, and to maintain classes and such program(s) at hospitals for the purpose of providing clinical training for students in such classes.

1.3 <u>Instructor</u>. Instructor shall be an employee of School and qualified to teach School's clinical training Program(s). School shall ensure that instructors maintain all required professional credentials and licensure necessary to provide instruction to students of Program(s). Hospital desires to provide instructor access to Hospital's clinical facilities for purposes of training and supervising students of School enrolled in the Program(s).

1.4. <u>Intent</u>. Hospital operates clinical facilities within Hospital which are suitable for the Program(s). School desires to establish the Program(s) at Hospital for the students of the School enrolled in the Program(s). Hospital desires to support the Program(s) to assist in training students of School.

1.5 <u>Purpose of This Agreement.</u> The purpose of this Agreement is to set forth the terms and conditions pursuant to which the parties will institute the Program(s) at Hospital.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises set forth herein and for such other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto agree as follows:

ARTICLE II RESPONSIBILITIES OF SCHOOL

2.1 <u>Academic Responsibility</u>. School shall develop the Program(s) curriculum and shall be responsible for offering a health care education Program(s) eligible, if necessary, for accreditation and approval by any state board or agency.

2.2 <u>Number of Students</u>. School shall designate and notify Hospital of the students who are enrolled and in good standing in the Program(s) to be assigned for clinical training at

Hospital in such numbers as are mutually agreed upon between Hospital and School. School and Hospital will also mutually agree to the dates and length of the Program(s).

2.3 Orientation. School shall provide orientation to all students and faculty and ensure that all students receive clinical instruction and have necessary basic skills prior to the clinical experience at Hospital. School shall provide orientation to students in the following areas: (i) injury and illness prevention; (ii) patient confidentiality and HIPAA privacy and security; (iii) dress code; (iv) standard precautions for infection control; and (v) needle safety. School is responsible for verifying that students and instructors have successfully completed an American Heart Association Basic Life Support ("BLS") for Healthcare Providers (CPR training) course. School shall certify to Hospital that each student and instructor assigned to Hospital has either (i) satisfied the requirements set forth on the Clinical Profile Orange County/Long Beach Consortium for Nursing in the form attached hereto on as Exhibit B for clinical training or (ii) has completed such orientation and CPR training using the Clinical Student Profile form and/or the Instructor Profile form, attached hereto and incorporated by reference as Exhibit C and Exhibit D, respectively. School shall maintain documentation in each student's and instructor's file that each student and instructor has completed such orientation and CPR training and agrees to provide such documentation to Hospital upon request.

2.4 <u>Supervision</u>. School shall supervise all students in their clinical training at Hospital and provide the necessary qualified instructors for the Program(s) who must be satisfactory to Hospital. All such instructors shall be employees of School. School also shall be responsible for instruction, counseling, control, discipline and all activities of students at Hospital.

2.5 <u>Attendance and Academic Documentation</u>. School shall maintain all attendance and academic records of students participating in the Program(s). School shall implement and maintain an evaluation process of the students' progress throughout the Program(s).

2.6 <u>Health Clearance and Background Check</u>.

2.6.1 <u>Health Clearance</u>. School shall ensure that each student and instructor complies with Hospital's requirements for immunizations and tests, including but not limited to an annual health examination, Hepatitis B series or titer, measles, mumps, and rubella titers, Tdap, annual TB screening (includes skin testing or symptom screening and chest x-ray, if determined appropriate by Hospital), influenza immunization (required annually) or declination statement. School shall also ensure that students and instructors follow Hospital's policies and procedures regarding blood-borne pathogens, including but not limited to, standard precautions.

2.6.2 <u>Background Check</u>. School, at School's expense or student's expense, shall conduct a background check on each student and instructor. At a minimum, the background check shall include the following: verification of identity (social security trace); criminal background check in all counties of residence and employment for the last seven (7) years; motor vehicle records trace; sex offender registry check; and Office of Inspector General ("OIG") sanction trace.

2.6.3 <u>Health and Background Documentation</u>. School shall certify to Hospital that each student and instructor assigned to Hospital for clinical training has satisfied Hospital's health clearance and background check requirements using (i) the Clinical Profile Orange County/Long Beach Consortium for Nursing in the form attached as **Exhibit B** or (ii) the Clinical Student Profile form and/or Instructor Profile form, attached hereto and incorporated by

reference as **Exhibit C** and **Exhibit D**, respectively. School shall maintain documentation in each student's and instructor's file that each student and instructor have satisfied Hospital's health clearance and background check requirements and agrees to provide such documentation to Hospital upon request.

2.6.4 <u>Authorization</u>. School shall maintain a written valid authorization from each student assigned to Hospital under this Agreement to permit Hospital to access student's and/or instructor's files and records, including health information and background check information.

2.7 <u>Hospital Policies and Procedures</u>. School shall ensure that each student and instructor is aware of and understands all applicable Hospital policies and procedures and shall require each student and instructor to conform to all such Hospital policies, procedures, regulations, standards for health, safety, cooperation, ethical behavior, and any additional requirements and restrictions agreed upon by representatives of Hospital and School. School shall instruct students that they are not permitted to interfere with the activity or judgment of the health care providers at Hospital in administering care to patients in the context of training.

2.8 <u>Supplies and Equipment</u>. School shall provide and be responsible for the care and control of educational supplies, materials, and equipment used for instruction during the Program(s). School shall also be responsible, as between Hospital and School, for the cost of travel expenses and transportation, if any, incurred by students as a result of the Program(s). Students are responsible for their own transportation costs, not the School.

2.9 <u>Confidentiality</u>. School shall instruct students and instructors who supervise students regarding confidentiality of patient information. No student or instructor shall have access to or have the right to review any medical record or quality assurance or peer review information, except where necessary in the regular course of the Program(s). School shall ensure that all students and instructors maintain the confidentiality of any and all patient and other information received in the course of the Program(s). Further, School shall ensure that students and instructors do not discuss, transmit, or narrate in any form any patient information of a personal nature, medical or otherwise, except as a necessary part of the patient's treatment plan or the Program(s).

2.10 Insurance

2.10.1 Professional Liability/Worker's Compensation. School shall ensure that all students and instructors maintain professional liability insurance coverage (either independently or as an additional insured on School's policy) at a minimum of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) in aggregate throughout the course of this Agreement. Further, School agrees to maintain professional and comprehensive general liability insurance at a minimum of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) in aggregate throughout the course of this Agreement. Further, School agrees to maintain professional and comprehensive general liability insurance at a minimum of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) in aggregate throughout the course of this Agreement. Further, School shall ensure that such policies provide for notification to Hospital at least thirty (30) days in advance of any material modification or cancellation of such coverage. School also agrees to maintain statutory Workers' Compensation coverage on any individuals characterized as employees of School and/or students and instructors working at Hospital pursuant to this Agreement at all times during the course of this Agreement. School shall provide certificates evidencing all coverage referred to in this section within thirty (30) days of execution of this Agreement and thereafter, on an annual basis except that, with respect to students and instructors, such evidence will be provided prior to the date when any new student

or instructor commences participation in the Program(s).

2.10.2 <u>Health Insurance</u>. School shall ensure and provide proof that students and instructors are covered by a health insurance policy, either through School or an individual policy. Student and instructor are responsible for his or her own health insurance coverage, if not provided by School.

2.11 <u>Accreditation</u>. School shall at all times during the course of this Agreement be licensed or qualified to offer the Program(s) to students.

2.12 <u>Student ID Badges</u>. For Hospital security purposes, the School will be billed/invoiced and required to pay to Hospital, the amount of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) for each and every student ID badge (including ID badges issued to instructors) that is lost, stolen or not returned to the Security Office upon completion of the students/instructors designated learning period. School acknowledges the importance of the return of badges in a children's hospital and will use good faith efforts to require students to return all badges. The School will inform the students and faculty of this requirement before placement.

ARTICLE III RESPONSIBILITIES OF HOSPITAL

3.1 <u>Access</u>. Hospital shall permit nonexclusive access to the Program(s) to instructors and those students designated by School as eligible for participation in the Program(s) at Hospital, provided such access does not unreasonably interfere with the regular activities at Hospital. Hospital agrees to provide qualified students with access to clinical areas and patient care opportunities as appropriate to the level of understanding and education of such students and as appropriate to the provision of quality care and privacy of Hospital patients.

3.2 <u>Implementation of Program(s)</u>. Hospital agrees to cooperate with and assist in the planning and implementation of the Program(s) at Hospital for the benefit of students from School.

3.3 <u>Instruction</u>. Hospital shall instruct students in their training at Hospital with the supervision of a fully licensed professional, if applicable, relevant to the students' specific course of training. Additionally, Hospital shall provide orientation to students in the following areas: (i) patient confidentiality and HIPAA privacy and security; (ii) dress code; and (iii) applicable Hospital policies and procedures.

3.4. <u>Accreditation</u>. Hospital shall maintain Hospital so that it conforms to the requirements of the California Department of Health Care Services and The Joint Commission.

3.5 <u>Patient Care</u>. Pursuant to the California Code of Regulations ("CCR"), Title 22, Section 70713, School understands and agrees that Hospital, with its Medical Staff, retains professional and administrative responsibility for Services rendered to Hospital patients. Further, School shall ensure its students and instructors conduct their activities hereunder consistent with relevant law and regulation, the Medical Staff Bylaws, the Medical Staff Rules and Regulations, Hospital policy and procedures, Emergency Medical Treatment and Active Labor Act ("EMTALA"), Title 22, the standards and requirements under The Joint Commission, professional standards, Hospital philosophy, values and ethics. The parties understand and agree that this provision is intended to fulfill requirements of The Joint Commission and state law and is not intended to modify the independent contractor relationship nor indemnification requirements between the parties herein.

3.6 <u>Space and Storage</u>. At Hospital's discretion, it will provide students with classroom space within Hospital and an acceptable amount of storage space for School's instructional materials for use in the Program(s), subject to reasonable availability.

3.7 <u>Removal of Students and Instructors</u>. Hospital shall have the absolute right to determine who will administer care to its patients. In the event that any student or instructor, in the sole discretion of Hospital, fails to perform satisfactorily, fails to follow Hospital policies, procedures and regulations, or fails to meet Hospital standards for health, safety, security, cooperation or ethical behavior, Hospital shall have the right to request that School withdraw the student or instructor from the Program(s). School shall comply with Hospital's request within five (5) days of receipt of notice from Hospital with respect to instructors, and shall provide a replacement instructor acceptable to Hospital. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in the event of any emergency or if any student or instructor represents a threat to patient safety or personnel, Hospital may immediately exclude any student or instructor from Hospital until final resolution of the matter with School.

3.8 <u>Documentation</u>. Hospital agrees to make available to instructors and qualified students of School a copy of its policies and procedures, rules and regulations, and other relevant information in order that students and instructors obtain the benefit of such documentation and in order that students and instructors comply with such policies and rules. Such copy is available at Hospital's facility for review.

3.9 <u>Authority</u>. Hospital shall maintain at all times full authority over and responsibility for care of its patients and may intervene and/or redirect students and instructors when appropriate or necessary.

3.10 <u>Statement of Adequate Staffing</u>. Hospital acknowledges that it has adequate staffing and that students participating in the Program(s) shall not be substituted for nursing staff necessary for reasonable staffing coverage.

ARTICLE IV RELATIONSHIP OF THE PARTIES

4.1 <u>Term</u>. The term of this Agreement shall commence as of the Effective Date and shall continue for five (5) year(s) unless otherwise terminated as provided herein.

4.2 <u>Termination</u>. Either party may terminate this Agreement with or without cause or penalty upon thirty (30) days prior written notice to the other party. To the extent reasonably possible, Hospital will attempt to limit its termination of this Agreement without cause so as to allow the completion of student training for the then current academic year by any student who, at the date of mailing of said notice by Hospital, was satisfactorily participating in the Program(s).

4.3 <u>Relationship of Parties/Independent Contractor</u>. In the performance of the obligations under this Agreement, it is mutually understood and agreed that School and School's instructors are at all times acting and performing as an independent contractor. Nothing in this Agreement is intended nor shall be construed to create between Hospital and School or Hospital and School's instructors and/or students an employer/employee relationship,

a joint venture relationship, or a lease or landlord/tenant relationship. Students shall maintain the status of learners/students and neither this Agreement nor any acts pursuant to it shall be deemed to create an employment or agency relationship between Hospital and any student. Therefore, the parties understand and agree that Hospital is not responsible in any way, directly or indirectly, for any employment-related benefits for students or School's instructors. Such benefits not covered include, but are not limited to salaries, vacation time, sick leave, Workers' Compensation, and health benefits. The sole interest of Hospital is to assure that services to its patients are performed in a competent and satisfactory manner. No relationship of employer and employee is created by this Agreement and School, instructors, and any student enrolled in School's Program(s), whether as a shareholder, partner, employee, independent contractor, subcontractor or otherwise, shall not have any claim under this Agreement or otherwise against Hospital for vacation pay, sick leave, retirement benefits, Social Security, Workers' Compensation, disability or unemployment benefits. School shall indemnify and hold harmless Hospital from any and all liability for fees, compensation, wages and benefits of itself, its instructors or its students and from taxes on business income and other costs and expenses of an employer that Hospital would incur if, contrary to the parties' intention, School, its instructors or its students are determined to be employees of Hospital.

4.4 <u>Role of Students and Instructors</u>. It is not the intention of School or Hospital that any student or instructor occupies the position of third-party beneficiary of any obligations assumed by Hospital or School pursuant to this Agreement.

4.5 <u>Publicity</u>. Neither School nor Hospital shall cause to be published or disseminate any advertising materials, either printed or electronically transmitted, which identifies the other party or its facilities with respect to the Program(s) without the prior written consent of the other party.

4.6 <u>Records</u>. It is understood and agreed that any and all medical records, charts, and business records, other than student evaluation records and information (collectively "Records"), shall be and remain the property of Hospital.

ARTICLE V CONFIDENTIALITY

5.1 <u>Records</u>. All Records shall be treated as confidential.

5.2 <u>HIPAA and CMIA</u>. For purposes of this Agreement and patient confidentiality under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 and regulations promulgated thereunder ("HIPAA"), students and instructors shall be considered to be members of Hospital's "Workforce," as defined at 45 Code of Federal Regulations (C.F.R.) § 160.103. School shall provide instructors and students with information regarding confidentiality of patient information and all applicable regulations relating to HIPAA and the California Medical Information Act ("CMIA"). In the course of clinical training at Hospital, students and instructors will have access to Protected Health Information, as defined at 45 C.F.R. § 160.103, and shall be subject to Hospital's HIPAA and CMIA Privacy and Security policies and procedures. Students and instructors will be required to participate in training related to the HIPAA and CMIA Privacy and Security Rules and Hospital's HIPAA and CMIA Privacy and Security policies and procedures.

5.3 <u>Confidentiality Statement</u>. Students and instructors shall be required to sign Hospital's confidentiality agreement (copy of model agreement attached as **Exhibit E**). Subject to students' and instructors' completion of Hospital's confidentiality agreement, Hospital shall provide students and instructors with the necessary access to its confidential patient medical records solely for purposes of obtaining the training contemplated by this Agreement.

ARTICLE VI INDEMNIFICATION

6.1 <u>Hospital's Obligations to School</u>. Hospital shall defend, indemnify and hold School, its officers, employees and agents harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense (including reasonable attorneys' fees), or claims for injury or damages to the extent arising out of the performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of Hospital, its officers, employees, or agents.

6.2 <u>School's Obligations to Hospital</u>. School shall defend, indemnify and hold Hospital, its officers, employees and agents harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense (including reasonable attorneys' fees), or claims for injury or damages to the extent arising out of the performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of School, its officers, employees, agents, or student(s).

ARTICLE VII GENERAL PROVISIONS

7.1 <u>Entire Agreement; Amendment</u>. This Agreement including the attachments and exhibits hereto contains the complete and full agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede all other agreements relative to the subject matter hereof by and between the parties. This Agreement may be amended but only by an instrument in writing signed by both parties to the Agreement. The parties agree to amend this Agreement to the extent reasonably necessary for Hospital or its affiliates to comply with its tax-exempt bond obligations and covenants, to maintain tax-exempt status, and to qualify for tax-exempt financing.

7.2 <u>Assignment</u>. School shall not subcontract, assign its rights or delegate its duties under this Agreement without the prior written consent of Hospital. This Agreement shall be binding on and inure to the benefit of successors and permitted assigns of each party.

7.3 <u>Compliance</u>. School acknowledges that Hospital's Corporate Responsibility Program ("CRP") applies to the Program and obligations described herein and that all policies and procedures relating to this CRP are available and should be reviewed by School and students of School who are training at Hospital. Hospital acknowledges that policies, procedures and handbooks are available for review by School and School's students by contacting the Compliance Officer at the Hospital. This CRP is intended to prevent compliance violations and to promote education related to fraud, abuse, false claims including but not limited to the Deficit Reduction Act provisions, excess private benefit, and inappropriate referrals. This CRP requires, and School hereby agrees, that any regulatory compliance concerns be promptly reported either to an appropriate Hospital manager or through the Hospital's Corporate Responsibility Hotline (877-388-8588). Further, School represents and warrants that students receiving training hereunder shall not at any time have been sanctioned by a health care regulatory agency and that any investigations of School shall be promptly reported to a Hospital manager or via the hotline (as above). Failure to abide by these compliance requirements shall give Hospital the right to terminate this Agreement immediately at its sole discretion.

7.4 <u>Access to Books and Records</u>. During the term of this Agreement and for a period of four (4) years after the termination hereof, School shall grant access to the following documents to the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services ("Secretary"), the U.S. Comptroller-General and their authorized representatives: this Agreement, and all books, documents and records necessary to verify the nature and costs of services provided hereunder. If School carries out the duties of this Agreement through a subcontract worth Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or more over a twelve (12) month period with a related organization, this subcontract shall also contain a clause permitting access by the Secretary, Comptroller-General and their authorized representatives to the related organization's books, documents and records.

7.5 Medicare/Medi-Cal Participation. School hereby represents and warrants that neither School, students, instructors nor its principals (if applicable) are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or excluded from participation in any federally funded health care program, including Medicare and Medi-Cal. School hereby agrees to immediately notify Hospital of any threatened, proposed, or actual debarment, suspension or exclusion from any federally funded health care program, including Medicare and Medi-Cal. In the event that School or any student and/or instructor is debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible or excluded from participation in any federally funded health care program during the term of this Agreement, or if at any time after the Effective Date of this Agreement it is determined that School, any student and/or instructor is in breach of this Section, this Agreement shall, as of the effective date of such action or breach, automatically terminate. School further understands that Hospital periodically checks contracted individuals and entities against the Office of Inspector General (OIG) and General Service Administration (GSA) databases of Excluded Individuals and Entities and will notify School if it discovers a match. Hospital will take reasonable measures to verify that the match is the same individual or entity before taking any action to terminate any underlying agreement(s).

7.6 <u>Governing Law</u>. This Agreement shall be governed by and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of California. Any action arising out of this Agreement shall be instituted and prosecuted only in a court of proper jurisdiction in Orange County, California.

7.7 <u>Non-Discrimination</u>. Neither party shall discriminate against any student on the basis of race, age, religion, sex, color, creed, national origin, handicap, disability or sexual preference, except to the extent permitted by law. In addition, the parties will fully comply with any and all applicable local, state and federal anti-discrimination regulations, statutes and judicial decisions that apply to the parties.

7.8 <u>Notices</u>. Any and all notices permitted or required by this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given (a) on the date personally delivered; (b) three (3) business days after being mailed by United States post, certified and return receipt requested; or (c) one business day after being sent by nationally recognized overnight courier, properly addressed as follows or such other address as may later be designated by the party:

7.9 <u>Severability</u>. The provisions of this Agreement shall be deemed severable and if any portion shall be held invalid, illegal or unenforceable for any reason, the remainder of this Agreement shall be effective and binding upon the parties.

7.10 <u>Waiver</u>. Any waiver of any terms, covenants and/or conditions hereof must be in writing and signed by the parties hereto. A waiver of any of the terms, covenants and/or conditions hereof shall not be construed as a waiver of any other terms, covenants and/or conditions hereof nor shall any waiver constitute a continuing waiver.

7.11 <u>Bond Covenants</u>. In the event legal counsel for Hospital advises that this Agreement or any practices which could be, or are, employed in exercising rights under this Agreement poses a material risk of violating any legal requirement related to Hospital's tax exempt status or tax exempt bond financing, the parties in good faith shall undertake to revise this Agreement to comply with such legal requirements. In the event the parties are unable to agree upon the revised terms within thirty (30) days thereafter, Hospital may terminate this Agreement immediately upon written notice to all parties hereto.

7.12 <u>Interruption of Training</u>. Each party shall be excused from any delay or failure in performance hereunder caused by reason of any occurrence or contingency beyond its reasonable control, including, but not limited to, acts of God, acts of war, fire, insurrection, labor disputes, riots, earthquakes, or other acts of nature. The obligations and rights of the party so excused shall be extended on a day-to-day basis for the time period equal to the period of such excusable interruption. In the event the interruption of a party's services continues for a period in excess of thirty (30) days, the other party shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon ten (10) days' prior written notice to the other party.

7.13 <u>Ambiguities</u>. Ambiguities, if any, in this Agreement shall be reasonably construed in accordance with all relevant circumstances including, without limitation, prevailing practices in the industry of the parties in the place where the contract is to be performed. Ambiguities, if any, shall not be construed against either party, irrespective of which party may

be deemed to have authored this Agreement generally or the ambiguous provision specifically.

7.14 <u>Survival</u>. Section 2.10 (Insurance), Article 5 (Confidentiality), Article 6 (Indemnification), Section 7.6 (Governing Law), Section 7.8 (Notices), and 7.13 (Ambiguities) and this Section 7.14 shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

Students in the Nursing, Occupational Therapy Assistant, Pharmacy Technician, Speech Therapy, Emergency Medical Technician, and Medical Assistant programs are required to participate in clinical rotation activities at sites throughout the community in order to gain practical field experiences and to apply knowledge and skills learned in college classes. The proposed Clinical Training Affiliation Agreement (Without School Instructor on Hospital Premises) Renewal with Children's Hospital of Orange County will yield appropriate clinical rotation activities for the Nursing, Occupational Therapy Assistant, Pharmacy Technician, Speech Therapy, Emergency Medical Technician, and Medical Assistant programs.

ANALYSIS

The Clinical Training Affiliation Agreement (Without School Instructor on Hospital Premises) Renewal with Children's Hospital of Orange County covers the scope of the program's operations of the facility, as well as other issues relating to the responsibilities for both parties. CLINICAL TRAINING AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

(Without School Instructor on Hospital Premises)

This Clinical Training Affiliation Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into and effective on October 1, 2018 ("Effective Date") by and between Children's Hospital of Orange County, a California non-profit public benefit corporation dba CHOC Children's Hospital ("Hospital") and Rancho Santiago Community College District on behalf of Santa Ana College ("School"). This Agreement will remain effective for the term as set forth in Section 4.1

ARTICLE I RECITALS

1.1 <u>Hospital</u>. Hospital is a California nonprofit public benefit corporation that operates a general acute care hospital accredited in accordance with the standards of the Joint Commission and licensed by the California Department of Health Care Services.

1.2 <u>School</u>. School is an institution of higher learning authorized pursuant to California law to offer health care program(s) (the "Program(s)"), as referenced in **Exhibit A**, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference, and to maintain classes and such program(s) at hospitals for the purpose of providing clinical training for students in such classes.

1.3 <u>Intent</u>. Hospital operates clinical facilities within Hospital which are suitable for the Program(s). School desires to establish the Program(s) at Hospital for the students of the School enrolled in the Program(s). Hospital desires to support the Program(s) to assist in training students of School.

1.4 <u>Purpose of this Agreement</u>. The purpose of this Agreement is to set forth the terms and conditions pursuant to which the parties will institute the Program(s) at Hospital.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises set forth herein and for such other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto agree as follows:

ARTICLE II RESPONSIBILITIES OF SCHOOL

2.1 <u>Academic Responsibility</u>. School shall develop the Program(s) curriculum and shall be responsible for offering a health care education Program eligible, if necessary, for accreditation and approval by any state board or agency.

2.2 <u>Number of Students</u>. School shall designate and notify Hospital of the students who are enrolled and in good standing in the Program(s) to be assigned for clinical training at Hospital in such numbers as are mutually agreed upon between Hospital and School. School and Hospital will also mutually agree to the dates and length of the Program(s).

2.3 <u>Orientation</u>. School shall provide orientation to all students and ensure that all students receive clinical instruction and have necessary basic skills prior to the clinical experience at Hospital. School shall provide orientation to students in the following areas: (i) injury and illness prevention; (ii) patient confidentiality and HIPAA privacy and security; (iii) dress code; (iv) standard precautions for infection control; and (v) needle safety. School is responsible for verifying that students have successfully completed an American Heart Association Basic Life Support ("BLS") for Healthcare Providers (CPR training) course. School shall certify to Hospital that each student

assigned to Hospital has either (i) satisfied the requirements set forth on the Clinical Profile Orange County/Long Beach Consortium for Nursing in the form attached hereto on as **Exhibit B** for clinical training or (ii) has completed such orientation and CPR training using the Clinical Student Profile form, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as **Exhibit C**. School shall maintain documentation in each student's file and/or database that each student has completed such orientation and CPR training or OPR training and agrees to provide such documentation to Hospital upon request.

2.4 <u>Discipline</u>. School shall be responsible for counseling, controlling, disciplining and all activities of students at Hospital.

2.5 <u>Attendance and Academic Documentation</u>. School shall maintain all attendance and academic records of students participating in the Program(s). School shall implement and maintain an evaluation process of the students' progress throughout the Program(s).

2.6 <u>Health Clearance and Background Check</u>.

2.6.1 <u>Health Clearance</u>. School shall ensure that each student complies with Hospital's requirements for immunizations and tests, including but not limited to an annual health examination, Hepatitis B series or titer, measles, mumps, rubella titers, Tdap, annual TB screening (includes skin testing and symptom screening and chest x-ray, if determined appropriate by Hospital, influenza immunization (required annually) or declination statement. School shall also ensure that students follow Hospital's policies and procedures regarding blood-borne pathogens including but not limited to universal precautions.

2.6.2 <u>Background Check.</u> School, at School's expense or Student's expense, shall conduct a background check on each student. At a minimum, the background check shall include the following: verification of identity (social security trace); criminal background check in all counties of residence and employment for the last seven (7) years; sex offender registry check, and Office of Inspector General ("OIG") sanction trace.

2.6.3 <u>Health and Background Documentation</u>. School shall ensure to Hospital that each student assigned to Hospital for clinical training has satisfied Hospital's health clearance and background check requirements using (i) the Clinical Profile Orange County/Long Beach Consortium for Nursing in the form attached as **Exhibit B** or (ii) the Clinical Student Profile form, attached hereto and incorporated by reference as **Exhibit C**. School shall maintain documentation in each student's file that each student has satisfied Hospital's health clearance and background check requirements and agrees to provide such information to Hospital upon request.

2.6.4 <u>Authorization</u>. School shall maintain a written valid authorization from each student assigned to Hospital under this Agreement to permit Hospital to access student's files and records, including health information and background check information.

2.7 <u>Hospital Policies and Procedures</u>. School shall ensure that each student is aware of and understands all applicable Hospital policies and procedures and shall require each student to conform to all such Hospital policies, procedures, regulations, standards for health, safety, cooperation, ethical behavior, and any additional requirements and restrictions agreed upon by representatives of Hospital and School. School shall instruct students that they are not permitted to interfere with the activity or judgment of the health care providers at Hospital in administering care to patients in the context of training.

2.8 <u>Supplies and Equipment</u>. School shall provide and be responsible for the care and control of educational supplies, materials, and equipment used for instruction during the Program(s). School shall also be responsible, as between Hospital and School, for the cost of travel expenses and transportation, if any, incurred by students as a result of the Program(s).

Students are responsible for their own transportation costs, not the School.

2.9 <u>Confidentiality</u>. School shall instruct students regarding confidentiality of patient information. No student shall have access to or have the right to review any medical record or quality assurance or peer review information except where necessary in the regular course of the Program(s). School shall ensure that all students maintain the confidentiality of any and all patient and other information received in the course of the Program(s). Further, School shall ensure that students do not discuss, transmit, or narrate in any form any patient information of a personal nature, medical or otherwise, except as a necessary part of the patient's treatment plan or the Program(s).

2.10 Insurance.

2.10.1 Professional Liability/Worker's Compensation. School shall ensure that all students maintain professional liability insurance coverage (either independently or as an additional insured on School's policy) at a minimum of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) in aggregate throughout the course of this Agreement. Further, School agrees to maintain professional and comprehensive general liability insurance at a minimum of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) in aggregate throughout the course of this Agreement. Further, School agrees to maintain professional and comprehensive general liability insurance at a minimum of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) in aggregate throughout the course of this Agreement. Further, School shall ensure that such policies provide for notification to Hospital at least thirty (30) days in advance of any material modification or cancellation of such coverage. School also agrees to maintain statutory Workers' Compensation coverage on any individuals characterized as employees of School and/or students working at Hospital pursuant to this Agreement at all times during the course of this Agreement. School shall provide certificates evidencing all coverage referred to in this section within thirty (30) days of execution of this Agreement and thereafter, on an annual basis except that, with respect to students, such evidence will be provided prior to the date when any new student commences participation in the Program(s).

2.10.2 <u>Health Insurance</u>. School shall ensure and provide proof that students are covered by a health insurance policy, either through School or an individual policy. Student is responsible for his or her own health insurance coverage, if not provided for by School.

2.11 <u>Accreditation</u>. School shall at all times during the course of this Agreement be licensed or qualified to offer the Program(s) to students.

2.12 <u>Student ID Badges</u>. For Hospital security purposes, the School will be billed/invoiced and required to pay to Hospital, the amount of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) for each and every Student ID Badge that is lost, stolen or not returned to the Security Office upon completion of the students designated learning period. School acknowledges the importance of the return of badges in a children's hospital and will use good faith efforts to require students to return all badges. The School will inform the students and faculty of this requirement before placement.

ARTICLE III RESPONSIBILITIES OF HOSPITAL

3.1 <u>Access</u>. Hospital shall permit nonexclusive access to the Program(s) to those students designated by School as eligible for participation in the Program(s) at Hospital provided such access does not unreasonably interfere with the regular activities at Hospital. Hospital agrees to provide qualified students with access to clinical areas and patient care opportunities as appropriate to the level of understanding and education of such students and as appropriate to the provision of quality care and privacy of Hospital patients.

3.2 <u>Implementation of Program(s)</u>. Hospital agrees to cooperate with and assist in the

planning and implementation of the Program(s) at Hospital for the benefit of students from School.

3.3 <u>Instruction</u>. Hospital shall instruct students in their training at Hospital with the supervision of a fully licensed professional, if applicable, relevant to the students' specific course of training. Additionally, Hospital shall provide orientation to students in the following areas: (i) patient confidentiality and HIPAA privacy and security; (ii) dress code; and (iii) applicable Hospital policies and procedures.

3.4 <u>Accreditation</u>. Hospital shall maintain Hospital so that it conforms to the requirements of the California Department of Health Care Services and The Joint Commission.

3.5 <u>Patient Care</u>. Pursuant to the California Code of Regulations ("CCR"), Title 22, Section 70713, School understands and agrees that Hospital, with its Medical Staff, retains professional and administrative responsibility for Services rendered to Hospital patients. Further, School shall ensure its students conduct their activities hereunder consistent with relevant law and regulation, the Medical Staff Bylaws, the Medical Staff Rules and Regulations, Hospital policy and procedures, Emergency Medical Treatment and Active Labor Act ("EMTALA"), Title 22, the standards and requirements under The Joint Commission, professional standards, Hospital philosophy, values and ethics. The parties understand and agree that this provision is intended to fulfill requirements of The Joint Commission and state law and is not intended to modify the independent contractor relationship nor indemnification requirements between the parties herein.

3.6 <u>Space and Storage</u>. At Hospital's discretion, it will provide students with classroom space within Hospital and an acceptable amount of storage space for School's instructional materials for use in the Program(s), subject to reasonable availability.

3.7 <u>Removal of Students</u>. Hospital shall have the absolute right to determine who will administer care to its patients. In the event that any student, in the sole discretion of Hospital, fails to perform satisfactorily, fails to follow Hospital policies, procedures and regulations, or fails to meet Hospital standards for health, safety, security, cooperation or ethical behavior, Hospital shall have the right to request that School withdraw the student from the Program(s). School shall comply with Hospital's request within five (5) days of receipt of notice from Hospital. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in the event of any emergency or if any student represents a threat to patient safety or personnel, Hospital may immediately exclude any student from Hospital until final resolution of the matter with School.

3.8 <u>Documentation</u>. Hospital agrees to make available to qualified students of School a copy of its policies and procedures, rules and regulations, and other relevant information in order that students obtain the benefit of such documentation and in order that students comply with such policies and rules. Such copy is available at Hospital's facility for review.

3.9 <u>Authority</u>. Hospital shall maintain at all times full authority over and responsibility for care of its patients and may intervene and/or redirect students when appropriate or necessary.

3.10 <u>Statement of Adequate Staffing</u>. Hospital acknowledges that it has adequate staffing and that students participating in the Program(s) shall not be substituted for nursing staff necessary for reasonable staffing coverage.

ARTICLE IV RELATIONSHIP OF THE PARTIES

4.1 <u>Term</u>. The term of this Agreement shall commence as of the Effective Date and shall continue for five (5) year(s) unless terminated sooner as provided herein.

4.2 <u>Termination</u>. Either party may terminate this Agreement with or without cause or penalty upon at least thirty (30) days prior written notice to the other party. To the extent reasonably possible, Hospital will attempt to limit its termination of this Agreement without cause so as to allow the completion of student training for the then current academic year by any student who, at the date of mailing of said notice by Hospital, was satisfactorily participating in the Program(s).

Relationship of Parties/Independent Contractor. In the performance of the 4.3 obligations under this Agreement, it is mutually understood and agreed that School is at all times acting and performing as an independent contractor. Nothing in this Agreement is intended nor shall be construed to create between Hospital and School an employer/employee relationship, a joint venture relationship, or a lease or landlord/tenant relationship. Students shall maintain the status of learners/students and neither this Agreement nor any acts pursuant to it shall be deemed to create an employment or agency relationship between Hospital and any student. Therefore, the parties understand and agree that Hospital is not responsible in any way, directly or indirectly, for any employment-related benefits for students. Such benefits not covered include but are not limited to, salaries, vacation time, sick leave, Workers' Compensation, and health benefits. The sole interest of Hospital is to assure that services to its patients are performed in a competent and satisfactory manner. No relationship of employer and employee is created by this Agreement, and neither School nor any student enrolled in School's Program(s), whether as a shareholder, partner, employee, independent contractor, subcontractor or otherwise, shall have any claim under this Agreement or otherwise against Hospital for vacation pay, sick leave, retirement benefits, Social Security, Workers' Compensation, disability or unemployment benefits. School shall indemnify and hold harmless Hospital from any and all liability for fees, compensation, wages and benefits of itself or its students, and from taxes on business income and other costs and expenses of an employer that Hospital would incur if, contrary to the parties' intention, School or its students are determined to be employees of Hospital.

4.4 <u>Role of Students</u>. It is not the intention of School or Hospital that any student occupies the position of third-party beneficiary of any obligations assumed by Hospital or School pursuant to this Agreement.

4.5 <u>Publicity</u>. Neither School nor Hospital shall cause to be published or disseminate any advertising materials, either printed or electronically transmitted, which identifies the other party or its facilities with respect to the Program(s) without the prior written consent of the other party.

4.6 <u>Records</u>. It is understood and agreed that any and all medical records, charts, and business records, other than student evaluation records and information (collectively "Records"), shall be and remain the property of Hospital.

ARTICLE V CONFIDENTIALITY

5.1 <u>Records</u>. All Records shall be treated as confidential.

5.2 <u>HIPAA and CMIA</u>. For purposes of this Agreement and patient confidentiality under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 and regulations promulgated thereunder ("HIPAA"), students shall be considered to be members of Hospital's "Workforce," as defined at 45 Code of Federal Regulations (C.F.R.) § 160.103. School shall provide students with information regarding confidentiality of patient information and all applicable regulations relating to HIPAA and the California Medical Information Act ("CMIA"). In the course of clinical training at Hospital, students will have access to Protected Health Information, as defined at 45 C.F.R. § 160.103, and shall be subject to Hospital's HIPAA and CMIA Privacy and Security policies and procedures. Students will be required to participate in training related to the HIPAA and CMIA Privacy and Security Rules and Hospital's HIPAA and CMIA Privacy and Security policies and procedures.

5.3 <u>Confidentiality Statement</u>. Students shall be required to sign Hospital's confidentiality agreement (copy of model agreement attached as **Exhibit D**). Subject to students' completion of Hospital's confidentiality agreement, Hospital shall provide students with the necessary access to its confidential patient medical records solely for purposes of obtaining the training contemplated by this Agreement.

ARTICLE VI INDEMNIFICATION

6.1 <u>Hospital's Obligations to School</u>. Hospital shall defend, indemnify and hold School, its officers, employees and agents harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense (including reasonable attorneys' fees), or claims for injury or damages to the extent arising out of the performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of Hospital, its officers, employees, or agents.

6.2 <u>School's Obligations to Hospital</u>. School shall defend, indemnify and hold Hospital, its officers, employees and agents harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense (including reasonable attorneys' fees), or claims for injury or damages to the extent arising out of the performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of School, its officers, employees, agents, or student(s).

ARTICLE VII GENERAL PROVISIONS

7.1 <u>Entire Agreement; Amendment</u>. This Agreement including the attachments and exhibits hereto contains the complete and full agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede all other agreements relative to the subject matter hereof by and between the parties. This Agreement may be amended but only by an instrument in writing signed by both parties to the Agreement. The parties agree to amend this Agreement to the extent reasonably necessary for Hospital or its affiliates to comply with its tax-exempt bond obligations and covenants, to maintain tax-exempt status, and to qualify for tax-exempt financing.

7.2 <u>Assignment</u>. School shall not subcontract, assign its rights or delegate its duties under this Agreement without the prior written consent of Hospital. This Agreement shall be binding on and inure to the benefit of successors and permitted assigns of each party.

7.3 <u>Compliance</u>. School acknowledges that Hospital's Corporate Responsibility Program ("CRP") applies to the Program and obligations described herein and that all policies and procedures relating to this CRP are available and should be reviewed by School and students of School who are training at Hospital. Hospital acknowledges that policies, procedures and handbooks are available for review by School and School's students by contacting the Compliance Officer at the Hospital. This CRP is intended to prevent compliance violations and to promote education related to fraud, abuse, false claims including but not limited to the Deficit Reduction Act provisions, excess private benefit, and inappropriate referrals. This CRP requires, and School hereby agrees, that any regulatory compliance concerns be promptly reported either to an appropriate Hospital manager or through the Hospital's Corporate Responsibility Hotline (877-388-8588). Further, School represents and warrants that students receiving training hereunder shall not at any time have been sanctioned by a health care regulatory agency and that any investigations of School shall be promptly reported to a Hospital manager or via the hotline (as above). Failure to abide by these compliance requirements shall give Hospital the right to terminate this Agreement immediately at its sole discretion.

7.4 <u>Access to Books and Records</u>. During the term of this Agreement and for a period of four (4) years after the termination hereof, School shall grant access to the following documents to the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services ("Secretary"), the U.S. Comptroller-General and their authorized representatives: this Agreement, and all books, documents and records necessary to verify the nature and costs of services provided hereunder. If School carries out the duties of this Agreement through a subcontract worth Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or more over a twelve (12) month period with a related organization, this subcontract shall also contain a clause permitting access by the Secretary, Comptroller-General and their authorized representatives to the related organization's books, documents and records.

7.5 Medicare/Medi-Cal Participation. School hereby represents and warrants that neither School, students, nor its principals (if applicable) are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or excluded from participation in any federally funded health care program, including Medicare and Medi-Cal. School hereby agrees to immediately notify Hospital of any threatened, proposed, or actual debarment, suspension or exclusion from any federally funded health care program, including Medicare and Medi-Cal. In the event that School or any student is debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible or excluded from participation in any federally funded health care program during the term of this Agreement, or if at any time after the Effective Date of this Agreement it is determined that School, and/or any student is in breach of this Section, this Agreement shall, as of the effective date of such action or breach, automatically terminate. School further understands that Hospital periodically checks contracted individuals and entities against the Office of Inspector General (OIG) and General Service Administration (GSA) databases of Excluded Individuals and Entities and will notify School if it discovers a match. Hospital will take reasonable measures to verify that the match is the same individual or entity before taking any action to terminate any underlying agreement(s).

7.6 <u>Governing Law</u>. This Agreement shall be governed by and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of California. Any action arising out of this Agreement shall be instituted and prosecuted only in a court of proper jurisdiction in Orange County, California.

7.7 <u>Non-Discrimination</u>. Neither party shall discriminate against any student on the basis of race, age, religion, sex, color, creed, national origin, handicap, disability or sexual preference, except to the extent permitted by law. In addition, the parties will fully comply with any and all applicable local, state and federal anti-discrimination regulations, statutes and judicial decisions that apply to the parties.

7.8 <u>Notices</u>. Any and all notices permitted or required by this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given (a) on the date personally delivered; (b) three (3) business days after being mailed by United States post, certified and return receipt requested; or (c) one business day after being sent by nationally recognized overnight courier, properly addressed as follows or such other address as may later be designated by the party:

7.9 <u>Severability</u>. The provisions of this Agreement shall be deemed severable and if any portion shall be held invalid, illegal or unenforceable for any reason, the remainder of this Agreement shall be effective and binding upon the parties.

7.10 <u>Waiver</u>. Any waiver of any terms, covenants and/or conditions hereof must be in writing and signed by the parties hereto. A waiver of any of the terms, covenants and/or conditions hereof shall not be construed as a waiver of any other terms, covenants and/or conditions hereof nor shall any waiver constitute a continuing waiver.

7.11 <u>Bond Covenants</u>. In the event legal counsel for Hospital advises that this Agreement or any practices which could be, or are, employed in exercising rights under this Agreement poses a material risk of violating any legal requirement related to Hospital's tax exempt status or tax exempt bond financing, the parties in good faith shall undertake to revise this Agreement to comply with such legal requirements. In the event the parties are unable to agree upon the revised terms within thirty (30) days thereafter, Hospital may terminate this Agreement immediately upon written notice to all parties hereto.

7.12 <u>Interruption of Training</u>. Each party shall be excused from any delay or failure in performance hereunder caused by reason of any occurrence or contingency beyond its reasonable control, including, but not limited to, acts of God, acts of war, fire, insurrection, labor disputes, riots, earthquakes, or other acts of nature. The obligations and rights of the party so excused shall be extended on a day-to-day basis for the time period equal to the period of such excusable interruption. In the event the interruption of a party's services continues for a period in excess of thirty (30) days, the other party shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon ten (10) days' prior written notice to the other party.

7.13 <u>Ambiguities</u>. Ambiguities, if any, in this Agreement shall be reasonably construed in accordance with all relevant circumstances including, without limitation, prevailing practices in the industry of the parties in the place where the contract is to be performed. Ambiguities, if any, shall not be construed against either party, irrespective of which party may be deemed to have authored this Agreement generally or the ambiguous provision specifically.

7.14 <u>Survival</u>. Section 2.10 (Insurance), Article 5 (Confidentiality), Article 6 (Indemnification), Section 7.6 (Governing Law), Section 7.8 (Notices), and 7.13 (Ambiguities) and this Section 7.14 shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

EDUCATIONAL AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

This Educational Affiliation Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into and effective as of <u>September 12, 2018</u> by and between <u>Rancho Santiago Community College District on behalf of Santa Ana College (</u>"School") and <u>MemorialCare, Orange Coast Medical Center</u>, a California - nonprofit public benefit corporation ("MemorialCare") (MemorialCare and School are sometimes individually referred to herein as a "party," and collectively as the "parties") with reference to the following:

RECITALS

- A. School is an institution of higher learning authorized by applicable law to offer health care program(s) for the instruction and training of students in one or more programs as identified in Exhibit A, (the "Programs"). Such Programs requires Program students ("Students") to obtain appropriate training and field experience in the community.
- B. MemorialCare owns and operates the following facility or facilities which MemorialCare and School mutually desire be used to furnish such field experience (each, a "Facility"): <u>MemorialCare, Orange Coast Medical Center</u>

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants, conditions and agreements hereinafter set forth below, the parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE I General Information

- 1.1 <u>Control</u>. Each Program is an educational program of School and not MemorialCare. School shall be, at all times, exclusively responsible for counseling, controlling, and disciplining Students.
- 1.2 <u>Times, Place and Subject Matter</u>. School and MemorialCare shall mutually set the times, place and subject matter for each Program that will be conducted at the Facility, and shall mutually agree upon the length of the Students' field experience at the Facility prior to the Students' arrival. The maximum number of Students who will be accepted at the Facility at any one time shall be determined by MemorialCare.
- 1.3 <u>Compensation</u>. Each Program shall be conducted without the payment of any consideration by School or MemorialCare to the other, or to any Student participating in a Program.

ARTICLE II Relationship of the Parties

2.1 <u>Term</u>. This Agreement shall be in effect for a period of (5) five years from the Effective Date, unless earlier terminated in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement.

- 2.2 <u>Termination</u>. This Agreement may be terminated by either party without cause upon no less than thirty (30) days prior written notice to the other party, except that any Student already accepted by MemorialCare and assigned to a Facility shall be allowed to complete any in-progress field experience assignment at the Facility, unless MemorialCare reasonably determines that continued participation of the Student at a Facility poses a material risk to effective patient care or the safety of any MemorialCare patient or employee. Notwithstanding the above, this Agreement shall immediately terminate if School's licenses, accreditations or certifications required for any Program are terminated, revoked, reduced or any type of disciplinary action is taken against School by any accreditation or regulatory agency.
- 2.3 <u>Independent Contractor</u>. The parties hereby acknowledge that they are independent contractors, and neither the School nor any of its agents, representatives, employees or Students shall be considered agents, representatives, or employees of MemorialCare. In no event shall this Agreement be construed as establishing a partnership or joint venture or similar relationship between the parties hereto. School shall be liable for its own debts, obligations, acts and omissions, including the payment of all required withholding, social security and other taxes or benefits. MemorialCare shall not assume any liability under any employment or worker's compensation law based on Students performing services, receiving education or traveling pursuant to this Agreement and no Student or Faculty shall look to MemorialCare for any salaries, insurance or other benefits pursuant to this Agreement. The provisions of this Section shall survive expiration or other termination of this Agreement.

ARTICLE III School's Responsibilities

- 3.1 <u>Academic Responsibility</u>. School shall develop all Program curriculum and shall be responsible for offering a health care education program eligible, if necessary, for accreditation and approval by any state agency. School shall be responsible at all times during the course of this Agreement for obtaining and maintaining all licenses, accreditation and certifications necessary for the Program. School shall provide MemorialCare with educational objectives for each Program for Students gaining field experience at the Facility under this Agreement prior to the start of each field experience rotation. School shall be responsible for Students' academic preparation. School shall ensure all Students have completed any required prerequisite didactic and clinical portions of the curriculum prior to their field experience at a Facility.
- 3.2 <u>Orientation</u>. Prior to any patient observation period or participation in any clinical experience, School shall require Students to receive training in HIPAA compliance and blood and body fluid standard precautions consistent with the Center for Disease Control guidelines, and fulfill any MemorialCare orientation requirements.
- 3.3 <u>MemorialCare Policies and Procedures</u>. School shall comply with all MemorialCare policies, procedures and rules relating to each Program. School also shall be responsible

for the general conduct of its Students and shall assure that Students and Program faculty ("Faculty") understand and comply with MemorialCare policies and procedures, as well any applicable state and federal laws, rules and regulations. School shall further assure that Students will conform to the rules and policies of the specific department to which they are assigned while participating in a Program at the Facility.

- 3.4 <u>Student Evaluations</u>. School shall appoint a Faculty member to coordinate each Program for School ("Program Coordinator") and shall provide MemorialCare with each Program Coordinator's name and contact information prior to the start of each field experience. Each Program Coordinator shall supervise all aspects of School's involvement in the Program, though Program Coordinator may or may not be on-site. School shall arrange for periodic conferences between the Program Coordinator and MemorialCare to evaluate the field experience provided under this Agreement.
- 3.5 <u>Student Information</u>. School shall provide MemorialCare with Student information as requested by MemorialCare at least two (2) weeks before a Student is scheduled to begin the field experience at a Facility.
- 3.6 <u>Background Check</u>. School agrees that each Student shall be required to submit to a complete background check as a condition of participation in a Program. At a minimum, the background check shall include the following: verification of identity; criminal background check in all counties of residence and employment for the last seven (7) years; and Office of Inspector General ("OIG") sanction trace. School shall provide a copy of the completed background check to MemorialCare prior to the commencement of each Student's field experience.
- 3.7 <u>Health Certification</u>. School shall assure that Students assigned to a Facility for a field experience meet MemorialCare standards of safety and health, and shall provide certification, upon request, that each Student has been immunized against the common communicable diseases. School shall maintain the health certification documentation of each Student for the time the Student is participating in a field experience at a Facility and for at least one (1) year beyond the date the Student completed the field experience at such Facility. School shall immediately notify MemorialCare, in writing, of any current or past Student in the Program who has, or had at the time of his or her field experience at a Facility, a medical condition that poses a health risk to patients, employees or invitees. If the Student until such time that he/she no longer poses a healththreat. School shall provide MemorialCare with a written medical clearance signed by the Student's treating physician prior to the Student returning to the Facility.
- 3.8 <u>Student Health Records</u>. School shall obtain authorization from the Student to allow disclosure of medical information to MemorialCare. School shall make all its health records pertaining to Student available for inspection by MemorialCare upon reasonable notice.

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- 3.9 <u>Standards</u>. School shall assure that Students and on-site Faculty (if any) understand and conform to the same standards as are set for MemorialCare employees in matters relating to the welfare of patients and general Facility operation. Students shall conduct their respective activities hereunder consistent with all applicable state and federal laws and regulations, MemorialCare policy and procedures, and The Joint Commission standards.
- 3.10 <u>Confidentiality</u>. School shall assure that Students and Faculty maintain the confidentiality of any and all patient and other information received in the course of, or arising from, the field experience and do not discuss, transmit, or narrate in any form any patient information of a personal nature, medical or otherwise except as a necessary part of a patient's treatment plan.
- 3.11 <u>Additional Student Responsibilities</u>. School shall assure that Students understand and comply with the following: (i) Students shall arrange and pay for all of their own expenses, including their transportation, support, maintenance, health care and living accommodations; (ii) Students shall report to the Facility on time, timely contact School and MemorialCare when they will be absent from the Facility when scheduled to be at the Facility; (iii) Students shall act in a professional manner and dress appropriately; (iv) Students shall assume responsibility for personal illness, necessary immunizations, tuberculin tests, chest x-rays, and annual health examinations; (v) Students shall reimburse MemorialCare for any emergency health care or first aid provided by the Facility; (vi) Students shall avoid infectious or communicable diseases and inform MemorialCare and School immediately if they have or might have been exposed to an infectious or communicable disease; and (vii) Students shall maintain adequate health care coverage.
- 3.12 <u>Removal of Students</u>. Upon the request of MemorialCare, School shall remove from the field experience any Student (a) who does not meet all requirements in this Article III applicable to Students, or (b) pursuant to MemorialCare's rights under Section 4.8

ARTICLE IV MemorialCare's Responsibilities

- 4.1 <u>MemorialCare Access</u>. MemorialCare shall accept from School the mutually agreed upon number of Students and shall permit said Students and on-site Faculty (if any) access to the Facility as MemorialCare determines is appropriate for the purposes of providing the field experience expected in each Program.
- 4.2 <u>MemorialCare Supervision</u>. MemorialCare shall ensure that activities assigned to Students while participating in the field experience at the Facility shall be supervised by a qualified MemorialCare employee.
- 4.3 <u>Orientation</u>. MemorialCare shall provide appropriate orientation and information regarding the policies and procedures of MemorialCare and the Facility to incoming Students and on-site Faculty (if any).

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- 4.4 <u>Student Evaluations</u>. MemorialCare shall designate a person who will coordinate the Students' experiences at the Facility ("MemorialCare Coordinator"). The MemorialCare Coordinator will provide evaluations to School of each Student's performance in a Program in a manner agreed upon by the parties.
- 4.5 <u>Student Health Care; Health Clearance Services</u>. MemorialCare shall assume no responsibility for providing or paying for Student's medical care or health clearance services. Notwithstanding the above, MemorialCare shall, within its capacity, provide Students necessary emergency health care or first aid for accidents occurring at the Facility. Student shall be responsible for paying the charges for such care.
- 4.6 <u>Adequate Staffing</u>. MemorialCare shall not decrease the number of staff or alter staffing patterns at the Facility due to the presence or absence of Students in assigned areas. MemorialCare shall assure that its staff is sufficient in number, quality and stability to ensure safe and continuous service to patients and families.
- 4.7 <u>Patient Care</u>. MemorialCare shall, at all times, retain professional and administrative responsibility for patient care and all services rendered at the Facility, pursuant to the California Code of Regulations, Title 22, Section 70713.
- 4.8 <u>Removal of Students</u>. MemorialCare shall have the right to suspend or terminate any Student from the field experience at the Facility if, in MemorialCare's sole judgment and discretion, Student fails to perform satisfactorily, fails to follow MemorialCare policies and procedures, or threatens the health, safety, or welfare of any patients, invitees, or employees at the Facility, or otherwise interferes with MemorialCare's ability to provide optimal patient care. An immediate suspension shall be imposed by MemorialCare on a temporary basis only until MemorialCare can confer with School and attempt to resolve the suspension, but the final decision regarding the Student's continued participation in the field experience at the Facility is vested in MemorialCare.

ARTICLE V Insurance

- 5.1 <u>School's Insurance</u>. School, at its sole expense, shall insure or self-insure its activities in connection with this Agreement by obtaining and maintaining in full force and effect during the term of the Agreement insurance or programs of self-insurance to cover School, Faculty and Students, as follows:
 - 5.1.1 Professional Liability insurance with one (1) or more approved insurance companies with limits of at least One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) each occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) annual aggregate. In the event that the professional liability policy is a claims made policy, School shall purchase a "tail" policy for a period not less than five (5) years following the effective termination date of the foregoing policy. Said "tail" policy shall have policy limits in an amount not less than the primary professional liability policy.

- 5.1.2 Comprehensive or Commercial Form General Liability insurance with limits of at least One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) annual aggregate with excess insurance coverage providing an additional Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000) per occurrence.
- 5.1.3 School shall provide MemorialCare with certificates of the insurance coverage required under this Agreement prior to the execution of this Agreement and at least annually thereafter. School shall provide at least thirty (30) days' written notice to MemorialCare of any substantial change to, or cancellation of, said insurance.
- 5.2 <u>MemorialCare's Insurance.</u> MemorialCare shall participate in the MemorialCare Health Services Self-Insurance Program to provide coverage against the perils of bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage and to cover such liabilities as are imposed by law and assumed under written contract, with limits of at least One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) each occurrence and Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) annual aggregate. MemorialCare shall, upon School's request, provide evidence of the foregoing coverage. MemorialCare shall provide at least thirty days written notice to School of any substantial change to, or cancellation of, said insurance.
- 5.3 <u>Worker's Compensation Insurance</u>. School shall procure and maintain Worker's Compensation insurance to cover its employees and agents while participating in a Program in compliance with the statutory requirements of California law. If Students are not covered under School's Workers Compensation insurance or a policy of student accident insurance, School shall assure that Students obtain a separate Worker's Compensation insurance policy or student accident insurance coverage at Student's sole expense.
- 5.4 <u>Survival of Obligations</u>. Obligations pursuant to Article V shall survive termination or expiration of this Agreement.

ARTICLE VI Indemnification

- 6.1 <u>Indemnity by School</u>. School agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless MemorialCare, its parents, subsidiaries, directors, officers, attorneys, agents and their employees from and against claims, losses, liabilities, expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees), judgments or settlements arising from injury to person or property, including death arising from any negligence on the part of School, its Faculty, agents or its employees in connection with or arising out of acts or omissions in services performed under this Agreement or any breach or default in performance of any of School's obligations hereunder.
- 6.2 <u>Indemnity by MemorialCare</u>. MemorialCare hereby agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless School, its Board of Trustees, employees, agents, officers, from and

against claims, losses, liabilities, expenses (including reasonable attorney's fees), judgments or settlements arising from injury to person or property, including death arising from any negligence on the part of MemorialCare, its parents, subsidiaries, directors, officers, agents and employees in connection with or arising out of the acts or omissions in services performed under this Agreement or any breach or default in performance of any of MemorialCare's obligations hereunder.

6.3 <u>Survival of Obligations</u>. Obligations pursuant to Article VI shall survive termination or expiration of this Agreement.

ARTICLE VII Compliance

- 7.1 <u>Applicable Laws</u>. Each party agrees to comply with all applicable state and federal laws, rules and regulations, as they now exist or may hereafter be amended or changed, in the performance or carrying out of its obligations under this Agreement.
- 7.2 <u>Health Care Program Exclusion</u>. School shall assure that all Students have not been excluded, currently or in the past, from participating in any federal or state health care program. School shall immediately remove any Student from the field experience if the Student is excluded from participating in any federal or state health care program.
- 7.3 Protected Health Information. For purposes of this Agreement, Students shall be considered "work force members," defined as individuals who are given access to MemorialCare's protected health information ("PHI"), which means any information whether oral or recorded in any form or medium, created or received by Students and: (i) that relates to the past, present or future physical or mental condition of the patient; the provision of health care to the patient; or the past present or future payment for the provision of health care to the patient; and (ii) that identifies the individual or with respect to which there is a reasonable basis to believe the information can be used to identify the patient and shall have the same meaning as the term "protected health information" in 45 C.F.R. §164.501. As members of the work force, Students will be required to participate in certain education and training related to security and protection of PHI. Both parties shall implement appropriate safeguards to prevent the use or disclosure of PHI other than as contemplated by this Agreement.

ARTICLE VIII General Provisions

- 8.5 <u>Partial Invalidity.</u> If any provision of this Agreement is prohibited by law or court decree of any jurisdiction, said prohibition shall not invalidate or affect the remaining provisions.
- 8.6 <u>Waiver of Breach</u>. No breach of any provision hereof can be waived unless in writing. The waiver of any one breach of any provision of this Agreement shall not be deemed a waiver of any other breach of either the same or any different provision.
- 8.7 <u>Binding Effect.</u> This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the parties hereto and their respective heirs, representatives, successors, and permitted assigns.
- 8.8 <u>No Third Party Beneficiaries.</u> It is not the intention of either party that any person or entity by a third party beneficiary of this Agreement.
- 8.9 <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in one (1) or more counterparts, including by facsimile, each of which shall be deemed an original but all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument.

STANDARD INTER-AGENCY INSTRUCTIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into this 10th day of September 2018, by and between the <u>Rancho Santiago Community College District, 2323 North Broadway, Santa Ana,</u> <u>California 92706</u> (District) and the <u>San Bernardino County Fire Training, 2824 East "W"</u> Street, San Bernardino, CA, 92408 (Agency).

RECITALS

WHEREAS, under Government Code Section 53060 and Education Code Section

78021, the Rancho Santiago Community College District desires to contract with Agency as an independent contractor to the District; and

WHEREAS, Agency has the personnel, expertise and equipment to provide the special services required herein, and

WHEREAS, the public's interest, convenience and general welfare will be served by this contract;

NOW THEREFORE, Agency and District agree as follows:

PROVISIONS OF THE AGREEMENT

A. AGENCY'S RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. <u>Services</u>. Agency's responsibility shall be to diligently furnish to

the District the services and materials as set forth in Attachment A, hereby incorporated in this Agreement by this reference.

2. <u>Student Attendance Records</u>. Records of student attendance and achievement will be maintained by Agency. Records will be open for review at all times by officials of the District and submitted on a schedule developed by the District.

3. <u>Non-Discrimination</u>. Agency agrees that it will not engage in unlawful discrimination of persons because of race, color, religious creed, national origin, ancestry, physical handicap, medical condition, marital status, or age, or sex of such person.

4. <u>Applicable Law</u>. Agency agrees to comply with all federal, state, and local laws, rules regulations, and ordinances that are now or may in the future become applicable to Agency, Agency's business, equipment, and personnel engaged in operations covered by this agreement or occurring out of the performance of such operations.

B. DISTRICT'S RESPONSIBILITIES

1. <u>Educational Program</u>. District is responsible for the educational program that will be conducted on site.

2. <u>Supervise and Control Instruction</u>. The instruction to be claimed for apportionment under this contract shall be under the immediate supervision and control of a District employee (Title 5, Section 58058) who has met the minimum qualifications for instruction in a vocational subject in a California community college.

3. <u>Instructor Who Is Not a District Employee - District's Responsibilities.</u> Where Agency's instructor is not a paid employee of the District, the District shall have a written agreement with each such instructor who is conducting instruction for which Full time Equivalency Students (FTES) are to be reported. The agreement shall state that the District has the primary right to control and direct the instructional activities of Agency's instructor.

4. <u>Qualifications of Instructors</u>. District shall list the minimum qualifications for instructors teaching these courses. Such qualifications shall be consistent with requirements specified by the District.

5. <u>District's Control of and Direction for Instructors</u>. District shall provide instructors with an orientation, instructors manual, course outlines, curriculum materials, testing and grading procedures, and any of the other necessary materials and services that it would provide to its hourly instructors on campus.

6. <u>Courses of Instruction</u>. These are specified in Attachment A to this Agreement. It is the District's responsibility to ensure that the course outline of records are approved by the District's curriculum committee pursuant to Title 5 course standards, and that the courses have been approved by the District's board of trustees.

C. FEE

District shall provide instructors with an orientation, instructors manual, course outlines, curriculum materials, testing and grading procedures, and any of the other necessary materials and services that it would provide to its hourly instructors on campus.

6. <u>Courses of Instruction</u>. These are specified in Attachment A to this Agreement. It is the District's responsibility to ensure that the course outline of records are approved by the District's curriculum committee pursuant to Title 5 course standards, and that the courses have been approved by the District's board of trustees.

7. <u>Different Section of Courses</u>. District shall have procedures to ensure that faculty teaching different sections of the same course teach in a manner consistent with the approved outline of record for that course. Such procedures apply to the faculty and courses that are the subject of this contract, and the students shall be held to a comparable level of rigor.

8. <u>Enrollment</u>. District will advise Agency of the enrollment period, student enrollment fees, the number of class hours sufficient to meet the stated performance objectives, policy regarding the supervision and evaluation of students, and the procedure applicable to the withdrawal of students prior to completion of a course or program.

9. <u>Obtaining Approval of Degree and Certificate Programs Is District's</u> <u>Responsibility</u>. It is required that degree and certificate programs have been approved by the State Chancellor's Office and courses that make up the programs must be part of the approved programs, or District must have received delegate authority to separately approve those courses locally. 10. <u>Classes Held Outside of District</u>. If the classes are to be located outside the boundaries of the District, the District must comply with the requirements of title 5, Sections 55230-55232, concerning approval by adjoining high school or community college districts and use of non-District facilities.

11. <u>Funding Source</u>. District shall certify that it does not receive full compensation for the direct education costs of the course from any public or private agency, individual, or group.

12. <u>Certification</u>. District is responsible for obtaining certification verifying that the instruction activity to be conducted will not be fully funded by other sources. (Title 5, Section 58051.5)

C. FEE

1. <u>Agency Fee and Expenses</u>. The fee to be paid by District for the services and materials to be supplied hereunder is: Three dollars and fifty cents (\$3.50) per student contact hour, not to exceed <u>22,500</u> student contract hours or <u>\$78,750.00</u> per fiscal year. Annual limits shall not be exceeded without the expressed permission from either the Dean of Human Services & Technology Division or the Associate Dean of Fire Technology.

2. <u>Invoices</u>. The Agency shall invoice the District at the conclusion of each course, supplying mutually acceptable documentation of student contact hours for each course.

3. <u>Tuition</u>. It is mutually agreed that Agency can choose to deduct tuition fees from the total dollar amount per student contact hour paid to Agency by District.

D. TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Facilities. Agency and District agree that the course shall be held at

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facilities that are clearly identified as being open to the general public. (Title 5, Section 58051.5)

2. <u>Open Enrollment</u>. District and Agency agree that enrollment in the course must be open to any person who has been admitted to the college and has met any applicable prerequisites. (Title 5, Sections 51006 and 59106) The District's policy on open enrollment is published in the college catalogue and schedule of classes (Title 5, Section 51006), along with a description of the course and information about whether the course is offered for credit and is transferable. (Title 5, Section 55005)

3. <u>Support Services for Students</u>. Both Agency and District shall ensure that ancillary and support services are provided for the students (e.g. Counseling and Guidance, and Placement Assistance).

4. <u>Indemnification</u>. All parties to this agreement shall agree to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the other party, its officers, agents, employees, and volunteers, from and against all loss, cost, and expense arising out of any liability or claim of liability, sustained or claimed to have been sustained, arising out of the activities, or the performance or nonperformance of obligations under this agreement, of the indemnifying party, or those of any of its officers, agents, employees, or volunteers. The provisions of this article do not apply to any damage or loss caused solely by the negligence or intentional acts of the non-indemnifying party or any of its agents or employees.

5. <u>Term</u>. This Agreement shall be in effect as of the date signed, and shall continue in effect for five years, unless sooner terminated by either party in accordance with this section in the manner set forth herein. Either party may cancel or terminate this Agreement without cause upon 30 days prior written notice given by either party.

6. <u>Termination for Cause</u>. The District may terminate this Agreement and be relieved of any consideration to Agency should Agency fail to perform the covenants herein at the time and in the manner provided. In the event of such termination, the District may proceed with the work in any manner deemed proper by the District. The cost to the District shall be deducted from any sum due the Agency under this Agreement, and the balance, if any, shall be paid by the Agency.

7. <u>Assignment</u>. This Agreement shall not be assigned by Agency either in whole or in part. Any such purported assignment voids this Agreement.

8. <u>Notices.</u> All notices required or permitted under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed delivered when delivered in person or deposited in the United States mail, postage prepaid, addressed as follows:

Time is of the essence for each of the provisions of this Agreement, and all the provisions of this Agreement, shall extend to and be binding upon the heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns of the respective parties hereto.

10. <u>Modifications</u>. No modifications or variations of the terms of this Agreement shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by the parties hereto, and no oral understanding or agreements not incorporated herein shall be binding on any of the parties hereto.

11. <u>Insurance</u>. Each Party to this Agreement shall insure or self-insure its activities in connection with this Agreement and obtain, keep in force and maintain during the term hereof insurance or self-insurance insuring against the peril of bodily injury, personal injury, property damage and including a contractual liability endorsement with a limit of liability at least one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and two million dollars (\$2,000,000) in the aggregate; California Workers' Compensation Insurance on their employees performing any services under this Agreement; and, such other insurance in such amounts which from time to time may be reasonably required by the mutual consent of the parties against other insurable risks relating to performance. Certificates of insurance, or other satisfactory documentation, evidencing that the insurance coverage specified herein is in full force and effect throughout the term of this Agreement may be requested by either party.

12. <u>Equal Employment Opportunity Clause.</u> The parties to this contract agree to promote equal employment opportunities through its policies and regulations. This means that both parties will not discriminate, nor tolerate discrimination, against any applicant or employee because of race, color, religion, gender, sexual orientations, national origin, age, disabled, or *SAC-17-059* veteran status. Additionally, the parties will provide an environment that is free from sexual harassment, as well as harassment and intimidation on account of an individual's race, color, religion, gender, sexual orientation, national origin, age, disability, or veteran status.

STANDARD INTER-AGENCY SERVICES AGREEMENT SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED BY AGENCY:

1. **Teaching Approved Curriculum:** All student contact hours submitted by the Agency to the District shall be part of a course of instruction that has either been approved by Santa Ana College's Curriculum and Instruction Council, or has been accepted as a topics course and approved by the College's Chief Instructional Officer.

2. **Instructor Qualifications:** All student contact hours submitted by the Agency to the District shall have been taught under the line of sight supervision of instructors who meet the District's minimum or equivalent qualifications for hiring as part-time Criminal Justice / Fire Technology Instructors. This expertise is furnished at the expense of the Agency. The services include the use of their specialized equipment, facilities, all handouts, and instructors with specific expertise.

3. **Non-overlap with other funding sources**: The above instructional hours are conducted as fulltime equivalent students (FTES) funded courses through the Criminal Justice Academies / Fire Technology Department at Santa Ana College.

4. **Enrollment of Students**: The District will supply current student enrollment forms to the Agency who will return properly completed enrollment forms to the District prior to beginning instruction.

5. **Instructional Activities**: The Administrators of Rancho Santiago Community College District and Agency (and/or their designees) will meet at mutually agreed intervals to plan, schedule and budget for instructional activities; the joint consent of the District and the Agency shall precede any instructional activity.

6. **List of Courses**: The District will make available to Agency all courses listed in the course catalog consistent with District Standards for curriculum adoption.

BACKGROUND

Renewed marketing efforts at Rancho Santiago Community College District (RSCCD) began in 2014, thanks to support from the RSCCD Board of Trustees in the form of one-time funds. SAC has since made a conscious effort to dedicate financial resources to continue college-wide marketing and advertising. The SAC Public Affairs Office, formed in March 2017, oversees the planning and implementation of these efforts.

ANALYSIS

In today's marketplace, current and prospective students have many options open to them. They may choose to return to the workforce, select one of the seven other community colleges in Orange County, or opt for a college in a nearby county. To remain competitive and top-of-mind, SAC is implementing a comprehensive and strategic advertising plan. Digital, print, and specialty advertising tactics are being implemented, but many digital advertisers require payment by credit card. At this time, RSCCD and SAC only have the ability to pay for media buys via check.

Twenty Fifth Hour Communications, in conjunction with their work through the RSCCD District Office, is able to execute the College's media buys at a discounted media placement fee of 8 percent.

The scope of work includes the following:

- Assistance with the advertising plan at no charge.
- Design of collateral materials
- Fall media spend
- GAP advertising spend (fall late-start classes)
- Intersession media spend
- Spring media spend
- Program marketing spend
- Specialized advertising opportunities media spend
- Implementation, tracking, and management of all media spends

This agreement shall support services for the 2018-19 academic year and end no later than June 30, 2018. The agreement is not to exceed \$90,000.00.

The project is funded by equity funds.

BACKGROUND

In October of 2017, the State legislature passed AB 637 to increase both access to and success in high-quality online courses. Through the Online Education Initiative (OEI) Consortium, students registered at their "home" college can enroll in online courses at a "teaching" college without the need for a formal application. This cross-enrollment will allow significantly more students to complete their educational goals in a timely manner. A study released by the State in April reported that students enrolled in OEI courses "achieved a success rate that was 4.9 percentage points higher than the statewide rate."

Following resolutions of support from their respective Academic Senates, Santa Ana College (SAC) and Santiago Canyon College (SCC) applied to join the OEI Consortium this past Spring. Both colleges were accepted along with 31 other community colleges, joining the 23 colleges that were part of the first cohort.

ANALYSIS

The OEI aligns with Guided Pathways to ensure that SAC students have an alternative means of completing coursework in a timely manner if the classes they need are not available. Improved completion rates directly benefit the District under the new funding model and the OEI provides SAC with the opportunity to increase enrollment by offering online courses to students at other colleges. Additionally, the OEI provides shared resources as well as subsidized services and technology to support the delivery of instruction and services, which benefits all students enrolled at SAC.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the California Virtual Campus – Online Education Initiative Consortium Master Agreement for California Community Colleges as presented.

Master Agreement for California Community Colleges

This California Virtual Campus - Online Education Initiative Consortium Master Agreement for California Community Colleges (hereafter "Agreement") is entered into by and between the Foothill-De Anza Community College District (hereafter "FHDA") representing the California Community Colleges California Virtual Campus - Online Education Initiative (hereafter "CVC-OEI") and Rancho Santiago Community College District on behalf of Santa Ana College (hereafter "Participating College" or "College") on the 11th day of September, 2018.

WHEREAS, The CVC-OEI is a collaborative effort among California Community Colleges (hereafter "CCC") to significantly increase opportunities for completion of student educational goals in California through access to high quality online courses and a comprehensive and collaborative online education ecosystem. The CVC-OEI is managed by FHDA through funding disbursed by the California Community College Chancellor's Office (hereafter "CCCCO");

WHEREAS, Through this Agreement, the CVC-OEI and Participating College agree to establish a program in the form of the CVC-OEI Consortium (hereafter "Consortium") as authorized by the CCCCO and Sections 66770, 66770.5, 66771, 66772, 66773, 66773.5, and 68101 of the California Education Code, the purpose of which is to implement a convenient online methodology to enable student cross-enrollment as authorized by AB 637;

WHEREAS, The Participating College agrees that, in its role as a member of the Consortium, it shall perform all of its duties, responsibilities and obligations as described in *Appendices A-D*, which are attached hereto and incorporated herein as part of this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, CVC-OEI agrees to provide management services for the Consortium and accordingly to provide College with the support and resources described in *Appendices A-D*.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE PARTIES HERETO AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

A. PURPOSE

The purpose of this Agreement is to define commitments, obligations, benefits, and responsibilities between the CVC-OEI and Participating College to collectively establish a Consortium of participating colleges supporting the online education ecosystem for the CCC. Furthermore, this Agreement including *Appendices A-D*, contains the entire agreement between the parties pertaining to the matters described herein, and supersedes any prior agreements (or MOU) covering these matters, verbal or written, in existence before the execution of this Agreement.

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B. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Participating Colleges will work with the CVC-OEI to support a fully operational California Virtual Campus Exchange (hereafter "CVC Exchange") in support of the Prime Agreement between the CCCCO and FHDA ("Prime Agreement"). The CVC Exchange aims to provide a seamless pathway for students to register for, and complete, online courses across participating colleges to support accelerated student completion of educational goals.

C. FUNDING

The CVC-OEI is managed by FHDA through funding disbursed by CCCCO as outlined in the Prime Agreement. The CVC-OEI receives ongoing annual funding, awarded in one-year increments, with renewal contingent upon submission of a satisfactory annual progress report, financial reporting, and overall performance as determined by the CCCCO. All of FHDA's and CVC-OEI's obligations stated herein including support services and activities are contingent upon available funding.

D. TERM

This Agreement shall become effective when signed by both parties and shall continue in effect from the date of execution until either party gives written notice of at least 30 days to terminate the Agreement; <u>or</u> until an event causing termination occurs; and/or until this Agreement is superseded.

E. MODIFICATIONS

To successfully accomplish the goals of the CVC Exchange, the Participating College and FHDA/CVC-OEI agree to collaborate in support of program goals and activities as stipulated in *Appendices A-D*. This Agreement including *Appendices* may be updated or modified by FHDA as needed to reflect needed programmatic adjustments or changes in availability of resources. Participating College will be provided with at least 60 days notice of such updates or amendments. Participating College's refusal to accept such updates or modifications shall be an event causing termination of this Agreement.

F. DISPUTE RESOLUTION.

Any dispute between the parties regarding their respective rights and obligations hereunder shall be to the extent reasonably possible resolved through compromise and/or non-binding mediation. To the extent reasonable and good faith discussions fail to resolve disputes, the parties agree to binding arbitration of such matters pursuant to California Code of Civil Procedure section 1280-1294.4, with the non-prevailing party responsible for the arbitrator's fee, but in all other respects with each side bearing its own costs and attorneys fees.

G. INSURANCE, INDEMNITY.

Each party will take all necessary steps to maintain customary insurance or authorized self-insurance coverages for its officers, employees and agents working on implementing this Agreement, including, without limitation, coverages for comprehensive general liability and errors and omissions. Failure to maintain such insurance or self-insurance shall be a breach of this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision herein, each party agrees to indemnify, hold harmless and defend the other (the "indemnitee") from and against any and all claims, suits, damages and injuries which were caused by the negligence, breach of contract or other culpable misconduct of the officers, employees or agents of the indemnitor arising from its activities hereunder.

The signatures below acknowledge that each party hereto has read and understands and agrees to the terms of this Agreement, in its entirety, including all Appendices, and is authorized to execute this Agreement on behalf of the named education entity.

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Appendix A Consortium Participation Requirements

Participating College commits to the following in order to effectively remain in good standing as a CVC-OEI Consortium Member:

1. General Provisions

- a. Commit and adhere to *Appendix A: Consortium Participation Requirements, Appendix B:* Support for Participating College, and Appendix C: Consortium Reciprocity Agreement.
- b. Utilize the Common Course Management System (CCMS), fully funded by the CVC-OEI, as the College's sole course management system.
- c. Commit to participating in the CVC Exchange as both Home and Teaching College (see *Appendix D* for definitions). Work with the CVC-OEI to continue to develop, test, and expand the CVC Exchange.
- d. Execute a separate California Community College Online Education Initiative (OEI) Consortium Federal Financial Aid Consortium as provided by CVC-OEI. The current agreement is located at http://ccconlineed.org/financialaidconsortium/.
- e. Provide local information technology support for implementation of technology integrations required to populate the CVC Exchange and to facilitate cross-enrollment. This includes working with CVC-OEI to provide secure access to data or systems necessary for the effective implementation of the CVC Exchange cross-enrollment processes as outlined in California Education Code.

2. Course Offerings

- a. Commit to achieving, within two (2) academic years, an initial target of aligning at least 20% of the College's existing annual online section inventory to the OEI Course Design Rubric using the CVC-OEI Peer Online Course Review process.
- b. These offerings shall, as pedagogically appropriate, incorporate CVC-OEI technologies and support services (or equivalents) as outlined in *Appendix B*: *Support for Participating College*, including:
 - 1) Course(s) must have been taught by the instructor submitting the course for review for at least one full term in the CCMS.
 - 2) Course(s) must have the appropriate C-ID, IGETC, CSU GE Breadth designation as specified by the CVC-OEI with the advisement of the Advisory Committee and the Consortium or fill other critical gaps as outlined by the CVC-OEI management team.

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- 3) Include access to Online Student Readiness (with diagnostic), online counseling, and online tutoring services.
- 4) Offer CVC-OEI subsidized online proctoring or an equivalent service if the course requires proctoring.
- 5) Participating College will ensure that courses submitted for review utilize technology and materials that comply with the accessibility requirements of Section 508 of the Federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as described in the CCC Information and Communication Technology and Instructional Material Accessibility Standard.
- c. College agrees, in cooperation with CVC-OEI, to provide training for College faculty in a localized Peer Online Course Review process utilizing the OEI Course Design Rubric or its equivalent.

3. Consortium Activities and Implementation Teams

- a. Establish a College Implementation Team comprised of the appropriate administrators, faculty, and staff, including a designated Project Leader who will serve as the representative and provide ongoing communication to the College. The Implementation Team must commit to meeting on a regular basis. CVC-OEI will provide the Participating College with a document suggesting a crosswalk for college functional roles of Implementation Team members.
- b. Actively participate in Consortium activities and meetings in accordance with the Consortium Charter.

4. Cessation

- a. College agrees that failure to make a good faith effort to prepare and provide the CVC Exchange with courses aligned to the OEI Course Design Rubric shall be an event which may cause termination of this Agreement and loss of benefits outlined in this Agreement and its attached Appendices.
- b. Parties agree that upon cessation of participation in the CVC-OEI Consortium, College is no longer eligible to receive Consortium-level, OEI-funded resources, as indicated in *Appendix B*. Parties agree that College shall continue to be eligible to receive resources otherwise provided to all CCCs that are not members of the CVC-OEI Consortium. CVC-OEI agrees to work with College to develop a reasonable timeframe for removal of funding for CVC-OEI Consortium- level resources. Such a timeframe developed by CVC-OEI shall not extend later than the end of the fiscal year in which the college ceases participation in the CVC-OEI Consortium.

Appendix B Support for Participating College

Participating College with a signed Agreement on file will receive free and/or subsidized access to designated CVC-OEI student support technologies and services during the timeframe of this Agreement. *Appendix B* will be updated no later than March 1 of each year, and may include resources such as, but not limited to, online student readiness, online counseling, online tutoring, and authentication tools. Free or subsidized access to technologies and services described in *Appendix B* is contingent upon College remaining in good standing through continued good faith efforts to fulfill requirements outlined in *Appendix A: Consortium Requirements*.

Parties may mutually agree to substitute or introduce additional resources, tools, or services based on usage, efficacy data, or operational considerations.

Parties agree that the CVC-OEI Management may determine that any particular resource, tool, or service indicated should be removed or replaced with a different solution with similar or expanded functionality.

Upon consultation with CVC-OEI, College may substitute a comparable resource or service upon mutual agreement.

2. Research and Data

In order to support efforts for closing the online achievement gap, the CVC-OEI may establish partnerships with various research organizations with a goal of gathering data to support program efficacy. As such, Consortium colleges may be invited to participate in selected research projects.

Participation may include but is not limited to allowing CVC-OEI affiliated researchers access to campus and/or district data, as needed, encouraging participation in CVC-OEI focus groups, surveys, as well as closed beta testing of select student support technology tools and data analytics projects. As required, CVC-OEI will facilitate agreements required to ensure compliance with data security and privacy requirements.

CVC-OEI agrees to provide Participating College with access to comprehensive reporting and data, as appropriate, to inform effective student success strategies for closing the online achievement gap as well as improve overall online student completion rates.

3. Additional Benefits

Participating College receives the following additional benefits based on active membership in the CVC-OEI Consortium:

- a. Support for Peer Online Course Review and course alignment with the OEI Course Design Rubric includes training, instructional design support, and accessibility assistance.
- b. Training and resources to support colleges in the development of local Peer Online Course Review activities and programs.
- c. Technical assistance provided as applicable, in conjunction with local technology support, for full implementation of technology integrations required to populate the CVC Exchange and to facilitate cross-enrollment.
- d. Participation in online and face-to-face meetings of the Consortium, as specified in the Consortium charter, with travel reimbursement as applicable.
- e. One complimentary registration per college to the annual Online Teaching Conference.

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Appendix C CVC-OEI Consortium Reciprocity Agreement

CVC Exchange Overview

The CVC Exchange will provide all California Community college students with access to search for online courses and programs via an intuitive course search optimizer and program finder. The program focus includes making cross-enrollment in online course sections available to California Community College students, with support for finding online degree and certificate program pathways, searching for available course sections, automation of cross-enrollment including registering for courses, and accessing online support services.

In keeping with the intent of AB 637 and California Education Code Chapter 9.7 Section 68101, the CVC Exchange will allow Consortium member students (those eligible to utilize online cross-enrollment) the added opportunity to register for online classes and programs offered at a consortium teaching college without having to submit a second CCCApply admission application.

To successfully accomplish the goals of the new CVC Exchange, the Participating College agrees to adhere to the following policies:

1. Online Cross-enrollment Application and Residency Considerations

- a. In order for consortium colleges students to benefit from online cross-enrollment, College will participate in electronically sharing all required student record data to include but not limited to: student application data from the participating Home College's Student Information System (SIS), registration data (e.g., prerequisite info, registration date), matriculation data, student transcript data, student final grade, and add/drop data from teaching college.
- b. With regards to residency determination, College will accept the determination of another community college district pursuant to California Education Code Chapter 9.7 Section 68101: *"Cross-Enrollment in Online Education between Campuses of the California Community Colleges."*
- c. Within the Consortium, the College where a student successfully completes matriculation and attempts to register for CVC Exchange courses shall be considered the student's Home College.

2. Online Cross-Enrollment and Course Registration Considerations

a. A student is qualified to participate in online cross-enrollment pursuant to California Education Code Chapter 9.7 Section 68101: "Cross-Enrollment in Online Education between Campuses of the California Community Colleges." if he or she is enrolled at a Home College that is part of the Online Education Initiative Consortium.

- b. A student shall acknowledge understanding that the CVC Exchange course is being offered by another college ("Teaching College") and agree to CVC Exchange policies/guidelines before the student can register for the online course.
- c. In order to utilize online cross-enrollment, a student must be enrolled in at least one (1) class at a participating Home College.
- d. A student may obtain access to register for a CVC Exchange course through the student's Home College registration system or the CVC registration portal at CVC.edu.
- e. The Teaching College shall accept the Home College designations of priority registration, which must be consistent with Title 5 Section 58108 registration and enrollment procedures. Therefore students choosing to utilize online cross-enrollment will receive registration dates and/or times based on their priority enrollment status at their Home College.
- f. The Home College shall be responsible for verification of matriculation completion (as defined by Title 5 and the Student Success and Support Program) for any student utilizing online crossenrollment.
- g. The Home College shall determine whether or not a student has met any identified prerequisites.
- h. A student will not be allowed to register for a CVC Exchange course if he/she has:
 - 1) Registered for another course with the same C-ID, IGETC, CSU GE equivalent articulation or during periods with overlapping start and end dates.
 - 2) Been determined by the Home College to fall into one of the following categories:
 - a) International F1 Visa
 - b) Address outside of California
 - c) Incarcerated
 - d) Vacation or Visitor Visas (B Visas)
 - e) AB540 with out of state addresses
 - f) High school dual enrollment
- i. If a seat is available and all other criteria are met, a student registering for a CVC Exchange course shall receive preliminary acknowledgment of successful registration and notification of next steps including fees to be paid and applicable institutional policy and regulations related to grading, enrollment, drop, and withdrawal.

- j. From a student's perspective, the Teaching College is responsible for providing information and responding to inquiries associated with its courses once the student is registered in that class. All other information and inquiries arising from participation in online cross-enrollment are the responsibility of the Home College.
- k. For students registering for CVC Exchange courses through online cross-enrollment, the Teaching College shall waive any non-essential campus-specific fees or provide the opportunity for students to opt out of local non-tuition related fees of the Teaching College.
 - 1) The Add/Drop/Withdrawal deadline for a CVC Exchange course is determined by the Teaching College offering the course.
 - 2) Attempted and completed CVC Exchange courses registered for via online crossenrollment will appear as transferred and articulated courses in the student's academic history at the Home College.
 - 3) Requirements for certificates and degrees to be awarded shall be determined by the Home College.
 - 4) Completed and attempted CVC Exchange course(s) utilizing online cross-enrollment will be reflected on the student transcript at the Teaching College within a timeframe deemed reasonable by the participating Teaching College. The Home College's student academic history shall also be updated within a timeframe deemed reasonable by the participating Home College.

3. Accessibility and Disabled Student Programs and Services Considerations

- a. The Teaching College and Home College Disabled Student Programs and Services ("DSPS") offices will collaborate to ensure that students utilizing online cross-enrollment will receive appropriate DSPS services.
- b. The Teaching College will accept the Home College's classification of DSPS pursuant to Title 5, Section 56006 if the student chooses to provide informed consent which will allow a Teaching College access to the student's Home College's DSPS classification determination.
- c. The Teaching College shall be responsible for notifying the course instructor regarding the necessary accommodations.
- d. The Home College will provide any qualified student with on-campus student support services, and accommodations as described in the required Academic Accommodations Plan (AAP) identified in Title 5 Section 56022.

e. The Teaching College will provide qualified in-class academic accommodation for CVC Exchange courses being taught by the Teaching College as described in the Academic Accommodations Plan (AAP).

4. Financial Aid Considerations

- a. All Consortium colleges will participate in a Federal Financial Aid Consortium Agreement. Under such agreement, the Home College shall be responsible for including CVC Exchange course units in its determination of financial aid, and for any associated processing and financial aid distributions. The Consortium member Home College reserves the right to exclude CVC Exchange course units from the determination of Financial Aid should there be a conflict with Title IV Federal requirements.
- b. To be considered eligible, students requesting the combining of units under the Federal Financial Aid Consortium Agreement must be enrolled in at least six (6) semester units or the equivalent quarter units at the participating Home College.
- c. The Teaching College shall honor the Home College's California Promise Grant (formerly Board of Governors Fee Waiver) eligibility determination. If loss of the California Promise Grant waiver occurs at the Home College or within the Home College's District, a separate determination of eligibility for the California Promise Grant will be made by the Teaching College.
- d. Teaching College agrees to a waiver or opt-out option of duplicate non-tuition fees such as health fee and other campus-based fees as fits local policy. With regards to non-tuition fees, the teaching college agrees to abide by the rules of the CVC Exchange in accordance with Education Code.
- e. Teaching College will share post-registration data regarding census attendance, number of enrolled units, withdrawals, drops, and grades to Home College in order to ensure that financial aid requirements are up to date.
- f. The Consortium Home College is responsible for reflecting students' CVC Exchange progress in the Satisfactory Academic Progress report (SAP).

5. Reconciliation

a. The CVC-OEI shall provide assistance to the Participating College to determine how and in what timeframe its local data is synchronized with the CVC Exchange and/or other associated databases.

- b. Collection of Teaching College CVC Exchange course enrollment fees and issuing any refunds is the responsibility of the Teaching College.
- c. Home College is responsible for any applicable student financial aid processing for the combined enrolled units.
- d. Home College shall be responsible for determining financial aid eligibility.
- e. Home College shall receive credit for degree completion and/or transfer attainment.
- f. Teaching College shall receive apportionment for CVC Exchange course enrollment.
- g. Third party (including student) claims shall be the responsibility of the District which employs the instructor, administrator, or other employee alleged to have caused the injury or loss.
- h. The initial implementation of the CVC Exchange may require some manual processes to perform reconciliations between colleges.

Appendix D Glossary of Terms

California Virtual Campus - Online Education Initiative (CVC-OEI):

The CCC initiative, funded by the CCC Chancellor's Office, that provides support to college online teaching and learning programs and coordinates online infrastructure, resources, and services available to the entire CCC system. Resources include the CCMS and other components such as student resources, faculty resources, other technology resources, and research and policy documentation.

CCMS (or Common Course Management System):

The CCMS is the common learning management platform provided by the CVC-OEI. At this time the CCMS is Canvas.

CVC Exchange (or Course Exchange):

The component of the CVC-OEI that facilitates students registering for online courses. This component of the CVC-OEI aims to reduce and/or eliminate barriers and duplication in the application and matriculation processes and automates associated business processes. The CVC Exchange is intended to facilitate the timely completion of educational goals that students establish at their Home Colleges by enabling students to enroll in courses critical to completing their educational goals, that are not readily available at their Home College.

CVC-OEI Consortium:

A consortium of California Community Colleges with a mission to expand the delivery of courses through technology pursuant to Schedule 26 and Provision 42 of Item 6870-101-0001 of Section 2.00 of the Budget Act of 2013 (Chapter 20 of the Statutes of 2013).

Home College:

The campus of the California Community Colleges at which a student is matriculated. Courses offered by a Teaching College are available to students from a Home College using cross-enrollment through the CVC Exchange.

Implementation Team:

The committee/workgroup at a Consortium College that will work together to deploy the components of the CVC-OEI program according to the Agreement and operational considerations.

Project Leader:

A designee or designees of the Participating College who chairs the College Implementation Team and serves as primary liaison between with the CVC-OEI. The Project Leader assists the CVC-OEI in communicating and coordinating the project efforts at the College.

Rubric-aligned Courses:

Online courses that have been submitted by Participating College faculty for peer review, instructional design and accessibility support. The course review assesses alignment with the OEI Course Design Rubric for design and accessibility. The CVC-OEI Chief Professional Development Officer oversees the review process and manages the standards impacting when courses are sufficiently aligned and can be badged accordingly.

Teaching College:

The campus of the California Community Colleges to which a student seeks access. Students from a Home College may use online cross-enrollment through the CVC Exchange to gain access to course(s) at a Teaching College.

Our Distance Education department will support faculty in Online Certification, Canvas training, OEI course advisement, instructional design and the OEI review process through preparation and support. DE will continue to require the OEI Course Design Rubric and usage of the Online Education Standards & Practices (OESP) required certification for SAC Online faculty. A course review is required using the rubric and this will be expanded to include a review of the entire course. The DE Advisory Group will work with faculty to review all courses using the course design rubric prior to OEI Consortium submittal.

Canvas Support for faculty and students will be provided by the Distance Education department, the 24/7 Canvas hot-line and our IT district support staff.

The Distance Education department at Santa Ana College supports all classroom and online faculty and students using the college Learning Management System, Canvas. The DE Faculty-Coordinator coordinates and supports all Online and OER Pathways, training of faculty and students and certification of online faculty.

What will your college uniquely bring to the OEI Consortium (i.e. specific types of courses, faculty expertise, etc.)

Santa Ana College currently has two Online Degree Pathways, Business Administration (AS-T) and Liberal Arts (AA) as well as OER/ZTC degree pathways in Business Administration, Liberal Arts and coming very soon, Physics. This semester, spring 2018, we are offering 198 fully online, 203 OER and ZTC sections. 65 online sections are offered OER/ZTC.

Online & OER offerings: Accounting, Economics, Business Law, Business Writing and Mathematics (Beg. Algebra, Algebra, Trigonometry, Calculus and Statistics) and a variety of general education. Some courses that may be different from others: Theatre, Engineering (CAD), Ethics, Sports and Society, Personal Fitness Training, Sport Psychology, Library Research Fundamentals.

Our faculty have experience teaching online as well as in use of OER materials for their courses. We also utilize our OER Librarian's expertise in locating OER/ZTC materials for entire course and supplementary material.

9. How will participating in the OEI Consortium benefit student access and program maintenance or growth at your college.

Current Semester Offerings: Santa Ana College students that are not able to take preferred courses during the semester or time-frame they like, will complete their degree/certificate faster through the OEI Consortium. Though many of our required online courses are offered every semester, some are not, causing a delay in student completion. These students would benefit with on-time completion through OEI offerings.

Enrollments for offering: Some departments are finding that increased course enrollment is necessary for sustained program maintenance. We are hopeful that the OEI Consortium will help to improve those course enrollments. Specifically, in the near-term, our Engineering, Digital Media Arts, Business Applications and Ethnic Studies departments have expressed interest. We expect with OEI Consortium participation that other disciplines will participate.

Our student population has shown high demand, with high online course enrollments and waitlists. Our working population of students, 69% part-time status, requires at minimum, a partial online course plan. We are looking to the OEI Consortium to assist our students in a timely completion and to offer courses for program sustenance. 10. Please provide any data relevant to your college's online achievement gap:

Comparison of Fall 2015 through Fall 2016, shows:

- *.5 1 % difference between lecture and online Success
- * < 1% difference between lecture and online Non-Success
- * Negligible difference between lecture and online non-completion

On average, there is a small difference between our lecture and online course success, non-success and completion rates. There are particular courses where we see more discrepancy and we are working with the faculty and departments to better understand and improve those particular courses.

Comparing online sections to lecture for Fall 2017: Asian students take 5.4% more online than classroom, Hispanic students 11.36% less, Caucasian students 10% more. Our online section students have a .17 higher GPA, and gender is relatively consistent. The average attempted units were 6.24 units less for online students.

11. One of the long-term goals of your college's participation in the Consortium in participation in the Course Exchange. If accepted into the Consortium, is your college prepared to:

Actively pursue a target of 10% of the college's existing online offerings listed and available to students in the Course Exchange within two semesters (or four quarters) of the college going live in the Course Exchange AND scheduling those online courses in a manner that allows students to access at least a portion of available seats via the Course Exchange (Note: Seats designated for the Course Exchange may also be accessed by local students in the event the locally designated cap is met).

Pursue a target of 20% of the college's existing online offerings listed and available to students in the Course Exchange after four semesters (eight quarters) of the college going live in the Course Exchange.

Identify faculty and courses to engage in the OEI Course Design Academy sufficient to meet the commitments listed above. An accelerated process for preparing courses will be available if the OEI Course Design Rubric is applied through a local college peer review process.

We are prepared to actively pursue the above targets and have begun to identify faculty and courses for the OEI Course Design Academy. We will have a local peer review process.

12. What programs and courses are currently impacted at your college and could benefit from increased access for students through the Course Exchange?

Courses toward our Business Administration Degree are currently our most impacted online courses. These include Accounting, Business Writing and Economics. Though there are multiple sections of these required course offered, we have a higher student demand than offerings.

Online offerings in areas in which we have a limited number would also benefit our students: Developmental English, Freshman Composition, Literature and Composition, Political Science, Modern Languages and Business Applications.

13. Which programs and courses have low online enrollments or cannot be offered every term, and would benefit from students enrolling at your college via the Course Exchange?

The following departments have courses that would benefit from OEI Course Exchange participation: Engineering, Digital Media Arts, Business Applications Ethnic Studies and Library Technology.

Student degree and certificate completion would benefit greatly from consistent online offerings while offering our "home" college students an increased array of general education coursework and discipline exposure.

BACKGROUND

The California Community College California Virtual Campus - Online Education Initiative (CVC-OEI) is a collaborative effort among California Community Colleges (CCCs) to significantly increase opportunities for more students to complete their educational goals by increasing both access to and success in high-quality online courses. The goal of the CVC-OEI Course Exchange is to streamline California Community College (CCC) students' completion of transfer degrees by giving them access to required courses online through other colleges when those courses are full or unavailable at their local campus.

ANALYSIS

As a participating college in the CVC-OEI, Santiago Canyon College students will be able to register for, and complete, online courses across participating colleges to support student completion of educational goals by participating in a fully operational California Campus Exchange (CVC Exchange) system.

California Virtual Campus - Online Education Initiative Consortium

Master Agreement for California Community Colleges

This California Virtual Campus - Online Education Initiative Consortium Master Agreement for California Community Colleges (hereafter "Agreement") is entered into by and between the Foothill-De Anza Community College District (hereafter "FHDA") representing the California Community Colleges California Virtual Campus - Online Education Initiative (hereafter "CVC-OEI") and Rancho Santiago Community College District on behalf of Santiago Canyon College (hereafter "Participating College" or "College") on the 11th day of September, 2018.

WHEREAS, The CVC-OEI is a collaborative effort among California Community Colleges (hereafter "CCC") to significantly increase opportunities for completion of student educational goals in California through access to high quality online courses and a comprehensive and collaborative online education ecosystem. The CVC-OEI is managed by FHDA through funding disbursed by the California Community College Chancellor's Office (hereafter "CCCO");

WHEREAS, Through this Agreement, the CVC-OEI and Participating College agree to establish a program in the form of the CVC-OEI Consortium (hereafter "Consortium") as authorized by the CCCCO and Sections 66770, 66770.5, 66771, 66772, 66773, 66773.5, and 68101 of the California Education Code, the purpose of which is to implement a convenient online methodology to enable student cross-enrollment as authorized by AB 637;

WHEREAS, The Participating College agrees that, in its role as a member of the Consortium, it shall perform all of its duties, responsibilities and obligations as described in *Appendices A-D*, which are attached hereto and incorporated herein as part of this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, CVC-OEI agrees to provide management services for the Consortium and accordingly to provide College with the support and resources described in *Appendices A-D*.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE PARTIES HERETO AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

A. PURPOSE

The purpose of this Agreement is to define commitments, obligations, benefits, and responsibilities between the CVC-OEI and Participating College to collectively establish a Consortium of participating colleges supporting the online education ecosystem for the CCC. Furthermore, this Agreement including *Appendices A-D*, contains the entire agreement between the parties pertaining to the matters described herein, and supersedes any prior agreements (or MOU) covering these matters, verbal or written, in existence before the execution of this Agreement.

B. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Participating Colleges will work with the CVC-OEI to support a fully operational California Virtual Campus Exchange (hereafter "CVC Exchange") in support of the Prime Agreement between the CCCCO and FHDA ("Prime Agreement"). The CVC Exchange aims to provide a seamless pathway for students to register for, and complete, online courses across participating colleges to support accelerated student completion of educational goals.

C. FUNDING

The CVC-OEI is managed by FHDA through funding disbursed by CCCCO as outlined in the Prime Agreement. The CVC-OEI receives ongoing annual funding, awarded in one-year increments, with renewal contingent upon submission of a satisfactory annual progress report, financial reporting, and overall performance as determined by the CCCCO. All of FHDA's and CVC-OEI's obligations stated herein including support services and activities are contingent upon available funding.

D. TERM

This Agreement shall become effective when signed by both parties and shall continue in effect from the date of execution until either party gives written notice of at least 30 days to terminate the Agreement; <u>or</u> until an event causing termination occurs; and/or until this Agreement is superseded.

E. MODIFICATIONS

To successfully accomplish the goals of the CVC Exchange, the Participating College and FHDA/CVC-OEI agree to collaborate in support of program goals and activities as stipulated in *Appendices A-D*. This Agreement including *Appendices* may be updated or modified by FHDA as needed to reflect needed programmatic adjustments or changes in availability of resources. Participating College will be provided with at least 60 days notice of such updates or amendments. Participating College's refusal to accept such updates or modifications shall be an event causing termination of this Agreement.

F. DISPUTE RESOLUTION.

Any dispute between the parties regarding their respective rights and obligations hereunder shall be to the extent reasonably possible resolved through compromise and/or non-binding mediation. To the extent reasonable and good faith discussions fail to resolve disputes, the parties agree to binding arbitration of such matters pursuant to California Code of Civil Procedure section 1280-1294.4, with the non-prevailing party responsible for the arbitrator's fee, but in all other respects with each side bearing its own costs and attorneys fees.

G. INSURANCE, INDEMNITY.

Each party will take all necessary steps to maintain customary insurance or authorized self-insurance coverages for its officers, employees and agents working on implementing this Agreement, including, without limitation, coverages for comprehensive general liability and errors and omissions. Failure to maintain such insurance or self-insurance shall be a breach of this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision herein, each party agrees to indemnify, hold harmless and defend the other (the "indemnitee") from and against any and all claims, suits, damages and injuries which were caused by the negligence, breach of contract or other culpable misconduct of the officers, employees or agents of the indemnitor arising from its activities hereunder.

The signatures below acknowledge that each party hereto has read and understands and agrees to the terms of this Agreement, in its entirety, including all Appendices, and is authorized to execute this Agreement on behalf of the named education entity.

Appendix A Consortium Participation Requirements

Participating College commits to the following in order to effectively remain in good standing as a CVC-OEI Consortium Member:

1. General Provisions

- a. Commit and adhere to *Appendix A: Consortium Participation Requirements, Appendix B:* Support for Participating College, and Appendix C: Consortium Reciprocity Agreement.
- b. Utilize the Common Course Management System (CCMS), fully funded by the CVC-OEI, as the College's sole course management system.
- c. Commit to participating in the CVC Exchange as both Home and Teaching College (see *Appendix D* for definitions). Work with the CVC-OEI to continue to develop, test, and expand the CVC Exchange.
- d. Execute a separate California Community College Online Education Initiative (OEI) Consortium Federal Financial Aid Consortium as provided by CVC-OEI. The current agreement is located at http://ccconlineed.org/financialaidconsortium/.
- e. Provide local information technology support for implementation of technology integrations required to populate the CVC Exchange and to facilitate cross-enrollment. This includes working with CVC-OEI to provide secure access to data or systems necessary for the effective implementation of the CVC Exchange cross-enrollment processes as outlined in California Education Code.

2. Course Offerings

- a. Commit to achieving, within two (2) academic years, an initial target of aligning at least 20% of the College's existing annual online section inventory to the OEI Course Design Rubric using the CVC-OEI Peer Online Course Review process.
- b. These offerings shall, as pedagogically appropriate, incorporate CVC-OEI technologies and support services (or equivalents) as outlined in *Appendix B*: *Support for Participating College*, including:
 - 1) Course(s) must have been taught by the instructor submitting the course for review for at least one full term in the CCMS.
 - 2) Course(s) must have the appropriate C-ID, IGETC, CSU GE Breadth designation as specified by the CVC-OEI with the advisement of the Advisory Committee and the Consortium or fill other critical gaps as outlined by the CVC-OEI management team.

- 3) Include access to Online Student Readiness (with diagnostic), online counseling, and online tutoring services.
- 4) Offer CVC-OEI subsidized online proctoring or an equivalent service if the course requires proctoring.
- 5) Participating College will ensure that courses submitted for review utilize technology and materials that comply with the accessibility requirements of Section 508 of the Federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as described in the CCC Information and Communication Technology and Instructional Material Accessibility Standard.
- c. College agrees, in cooperation with CVC-OEI, to provide training for College faculty in a localized Peer Online Course Review process utilizing the OEI Course Design Rubric or its equivalent.

3. Consortium Activities and Implementation Teams

- a. Establish a College Implementation Team comprised of the appropriate administrators, faculty, and staff, including a designated Project Leader who will serve as the representative and provide ongoing communication to the College. The Implementation Team must commit to meeting on a regular basis. CVC-OEI will provide the Participating College with a document suggesting a crosswalk for college functional roles of Implementation Team members.
- b. Actively participate in Consortium activities and meetings in accordance with the Consortium Charter.

4. Cessation

- a. College agrees that failure to make a good faith effort to prepare and provide the CVC Exchange with courses aligned to the OEI Course Design Rubric shall be an event which may cause termination of this Agreement and loss of benefits outlined in this Agreement and its attached Appendices.
- b. Parties agree that upon cessation of participation in the CVC-OEI Consortium, College is no longer eligible to receive Consortium-level, OEI-funded resources, as indicated in *Appendix B*. Parties agree that College shall continue to be eligible to receive resources otherwise provided to all CCCs that are not members of the CVC-OEI Consortium. CVC-OEI agrees to work with College to develop a reasonable timeframe for removal of funding for CVC-OEI Consortium- level resources. Such a timeframe developed by CVC-OEI shall not extend later than the end of the fiscal year in which the college ceases participation in the CVC-OEI Consortium.

Appendix B Support for Participating College

Participating College with a signed Agreement on file will receive free and/or subsidized access to designated CVC-OEI student support technologies and services during the timeframe of this Agreement. *Appendix B* will be updated no later than March 1 of each year, and may include resources such as, but not limited to, online student readiness, online counseling, online tutoring, and authentication tools. Free or subsidized access to technologies and services described in *Appendix B* is contingent upon College remaining in good standing through continued good faith efforts to fulfill requirements outlined in *Appendix A: Consortium Requirements*.

CVC-OEI Consortium Master Agreement for California Community Colleges

Parties may mutually agree to substitute or introduce additional resources, tools, or services based on usage, efficacy data, or operational considerations.

Parties agree that the CVC-OEI Management may determine that any particular resource, tool, or service indicated should be removed or replaced with a different solution with similar or expanded functionality.

Upon consultation with CVC-OEI, College may substitute a comparable resource or service upon mutual agreement.

2. Research and Data

In order to support efforts for closing the online achievement gap, the CVC-OEI may establish partnerships with various research organizations with a goal of gathering data to support program efficacy. As such, Consortium colleges may be invited to participate in selected research projects.

Participation may include but is not limited to allowing CVC-OEI affiliated researchers access to campus and/or district data, as needed, encouraging participation in CVC-OEI focus groups, surveys, as well as closed beta testing of select student support technology tools and data analytics projects. As required, CVC-OEI will facilitate agreements required to ensure compliance with data security and privacy requirements.

CVC-OEI agrees to provide Participating College with access to comprehensive reporting and data, as appropriate, to inform effective student success strategies for closing the online achievement gap as well as improve overall online student completion rates.

3. Additional Benefits

Participating College receives the following additional benefits based on active membership in the CVC-OEI Consortium:

- a. Support for Peer Online Course Review and course alignment with the OEI Course Design Rubric includes training, instructional design support, and accessibility assistance.
- b. Training and resources to support colleges in the development of local Peer Online Course Review activities and programs.
- c. Technical assistance provided as applicable, in conjunction with local technology support, for full implementation of technology integrations required to populate the CVC Exchange and to facilitate cross-enrollment.
- d. Participation in online and face-to-face meetings of the Consortium, as specified in the Consortium charter, with travel reimbursement as applicable.
- e. One complimentary registration per college to the annual Online Teaching Conference.

Appendix C CVC-OEI Consortium Reciprocity Agreement

CVC Exchange Overview

The CVC Exchange will provide all California Community college students with access to search for online courses and programs via an intuitive course search optimizer and program finder. The program focus includes making cross-enrollment in online course sections available to California Community College students, with support for finding online degree and certificate program pathways, searching for available course sections, automation of cross-enrollment including registering for courses, and accessing online support services.

In keeping with the intent of AB 637 and California Education Code Chapter 9.7 Section 68101, the CVC Exchange will allow Consortium member students (those eligible to utilize online cross-enrollment) the added opportunity to register for online classes and programs offered at a consortium teaching college without having to submit a second CCCApply admission application.

To successfully accomplish the goals of the new CVC Exchange, the Participating College agrees to adhere to the following policies:

1. Online Cross-enrollment Application and Residency Considerations

- a. In order for consortium colleges students to benefit from online cross-enrollment, College will participate in electronically sharing all required student record data to include but not limited to: student application data from the participating Home College's Student Information System (SIS), registration data (e.g., prerequisite info, registration date), matriculation data, student transcript data, student final grade, and add/drop data from teaching college.
- b. With regards to residency determination, College will accept the determination of another community college district pursuant to California Education Code Chapter 9.7 Section 68101: "Cross-Enrollment in Online Education between Campuses of the California Community Colleges."
- c. Within the Consortium, the College where a student successfully completes matriculation and attempts to register for CVC Exchange courses shall be considered the student's Home College.

2. Online Cross-Enrollment and Course Registration Considerations

a. A student is qualified to participate in online cross-enrollment pursuant to California Education Code Chapter 9.7 Section 68101: "Cross-Enrollment in Online Education between Campuses of the California Community Colleges." if he or she is enrolled at a Home College that is part of the Online Education Initiative Consortium.

- b. A student shall acknowledge understanding that the CVC Exchange course is being offered by another college ("Teaching College") and agree to CVC Exchange policies/guidelines before the student can register for the online course.
- c. In order to utilize online cross-enrollment, a student must be enrolled in at least one (1) class at a participating Home College.
- d. A student may obtain access to register for a CVC Exchange course through the student's Home College registration system or the CVC registration portal at CVC.edu.
- e. The Teaching College shall accept the Home College designations of priority registration, which must be consistent with Title 5 Section 58108 registration and enrollment procedures. Therefore students choosing to utilize online cross-enrollment will receive registration dates and/or times based on their priority enrollment status at their Home College.
- f. The Home College shall be responsible for verification of matriculation completion (as defined by Title 5 and the Student Success and Support Program) for any student utilizing online crossenrollment.
- g. The Home College shall determine whether or not a student has met any identified prerequisites.
- h. A student will not be allowed to register for a CVC Exchange course if he/she has:
 - 1) Registered for another course with the same C-ID, IGETC, CSU GE equivalent articulation or during periods with overlapping start and end dates.
 - 2) Been determined by the Home College to fall into one of the following categories:
 - a) International F1 Visa
 - b) Address outside of California
 - c) Incarcerated
 - d) Vacation or Visitor Visas (B Visas)
 - e) AB540 with out of state addresses
 - f) High school dual enrollment
- i. If a seat is available and all other criteria are met, a student registering for a CVC Exchange course shall receive preliminary acknowledgment of successful registration and notification of next steps including fees to be paid and applicable institutional policy and regulations related to grading, enrollment, drop, and withdrawal.

- j. From a student's perspective, the Teaching College is responsible for providing information and responding to inquiries associated with its courses once the student is registered in that class. All other information and inquiries arising from participation in online cross-enrollment are the responsibility of the Home College.
- k. For students registering for CVC Exchange courses through online cross-enrollment, the Teaching College shall waive any non-essential campus-specific fees or provide the opportunity for students to opt out of local non-tuition related fees of the Teaching College.
 - 1) The Add/Drop/Withdrawal deadline for a CVC Exchange course is determined by the Teaching College offering the course.
 - 2) Attempted and completed CVC Exchange courses registered for via online crossenrollment will appear as transferred and articulated courses in the student's academic history at the Home College.
 - 3) Requirements for certificates and degrees to be awarded shall be determined by the Home College.
 - 4) Completed and attempted CVC Exchange course(s) utilizing online cross-enrollment will be reflected on the student transcript at the Teaching College within a timeframe deemed reasonable by the participating Teaching College. The Home College's student academic history shall also be updated within a timeframe deemed reasonable by the participating Home College.

3. Accessibility and Disabled Student Programs and Services Considerations

- a. The Teaching College and Home College Disabled Student Programs and Services ("DSPS") offices will collaborate to ensure that students utilizing online cross-enrollment will receive appropriate DSPS services.
- b. The Teaching College will accept the Home College's classification of DSPS pursuant to Title 5, Section 56006 if the student chooses to provide informed consent which will allow a Teaching College access to the student's Home College's DSPS classification determination.
- c. The Teaching College shall be responsible for notifying the course instructor regarding the necessary accommodations.
- d. The Home College will provide any qualified student with on-campus student support services, and accommodations as described in the required Academic Accommodations Plan (AAP) identified in Title 5 Section 56022.

e. The Teaching College will provide qualified in-class academic accommodation for CVC Exchange courses being taught by the Teaching College as described in the Academic Accommodations Plan (AAP).

4. Financial Aid Considerations

- a. All Consortium colleges will participate in a Federal Financial Aid Consortium Agreement. Under such agreement, the Home College shall be responsible for including CVC Exchange course units in its determination of financial aid, and for any associated processing and financial aid distributions. The Consortium member Home College reserves the right to exclude CVC Exchange course units from the determination of Financial Aid should there be a conflict with Title IV Federal requirements.
- b. To be considered eligible, students requesting the combining of units under the Federal Financial Aid Consortium Agreement must be enrolled in at least six (6) semester units or the equivalent quarter units at the participating Home College.
- c. The Teaching College shall honor the Home College's California Promise Grant (formerly Board of Governors Fee Waiver) eligibility determination. If loss of the California Promise Grant waiver occurs at the Home College or within the Home College's District, a separate determination of eligibility for the California Promise Grant will be made by the Teaching College.
- d. Teaching College agrees to a waiver or opt-out option of duplicate non-tuition fees such as health fee and other campus-based fees as fits local policy. With regards to non-tuition fees, the teaching college agrees to abide by the rules of the CVC Exchange in accordance with Education Code.
- e. Teaching College will share post-registration data regarding census attendance, number of enrolled units, withdrawals, drops, and grades to Home College in order to ensure that financial aid requirements are up to date.
- f. The Consortium Home College is responsible for reflecting students' CVC Exchange progress in the Satisfactory Academic Progress report (SAP).

5. Reconciliation

a. The CVC-OEI shall provide assistance to the Participating College to determine how and in what timeframe its local data is synchronized with the CVC Exchange and/or other associated databases.

- b. Collection of Teaching College CVC Exchange course enrollment fees and issuing any refunds is the responsibility of the Teaching College.
- c. Home College is responsible for any applicable student financial aid processing for the combined enrolled units.
- d. Home College shall be responsible for determining financial aid eligibility.
- e. Home College shall receive credit for degree completion and/or transfer attainment.
- f. Teaching College shall receive apportionment for CVC Exchange course enrollment.
- g. Third party (including student) claims shall be the responsibility of the District which employs the instructor, administrator, or other employee alleged to have caused the injury or loss.
- h. The initial implementation of the CVC Exchange may require some manual processes to perform reconciliations between colleges.

Appendix D Glossary of Terms

California Virtual Campus - Online Education Initiative (CVC-OEI):

The CCC initiative, funded by the CCC Chancellor's Office, that provides support to college online teaching and learning programs and coordinates online infrastructure, resources, and services available to the entire CCC system. Resources include the CCMS and other components such as student resources, faculty resources, other technology resources, and research and policy documentation.

CCMS (or Common Course Management System):

The CCMS is the common learning management platform provided by the CVC-OEI. At this time the CCMS is Canvas.

CVC Exchange (or Course Exchange):

The component of the CVC-OEI that facilitates students registering for online courses. This component of the CVC-OEI aims to reduce and/or eliminate barriers and duplication in the application and matriculation processes and automates associated business processes. The CVC Exchange is intended to facilitate the timely completion of educational goals that students establish at their Home Colleges by enabling students to enroll in courses critical to completing their educational goals, that are not readily available at their Home College.

CVC-OEI Consortium:

A consortium of California Community Colleges with a mission to expand the delivery of courses through technology pursuant to Schedule 26 and Provision 42 of Item 6870-101-0001 of Section 2.00 of the Budget Act of 2013 (Chapter 20 of the Statutes of 2013).

Home College:

The campus of the California Community Colleges at which a student is matriculated. Courses offered by a Teaching College are available to students from a Home College using cross-enrollment through the CVC Exchange.

Implementation Team:

The committee/workgroup at a Consortium College that will work together to deploy the components of the CVC-OEI program according to the Agreement and operational considerations.

Project Leader:

A designee or designees of the Participating College who chairs the College Implementation Team and serves as primary liaison between with the CVC-OEI. The Project Leader assists the CVC-OEI in communicating and coordinating the project efforts at the College.

Rubric-aligned Courses:

Online courses that have been submitted by Participating College faculty for peer review, instructional design and accessibility support. The course review assesses alignment with the OEI Course Design Rubric for design and accessibility. The CVC-OEI Chief Professional Development Officer oversees the review process and manages the standards impacting when courses are sufficiently aligned and can be badged accordingly.

Teaching College:

The campus of the California Community Colleges to which a student seeks access. Students from a Home College may use online cross-enrollment through the CVC Exchange to gain access to course(s) at a Teaching College.

BACKGROUND

Attached is a list of students who successfully completed coursework at Santa Ana College leading to an associate in arts degree, associate in arts for transfer degree, associate in science degree, associate in science for transfer degree, certificate of achievement, and/or certificate of proficiency for Intersession and Spring 2018. Also attached are the statistical tables showing degrees and certificates awarded by major.

ANALYSIS

Santa Ana College awarded 1,793 Associate Degrees at the conclusion of the Spring 2018 session, 1,039 Associate in Arts, 232 Associate in Arts Transfer, 297 Associate in Science and 225 Associate in Science for Transfer. The area that showed the largest increase is Associate in Arts, which grew from 873 degrees in Spring 2017 to 1,039 awarded in Spring 2018.

Santa Ana College implemented Certificate Track to automatically award students who earned Certificates of Achievement and Proficiency. In Fall 2017, a new certificate of proficiency was introduced which was processed during the 2018 Intersession that resulted in an additional 3,384 awards. As a continued result of our auto-awarding process, Santa Ana College awarded 1,395 Certificates of Achievement/Proficiency at the conclusion of the Spring 2017 session and 1,261 in Spring 2018 respectively.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees confirm the list of recipients of Santa Ana College Associate Degrees and Certificates awarded in Intersession and Spring 2018 as presented.

# BACKGROUND

Students in Chapman University's Athletic Training Programs are required to gain practical field experience and to apply the knowledge and skills learned in college classes. This experience will be gained by working in the SCC Athletic Training Room as well as attending athletic practices and events. This ADDENDUM TO AFFILIATED SITE AGREEMENT (this "Addendum") is made and entered into on September 10, 2018 ("Effective Date"), by and between Chapman University, a California non- profit public benefit corporation ("University"), and Santiago Canyon College ("Affiliated Site") (each, a "Party" and, collectively, the "Parties"), to renew that certain Affiliated Site Agreement entered into by the Parties on June 2, 2014 (the "Agreement").

## **Recitals**

**WHEREAS**, the Parties entered into the Agreement, whereby Affiliated Site agreed to cooperate in the development, implementation, and evaluation of an athletic training student clinical program in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Agreement;

WHEREAS, the Parties now desire to renew the Agreement on identical terms.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties hereto agree as follows:

## **Agreement**

Pursuant to Section I(A) of the Agreement, the Parties hereby mutually agree to renew the Agreement for an additional one (1) year period, commencing on September 10, 2018 and ending on and including July 31, 2019, on the same terms and conditions agreed to upon execution of the Agreement.

## **General Provisions**

1. All other terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain unchanged, and except as expressly modified by this Addendum, the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

2. This Addendum may be executed by the parties in counterparts, each of which shall constitute one and the same instrument. Further, the parties may execute this Addendum via fax or electronic mail transmission. ## CHAPMAN UNIVERSITY ATHLETIC TRAINING EDUCATION PROGRAM

## AFFILIATED SITE AGREEMENT

This AGREEMENT is made and entered into this June 2, 2014 between CHAPMAN UNIVERSITY, hereafter referred to as the "UNIVERSITY", and RANCHO SANTIAGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT and their participating schools at SANTA ANA COLLEGE and SANTIAGO CANYON COLLEGE, hereafter referred to as the "AFFILIATED SITE".

### WHEREAS:

The UNIVERSITY has an undergraduate major in Athletic Training which awards a Bachelor of Science degree in Athletic Training that is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Athletic Training Education (CAATE) and the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. Starting in summer 2015, the UNIVERSITY will also have a graduate program in Athletic Training that awards a Master of Science degree in Athletic Training, and:

Clinical experience is required as an integral component of the athletic training curriculum and professional preparation, and;

The UNIVERSITY desires the cooperation of the AFFILIATED SITE and its staff in the development, implementation and evaluation of the athletic training student clinical experience and professional preparation and;

The AFFILIATED SITE will benefit from the professional services provided by the athletic training students of UNIVERSITY, and;

The parties have found it to be in the public interest for the AFFILIATED SITE to join the UNIVERSITY in satisfying the curriculum requirements and professional preparation of athletic training students.

NOW, THEREFORE, UNIVERSITY and AFFILIATED SITE agree to the following terms and conditions for the establishment and operation of a clinical education program.

I. THE PARTIES MUTUALLY AGREE:

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- A. This AGREEMENT shall continue in force, effect from June 2. 2014, to and including <u>May 31, 2018</u>. This AGREEMENT may be renewed for a one-year period by mutual consent of both parties. This AGREEMENT may be terminated by either party with or without cause upon ninety (90) days written notice, provided that (subject to the other terms of this AGREEMENT) all students currently enrolled in the Program at the AFFILIATED SITE at the time of notice of termination shall be given the opportunity to complete the program at the AFFILIATED SITE.
- B. The parties shall follow the cognitive and psychomotor competencies and clinical proficiencies specified by CAATE for the clinical education experience, utilize methods for their implementation and continually evaluate the effectiveness of the clinical experience in meeting the didactic and clinical delivery of the curriculum for athletic training students.
- C. The AFFILIATED SITE Certified Athletic Trainer (ATC) must be recognized as a Preceptor defined by the CAATE and Chapman University Athletic Training Education Program (CUATEP). This recognition includes the participation of the AFFILIATED SITE Certified Athletic Trainer in a five-hour Preceptor education workshop delivered by the CUATEP Program Director and/or Clinical Education Coordinator, both of whom are Preceptor Educators.
- D. The AFFILIATED SITE health-care provider (e.g., Physician, Physician Assistant, Nurse, Physical Therapist, etc.) who is not a certified athletic trainer must be recognized as a Preceptor defined by the CAATE and Chapman University Athletic Training Education Program CUATEP.
- E. The period for each athletic training student's clinical experience shall be mutually agreed upon prior to beginning the clinical education program.
- F. The number of students able to participate in the AFFILIATED SITE'S clinical education program will be mutually determined by agreement of the parties and may be altered by mutual agreement, with due consideration given to the clinical space available, not to exceed the standard 5 (five) athletic training students to 1 (one) Preceptor ratio.
- G. The Affiliated Site Preceptor *may be* eligible for pay or remuneration for participation in this program beyond the 5.0 Continuing Education Units from the Board of Certification (BOC), Inc. for attending the CUATEP Preceptor education workshop. Criteria for pay or remuneration are as follows:
  - Instructing and supervising one or more Athletic Training Student(s) (ATS) at the Affiliated Site during the semester;
  - Providing written evaluation of ATS(s) performance at the midterm and final week during the semester;

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- Positive written evaluation comments by the ATS(s) of the Affiliated Site and Preceptor
- Standard stipend remuneration will be:

1. \$50 per student up to a maximum of \$250 per semester Stipends will be processed during each semester of the academic year

- H. AFFILIATED SITE may request UNIVERSITY to withdraw from AFFILIATED SITE'S clinical experience program any student who AFFILIATED SITE determines is not performing satisfactorily, or who refuses to follow AFFILIATED SITE'S administrative and patient care policies, procedures, rules and regulations. Such request shall be in writing and must include a statement of reason(s) why AFFILIATED SITE desires to have the student withdrawn. UNIVERSITY may withdraw a student from the clinical program at any time, upon written notice to the AFFILIATED SITE.
- I. Neither party shall discriminate in the assignment of athletic training students based on race, color, disability, sex, religion, national origin, sexual orientation, ancestry, or any other basis prohibited by law.
- J. The UNIVERSITY agrees to indemnify, hold harmless, and defend the AFFILIATED SITE, its agents, and employees from and against all loss or expense (including costs and attorney fees) resulting from liability imposed by law upon the AFFILIATED SITE because of bodily injury to or death of any person or on account of damages to property, including loss of use thereof, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement and due or claimed to be due to the negligence of the UNIVERSITY, its trustees, agents, employees, or students.
- K. The AFFILIATED SITE agrees to indemnify, hold harmless, and at the UNIVERSITY'S request, defend the UNIVERSITY, its trustees, agents and employees from and against all loss or expenses (including costs and attorney fees) resulting from liability imposed by law upon the UNIVERSITY because of bodily injury to or death of any person or on account of damages to property, including loss of use thereof, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement, and due or claimed to be due to the negligence of the AFFILIATED SITE, its agents, or employees.
- L. The parties agree that the athletic training students are fulfilling specific requirements for the field experiences as part of a degree requirement and, therefore, regardless of the nature or extent of the acts performed by them, the students are not to be considered employees or agents of either the UNIVERSITY or the AFFILIATED SITE for any purpose including Workers' Compensation or employee benefit programs, and the students shall not be entitled to any monetary remuneration for services performed by them in the course of their training.
- M. Notices required or permitted to be provided under this AGREEMENT shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given if mailed first class as follows:

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- H. Upon reasonable request, to permit UNIVERSITY and/or appropriate agencies charged with the responsibility of accrediting or approving the athletic training education program to inspect the clinical facilities, services available for clinical experience, student records and other materials pertaining to the clinical education program.
- I. To evaluate the performance of the athletic training student on a regular basis using the evaluation form provided by CUATEP at the midterm and end of semester. UNIVERSITY is to be notified, by at least midterm, of any serious deficit noted in that assigned athletic training student's ability to accomplish the objectives set forth for that clinical experience. (It will then be the mutual responsibility of the assigned student and Preceptor to devise a plan by which the student may be assisted to achieve the stated objectives.)
- J. To forward a copy of the student's final written evaluation of clinical rotation objectives reflecting competency completion and clinical proficiency acquisition, upon completion of the clinical education experience to be received by CUATEP Director and/or Clinical Education Coordinator within five (5) working days of the end of a semester.
- K. The AFFILIATED SITE agrees to comply with all federal, state and local statutes and regulations applicable to the operation of the program, including without limitation laws relating to the confidentiality of student records.
- L. To promptly and thoroughly investigate any complaint by any participating student of unlawful discrimination or harassment at the AFFILIATED SITE or involving employees or agents of the AFFILIATED SITE, to take prompt and effective remedial action when discrimination or harassment is found to have occurred, and to promptly notify the UNIVERSITY of the existence and outcome of any complaint of harassment by, against, or involving any participating student.
- M. To provide, upon request by any participating student, with such reasonable accommodations at the AFFILIATED SITE as required by law in order to allow qualified disabled students to participate in the program.
- N. The AFFILIATED SITE will maintain the following minimal coverage in full force and effect, at its sole expense and written by carriers acceptable to UNIVERSITY:
  - i. Commercial General Liability (Minimum Requirements):

Limits of Liability:

\$1,000,000 Each Occurrence
\$2,000,000 General Aggregate
\$1,000,000 Products/Completed Operations Aggregate
\$1,000,000 Personal & Advertising Injury

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## \$5,000 Medical Payments

ii. Certificates of Insurance:

The AFFILIATED SITE shall supply an insurer's Certificate of Insurance (COI) on an AcordTM 25 form stating that there is insurance in effect with the minimum limits shown above. Each COI shall specify that should any of the above described policies be cancelled before the expiration date thereof, notice will be delivered in accordance with the policy provisions. Insurance required under this Agreement shall be primary insurance as respects UNIVERSITY, its trustees, officers, employees, representatives, agents and assigns, and any insurance maintained by UNIVERSITY shall be excess and shall not contribute with it. All policies must be issued by insurers currently rated by A.M. Best as "(A-) IX" or better.

- III. UNIVERSITY AGREES:
- A. To assume responsibility for the professional preparation of the athletic training student in compliance with the curriculum standards as set forth by CAATE and the BOC, Inc.
- B. To establish and maintain ongoing communication with the Preceptor of clinical education at the AFFILIATED SITE on items pertinent to athletic training education and the clinical education of athletic training students enrolled in the CUATEP. (Such communication might include, but is not limited to, a description of the experience, student biographical information, policies, faculty qualification, etc.) On-site visits will be arranged when feasible or upon request by the AFFILIATED SITE Preceptor.
- C. To place at the AFFILIATED SITE only those athletic training students who have satisfactorily completed the prerequisite didactic portion of the curriculum.
- D. To inform the athletic training student of the AFFILIATED SITE'S requirements for acceptance when applicable.
- E. To provide upon request, the AFFILIATED SITE written certification concerning the student's health and any immunization against communicable diseases requested by the AFFILIATED SITE upon receipt by the CUATEP Director and/or Clinical Education Coordinator.
- F. To provide the AFFILIATED SITE, upon request, with a Certificate of Insurance evidencing the UNIVERSITY'S general liability insurance coverage relative to bodily injury and property damage with limits as set forth in Section II.N., and to further provide evidence of professional liability insurance coverage for any participating student in

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connection with the student's professional activities at the AFFILIATED SITE under the AGREEMENT.

- G. To supply the Preceptor at an AFFILIATED SITE with all appropriate didactic and clinical syllabi and evaluation instruments reflecting the educational competencies and clinical proficiencies necessary for proper clinical education instruction, supervision and evaluation.
- H. To have each athletic training student provide, prior to commencement of the clinical experience, such confidential information as may be required by the AFFILIATED SITE as deemed necessary for the training and guidance of the students, together with the student's authorization for release of such information, as required by law.
- I. That the athletic training students are not employees of the AFFILIATED SITE and they will not receive compensation from said AFFILIATED SITE.
- J. To inform the athletic training students that they must abide by existing rules and regulations of the AFFILIATED SITE.
- K. To inform the athletic training students that they must be cleared, if required by the AFFILIATED SITE, from an absence caused by injury or illness, by a physician.
- L. That the athletic training student will provide evidence of health insurance coverage at the beginning of the clinical experience.

This AGREEMENT fully supersedes any and all prior AGREEMENTS or understandings between the parties or any of their respective affiliates with respect to the subject matter hereof, and no change in, modification of or addition, amendment or supplement to this AGREEMENT shall be valid unless set forth in writing and signed and dated by both parties hereto subsequent to the execution of this AGREEMENT.

This AGREEMENT may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall constitute one and the same agreement. Further, the Parties may execute this AGREEMENT via fax or electronic mail transmission. A true and correct copy of the AGREEMENT, as executed by the Parties, may be used in lieu of an original for all purposes permitted by law.

# BACKGROUND

In December 2017, the Rancho Santiago Community College District (RSCCD) and the Goodwill Industries of Orange County (GIOC) entered into an Instructional Services Agreement (SCC Contract Number SCC 17-1204-A) to provide noncredit employment preparation classes for students with disabilities. The purpose of this amendment #1 is to: add an additional training facility; increase the maximum number of allowable instructional hours from 1,350 to 2,025 hours; increase the maximum allowable student attendance hours from 13,500 to 27,000; and increase the maximum reimbursable amount to GIOC from \$33,750 to \$67,500. The term of the original agreement is December 4, 2017 through June 30, 2019.

# ANALYSIS

This amendment will add the Children's Hospital of Orange County (CHOC), 1201 W. La Veta Avenue, Orange, CA 92868 as an additional instructional facility to provide noncredit employment preparation classes to serve additional students with disabilities under this Agreement. GIOC will provide staff, classrooms, and worksite training locations within CHOC. RSCCD will collect State apportionment for these classes and reimburse GIOC \$2.50 per student attendance hour.

This AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE to the Instructional Services Agreement between Goodwill Industries of Orange County (GIOC) and the Santiago Canyon College - Orange Education Center (SCC Contract Number SCC 17-1204-A) is to amend Sections D1, D2, E5, and G1 of the original agreement as follows:

## Section D1:

DISTRICT shall provide instruction and training to eligible students of the DISTRICT at various facilities designated by GIOC, including the University of California, Irvine Medical Center, 101 The City Drive, Orange, CA 92868, and the Children's Hospital of Orange County (CHOC), 1201 W. La Veta Avenue, Orange, CA 92868. DISTRICT is responsible for the educational programs conducted at these locations.

DISTRICT shall provide instruction for the following subjects, not to exceed the total number of student attendance hours per subject area, per fiscal year:

## Section E5:

GIOC staff conducting classes authorized in this Agreement shall do so according to the following schedule per subject, per fiscal year:

<u>Social Skills and Necessary Etiquette</u> Minimum of 7.5 hours per week, for a total of 675 hours per fiscal year

<u>Customer Service for the Medical Field</u> Minimum of 22.5 hours per week, for a total of 20,250 hours per fiscal year

# Section G1:

DISTRICT shall reimburse GIOC for the use of staff and facilities at the rate of \$2.50 per student attendance hour, up to a maximum of 27,000 hours (\$67,500) per fiscal year. The hours claimed under this Agreement must be certified to DISTRICT for actual attendance during the preceding month for all properly enrolled students. Such payment is considered full payment to cover all of GIOC's contract cost of operating the instructional programs covered by this Agreement.

The original agreement is effective December 4, 2017 through June 30, 2019. All other terms and conditions of the original agreement remain in full force and effect.

# BACKGROUND

The 2015-2016 State Budget included a \$500 million Adult Education Block Grant (AEBG) to be allocated among regional consortia comprised of representatives from community college districts, K-12 districts, and other organizations that serve a role in adult education (each consortium was defined by the boundaries of a community college district). AB 104 authorizes a community college district to join the local adult education consortium as a member and states that a member of the consortium shall be represented only by an official designated by the governing board of the member.

# ANALYSIS

An official representative on the Rancho Santiago Adult Education Consortium is necessary to ensure that the Rancho Santiago Community College District has a full voice in the decision making process to implement the local adult education plan supported by the AEBG. Dean of Instruction and Student Services, Dr. Lori Fasbinder, is well versed about the instructional programs and student support services that are authorized in AB 104.

It is recommended that the RSCCD Board of Trustees approve Dr. Lori Fasbinder, Dean of Instruction and Student Services (Continuing Education), to serve as the official District Representative on the Rancho Santiago Adult Education Consortium from July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2019.

# BACKGROUND

In accordance with the California Code of Regulations, Title 5, Sections 58301 and 58305(c), the governing board of each community college district shall hold a public hearing and adopt a final budget by September 15th of each year. At the Board meeting of August 13, 2018, the Board of Trustees took action to set this public hearing at the September 10, 2018 meeting. The General Fund proposed Adopted Budget has been reviewed and unanimously recommended by both the Fiscal Resources Committee and District Council.

# ANALYSIS

A full bound copy of the 2018/2019 proposed Adopted Budget was available for public display and review September 5th through September 7th at the District Office, 2323 N. Broadway, on the 4th floor reception area between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. and has been provided for your review. It contains a balanced budget for all District funds. Furthermore, the Chancellor's Message can be found on Page 3 and provides an overview of the major assumptions used in the budget development process. Unfortunately as the 2017/18 data used to fund the 2018/19 budget have still not been released, the effects on our own budget are not known at this time. The new formula includes a hold harmless clause which keeps districts funded at the 2017/18 Total Computational Revenue level plus the 2018/19 Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) of 2.71%. Therefore, this proposed budget includes only what we do know at this time. As additional information is known, we will bring back an update of the budget to the Board. # BACKGROUND:

The Board of Trustees approved an agreement for topographic land survey consultant services at the District Operations Center with Michael Baker International, Inc. ("Michael Baker") on April 23, 2018. Michael Baker completed the survey work and provided the District with an updated ALTA (topographic) survey for the District Office property. The District Operations Center property is shared by Veros Credit and is bounded by Santa Clara Avenue to the south, North Broadway to the west and the Interstate 5 ("I-5") freeway to the east. Veros Credit's property is addressed as 2333 North Broadway located on the northern portion of the site (Parcel #1). The southern portion of the site (Parcel#2) is owned by the Rancho Santiago Community College District addressed as 2323 North Broadway. The survey confirmed property boundaries, utility locations, easements and other site topography. It accurately identified and delineated site boundaries particularly with respect to the boundary line between the two parcels. Consequently, as part of the survey work, it was brought to the attention of the District that a portion of the property at the southern easterly corner adjacent Santa Clara Avenue and the Main Street I-5 freeway exit is a right-of-way owned by the Department of Transportation ("Caltrans"). The area owned by Caltrans is 4,004.61 square feet, and perimeter is 533.57 feet as illustrated in Attachment A.

The District has had beneficial use of this Caltrans right-of-way property since 1998 when the property was acquired and has been used for parking and landscaping, including where the corner monument sign currently resides. The District has two options in regards to this section of the property: 1) Reconfigure the District owned property so that the section owned by Caltrans is no longer utilized which would result in a loss and/or impact to approximately 18 parking spaces; 2) Acquire the Caltrans right-of-way portion of the property through the proper legal process as outlined by Caltrans for title, ownership and insurance purposes to allow continued beneficial use and have the proper legal authority to continue operations on said property.

Caltrans has been informed of their ownership of this right-of-way and that the District has been using such property for parking and landscaping since the District's acquisition of the property. Caltrans rights-of-ways can be disposed of as relinquishments, vacations, or excess property or

rights of which access is a part. Caltrans has informed the District that the District would need to submit an application for decertification of the property. Decertification is the process by which Caltrans undertakes to determine if the operating right-of-way is to be excess and no longer necessary for transportation purposes. It appears Caltrans may have been unaware of the ownership of this right-of-way when brought to their attention. Caltrans staff recommended the decertification process to the District to start this formal review.

At this time, the District is recommending the approval of an agreement with Michael Baker to assist the District in the decertification process. In addition, the Caltrans agency fee of a deposit of \$35,000 plus any other agency fees is on the same Board meeting agenda docket for consideration along with this approval of the survey consultant services of Michael Baker.

The scope of work associated with the consultant, Michael Baker includes: 1) Assistance with the coordination of the Caltrans decertification process; 2) Preparation of legal description and plat; 3) Preparation of the Certificate of Compliance for the City of Santa Ana; 4) Preparation of the Record of Survey which is the last step for filing a map with the County Recorder's Office after setting monuments at the property corners of the newly acquired land from the decertification process.

The acquisition of such property would allow the District to continue its use of the existing property as well as the operations and maintenance of such property. This acquisition will clear up any potential disputes over ownership and allow the District to have a clear title record on file at the County Recorder's Office.

If the decertification is successful, the Board will have to approve a future payment of acquisition costs to Caltrans associated with the fair market appraised value for such property being decertified. This will be proposed as a separate approval at a future Board of Trustees meeting upon approval by Caltrans of the decertification.

# ANALYSIS:

A Request for Proposal #1718-202 for land title surveying services at the District Operations Center was solicited to four prequalified firms on March 2, 2018 with a due date of March 21, 2018. The District received four proposals including DMc Engineering (Irvine); Michael Baker International, Inc. (Santa Ana); PENCO Engineering, Inc. (Irvine) and TAIT & Associates, Inc. (Santa Ana). A screening panel convened on March 28, 2018 to review the proposals. The panel recommends Michael Baker International, Inc. by consensus after a thorough review based upon the culmination of their RFP response, experience, team members, reference checks, and approach to the project and hourly rate.

It is recommended that the District enter into an agreement with Michael Baker International, Inc. for survey consultant services at the District Operations Center related to the decertification application process with Caltrans. The services covered by this agreement shall commence September 11, 2018 and end December 31, 2019. The contract is a not to exceed fee of \$22,769. The District has reviewed the fee and it is reasonable and within industry standards. This agreement is funded by Capital Outlay Funds.

# **<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>**:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the agreement with Michael Baker International, Inc. - topographic land survey consultant services at the District Operations Center as presented.





The District Operations Center property at 2323 North Broadway is shared by Veros Credit and is bounded by Santa Clara Avenue to the south, North Broadway to the west and the Interstate 5 ("I-5") freeway to the east. Veros Credit's property is addressed as 2333 North Broadway located on the northern portion of the site (Parcel #1). The southern portion of the site (Parcel#2) is owned by the Rancho Santiago Community College District. Upon completion of a topographic land survey for the District Operations Center property by Michael Baker International, Inc. ("Michael Baker"), it was brought to the attention of the District that a portion of the property at the southern easterly corner adjacent Santa Clara Avenue and the Main Street I-5 freeway exit is a right-of-way owned by the Department of Transportation ("Caltrans"). The area owned by Caltrans is 4,004.61 square feet, and perimeter is 533.57 feet as illustrated in Attachment A.

The District has had beneficial use of this Caltrans right-of-way property since 1998 when the property was acquired and has been used for parking and landscaping, including where the corner monument sign currently resides. 



# BACKGROUND:

This is a new agreement for furniture & equipment consulting services for the Russell Hall Replacement (Health Sciences Building). The District is in need of a consultant specializing in furniture and equipment design services to assist the District in proper selection of the furniture and equipment for each space to ensure programmatic needs are adequately addressed. The new building houses labs for Nursing, Medical Assistant, Emergency Medical Technician, Pharmacy Technology, and Occupational Therapy. PAL id Studio, Inc. will focus on the furniture and nonmedical equipment required throughout the building including, laboratories, storage rooms, general classrooms, computer labs, offices, conference rooms, and the learning centers. Due to the complexity of each lab's medical equipment requirements, the scope for medical equipment will be provided by a separate consultant who specializes in medical equipment under a separate future agreement to be considered by the Board of Trustees at a future meeting.

The project is currently in the construction document phase. PAL id Studio, Inc.'s scope of work for the furniture and non-medical equipment includes four phases: 1) space plan drawings; 2) product bidding and procurement; 3) product delivery and installation coordination and oversight; and 4) project closeout with the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office due to the project receiving State funding.

# ANALYSIS:

A Request for Qualifications/Request for Proposal (RFQ/RFP) #1819-219 was advertised on August 1, 2018 with a response deadline of August 17, 2018. The District received responses from Criterion (Capistrano Beach) and PAL id Studio, Inc. (Fullerton). A screening panel convened on August 21, 2018 to review the proposals and interviewed both firms on August 22, 2018. After a thorough review, the panel recommends PAL id Studio, Inc. by consensus based upon a thorough review and the culmination of their RFP response, responsiveness, qualifications, interviews, experience, team members, project approach, fee, schedule, knowledge and ability to meet the anticipated schedule. The services covered by this agreement shall commence September 11, 2018 and end June 30, 2022. The contract is a not-to-exceed fee of \$181,500. The District has reviewed the fee and it is reasonable and within industry standards.

This agreement is funded by Capital Outlay Funds and State Funding.

# BACKGROUND:

This is an amendment to an existing agreement for additional inspection services. On April 23, 2018 the Board of Trustees approved an agreement with Sandy Pringle Associates Inspection Consultants for inspector services for Hammond Hall window replacement project at Santa Ana College. Building H (Hammond Hall) was built in 1954 and the windows have never been replaced. This is a State Scheduled Maintenance project to replace all windows which will be more energy efficient for the building. The Division of the State Architect (DSA) requires that all construction projects are overseen by a DSA certified project inspector to ensure the project is constructed in accordance with the DSA approved plans and specifications. The District is requesting additional inspection services for monitoring activities related to any ongoing work associated with the window installation. The District has not accepted the project as complete due to the recent rejection of the window installation as it has not passed the appropriate required water intrusion test. The District is currently working with the contractor on identification of a proposed correction action which requires additional DSA inspection services beyond originally anticipated. # ANALYSIS:

The amendment is to increase the contract by \$15,000. The revised total contract amount is \$44,400. The District has reviewed the fee and it is reasonable and within industry standards.

## BACKGROUND:

On April 23, 2018, the Board of Trustees approved a contract with Golden Gate Steel, Inc. dba Golden Gate Construction for the Barrier Removal Exterior Path of Travel (Phase 2A) project at Santiago Canyon College. This is an amendment to the contract for an extension of time only. This barrier removal project is one of several projects to address the Blaser settlement deficiency items and deadlines. The Phase 2A project consists of removing barriers to provide compliant paths of travel at limited locations on campus. Repairs to existing sidewalks, curb ramps, and handrails were undertaken as part of this project. The project has received Division of the State Architect (DSA) approval.

## ANALYSIS:

Change Order #1 is a non-compensable extension of time which extends the contract duration from 81 calendar days to 95 calendar days to allow additional time needed to complete the work. All work has been completed and is currently in the close-out phase. There are no increases to the contract amount associated with this time extension. The District has reviewed the change order and has found the time extension to be fair and reasonable. Pursuant to Administrative Regulation 6600, staff has approved this change order.

## BACKGROUND

The District's Emergency Telephone (Bluephone) System needs to be replaced. While operational, the existing system does not meet current Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) placement criteria and functionality. In addition existing hardware is outdated, the specific cellular technology powering the system is soon to be obsolete. Lastly, in the case of a campus-wide emergency, the existing system does not have a mass notification system.

## ANALYSIS

The District's Facility Planning and Safety/Security departments investigated and assessed various equipment and installation options as well as hard-wired and cellular configurations. After careful consideration of performance specifications, equipment, cost savings and ADA accessibility features, evaluating staff selected CASE Systems, Inc. for the purchase of a new solar powered, cellular Emergency Telephone (Bluephone) and Mass Notification System and related services.

In November 2017, the California Department of General Services (DGS) awarded a California Multiple Award Schedule (CMAS) Contract #3-17-70-3480A to CASE Systems, Inc., for the purchase of Data Communications, Public Address, Two-Way Radio and Satellite Telecom Equipment and related services. This cooperative contract meets the legal requirements to piggyback, set forth in Public Contract Code #20652. This contract expires December 31, 2019.

Utilization of the contract, for the proposed solution, will save the District 43.5% off the manufacturer's list price. The initial purchase for this project, estimated at \$480,989 includes the Bluephone purchase, installation and configuration of the system hardware. This project is being funded by Capital Outlay funds.

## **RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the contract with CASE Systems, Inc., CMAS Contract #3-17-70-3480A for the purchase of an Emergency Telephone and Mass Notification System and related services and future addendums, as presented.

#### BACKGROUND

As incidents of Business Email Compromise (BEC), ransomware and phishing are on the rise, the District requires additional tools and methods to detect and abate cyber threats. The District's Information Technology Services (ITS) department has determined additional email spam protection solutions are required.

#### ANALYSIS

ITS performed an assessment of industry-leading email protection products. Products were stress tested and put through real-world scenarios. In all cases, Cloud Email Security Inbound Essentials, together with, Cloud Email Security AMP, both by Cisco Systems, Inc., out-performed all other products tested. District's ITS selected Cisco Email Spam Protection Solutions.

In 2014, the State of Utah, on behalf of NASPO ValuePoint, awarded Master Agreement #AR233 to Cisco Systems, Inc. and their authorized resellers, for the purchase of data center applications, networking hardware, unified communications equipment and network security solutions and related software, devices and services. The agreement was approved for use in California by the Department of General Services, Participating Addendum # 7-14-70-04. This is a cooperative contract, competitively bid and meeting the legal requirements to piggyback, set forth in Public Contract Code #20652. This Master Agreement contract expires May 31, 2019.

Contract pricing, for the proposed solution, is a minimum of 35% off the manufacturer's list price with the opportunity to negotiate additional discounts for higher education, based on volumes and product type. The initial purchase is estimated to be \$121,275 for a three (3) year subscription period and funded by ITS budget.

#### INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR AGREEMENT TERMS AND CONDITIONS

#### 1 Independent Contractor Services.

1.1 <u>Independent Contractor Services Schedule</u>. The Independent Contractor shall complete the Independent Contractor Services, and portions thereof, in accordance with the Independent Contractor Services Schedule set forth in Attachment 1. The Independent Contractor is liable to the District for costs, charges, losses and other damages arising out of or related to the failure of the Independent Contractor to complete Independent Contractor Services in accordance with the Independent Contractor Services Schedule.

1.2 Independent Contractor Work Product. All materials generated by the Independent Contractor or received by the Independent Contractor in the course of completing the Independent Contractor Services ("Independent Contractor Work Product") are property of the District. Independent Contractor Work Product includes tangible and intangible items in any form, including calculations, drawings, written/graphic materials, digital/electronic files and samples. The Independent Contractor Work Product of Independent Contractor Services for the District's inspection, review and/or reproduction of Independent Contractor Work Product.

1.3 <u>Independent Contractor Standard of Care</u>. The Independent Contractor Services shall be performed and provided by Independent Contractor: (i) using the Independent Contractor's best skill and attention; (ii) with due care and in accordance with applicable professional standard(s) of care; (iii) in accordance with applicable laws, rules and regulations; and (iv) in accordance with the terms of this Agreement. The Independent Contractor is liable to the District for losses, costs, changes and other consequences of its failure to provide perform and/or complete the Independent Contractor Services in accordance with the foregoing described standards of care.

1.4 <u>Independent Contractor as Independent Contractor;</u> <u>Limited Independent Contractor Agency</u>. The Independent Contractor is an independent contractor to the District. The terms of this Agreement set forth the limited extent to which the Independent Contractor is authorized to act as an agent or representative of the District. The Independent Contractor shall be liable to the District and third parties for the consequences of its conduct which exceed the express limited scope of the Independent Contractor to act on behalf of the District.

#### 2 Contract Price

2.1 <u>Independent Contractor Billings for Payment of Contract</u> <u>Price</u>. During the course of providing Independent Contractor Services, unless otherwise negotiated, Independent Contractor shall submit monthly billing invoices to the District for payment of the Contract Price for Independent Contractor Services performed in the immediately prior month. Independent Contractor's billings shall be in such form and format along with such substantiating data as requested by District.

2.2 <u>District Payment of Contract Price</u>. Within thirty (30) days of receipt of Independent Contractor's billing invoices, District will make payment to Independent Contractor of

undisputed amounts of the Contract Price due for Independent Contractor Services. The District may withhold or deduct from amounts otherwise due Independent Contractor hereunder if Independent Contractor fails to timely and completely perform material obligations to be performed on its part under this Agreement, with the amounts withheld or deducted being released after Independent Contractor has fully cured such failure of performance, less costs, damages or losses sustained by the District resulting therefrom.

2.3 <u>Independent Contractor's Payments</u>. The Independent Contractor shall promptly pay its employees, independent contractors, if any, and others performing or providing Independent Contractor Services upon receipt of payments of the Contract Price from the District. If required by applicable law, rule or regulation, the Independent Contractor's payment to personnel providing or performing Independent Contractor Services shall be at least the prevailing wage rate established for the type of service provided. If prevailing wage rates apply to any personnel performing or providing Independent Contractor Services, the obligation for compliance rests solely with the Independent Contractor, without adjustment of the Contract Price.

#### 3 Insurance and Indemnity

3.1 <u>Workers Compensation and Employers Liability</u> <u>Insurance</u>. If required, the Workers' Compensation Insurance shall cover claims under workers' or workmen's compensation, disability benefit and other similar employee benefit acts. The Employer's Liability Insurance shall cover bodily injury (including death) by accident or disease to any employee which arises out of the employee's employment by Independent Contractor. The Employer's Liability Insurance may be obtained as a separate policy of insurance or as an additional coverage under the Workers' Compensation Insurance policy.

3.2 <u>General Liability and Automobile Liability Insurance</u>. The General Liability Insurance policy shall cover death, bodily injury and property damage liabilities arising out of premises, operations, independent contractors, products, completed operations, personal & advertising injury, and contractual liability contractual liability coverage sufficiently broad to include the insurable liability assumed by the Independent Contractor under the indemnity and hold harmless provisions of this Agreement. The Automobile Liability Insurance shall cover liabilities for bodily injury, death of a person or property damages arising out of ownership, maintenance or use of any owned, non-owned and hired motor vehicles that are operated by or on behalf of the Independent Contractor in connection with this Agreement.

3.3 <u>Professional Liability Insurance</u>. If required, the Independent Contractor's professional liability insurance shall cover liabilities arising out of the performance of Independent Contractor Services under this Agreement.

3.4 <u>Policy Endorsements; Evidence of Insurance</u>. Independent Contractor shall deliver to the District Certificates of Insurance evidencing each of the policies of insurance in the coverage amounts required hereunder. All policies of insurance required hereunder shall be issued by insurer(s) authorized to issue insurance policies by the State of California and who are A.M. Best rated at least A-/VII. Coverages under each policy of insurance required hereunder, whether by endorsement or otherwise, shall provide that such policy will not be modified, canceled or allowed to expire without at least thirty (30) days advance written notice to the District.

3.5 <u>District General Liability Insurance</u>. The District will maintain General Liability Insurance covering the District for claims of bodily injury or death of persons and property damage. The District may at its sole election obtain such liability insurance from a commercially available source, a Joint Powers Authority or by self-insurance.

#### 3.6 Indemnity.

3.6.1 Independent Contractor Indemnity of District. To the fullest extent permitted by law, the Independent Contractor shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the District and its employees, officers, Trustees, agents and representatives from any and all claims, demands, losses, responsibilities or liabilities for: (i) injury or death of persons; (ii) property damage; or (iii) other costs or charges arising out of or attributable, in whole or in part, to the negligent, grossly negligent or willful conduct of Independent Contractor or the employees, agents and representatives of Independent Contractor in performing or providing any of the obligations, services or other work product contemplated under this The foregoing shall include without Agreement. limitation, attorneys' fees and shall survive the termination of this Agreement or Independent Contractor's completion of obligations hereunder until barred by the applicable Statute of Limitations.

3.6.2 <u>District Indemnity of Independent Contractor</u>. The District shall indemnify and hold harmless Independent Contractor from claims arising out of bodily injury (including death) and physical damage which arise out of the negligent or willful acts, omissions or other conduct of the District.

#### 4 Termination; Suspension

Termination for Default. 4.1 Either the District or Independent Contractor may terminate this Agreement upon seven (7) days advance written notice to the other if there is a default by the other Party in its performance of a material obligation hereunder and such default in performance is not caused by the Party initiating the termination. Such termination shall be deemed effective the seventh (7th) day following the date of the written termination notice, unless during such seven (7) day period, the Party receiving the written termination notice commences to cure it default(s) and diligently thereafter prosecutes such cure to completion. In addition to the District's right to terminate this Agreement pursuant to the foregoing, the District may terminate this Agreement upon written notice to Independent Contractor if: (i) Independent Contractor becomes bankrupt or insolvent, which shall include without limitation, a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or the filing by Independent Contractor or a third party of a petition to reorganize debts or for protection under any bankruptcy or similar law or if a trustee or receiver is appointed for Independent Contractor or any of Independent Contractor's property on account of Independent Contractor's insolvency; or (ii) if Independent Contractor disregards applicable laws, codes, ordinances, rules or regulations. If the District exercises the right of termination hereunder, the Contract Price due the Independent Contractor, if any, shall be based upon

Independent Contractor Services completed prior the effective date of the District's termination of this Agreement, reduced by the District's prior payments of the Contract Price and losses, damages, or other costs sustained by the District arising out of the termination of this Agreement or the cause(s) for termination of this Agreement. Independent Contractor shall remain responsible and liable to District for all losses, damages or other costs sustained by District arising out of termination pursuant to the foregoing or otherwise arising out of Independent Contractor's default hereunder, to the extent that such losses, damages or other costs exceed any amount due Independent Contractor hereunder for Independent Contractor Services.

4.2 <u>District Right to Suspend</u>. The District may, in its discretion, suspend all or any part of the Independent Contractor Services hereunder; provided, however, that if the District directs suspension of Independent Contractor Services for sixty (60) consecutive days or more and such suspension is not caused by the Independent Contractor's default or the acts or omissions of Independent Contractor or its Sub-Independent Contractors, upon rescission of such suspension, the Contract Price will be subject to adjustment to reflect actual costs and expenses incurred by Independent Contractor, if any, as a direct result of the suspension and resumption of Independent Contractor Services hereunder.

4.3 District Termination For District Convenience. The District may, at any time, upon seven (7) days advance written notice to Independent Contractor terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, for the District's convenience and without fault, neglect or default on the part of Independent Contractor. In such event, the Agreement shall be deemed terminated seven (7) days after the date of the District's written notice to Independent Contractor or such other time as the District and Independent Contractor may mutually agree upon. In such event, the District shall make payment of the Contract Price to Independent Contractor for Independent Contractor Services completed prior to the effective date of termination. Except as set forth above, the Independent Contractor shall not be entitled to other compensation if the District exercises the right to terminate hereunder.

4.4 Independent Contractor Suspension of Independent Contractor Services. If the District fails to make payment of the undisputed portion of the Contract Price when due Independent Contractor hereunder, Independent Contractor may, upon seven (7) days advance written notice to the District, suspend performance of Independent Contractor Services until payment of the undisputed portion of the Contract Price is received by the Independent Contractor. In such event, Independent Contractor shall have no liability for any delays to completion of Independent Contractor Services due to, or arising out of, such suspension. Except as expressly set forth herein, there is no other right of the Independent Contractor Services.

4.5 <u>Independent Contractor Obligations Upon Termination</u>. Upon the District's exercise of the right of termination hereunder, the Independent Contractor shall take action as directed by the District relating to completed and in progress Independent Contractor Services. The Independent Contractor shall within five (5) days of the effective date of Termination, assemble and deliver to the District all Independent Contractor Work Product.

#### 5 Miscellaneous

5.1 <u>Governing Law; Interpretation</u>. This Agreement shall be governed and interpreted in pursuant to the laws of the State of California and in accordance with its fair meaning and not strictly for or against the District or Independent Contractor. If any provision of this Agreement is deemed illegal, invalid unenforceable or void by any court of competent jurisdiction, such provision shall be deemed stricken and deleted herefrom, but all remaining provisions will remain and continue in full force and effect.

5.2 <u>Time</u>. Time is of the essence to this Agreement. The time for performance of any obligation hereunder by either Party shall be extended if performance of such obligation is delayed or prevented by conduct of the other Party, acts of God, or other unforeseeable events.

5.3 <u>Successors; Non-Assignability</u>. This Agreement and all terms hereof are binding upon and inure to the benefit of the respective successors of Independent Contractor and the District. Neither Independent Contractor nor District shall assign rights or obligations hereunder without the prior consent of the other, which consent may be withheld or granted in sole discretion of the Party requested to grant such consent.

5.4 <u>Independent Contractor Personnel and Expense</u> <u>Records</u>. The Independent Contractor shall maintain detailed billing records of personnel time to complete Independent Contractor Services. Such records shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applied in a consistent manner and shall be available to the District for inspection, review and/or reproduction upon request of the District. Independent Contractor shall maintain billing records for at least three (3) years after completion of Independent Contractor Services.

5.5 <u>Confidentiality</u>. All information and data provided by the District to the Independent Contractor in connection with the Independent Contractor Services are deemed confidential materials which shall not be disclosed by Independent Contractor to any third party without express prior written consent of the District, which may be granted, conditioned or denied in the sole discretion of the District. The Independent Contractor is liable to the District and third parties for losses, costs or other damages arising out of or relating to Independent Contractor's breach of the confidentiality obligations set forth herein.

5.6 <u>Personal Services</u>. The Independent Contractor and District acknowledge and agree that the Independent Contractor Services are in the nature of personal services.

5.7 <u>Cumulative Rights: No Waiver</u>. Duties and obligations imposed by this Agreement and rights and obligations hereunder are in addition to and not in lieu of any imposed by or available at law or in equity. No action or failure to act by District shall be deemed a waiver of any right or remedy afforded hereunder or acquiesce or approval of any breach or default of the Independent Contractor.

5.8 Disputes.

5.8.1 <u>Independent Contractor Continuation of</u> <u>Services</u>. Except in the event of the District's failure to make undisputed payment of the Contract Price due Independent Contractor, notwithstanding any disputes between District and Independent Contractor hereunder, Independent Contractor shall continue to provide and perform Independent Contractor Services and authorized Additional Services pending a subsequent resolution of such disputes.

5.8.2 <u>Mandatory Mediation</u>. All claims, disputes and other matters in controversy between the Independent Contractor and the District arising out of or pertaining to this Agreement shall be submitted for resolution by non-binding mediation conducted under the auspices of the American Arbitration Association ("AAA") and the Commercial Mediation Rules of the AAA in effect at the time that a Demand For Mediation is filed. The commencement and completion of mediation proceedings pursuant to the foregoing is a condition precedent to either the District or the Independent Contractor commencing arbitration proceedings pursuant to the following Paragraph.

5.8.3 Arbitration. All claims, disputes or other matters in controversy between Independent Contractor and District arising out of or pertaining to this Agreement which are not fully resolved through the mandatory mediation set forth above shall be settled and resolved by binding arbitration conducted under the auspices of the AAA Commercial Arbitration Rules in effect at the time of the filing of a Demand for Arbitration. If any claim or dispute is asserted by others providing services in connection with the subject matter of this Agreement and such other claim or dispute arises in whole or in part out of this Agreement or the services provided by or through the Independent Contractor hereunder, Independent Contractor and District agree that any arbitration proceedings initiated between Independent Contractor and District hereunder shall be consolidated with any arbitration proceedings initiated in connection with such other claim or dispute. Any arbitration in the AAA hereunder shall be conducted Office.

Independent Contractor Compliance With 5.8.4 Government Code Claims Process. All claims. demands, disputes, disagreements or other matters in controversy asserted by the Independent Contractor against the District in a demand for arbitration are deemed a "suit for money or damages" under Government Code §900 et seq. An express condition precedent to the Contractor's commencement of arbitration proceedings under Paragraph 5.9.3 is the Independent Contractor's strict compliance with and exhaustion of remedies and procedures under Government Code §900 et seq., including without limitation, §§945.4, 945.6 and 946. Notwithstanding the dispute resolution provisions set forth herein, all claims demands, disputes, disagreements or other matters in controversy asserted by the Independent Contractor against the District seeking money or damages shall first be presented to the District's Board of Trustees and acted upon or deemed rejected by the Board of Trustees pursuant to Government Code §900 et seq.

All policies of insurance required hereunder shall be issued by insurer(s) authorized to issue insurance policies by the State of California and who are A.M. Best rated at least A-/VII. Coverages under each policy of insurance required hereunder, whether by endorsement or otherwise, shall provide that such policy will not be modified, canceled or allowed to expire without at least thirty (30) days advance written notice to the District.

3.5 <u>District General Liability Insurance</u>. The District will maintain General Liability Insurance covering the District for claims of bodily injury or death of persons and property damage. The District may at its sole election obtain such liability insurance from a commercially available source, a Joint Powers Authority or by self-insurance.

#### 3.6 Indemnity.

Independent Contractor Indemnity of District. 3.6.1 To the fullest extent permitted by law, the Independent Contractor shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the District and its employees, officers, Trustees, agents and representatives from any and all claims, demands, losses, responsibilities or liabilities for: (i) injury or death of persons; (ii) property damage; or (iii) other costs or charges arising out of or attributable, in whole or in part, to the negligent, grossly negligent or willful conduct of Independent Contractor or the employees, agents and representatives of Independent Contractor in performing or providing any of the obligations, services or other work product contemplated under this The foregoing shall include without Agreement. limitation, attorneys' fees and shall survive the termination of this Agreement or Independent Contractor's completion of obligations hereunder until barred by the applicable Statute of Limitations.

3.6.2 <u>District Indemnity of Independent Contractor</u>. The District shall indemnify and hold harmless Independent Contractor from claims arising out of bodily injury (including death) and physical damage which arise out of the negligent or willful acts, omissions or other conduct of the District.

#### 4 Termination; Suspension

Either the District or 4.1 Termination for Default. Independent Contractor may terminate this Agreement upon seven (7) days advance written notice to the other if there is a default by the other Party in its performance of a material obligation hereunder and such default in performance is not caused by the Party initiating the termination. Such termination shall be deemed effective the seventh (7th) day following the date of the written termination notice, unless during such seven (7) day period, the Party receiving the written termination notice commences to cure it default(s) and diligently thereafter prosecutes such cure to completion. In addition to the District's right to terminate this Agreement pursuant to the foregoing, the District may terminate this Agreement upon written notice to Independent Contractor if: (i) Independent Contractor becomes bankrupt or insolvent, which shall include without limitation, a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or the filing by Independent Contractor or a third party of a petition to reorganize debts or for protection under any bankruptcy or similar law or if a trustee or receiver is appointed for Independent Contractor or any of Independent Contractor's property on account of Independent Contractor's insolvency; or (ii) if Independent Contractor disregards applicable laws, codes, ordinances, rules or regulations. If the District exercises the right of termination hereunder, the Contract Price due the Independent Contractor, if any, shall be based upon

Independent Contractor Services completed prior the effective date of the District's termination of this Agreement, reduced by the District's prior payments of the Contract Price and losses, damages, or other costs sustained by the District arising out of the termination of this Agreement or the cause(s) for termination of this Agreement. Independent Contractor shall remain responsible and liable to District for all losses, damages or other costs sustained by District arising out of termination pursuant to the foregoing or otherwise arising out of Independent Contractor's default hereunder, to the extent that such losses, damages or other costs exceed any amount due Independent Contractor hereunder for Independent Contractor Services.

4.2 <u>District Right to Suspend</u>. The District may, in its discretion, suspend all or any part of the Independent Contractor Services hereunder; provided, however, that if the District directs suspension of Independent Contractor Services for sixty (60) consecutive days or more and such suspension is not caused by the Independent Contractor's default or the acts or omissions of Independent Contractor or its Sub-Independent Contractors, upon rescission of such suspension, the Contract Price will be subject to adjustment to reflect actual costs and expenses incurred by Independent Contractor, if any, as a direct result of the suspension and resumption of Independent Contractor Services hereunder.

4.3 District Termination For District Convenience. The District may, at any time, upon seven (7) days advance written notice to Independent Contractor terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, for the District's convenience and without fault, neglect or default on the part of Independent Contractor. In such event, the Agreement shall be deemed terminated seven (7) days after the date of the District's written notice to Independent Contractor or such other time as the District and Independent Contractor may mutually agree upon. In such event, the District shall make payment of the Contract Price to Independent Contractor for Independent Contractor Services completed prior to the effective date of termination. Except as set forth above, the Independent Contractor shall not be entitled to other compensation if the District exercises the right to terminate hereunder.

4.4 <u>Independent Contractor Suspension of Independent</u> <u>Contractor Services</u>. If the District fails to make payment of the undisputed portion of the Contract Price when due Independent Contractor hereunder, Independent Contractor may, upon seven (7) days advance written notice to the District, suspend performance of Independent Contractor Services until payment of the undisputed portion of the Contract Price is received by the Independent Contractor. In such event, Independent Contractor shall have no liability for any delays to completion of Independent Contractor Services due to, or arising out of, such suspension. Except as expressly set forth herein, there is no other right of the Independent Contractor Services.

4.5 <u>Independent Contractor Obligations Upon Termination</u>. Upon the District's exercise of the right of termination hereunder, the Independent Contractor shall take action as directed by the District relating to completed and in progress Independent Contractor Services. The Independent Contractor shall within five (5) days of the effective date of Termination, assemble and deliver to the District all Independent Contractor Work Product.

#### 5 Miscellaneous

5.1 <u>Governing Law; Interpretation</u>. This Agreement shall be governed and interpreted in pursuant to the laws of the State of California and in accordance with its fair meaning and not strictly for or against the District or Independent Contractor. If any provision of this Agreement is deemed illegal, invalid unenforceable or void by any court of competent jurisdiction, such provision shall be deemed stricken and deleted herefrom, but all remaining provisions will remain and continue in full force and effect.

5.2 <u>Time</u>. Time is of the essence to this Agreement. The time for performance of any obligation hereunder by either Party shall be extended if performance of such obligation is delayed or prevented by conduct of the other Party, acts of God, or other unforeseeable events.

5.3 <u>Successors; Non-Assignability</u>. This Agreement and all terms hereof are binding upon and inure to the benefit of the respective successors of Independent Contractor and the District. Neither Independent Contractor nor District shall assign rights or obligations hereunder without the prior consent of the other, which consent may be withheld or granted in sole discretion of the Party requested to grant such consent.

5.4 <u>Independent Contractor Personnel and Expense</u> <u>Records</u>. The Independent Contractor shall maintain detailed billing records of personnel time to complete Independent Contractor Services. Such records shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applied in a consistent manner and shall be available to the District for inspection, review and/or reproduction upon request of the District. Independent Contractor shall maintain billing records for at least three (3) years after completion of Independent Contractor Services.

5.5 <u>Confidentiality</u>. All information and data provided by the District to the Independent Contractor in connection with the Independent Contractor Services are deemed confidential materials which shall not be disclosed by Independent Contractor to any third party without express prior written consent of the District, which may be granted, conditioned or denied in the sole discretion of the District. The Independent Contractor is liable to the District and third parties for losses, costs or other damages arising out of or relating to Independent Contractor's breach of the confidentiality obligations set forth herein.

5.6 <u>Personal Services</u>. The Independent Contractor and District acknowledge and agree that the Independent Contractor Services are in the nature of personal services.

5.7 <u>Cumulative Rights: No Waiver</u>. Duties and obligations imposed by this Agreement and rights and obligations hereunder are in addition to and not in lieu of any imposed by or available at law or in equity. No action or failure to act by District shall be deemed a waiver of any right or remedy afforded hereunder or acquiesce or approval of any breach or default of the Independent Contractor.

5.8 Disputes.

5.8.1 <u>Independent Contractor Continuation of</u> <u>Services</u>. Except in the event of the District's failure to make undisputed payment of the Contract Price due Independent Contractor, notwithstanding any disputes between District and Independent Contractor hereunder, Independent Contractor shall continue to provide and perform Independent Contractor Services and authorized Additional Services pending a subsequent resolution of such disputes.

5.8.2 <u>Mandatory Mediation</u>. All claims, disputes and other matters in controversy between the Independent Contractor and the District arising out of or pertaining to this Agreement shall be submitted for resolution by non-binding mediation conducted under the auspices of the American Arbitration Association ("AAA") and the Commercial Mediation Rules of the AAA in effect at the time that a Demand For Mediation is filed. The commencement and completion of mediation proceedings pursuant to the foregoing is a condition precedent to either the District or the Independent Contractor commencing arbitration proceedings pursuant to the following Paragraph.

5.8.3 Arbitration. All claims, disputes or other matters in controversy between Independent Contractor and District arising out of or pertaining to this Agreement which are not fully resolved through the mandatory mediation set forth above shall be settled and resolved by binding arbitration conducted under the auspices of the AAA Commercial Arbitration Rules in effect at the time of the filing of a Demand for Arbitration. If any claim or dispute is asserted by others providing services in connection with the subject matter of this Agreement and such other claim or dispute arises in whole or in part out of this Agreement or the services provided by or through the Independent Contractor hereunder, Independent Contractor and District agree that any arbitration proceedings initiated between Independent Contractor and District hereunder shall be consolidated with any arbitration proceedings initiated in connection with such other claim or dispute. Any arbitration hereunder shall be conducted in the AAA Office.

Independent Contractor Compliance With 5.8.4 Government Code Claims Process. All claims. demands, disputes, disagreements or other matters in controversy asserted by the Independent Contractor against the District in a demand for arbitration are deemed a "suit for money or damages" under Government Code §900 et seq. An express condition precedent to the Contractor's commencement of arbitration proceedings under Paragraph 5.9.3 is the Independent Contractor's strict compliance with and exhaustion of remedies and procedures under Government Code §900 et seq., including without limitation, §§945.4, 945.6 and 946. Notwithstanding the dispute resolution provisions set forth herein, all claims demands, disputes, disagreements or other matters in controversy asserted by the Independent Contractor against the District seeking money or damages shall first be presented to the District's Board of Trustees and acted upon or deemed rejected by the Board of Trustees pursuant to Government Code §900 et seq.

  - e. Work as a mediator between colleges to arrive at equitable solutions to perceived differences.

- 2. Work closely with Brian Lovell and ACP to prepare a Building Automation at 1 or more colleges in the region.

  - b. Seek Building Automation experts to work with the colleges' to serve as adjunct faculty to guide in curriculum development as well as teach courses where needed when College faculty are short staffed or over loaded.
  - c. Take a deeper look into the reviews of IVC's building automation curriculum that was done by Brian Lovell and work with faculty and ACP to better align the program with the participating colleges.

- Coordinate the review of other automation programs around the country for lessons learned, best practices and available curriculum facilitations guides.
  - a. Coordinate the reviews of other programs in the state, in particular, the work that has been done at Bakersfield in their Bachelor of Applied Science in Industrial Automation Curriculum.
  - b. Work with National Science Foundation and the US Department of Energy through collaboration with ACP for resources that they can provide.

## BACKGROUND

Through the Strong Workforce Program Trailer Bill the state allocated funds to community colleges to support collaborative, regional work to improve the quality of career technical education programs and to increase the number of students who complete these programs and enter industry sectors with high-wage occupations in the region. Rancho Santiago Community College District was selected to serve as the Fiscal Agent for the Los Angeles & Orange County Region's Strong Workforce Program – Regional Funds, and is responsible for distributing funds to the region, ensuring that projects are compliant with the funding terms and conditions, providing status reports on the use of funds in the region, and developing and submitting program and expenditure reports to the Chancellor's Office.

# ANALYSIS

Strong Workforce Program regional funds will be allocated to the Orange County Superintendent of Schools in support of the *2018 Orange County Counselor Symposium* scheduled for November 1, 2018. The event is directed to counselors from K-12, adult education centers and community colleges providing an opportunity to engage in professional development, networking, early career exploration, enhance articulation and action plan development. The enclosed sub-agreement (#DO-18-2225-35) outlines the terms of the project. The period of performance is September 11, 2018, to December 31, 2018. The cost shall not exceed \$50,000.

The project director is Dr. Gustavo Chamorro, Director of Los Angeles/Orange County Regional Consortium and the project administrator is Dr. Adriene "Alex" Davis, Assistant Vice Chancellor of Economic and Workforce Development.

## SUB-AGREEMENT BETWEEN RANCHO SANTIAGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT AND ORANGE COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

#### FOR THE

# STRONG WORKFORCE PROGRAM – REGIONAL FUNDS INITIATIVE ORANGE COUNTY REGION

This sub-agreement (hereinafter "Agreement") is entered into on this 10th day of September 2018, between Rancho Santiago Community College District (hereinafter "FISCAL AGENT") and Orange County Superintendent of Schools also referred to as Orange County Department of Education (hereinafter "SUBCONTRACTOR"). FISCAL AGENT and SUBCONTRACTOR may be referred to individually as a "Party" and collectively as the "Parties" in this Agreement. This Agreement is based on the Strong Workforce Program - Regional Funds Initiative agreement between the FISCAL AGENT and the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office (hereinafter "PRIME SPONSOR").

WHEREAS, the Rancho Santiago Community College District was designated as the FISCAL AGENT for the Strong Workforce Program – Regional Funds Initiative for the Los Angeles and Orange County region and is responsible for distributing funds to the community college districts within the region following certification of the regional plans by the Regional Consortia, and is responsible for monitoring the work of the Agreement for compliance with the terms and conditions of the funds, as delineated in the FISCAL AGENT's Scope of Work; and

WHEREAS, FISCAL AGENT has the right to enter into agreements with outside entities for various services with the approval of the Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, SUBCONTRACTOR has agreed to participate in the purpose of the Agreement according to the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

1. Statement of Work

SUBCONTRACTOR agrees to implement the work as described in the Scope of Work (Exhibit A), which by reference is incorporated into this Agreement. SUBCONTRACTOR agrees to comply with all provisions, to perform all work as set forth in this Agreement and the aforementioned Statement of Work in a professional, timely and diligent manner.

## 2. Period of Performance

The period of performance for this Agreement shall be from September 11, 2018, through December 31, 2018.

3. Total Cost

The total cost to FISCAL AGENT for performance of this Agreement shall not exceed **\$50,000.00** USD, to be funded by the Strong Workforce Program Regional Initiative – *Orange* 

Agreement #DO-18-2225-35

County Marketing and Branding Project.

4. Budget

SUBCONTRACTOR agrees that the expenditures of all funds under this Agreement will be in accordance with the Project Budget (**Exhibit B**), which by reference is incorporated into this Agreement.

5. Payment

A one-time payment of the "Total Cost" will be issued to SUBCONTRACTOR upon receipt of the fully executed Agreement and an invoice requesting payment in full. Payment to SUBCONTRACTOR shall not exceed the amount listed under "Total Cost".

6. Invoices

SUBCONTRACTOR must submit one invoice for payment of "Total Cost" that includes a statement indicating "payment in full for the 2018 Orange County Counselor Symposium." The invoice must include the Agreement number (refer to footer), and should be submitted to the following address:

7. <u>Reporting</u>

Through this Agreement, SUBCONTRACTOR agrees to provide data and submit reports, upon request, for the duration of the Agreement. SUBCONTRACTOR will submit reports to the Project Director via email at Chamorro_Gustavo@rsccd.edu in a timely manner.

8. Expenditure of Funds

SUBCONTRACTOR agrees to comply with all funding requirements and that it is solely responsible for the appropriate expenditure of all funds received and for any misappropriation or dis-allowment of funds.

9. <u>Time Extensions</u>

FISCAL AGENT will not be requesting a time extension for program activities from the PRIME SPONSOR. As a result, SUBCONTRACTOR will not be granted an extension. Therefore, SUBCONTRACTOR must spend all of the funds allocated through this Agreement within the timeframe of the Agreement. Under this Agreement, SUBCONTRACTOR will only be reimbursed for expenses that are incurred on or prior to **December 31, 2018**.

10. Independent Contractor

SUBCONTRACTOR agrees that the services provided hereunder are rendered in its capacity as an independent contractor and that it is not in any way an agent of FISCAL AGENT, nor shall its employees be entitled to any personnel benefits of FISCAL AGENT whatsoever.

# 11. Subcontract Assignment

Unless specifically noted in the Scope of Work (**Exhibit A**), none of the duties of, or work to be performed by, SUBCONTRACTOR under this Agreement shall be sub-contracted or assigned to any agency, consultant, or person without the prior written approval by FISCAL AGENT. No subcontract or assignment shall terminate or alter the legal obligation of SUBCONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement.

SUBCONTRACTOR shall insure that all subcontracts for services and contracted staff are procured in a manner consistent with state SUBCONTRACTOR guidelines. SUBCONTRACTOR shall itemize all sub-contractor and contracted staff costs in the budget so it is clear how the funds will be allocated and spent by SUBCONTRACTOR. By entering into this Agreement SUBCONTRACTOR agrees that it is the direct provider of intended services. Upon request, SUBCONTRACTOR shall submit to FISCAL AGENT copies of all sub-contracts for services and contracted staff, and other agreements, as well as documentation indicating the approving authority's approval, that relate to this Agreement.

# 12. <u>Rules for Deliverables</u>

- A. Any document or written report prepared in whole or in part by Parties shall reference the Strong Workforce Program relating to the preparation of such document or written report.
- B. All products resulting from this Agreement or its subcontracts in whole or in part shall reference the California Community Colleges, Chancellor's Office and the specific funding source (Strong Workforce Program).
- C. All references to the project shall include the phrase, "funded in part by the California Community Colleges, Chancellor's Office."

# 13. Record Keeping

SUBCONTRACTOR agrees to maintain project records for possible audit for a minimum of five (5) years after final payment or until any audit findings have been resolved, unless a longer period of records retention is stipulated.

# 14. <u>Audit</u>

SUBCONTRACTOR agrees that FISCAL AGENT, the PRIME SPONSOR, the Bureau of State Audits, any other appropriate state or federal oversight agency, or their designated representative(s), shall have the right to review and to copy any records and supporting documentation pertaining to the performance of this Agreement. SUBCONTRACTOR agrees to allow the auditor(s) access to such records during normal business hours and to allow interviews of any employees who might reasonably have information related to such records. Further, SUBCONTRACTOR agrees to include a similar right of FISCAL AGENT, the PRIME SPONSOR, the Bureau of State Audits, any other appropriate state or federal oversight agency, or their designated representative(s) to audit records and interview staff in any subcontract related to the performance of this Agreement.

## 15. Insurance

The Parties are self-insured public entities for the purposes of professional liability, general liability and workers' compensation. Each Party warrants that through its program of self-

insurance it has adequate liability, general liability and workers' compensation to provide coverage for liabilities arising out of the Parties performance of this contract.

## 16. Mutual Indemnification

Both Parties to this Agreement shall agree to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the other Party, its officers, agents, employees, and volunteers, from and against all loss, cost, and expense arising out of any liability or claim of liability, sustained or claimed to have been sustained, arising out of activities, or the performance or nonperformance of obligations under this Agreement, of the indemnifying Party, or those of any of its officers, agents, employees, or volunteers. The provisions of this Article do not apply to any damage or losses caused solely by the negligence of the non-indemnifying Party or any of its agents or employees.

## 17. Termination

Either Party may terminate this Agreement, with or without cause upon thirty (30) days written notice served upon the other Party. Notice shall be deemed served on the date of mailing. Upon termination, or notice thereof, the Parties agree to cooperate with one another in the orderly transfer of contract responsibilities, records, and pertinent documents.

The obligations of FISCAL AGENT under this Agreement are contingent upon the availability of State funds, as applicable, for the reimbursement of SUBCONTRACTOR expenditures, and inclusion of sufficient funds for the services hereunder in the budget approved by the FISCAL AGENT Board of Trustees each fiscal year this Agreement remains in effect. In the event that such funding is terminated or reduced, FISCAL AGENT shall provide SUBCONTRACTOR with written notification of such determination, and FISCAL AGENT shall reimburse SUBCONTRACTOR for costs incurred for the completion of the work described in **Exhibit A**, including without limitation, all non-cancelable obligations incurred through the date of termination.

## 18. Disputes

In the event of a dispute between the Parties, the aggrieved Party shall notify the other Party and provide a detailed description of the alleged problem. The Parties agree to use reasonable efforts to resolve such dispute by good faith negotiations and mutual agreement. In the event such informal resolution is not successful within a reasonable period of time, the Parties hereby agree that such dispute will be resolved in the manner specified below.

Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, any dispute concerning any question arising under this Agreement shall be decided by FISCAL AGENT and/or the PRIME SPONSOR. In such a case, the decision shall be reduced to writing and a copy thereof shall be mailed or otherwise furnished to SUBCONTRACTOR. The decision shall be final and conclusive unless within thirty (30) calendar days from the mailing or delivery of such copy, FISCAL AGENT receives from SUBCONTRACTOR a written request to appeal said decision. Pending final decision of the appeal, SUBCONTRACTOR shall act in accordance with the written decision of FISCAL AGENT or the PRIME SPONSOR, whichever is the final arbiter of the dispute. The handling of non-criminal complaints, including discrimination complaints, and complaints and reports of criminal fraud, waste and abuse shall be as prescribed by the State of California,

and/or the PRIME SPONSOR, whichever is applicable, in accordance with applicable provisions of the Code of Federal Regulations.

## 19. Notices

All notices, reports and correspondence between the Parties hereto respecting this Agreement shall be in writing and deposited in the United States Mail, postage prepaid, addressed as follows:

## 20. Unenforceable Provision

In the event that any provision of this Agreement is unenforceable or held to be unenforceable, then the Parties agree that all other provisions of this Agreement remain in full force and effect and shall not be affected thereby.

## 21. Waiver

Agreement #DO-18-2225-35

Any waiver by FISCAL AGENT of any breach of any one or more of the terms of this Agreement shall not be construed to be a waiver of any subsequent or other breach of the same or of any other term. Failure on the part of Fiscal Agent to require full, exact, and complete compliance with any terms of this Agreement shall not be construed as in any manner changing the terms of this Agreement, or stopping FISCAL AGENT from enforcing the terms of this Agreement.

## 22. Severability

If any provision in this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remaining provisions will nevertheless continue in full force and effect without being impaired or invalidated in any way.

## 23. Amendments

This Agreement may be modified or revised at any time by the Parties as long as the amendment is made in writing and signed by an authorized official of both Parties.

As the Agreement is contingent upon the availability of funds, and is subject to any additional restrictions, limitations, or conditions enacted in the State Budget and/or Executive Orders that may affect the provisions, terms, or funding of this Agreement in any manner, FISCAL AGENT may modify this Agreement through an amendment, as needed. # Guidelines, Definitions and Reasonable Standards for Strong Workforce Funding Investment

(Local and Regional Share)

# Reasonable

Reasonable is defined by the dictionary as: agreeable to sound judgment, not exceeding the limit prescribed by reason (not excessive), moderate in price, and a rational decision. Systems that can guide this definition are: necessary for the performance of the funding; follow sound business practices (procurement processes, follow state and local laws, follow the terms of the funding source); use of fair market prices; acting with prudence under the circumstances; and having no significant deviation from established prices.

The following, directly relate to Strong Workforce Education Code Requirements and some examples of the standard non-allowable activities that meet the "front-page of the newspaper" test of reasonable and the allowable indirect cost rate:

- **Supplanting:** Funds appropriated to community college districts for local or regional share investment shall supplement, not supplant, existing funding of community college career technical education programs. This shall not be interpreted to mean that a participating community college district is prohibited from eliminating or altering existing programs, but the percentage of that community college district's total full-time equivalent students enrolled in career technical education courses relative to the total full-time equivalent students enrolled in the district shall not be reduced from the percentage computed for the 2015–16 fiscal year. [*EC§88824(e)*]
- **Funding CTE Only:** Funds expended must show a direct benefit to the requirements of the Strong Workforce Program outcomes of increasing the number of quality students or programs in CTE courses programs and pathways and addressing the recommendations of the Strong Workforce Task Force. [EC\$88824(d)(5)(A-C)]
- **Duplication of Effort:** To avoid duplication of effort, activities funded under the Strong Workforce Program shall be informed by, aligned with, and expand upon the activities of existing workforce and education regional partnerships, including those partnership activities that pertain to regional planning efforts established pursuant to the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (Public Law 113-128), adult education block grant consortia, and K-12 career technical education programs. *[EC§88821(4)(d)*
- **District Procedures:** All fiscal policy and program procedures adopted by the applicable Community College District shall be followed when expending (local and regional) allocations.

### • Non-Allowable Activities:

*Entertainment* – Costs of entertainment, including amusement, diversion, and social activities and any costs directly associated with such costs (such as tickets to shows or sports events, meals, lodging, rentals, transportation, and gratuities) are unallowable.

Alcoholic Beverages – Costs of alcoholic beverages are unallowable.

**Contingency** (Rainy Day Funds) – Contributions to a contingency reserve or any similar provision made for events the occurrence of which cannot be foretold with certainty as to time, intensity, or with an assurance of their happening, are unallowable.

*Goods and Services for Personal Use* – Cost of goods and services for Personal use is unallowable.

**Lobbying** – Lobbying is never allowed unless it meets the following criteria: (1) Technical and factual presentations on topics directly related to the performance of a grant, contract, or other agreement (through hearing testimony, statements, or letters to the Congress or a State legislature, or subdivision, member, or cognizant staff member thereof), in response to a documented request (including a Congressional Record notice requesting testimony or statements for the record at a regularly scheduled hearing) made by the recipient member, legislative body or subdivision, or a cognizant staff member thereof, provided such information is readily obtainable and can be readily put in deliverable form, and further provided that costs under this section for travel, lodging or meals are unallowable unless incurred to offer testimony at a regularly scheduled Congressional hearing pursuant to a written request for such presentation made by the Chairman or Ranking Minority Member of the Committee or Subcommittee conducting such hearings.

*Contributions or Donations* – Cash or property contributions or donations are unallowable.

*Fund Raising and Investment Costs* – Costs of organized fund raising, including financial campaigns, solicitation of gifts and bequests, and similar expenses incurred to raise capital or obtain contributions are unallowable, regardless of the purpose for which the funds will be used.

This memorandum provides guidance on the use of funds for the strong workforce program.

#### August 24, 2016 – Scope of Work

#### **Roles and Responsibility**

### **Regional Share Fiscal Agent**

The fiscal agent has no authority over decisions on the use of funding, rather the fiscal agent role is to dispense, monitor and audit sub-grants once spending decisions have been authorized by the CTE Regional Consortia as stipulated in Strong Workforce legislation. The district designated as the fiscal agent shall perform the following roles and responsibilities:

- Provide a single-point of contact to act as an embedded member of the CTE Regional Consortium (RC) Team to account for financial operation and control associated with the Regional Share.
- Review sub-awardee applications for compliance with grant terms and requirements. Work with sub-awardees to resolve issues that arise.
- Review sub-award application budgets to ensure that expenditures are allowable under the grant terms and conditions, are properly classified, and that the calculations are correct. Work with sub-awardees to resolve any issues that arise.
- Develop policies, procedures, systems and timelines for disbursement of funds.
- Determine the documentation required to ensure funds are properly accounted for
- Develop systems to track each of the contracts/grants and their status that can be shared with the RCs, the CCCCO grant monitors, and sub-awardees.
- Develop sub-award agreements with each of the sub-awardees that incorporate the contracting requirements of the CCCCO and the Fiscal Agent.
- Provide information, guidelines and technical assistance to sub-awardees.
- Manage the flow of funds to sub-awardees by receiving, reviewing and approving claims for funds and ensure that proper documentation has been received to verify that what was requested conforms to what was approved when discrepancies occur.
- Issue payments and verify that payments have been received.
- Fulfill reporting requirements by receiving and monitoring quarterly reports and final reports from the sub-awardees.
- Follow-up on missing or incorrect reports. Work with sub-awardees to resolve issues.
- Consolidate reports and report up to the RC/CCCCO as required and upon request.
- Conduct sub-recipient monitoring and audits, in accordance with grant requirements and OMB Uniform Guidelines.
- Field questions on allowable expenditures in accordance with any CCCCO guidance
- Review sub-awardees' requests for approval of contracts and sub-agreements, prior to forwarding requests to CCCCO for final approval. Provide guidance and direction to the colleges to ensure compliance and facilitate CCCCO review and approval, as needed.
- Collaborate with RCs to standardize Strong Workforce related fiscal related and reporting processed, procedures and to develop recommendations and responses to CCCCO.

### **Expanded Regionalized Coordination:**

The chart below shows a regional model funding breakdown that includes the following sources: Perkins 1b and the regional share allocation. Under this model, the CTE Regional Consortia shall use 5% of the regional share allocation for basic operations of the CTE Regional Consortia capacity including any fiscal agency costs. 2% of the 5% regional share operational amount will cover the fiscal agency costs (with amounts adjusted to a maximum of \$200,000 and a minimum of \$100,000. This adjustment affects Regions B, D, & G1). The remaining 3% is then leveraged with the Perkins 1b funds, and becomes the total funds available for RC basic operations and key talent expenditures. These amounts are represented in the last column of the chart.

### **Budget Development Guidance/Fiscal Agent fees**

As you continue budget development, please consider the following points:

- The total amount taken from the regional share allocation is 5%. Of this amount, the fiscal agency costs shall be capped at 2% (=40% of the 5%) or a maximum of \$200,000 and a minimum of \$100,000 for each region, leaving 3% (=60% of the 5%) to cover regional consortium costs.
- Indirect cannot be taken on any part of the 5% funds. The 2% (with a max of \$200,000 and a min of \$100,000) shall fund the fiscal agent operational costs such as office space, network support, copier use, personnel, etc. The 3% (along with the Perkins 1B allocation) will fund the regional consortium operational costs such as clerical/office staff, travel, meeting facilitation, etc.
- Perkins 1B funds should be used to pay for Key Talent costs, such as the RC salaries. Keep in mind that these funds have a 4% indirect being charged to the each of these grants.
- If 5% of the regional allocation is for fiscal agent and regional consortium costs, and 85% of the regional allocation is for more and better CTE program(s). The remaining 10% covers soft costs associated with Task Force recommendations should not be used to build regional consortium capacity or infrastructure. This percentage should be used for the following:
  - o Region-wide outreach to employers with ultimate goal of increasing internships/hires
  - o Region-wide outreach to students/parents about CTE options
  - o Additional data-related needs
  - o Professional development for curriculum approval

### **BACKGROUND**

Rancho Santiago Community College District received a fiscal year 2018/19 Adult Education Program – Regional Consortium Funding Apportionment (Assembly Bill 104), formerly Adult Education Block Grant, from the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office. Funding was awarded to the Rancho Santiago Adult Education Consortium (RSAEC) that includes RSCCD, three school districts (Santa Ana, Orange, and Garden Grove), the Orange County Department of Education, and the Orange County Sheriff's Department.

The Chancellor's Office has apportioned Adult Education Program funds to regions throughout the state to expand and improve opportunities for educational and workforce services for adult learners. Funding will support RSAEC's AB 86 Regional Comprehensive Plan seven program areas: (1) elementary and secondary basic skills, including high school diploma or GED; (2) citizenship, English as a second language, and workforce preparation; (3) adults/older adults entry or re-entry into the workforce; (4) family literacy; (5) adults with disabilities; (6) career technical education; and (7) pre-apprenticeship training activities. The apportionment award is \$3,066,565. The funding term is July 1, 2018, through December 31, 2020, with program activities and reporting ending June 30, 2021.

### ANALYSIS

The enclosed sub-agreement (#DO-18-2238-01) with the Friendly Center is to provide child care/babysitting services during the fall and spring semesters in fiscal year 2018/19 thereby increasing adult students' participation in adult education programs. ### GRANT SUB-AGREEMENT BETWEEN RANCHO SANTIAGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT AND LOS RIOS COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT

- Create and deliver a Division of Apprenticeship Standards (DAS) approved curriculum that introduces Apprentices to key accounting and auditing concepts and skills;
- Develop a sustainable apprenticeship pipeline for populations that are underrepresented in accounting and auditing related occupations;
- Coordinate and leverage existing SEIU Local 1000, ARC, and state agency resources to support workers' overall engagement and success.

The ARC Project Director represents the campus as fiscal agent, and will oversee all program activities. ARC will provide Related Supplemental Instruction for all registered apprentices. Upon receipt of grant funding a committee of representatives from ARC, SEIU Local 1000, GovOps, CDTFA, EDD, FTB, and any other interested partner state agencies will convene regularly to conduct continuing program planning, implementation, apprentice support, research, and evaluation.

This new and innovative apprenticeship program affords unique deliverables:

- A sustainable financial services professional pathway. This apprenticeship-tonew-career pipeline provides upward mobility opportunities to workers from disproportionately impacted communities underrepresented in financial services occupations
- It supports structured professional development within a career advancement scaffolding model. Apprentices learn in demand basic concepts and skills that serve as a foundation for upward socioeconomic mobility
- Successful matriculation of 60 apprentices over 42 months. Coursework provides apprentices with the academic qualifications combined with jobbased hands-on experience necessary to qualify for near future career advancement opportunities
- An increase in the pool of civil service applicants prepared to fill vacancies in an occupational sector that has significant shortages and is projected to grow exponentially over the next 10 years.

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### Need

**Overview:** The need for qualified financial services workers in California's civil service sector is prevalent across agencies, departments, and geographies statewide, and especially so in the Sacramento region. Based on input from our partner agencies, current civil service recruitment efforts fail to fill vacancies, leaving civil service programs understaffed and incumbent employees with unmanageable workloads. The resulting impact is fewer opportunities for professional development or wage advancement among the incumbent workforce.

The proposed **California Financial Services Apprenticeship Collaborative** program will create upward socioeconomic mobility opportunities for civil service workers currently employed by state agencies. Apprentices will complete an occupation-specific Related Supplemental Instruction (RSI) curriculum and On the Job Training (OJT) via a Training and Development (T&D) assignment. Training and curriculum includes: basic accounting, business, business management and communication concepts, and soft skills acquisition. Mastery of these skill sets is a cornerstone of the technical and interpersonal aspects of the state's financial services occupations per hiring managers consulted for this proposal.

Upon successful completion of the program, apprentices will be academically and professionally qualified to access journey level civil service positions. This program proposal is designed to accomplish this goal as well as the three primary policy objectives set forth in California's 2016-2020 Unified Strategic Workforce Development Plan¹.

The California Financial Services Apprenticeship Collaborative will foster demanddriven skills attainment as prioritized by the partner agencies; enable upward economic mobility, self-sufficiency, and security for apprentices; and leverage the collective resources of all program partners to create a scalable and sustainable program design.

**Demand grows for skilled financial services workers:** In 2016, for the seventh year in a row, Manpower Group's annual Talent Shortage Survey² listed accounting and finance positions among the most difficult jobs to fill. Forty-eight percent of employers reported challenges filling openings due to the lack of technical competence among applicants. Another 32% of employers identified a lack of candidates in general. In total, 80% of employers reported difficulty filling vacancies in accounting and finance as the result of a candidate pool that failed to meet their needs.

Yet, these industries continue to experience marked job growth. According to California's Economic Development Department (EDD), accountant and auditor occupations are expected to grow faster than all other occupations. The number of jobs in these target occupations is projected to increase by 28,000 between 2014 and 2024; an 18% job growth rate.

Increased growth in the financial services sector is also reflected in the greater Sacramento region, according to EDD's *Projection in Employment, Regional Economic Analysis Profiles 2012-2022.*³ In 2016, approximately 18,384 accounting and auditing jobs were located in Sacramento County. This figure is projected to increase 14.4% by 2024 with the creation of approximately 1,780 new positions in the Capitol region.

Additionally, 63% of the 11,300 financial services related jobs within state civil service are based in Sacramento County. While the overall vacancy rate for SEIU Local 1000 rank-and-file state civil service accounting and auditing classifications is 16%, the average vacancy rate for the state's accounting classifications is 22% or about 520 open positions. Auditing classifications share the same median vacancy rate at 22% – well above the overall average for state service occupations – with 560 vacant positions. These high vacancy rates highlight the need for innovative programming that allows state agencies to train and retain a critical accounting and auditing workforce.

*Minority workers underrepresented in financial services occupations:* Across California, minority workers are vastly underrepresented in higher-level financial services occupations compared to other groups. According to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission's 2015 private industry data⁴, non-white workers comprise 51% of those employed in the "Finance and Insurance" industry. Yet, only 23% of non-white workers are employed in senior management positions. As reflected in Table 1, this pattern of underrepresentation is consistent and more pronounced among Black and Hispanic workers.

Similar underrepresentation is evident when examining minority representation among financial services occupations in California state civil service. State Controller's Office data indicate that Black, Hispanic, and Native American workers comprise about 35% of California's state workforce; however, the same demographic groups make up only 26% of all financial services positions. Note in Table 2 (below) that Black and Latino rank-and-file financial services workers account for 6% and 14%, respectively, of the overall financial services workforce. Furthermore, 46% of Black, Hispanic, and Native American workers employed in financial services positions earn less than \$40,000 annually.

The pattern of minority underrepresentation in well-paying financial services occupations is problematic given the demand for and an abundance of well-paying jobs. This suggests an opportunity to invest in career advancement pathways that contribute to the long-term economic stability of the state economy and uplifts economically vulnerable Californians.

**Occupational compaction and upward mobility:** This apprenticeship program seeks to create upward mobility opportunities for incumbent workforce employees, and ultimately individuals from the general public, who work in clerical and entry-level accounting occupations. The elevation is job title can result in as much as 23% increase in annual salary (as shown later in this proposal).

This apprenticeship program initially seeks state civil service workers, with the focus on creating opportunities for employees in compacted clerical and entry-level accounting classifications. Following the initial pilot, the intent is to scale the program to serve the entire state of California. The RSI and OJT components of the apprenticeship will provide workers with the educational background and work experience required to meet the minimum qualifications of financial services occupations in state civil service.

At present two primary factors contribute to "occupational compaction":

1) Entry into the classification requires a relatively common basic skills set; and

2) Career advancement requires specialized education and training and a higher-level skillset, which this apprenticeship program will meet.

This apprenticeship program will institute a targeted incumbent worker training program that moves workers up the financial services career ladder. Sustainability is achieved by targeting incumbent civil service workers to advance to higher-level positions in the financial services career pathway. Likewise, the upward movement of workers in clerical and entry-level accounting classifications creates entry-level job openings for the incumbent and non-incumbent workforce populations.

The State of California is the single employer, but for this apprenticeship program stakeholders will form a Joint Apprenticeship Committee (JAC) to manage the program's operation and oversight. Beginning in the latter part of 2017, program stakeholders including the Division of Apprenticeship Standards (DAS), Service Employees International Union Local 1000 (SEIU Local 1000), and the State Departments (CDTFA, EDD, and FTB) began meeting to proactively coordinate and identify the members of a JAC committee, as well as their respective roles and responsibilities. The above named stakeholders considered different programmatic oversight models and will finalize this decision making process upon an award of grant funding.

One governance option the group is considering consists of a primary oversight committee comprised of all program stakeholders. The oversight committee would then be divided into smaller, department-specific subcommittees. Another model under consideration excludes the smaller subcommittee component. Regardless of which apprenticeship program governance model materializes, all stakeholders agree on the importance of equal employer and labor union representation. As part of its role as LEA, American River College will serve either as a member or consultant of the JAC. Again, upon notice of grant funding, titles, positions, and responsibilities of the California Financial Services Apprenticeship Collaborative committee members will be finalized.

**The Financial Services Apprenticeship curriculum:** The curriculum is designed to prepare individuals for success as part of the California Financial Services Apprenticeship Collaborative Program. Apprentices will receive the on the job training and instruction needed to advance onto journey-level financial services occupations. Preferred applicants for the Financial Services Apprenticeship Program will have 1) developed some facility with basic accounting and more complex clerical skills throughout their working career; and 2) demonstrated some aptitude in these areas (i.e. as exemplified by prior work experience, academic coursework, or a combination of these factors). The curriculum allows for apprentices with varying educational backgrounds to gain familiarity and confidence in these subject areas and become competitive applicants for journey-level positions following completion of the program. While the apprenticeship program will be open to all individuals who show interest and meet the applicant criteria, program design efforts will emphasize outreach and recruitment of individuals who are traditionally underrepresented in the financial services field.

Those individuals selected to participate in the apprenticeship program will engage in a curriculum offered by American River College and with fundamental courses in math, English, accounting, business, and computer applications. Enrollment in coursework will be tailored and customized to the needs of participants based on prior work experience, educational background, and college assessment levels. Apprenticeship participants will have 18-24 months to complete the proposed curriculum. Additionally, this curriculum will satisfy accounting tasks requirements for most standard agency financial services work in California's civil service as determined by the partnering state agencies identified in this proposal.

Along with this core curriculum for all financial services target occupations and classifications ARC faculty and the program partners will develop a set of electives that allow for department-specific skill set attainment. For example, while the core competencies for the Tax Auditor classification are consistent across multiple civil service departments it is common to have variation among specific job duties and work processes from one department to the next. To address this variability the proposed coursework is designed as a "core" curriculum, supplemented by department-specific academic "electives". This strategic curricular approach is sensitive to the nuances of financial services occupations and employment, and allows the program to be both structured and flexible to meet apprentice and employer needs. Finally, this approach to curriculum design accommodates the various occupational variations resulting in an apprentice who is better prepared to be successful in a journey-level position or assignment.

- describe the traditional types of product costing systems (including job-order and process), illustrate the flow of costs in each, and prepare related accounting records and reports.

- discuss the impact of technology on the business environment, its implications for product and service costs, and the development of activity-based costing and management.
- explain the purposes of budgeting, prepare a master budget and its component schedules, and relate the budget to planning and control.
- explain the development and use of standard costs and flexible budgets, prepare and interpret variance analysis reports, and relate them to responsibility accounting and control.
- explain the nature of and need for segment reporting and its relationship to cost, revenue, profit, and investment centers; prepare and analyze related segment reports.
- compare and contrast absorption costing and variable costing, prepare income statements using both methods, and reconcile the resulting net incomes.
- define relevant costs and benefits and prepare analyses related to special decisions.
- explain the nature of capital expenditure decisions and apply and evaluate various methods used in making these decisions; including the time value of money.
- identify the ethical implications inherent in managerial accounting and reporting and apply strategies for addressing them.

Text and case reading relevant to the legal and ethical environment in which businesses operate. Analysis of actual and hypothetical cases involving key legal concepts and principles of business law.

### Example #1:

Research the landmark case of Marbury v. Madison (1803) using the law library of the American River College Library and/or findlaw.com. Read the case and discuss its relevance as it relates to the establishment of the doctrine of judicial review. Analyze how the U.S. Supreme Court usurped this opportunity to become a legitimate, equal partner and a true third branch of government. Please also discuss how many Justices comprise the U.S. Supreme Court, how do they earn their position on the bench, and how long do they serve? Last, please explain what is the primary function of the Supreme Court. Prepare your explanation in a brief written format and be prepared to discuss in class.

#### Example #2:

Dan, a driver for ABC Delivery Company, which is owned by Ernie Employer and organized as a Limited Liability Company, decides to take a short deviation from his normal delivery schedule route in Sacramento, California to handle a personal errand. While away from his normal route, Dan is involved in a motor vehicle collision because he is distracted by texting on his cell phone. Dan swerves to avoid a Regional Transit bus that has stopped to drop off passengers but rear ends the car in the left lane in front of him. The California Highway Patrol (CHP) arrives on the scene and later concludes that Dan is the primary cause of the collision because he was traveling at an unsafe speed for conditions and for making an unsafe lane change and for speeding, in direct violation of California Vehicle Codes Sections 22350 and 21658(a) and 22349(a), respectively. The CHP Officer issues a citation or infraction to Dan for these violations, as well as one for texting/text messaging while driving because Wally, a witness, states that he saw a cell phone in Dan's hand immediately after the collision. Victor, the driver of the car Dan rear ended, is seriously injured and his vehicle has significant damage. Who can Victor make a claim against? What damages can he sue for? What legal theories or causes of action can he employ to recoup his losses? Can he sue Ernie Employer directly? Please look up the three (3) referenced vehicle code violations and determine if you agree they were all correct. Last, analyze the cell phone texting/text messaging allegation and its likely disposition in Court.

Students' success is evaluated through application/written exercises, problem-solving assignments, exams and quizzes, research reports, written responses to essay questions, and individual oral and written projects.

Applications use data from various disciplines including business, social sciences, psychology, life and health sciences, and education. Statistical analysis using a computer statistics package or graphing calculator is required.

6) On-The-Job Training (OJT)--Term of Apprenticeship Program:

The minimum Standards for Term of Apprenticeship Program require: 2,000 OJT hours within a reasonable calendar period (12 to 18 months). For each occupation/craft, what will be the term of apprenticeship (OJT hours)? How many months to complete the program?

All apprentices will complete a total of 4,000 OJT hours. These hours will be completed at each civil service agency or department job site and comply with the details of the job description and corresponding minimum qualifications. As outlined in the response to item five (above), the apprenticeship is 18-24 months of RSI and OJT occurs concurrently.

The mechanism that permits civil service apprentices to complete their OJT requirement is the State of California Training and Development (T&D) program. Excerpts detailing that program are provided below⁵:

#### T&D Guidelines:

The following guidelines are provided to assist in determining the appropriateness of a T&D assignment. These guidelines are intended to provide enough flexibility to allow T&D assignments between different occupational groups for the purpose of upward mobility and the opportunity to move to nontraditional occupations while ensuring that the flexibility is channeled in as lateral a direction as possible to prevent circumvention of the competitive promotional process.

- a) Employees must have permanent status in their present class, or have probationary status in their present class and previously have had permanent status with no break in service due to a permanent separation since the permanent status.
- b) Eligibility for T&D assignments is based on the employee's permanent appointment level. Employees on temporary or limited-term appointments have to return to their permanent appointment class before going on a T&D assignment.
- c) Employees who are currently on probation, but who have prior permanent status, are permitted to participate in a T&D assignment. However, the appointing power should be advised that T&D assignments do count towards the completion of probation. Therefore, it is not recommended giving T&D assignments to probationary employees when there is any question concerning the employee's ability to perform the duties of their current classification.

The primary consideration in making a T&D assignment should be that the training

assignment is consistent with the career development plan of the employee and provides for real development experience. Additional guidelines and standards for T&D assignments are as follows:

- a) T&D assignments may not be used to circumvent a promotional eligible list.
- b) The T&D classification may be to a classification with substantially the same salary to which the employee could voluntarily transfer.
- c) T&D assignments may be made to a classification with a promotional salary range provided that:
  - i. The higher salaried classification is the classification in the desired occupational area nearest in salary to the employees' current classification that will provide an appropriate training experience: and
  - ii. When the T&D classification is more than three steps higher than the employee's current classification, the intent of the T&D assignment is to prepare the employee for a permanent move to the T&D classification or to a closely related classification, and the employee will meet the minimum qualification for the higher salaried classification by the conclusion of the T&D assignment; and
  - iii. The T&D classification is not in the same classification series as the employee's present classification.

T&D assignments may be made to a classification with a demotional salary range provided that:

- a) It is the classification in the desired occupational area nearest in salary to the employee's current classification that will provide the appropriate training experience: and
- b) Any assignments to classifications that are more than three steps lower than the employee's status classification are approved in advance by the State Personnel Board (SPB); and
- c) The purpose of the T&D assignment is to prepare for future service in a classification to the salary range of the employee's current classification; and
- d) The assignment will provide experience that differs from the duties that the employee has previously performed.

T&D assignments to a lower level of responsibility allow an employee to gain experience in a new occupational field that will ultimately prepare them for service at or above their current classification level. T&D assignments to lower classes are also

appropriate when it will reduce the impact of a cut in the employee's salary while they are gaining the experience needed to meet the alternate range criteria of a class they intend to transfer into. In applying the guidelines of a T&D assignment to a lower level classification, care must be taken to ensure that the lower level assignment really constitutes the required training for a future assignment at or above the employee's current classification level. Lower level T&D assignments are not appropriate in situations where a disciplinary or medical demotion is the more appropriate remedy.

### 7) Work Processes:

The **California Financial Services Apprenticeship Collaborative** is a novel and innovative project. All project stakeholders (state departments and agencies, SEIU Local 1000, and ARC) are actively working with the Division of Apprenticeship Standards (DAS) to identify and create the new work processes for this currently non-existent apprenticeship program.

The sample job description below is a target occupation classification for the program, and was used for the creation of RSI curriculum. Moving forward, 4,000 hours of OJT will be delineated by each department according to the details of the job description and corresponding minimum qualifications required for entry into this career pathway. As outlined in the response to item five (above), the apprenticeship is 18-24 months of RSI in length and all programmatic work processes will mirror this timeline.

#### Occupation Title: Tax Auditor (applicable for CDTFA, EDD, FTB) Term of apprenticeship: 24 months/4,000 hrs

• **Description:** This is the entry, training, and first journey level in this series. Under supervision, incumbents conduct professional program audit work or may serve as a member of an audit team on more difficult audits. Incumbents learn all phases of tax audit work, and either:

(1) Conduct the least-to-moderately difficult field audits of accounts and records of individuals, business organizations, State agencies, or other governmental jurisdictions subject to State taxation or regulations;

(2) In the office, audit the least-to-moderately difficult tax returns and financial statements for completeness, accuracy, and proper application of the law; correspond with taxpayers to request additional information and answer taxpayers' questions; prepare working schedules to show changes in tax liability; make recommendations for proposed additional assessments; or

(3) Apply provisions of the California Unemployment Insurance Code, the Revenue and Taxation Code, applicable regulations, legal opinions, court and

(Registration as a senior student in a recognized institution will admit applicants to the examination, but they must produce evidence of successful completion of the curriculum and the prescribed courses before they may be considered eligible for appointment.)

Completion of a prescribed professional accounting curriculum given by a residence or correspondence school of accountancy including courses in elementary and advanced accounting, auditing, cost accounting, and business law.

The Journeyman to Apprentice ratio will be 1:5. Apprentices will be supervised by the appropriate journey-level employee or departmental supervisor according to existing employer practices, and in alignment with the appropriate collective bargaining unit agreement.

What will the wage schedule (hourly and benefits) be for each occupation/craft? (Apprentices must be paid at least minimum wage \$10.00 per hour or local county/city rate.)

Please answer below:

#### a. Journeyman base hourly rate and fringe benefits (if any.)

This apprenticeship will target multiple journey-level financial services classifications, each of which has a specific salary scale. ARC has been working collaboratively with the participating state departments to assess which classifications should be targeted. Though assessment is ongoing, we have selected the Tax Auditor classification as our initial journey-level classification target. The monthly salary for this classification ranges from \$3,546 to \$6,207. This is equivalent to an hourly wage of \$20.46 to \$35.81. More specific salary information can be found in Table 5 below. Finally, fringe benefits for this classification and SEIU Local 1000. They include health benefits, vision care, pension contributions, vacation and sick leave, and others.

# b. Apprentice base hourly rate and fringe benefits (if any.) Show each period (hours and months) to allow for advancement.

An apprentice shall be paid in accordance with the California State Civil Service Pay Scale appropriate to the current classification. For example, an apprentice entering into this program as an Office Assistant will receive a 3.5-4% annual wage increase based on the schedule in Table 4 below. Upon completion of the two year program, apprentices who become Tax Auditors continue receiving annual wage increases, but at the new wage schedule provided in Table 5.

Imagine a scenario where Apprentice Hernandez, a "Range B" Office Assistant, earns a maximum salary of \$3,102/month in July 2017. At minimum, Hernandez will earn an additional \$715/month – a 23% salary increase – after completing the two year apprenticeship program in July 2019 and becoming a "Range A" Tax Auditor.

Thereafter, Hernandez's wage earnings potential is positively skewed as the new professional career track is ascended. Now imagine this same upward mobility example being replicated by hundreds, and subsequently thousands, of individuals across California. The potential growth of the middle class through this apprenticeship program is indeed significant, as is the positive impact it will have on the lives of the individuals involved.

The salary schedules for select target classifications in Tables 4 and 5 below provide greater detail on salary differential between the Unit 4 and Unit 1 career tracks. All participating state agencies are contractually obligated to uniformly pay apprentice (i.e. employee) wages.

# c. What criteria will be used for an apprentice to gain a pay raise and advance to the next period?

Annual base pay and wage progression is determined by several factors consistent with the current SEIU Local 1000 collective bargaining agreement and civil service employment code. Select criteria is provided below:

#### 11.1 Salaries⁸

A. SEIU Local 1000 eligible employees shall receive a General Salary Increase (GSI) of four percent (4%) effective July 1, 2017, a GSI of four percent (4%) effective July 1, 2018, and a GSI of three and a half percent (3.5%) effective July 1, 2019.

B. Eligible employees means an employee of a recognized collective bargaining unit that has a ratified collective bargaining agreement containing these provisions.

#### 11.7 Merit Salary Adjustments (MSA)⁹

A. Employees shall receive annual MSA in accordance with Government Code section 19832 and applicable CalHR rules.

B. The employee shall be informed in writing of denial ten (10) working days prior to the proposed effective date of the MSA.

C. Denial of the MSA shall be subject to the grievance and arbitration procedure.

merit salary adjustment equivalent to one of the intermediate steps during each year when he or she meets the standards of efficiency as the department by rule shall prescribe.

Per the Preamble on page 1 of the "Master Agreement" document, the State of California and SEIU Local 1000 entered into the collective bargaining agreement contract. Therefore, all participating state departments and agencies agree to abide by this contract including paying apprentice employees based on the rates and terms noted above.

The California Financial Services Apprenticeship Collaborative will structure the financial solvency model of the apprenticeship program using a three-phase approach:

- **Phase 1** utilizes CAI grant funding to support the initial launch of the apprenticeship program. Grant funds establish a firm and finite programmatic foundation with the expectation that the employer partner will support it in the near future project term. Grant funds will also leverage Post-9/11 GI Bill funds for all veterans who participate in the apprenticeship program.
- In **Phase 2**, participating state agencies and departments (employers) utilize their existing Training and Development budgets to support the continuation of the apprenticeship program. This is consistent with the State of California's mission to support ongoing learning, workforce upskilling, upward economic mobility, and succession planning within state civil service occupations.
- Finally, **Phase 3** is a long-term strategy based on SEIU Local 1000's interest in developing a training trust fund. SEIU Local 1000 intends to establish a trust fund, supported by regular contributions from the State of California during its next round of contract negotiations in 2019. This successful and sustainable trust fund approach is modeled after other "traditional trades" unions throughout the state and in many other apprenticeship programs. Additionally, ARC will develop curriculum and incorporate Work Experience course credit, which will support LEA program fiscal stability. Implementation of Phases 2 and 3 ensures the long-term financial sustainability of this apprenticeship program.

#### Developing strategies for long-term success

Program stakeholders will employ the following strategies to identify funding sources that will support programmatic longevity and sustainability:

- Explore the development of an apprenticeship trust fund, partly funded by the State of California and partly funded by industry, which will create long-term funding stability for the state's apprenticeship initiatives
- Concurrent to the bullet above, ARC will work with its grant partners to begin
  modularizing the apprenticeship program curriculum; a critical step to develop
  the post-grant RSI funding model for this program. All grant partners will
  identify the most career/industry relevant Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs)
  within each Financial Services course. The resulting data will allow ARC to
  create a new Course Outlines of Record apprenticeship curriculum
- Seek new and innovative funding options with the Division of Apprenticeship Standards (DAS), business partners, community colleges, adult education centers, and other stakeholders
- Negotiate benefits during the collective bargaining process. Benefits will
  promote sustainability of funding and the expansion of formalized 20/20
  programs (short-term programs during which employees work part-time,
  attend school part-time, while receiving their full salary.) These programs
  allow employees to obtain in-demand skills that are valued by employers and
  required for career advancement.

 Develop an effective communication strategy to market and publicize the progress and impacts of the California Financial Services Apprenticeship Collaborative. Target audiences will be both internal and external to the grant partner organizations, new partners (i.e. State Controller's Office and CalPERS have already expressed interest in future participation), and prospective program participants.

American River College, SEIU Local 1000, participating civil service departments, and GovOps will develop a Joint Apprenticeship Committee. These key stakeholders have a vested interest in developing and launching the Financial Services Apprenticeship Collaborative. In addition to developing the apprenticeship, this committee will complete the following long-term success objectives related to the apprenticeship program:

- Develop an implementation strategy aimed at meeting the objectives detailed in the attached work plan
- Create a strategy to target, reach, and recruit applicants from demographic groups that are underrepresented in Financial Services occupations
- Solicit input from the CalCPA Institute's Diversity and the California Board of Accountancy to explore methods to create interest in financial services industry occupations among young people from disproportionately impacted communities in California
- Develop guidelines and committee procedures and processes for recruiting, screening, and selecting apprenticeship applicants
- Strategize and implement methods that maintain engagement among all partners throughout the program administration period
- Collect and analyze *Doing What Matters'* Strong Workforce Program Metrics data to measure the success of the apprenticeship program (Relevant data include figures related to course enrollment, change in earnings, attainment of a living wage, and apprenticeship certificates awarded)
- Evaluate research-based indicators for measurable student outcomes including academic performance, attendance, graduation data, and career advancement within the financial services industry

#### 11) Military Veterans:

Do you plan on recruiting military veterans? *Military veterans who enter registered* apprenticeship programs, depending on VA eligibility, qualify to access G.I. Bill benefits.

According to Daniel Avegalio, Student Services Supervisor for American River College's award winning¹² Veterans Resource Center (VRC), Business and Accounting degrees and certificates are among the most popular academic programs chosen by veterans. As such, military veterans and their families will be one of the key target populations for the Financial Services Apprenticeship Collaborative.

American River College's VRC serves over 1,200 veteran students and their family members, and provides outreach, academic counseling, and community resource services among others. The VRC serves as a link between students, their dependents, and the Department of Veterans Affairs for all educational and VA related needs. Similarly, SEIU Local 1000's Veterans Committee will serve as a platform to address veteran's issues and concerns within the union. The committee is dedicated to advocating for its members' military veterans and their families including issues related to health care, savings, investment, and retirement among others. American River College and SEIU Local 1000 will leverage their collective resources to ensure that all veterans and their families are encouraged to apply, participate, and succeed in this new and innovative apprenticeship program.

#### 12) Affirmative Action Plan:

What will the program's outreach and recruitment activities consist of to help increase minority and women's participation in your program?

The State of California is an equal opportunity employer to all, regardless of age, ancestry, color, disability (mental and physical), exercising the right of family care and medical leave, gender, gender expression, gender identity, genetic information, marital status, medical condition, military or veteran status, national origin, political affiliation, race, religious creed, sex (includes pregnancy, childbirth, breastfeeding, and related medical conditions), and sexual orientation.¹³

In accordance with existing laws and regulations, all financial services apprenticeship program stakeholders will engage in outreach and positive recruitment activities that strive to increase the participation of individuals from disproportionately impacted communities. All program stakeholders are committed to and have a vested interest in the development of fair and impartial program selection procedures; applying program selection procedures uniformly in the selection of applicants for apprenticeship, and; providing additional educational training to prepare those who may need assistance to qualify for apprenticeship program participation.

#### **13) Selection of Applicants:**

When, where, at what time and how often are written applications accepted within your program?

Written or electronic applications for the program will be accepted – annually or biannually – during a defined application period approximately six months prior to the

start of each cohort. For example, an application period will be held in early fall 2018 with the anticipation of a spring 2019 cohort. Applications may be submitted to SEIU Local 1000 Headquarters/GovOps in-person or online.

#### 14) Educational Prerequisites:

What are the educational prerequisites for entry into your program? (For example, applicant must have a High School Diploma, GED, or equivalent.)

Applicants for this program must have a High School Diploma, GED, or equivalent. Additionally, applicants may need to meet general educational prerequisite requirements, as defined by the JAC. In certain instances, comparable education received while serving in the military may be substituted for prerequisites. Candidates accepted into the program may be required to provide certified college transcripts prior to being indentured into the program.

#### **15) Physical Prerequisites:**

Will there be any physical requirements stated for entry into the program? (For example, must be able to lift 50 pounds for an extended period of time. Must be able to carry loads of up to 50 pounds up and down a 10 foot ladder numerous times a day.) *If your program will require a drug test or physical exam, this shall be at no cost to the applicant.* 

Physical requirements for the program are minimal. In order to participate, applicants must be able to physically perform the duties of the target classification (i.e. Tax Auditor), with or without accommodation, by the date they are indentured in the apprenticeship.

#### 16) Entry Exam (s): Written

Do you require other tests for entry into your program? (For example a math test, special awareness, or industry-related exam?) List the title of the test(s) if applicable.

A written test may be included as part of the selection process. Written tests that may be utilized are the Los Rios Assessment Exams and the ASVAB (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery Exam).

#### 17) Entry Exam (s): Oral

Does your program require an oral interview? If so, list the categories and the ratings value/percentage for each category. Oral interviews may also be rated as a Pass/Fail.

An oral Interview shall be administered by members of the JAC and one (1) representative from both the Personnel Office and working unit of the participating department. There will be up to eight (8) standardized questions; and up to two (2) will be tailored to each department. The questions will be the same for all participating departments' candidates taking part in the oral interview. Each question will be graded on a 1-5 scale (5 being the highest score).

Upon completion of the interview, scores will be tabulated and added to the prerequisite portion of the selection process for a final score. In the event of a tie, the two (2) departmental questions will be weighted to determine which of the candidates will be selected. If after comparison of scoring, it is determined that each candidate scored the same on the departmental questions, then the JAC will devise another objective tie-breaking method.

#### 18) Eligible Applicants—How do they enter your program?

Now that you have established an eligible pool of applicants, how will you create your rank list of applicants that are allowed to enter your program? #### **Response to Need Supplemental Narrative**

**Support services for apprentices:** American River College, participating civil service departments, GovOps, and SEIU Local 1000 are deeply committed to creating upward mobility opportunities for workers, increasing employee wages, and providing professional growth and development prospects for workers.

Focus groups will be formed to elicit apprentices' concerns, special challenges, and expectations about the program, in addition to methods or approaches they believe will contribute to their success. Early in the apprenticeship program implementation process, a focus group will be conducted to ascertain baseline qualitative feedback and solicit initial program impressions from apprentices. Surveys may include questions about program materials, mentors, instructors, state agency support, and other issues that might arise during the initial implementation stages of the program launch. The formal feedback process will conclude with a program exit survey that will ask participants to assess their experience and suggest any changes to the program that they believe might strengthen it.

Support services also will be offered to apprentices through ARC. As ARC students, apprentices will have access to several resources including the Tutoring Lab, the Business and Computer Information Science Departments' Computer Lab, academic counselors, professors, and other academic support programs and staff. Additionally, participants will have access to the apprenticeship tools and support SEIU Local 1000 established through subsequent successful apprenticeship initiative programs. These resources include online networking and collaboration, study areas and equipment for use, and the support of two "Success Coordinators" employed specifically to provide apprentices with personal, professional, and academic support. Apprentices will also attend bi-weekly study periods at SEIU Local 1000's administrative offices where they can meet with other participants for joint study sessions, ask questions, or discuss the program.

This proposal also includes the development of a mentorship program for participants. We acknowledge, though, that finding appropriate mentors for apprentices – in the classroom or on the job – who are willing to meaningfully engage with participants poses a significant challenge for the apprenticeship program. Absent appropriate incentive and direction, mentors within the industry may simply instruct and transfer skills, rather than listen and advocate for apprenticeship program participants. GovOps, state agencies, ARC, and SEIU Local 1000 will work together to identify qualified

mentor candidates who are willing to build meaningful relationships with apprenticeship participants.

*Hands-on training in apprenticeship:* Our apprenticeship program will provide handson training to incumbent workers in California state agencies via T&D assignments. Efforts will be made to tailor hands-on training to the day-to-day duties of participants' current occupations. The bulk of California's Financial Services positions serve three departments: the Economic Development Department (EDD), the Franchise Tax Board (FTB), and the recently created California Department of Tax and Fee Administration (CDTFA; a reorganization of the former Board of Equalization). The work plan included in this proposal details stakeholder efforts to coordinate apprentices' classroom instruction with exposure to concrete accounting tasks and work processes, reinforcing those skills students learn in the classroom. In addition, apprentices will have an opportunity to gain hands-on training through participation in SEIU Local 1000's tax preparation workshop for members. Lastly, future non-incumbent worker populations will be provided information about obtaining employment with the state and encouraged to apply for advancement opportunities within state civil service. Outreach efforts will serve to develop the Financial Services Apprenticeship Collaborative pipeline.

*The California Financial Services Apprenticeship Collaborative pipeline:* While there currently is no DAS approved financial services apprenticeship in place, the objective of the program sponsors identified in this grant application – SEIU Local 1000 and the State of California, represented by GovOps – is to create and establish a DAS approved apprenticeship program in 2018. Upon program creation, apprentices will have access to a new pipeline for future advancement and new career opportunities. Both parties view the establishment of a financial services apprenticeship program as a high priority in the coming year. ARC is committed to serving as the Local Educational Agency (LEA) for this non-traditional apprenticeship partnership.

The California Financial Services Apprenticeship Collaborative Joint Apprenticeship Committee (JAC), created as part of the work plan in this proposal, will administer and oversee the financial services apprenticeship program. As such, the apprenticeship will provide direct linkage to civil service employment as a defined pathway for successful program participants.

# **Project Management**

**Existing Partnerships:** ARC has a robust network of existing partnerships and extensive experience as the lead institution administering apprenticeship training programs and other career technical education (CTE) programs. ARC currently administers nearly \$10 million in combined state and federal CTE and apprenticeship grants. Our \$1.4 million Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education (CTE) Improvement Act federal grant supports 43 instructional programs, 7 across institution programs, 114 CTE certificates, and 72 CTE AA/AS degrees in 15 different CTE career pathways annually. Two CTE Enhancement Fund Grants support seven instructional programs and the other supports an Advanced Transportation and Renewables Regional Collaborative involving several colleges throughout the northern California region totaling over \$1 million; and a recent \$5 million federal Dept. of Labor American Apprenticeship Initiative Grant includes 5 colleges, WIBs and over 50 employers.

**Experience in apprenticeship training programs:** American River College has one of the largest Apprenticeship Training Programs in the state. ARC serves as the lead education agency for the Los Rios Community College District, developing new apprenticeship partnerships and instructional programs in collaboration with business and industry, community organizations, government agencies, faculty, and administrators, connecting the college with employers while developing and expanding internships, and work experience opportunities that serve to advance the college's mission. ARC is responsible for maintaining relationships with our four major trade union partners, including; the northern California Carpenter Training Centers, the Sheet Metal Workers, Iron Workers, and Electricians representing over 4,000 apprenticeship enrollments annually which generate over 100,000 hours of related supplemental instruction (RSI).

ARC currently belongs to the Registered Apprenticeship College Consortium (RAC) and California Apprenticeship Council (CAC). ARC sits on the Joint Apprenticeship Training Committee, holds membership with the California Apprenticeship Coordinators Association and is an approved college with the U.S. Department of Labor's program, the Registered Apprenticeship College Consortium (RACC). ARC also has a pre-apprenticeship program "Power Pathways" that is in its seventh year of operation, and is a model nationwide for pre-apprenticeship programs. This gives us excellent background for expanding and enhancing our pre-apprenticeship program.

In 2017, Service Employees International Union (SEIU Local 1000) and California Government Operations Agency (GovOps), working in support of Governor Brown's Civil Service Initiative, developed a civil service IT Apprenticeship Program with a networking focus – the first apprenticeship of its kind in the nation. This apprenticeship was created in response to high turnover and vacancy rates within civil service IT classifications, leading to costly contracting-out of civil service work. After launching the first and secon cohorts in 2017, program partners are now working to select their third cohort of IT apprentices. Another apprenticeship that exemplifies this shared commitment to upward mobility is the innovative LVN to RN Apprenticeship with San Joaquin Delta College, introduced in 2016. SEIU Local 1000's successful partnership with California Correctional Health Care Services on the LVN to RN bridge apprenticeship program has thus far indentured 36 apprentices.

**Regional Leadership:** ARC was recently accepted into the new California Online Education Initiative's Equity Cohort¹⁴, sponsored by the Community College Chancellor's Office. ARC is one of thirty-three California community colleges selected to participate in this flagship program. This effort aligns with our institutional strategic plan and commitment to social justice and equity due to its focus on:

- Culturally responsive teaching with a community of practice around online equity
- Name/gender identification for instruction and student support services, including counseling, tutoring, health services, etc.
- Additional online resources integrated into the online Canvas system for community building, student engagement, and collaboration
- Faculty engagement in collaborative course development using Online Education Resource materials
- Support for the development of a local, peer-faculty course review process to support equity and student success in online courses.

ARC is excited to be a part of this initiative and looks forward to the benefits it will bring to our students and campus community, including online delivery of Career Education programs.

*Major accomplishments – Aligning education and industry:* In 2015, ARC led a successful grant proposal for the Department of Labor (DOL) funding, one of only three funded entities in California and the only community college funded. Funding was granted to ARC by DOL due to the strength of our industry partnerships. ARC will be working with local, regional, and statewide employers to redesign curriculum to meet local industry needs. Participating employers have committed to providing instructional materials, technical support, and job interview skills. Industry also agreed to help this partnership secure instructors with advanced skills sets to deliver tailored curriculum to apprentices. ARC is on track to meet its grant target of 1,000 registered apprentices in the near future.

In 2015 ARC led another a successful grant proposal for California Apprenticeship Initiative (CAI) New and Innovative Grant funding. Like the DOL funding, ARC was awarded the grant as a result of the strength of its industry partnerships and proven track record of successful program development and implementation. Following a change in project administration and staffing, ARC successfully pivoted its program workplan to address incumbent workforce needs with regionally based advanced manufacturing industry partners. ARC expects to meet and possibly exceed its grant target of 40 registered apprentices in the coming months.

Leadership in visioning, identifying opportunities, and acquiring resources to develop training programs: ARC has operationalized the vision for regional cooperation in building career pathway partnerships, and has led the effort to identify opportunities and acquire resources to develop training programs. ARC's extensive experience as the lead education agency for the northern California trade-union training centers, as well as recent leadership of the advance transportation and advanced manufacturing regional consortiums, is evidence of this institutions success in implementing the framework for regional cooperation across industry sectors. These sector-based regional consortiums and career pathway partnerships support student success by both creating and expanding CTE, pre-apprenticeship, and apprenticeship programs that advance the college's mission and result in living-wage employment outcomes for students.

# Experience supports creation of new apprenticeship programs: ARC's

demonstrated record of success indicates that industry, colleges, and WIBs can work together when there is a common need. Our experience has taught us that collaboration efforts with our regional and statewide employer partners cannot and should not be overlooked. This apprenticeship program engages key stakeholders that have the potential to impact the future of apprenticeship programs as we know it. ARC, the State of California, and SEIU Local 1000 will create an education to career pathway that is truly new, innovative, and unlike any apprenticeship program that currently exists to date. ARC will:

- Launch the apprenticeship program using existing curriculum, then redesign and modularize college courses based on career-specific industry needs
- Utilize on-campus and SEIU Local 1000 expertise in recruitment and case management to strengthen the delivery and monitoring of the apprenticeship program
- Encourage industry and labor partners to expand the scope and reach of this program to achieve local, then regional, and eventually statewide scale and impact
- Work with the CCCCO's Office of Apprenticeship and Workforce Development and DAS to support the replication and expansion of this Registered Apprenticeship program to other civil service agencies and departments

# Data-driven evidence-based decision making & project management experience:


ARC is committed to data-driven and evidenced-based decision making. We demonstrate this commitment by managing projects with a strong emphasis on data collection, performance, measurement, reporting, and analysis. ARC offers a significant variety of Career Education certificates and degrees. All of the college's program offerings reflect the technical and professional competencies needed to meet employment standards and they prepare students for external licensure and certification. ARC offers 58 occupational degree programs and six apprenticeship degrees. ARC also offers 104 CCCCO approved occupational certificates, eight apprenticeship certificates, and 157 occupational department certificates.

Decisions to create new programs in each of these areas are evidenced-based. New occupational and apprenticeship CE certificate and degree programs are developed based on recommendations from employers, advisory committees, professional organizations, apprenticeship programs, and our faculty. With the assistance of advisory committees, employers, and students, faculty develop and refine measurable student learning objectives (SLOs) for courses and programs. ARC's Career Education program development process includes evaluation of labor market data and employer surveys, availability of facilities, and resources. The Los Rios Community College District (LRCCD) Program Placement Council (PPC) must first approve certificates and degrees before they are announced and reviewed by the North Far North Regional Consortium for demonstrated need and unnecessary regional duplication. Once they are on the PPC approval list and receive North Far North Regional Consortium approval, programs go through the entire curriculum process. This rigorous program approval process promotes the creation of high quality programs that are responsive and forward thinking.

The organizational chart illustrates that the college is committed to this program by placing it within the organizational structure. The California Apprenticeship Initiative – Apprenticeship Grant Program management will be at American River College's main campus. The project Director will be Josef Preciado, Director of the California Apprenticeship Initiative. The Director reports directly to the Associate Vice President for Workforce and Economic Development role. Mr. Preciado has a Master degree in Public Policy and Public Administration and 15 years of experience developing, implementing, and leading a range of projects and programs in higher education. As the Director, Mr. Preciado will have full authority for budgetary responsibilities; for hiring and supervising the project's staff, including the coordinator, designated counselors, and other staff. Mr. Preciado and members of the CAI project team will also work closely with the Dean of Business and Computer Science, instructional faculty, the Dean of Career Education and Workforce Development, and LRCCD Budget Office to ensure successful project implementation and reporting.




Table 7. American River College Apprenticehship Governance Chart

*Outreach strategies:* The JAC will reach out to Financial Services industry associations in the greater Sacramento area. More specifically the JAC will target groups committed to creating a more diverse and inclusive financial services workforce. Collaboration with regional and national professional minority associations that have chapters in Northern California will also serve to inform potential apprentices of this opportunity. Finally, ARC will advertise the apprenticeship to current students, Veteran populations, disproportionately impacted (DI) communities, and other target groups.

As the state agency that oversees CalHR, GovOps will disseminate apprenticeship program information to recruit potential apprentices. Hosting program information on CalHR's webpage will expose thousands of incumbent and non-incumbent workers this program. The CalCareers website is another electronic resource that explains the civil service hiring process and allows individuals to research financial services classifications and vacancies. Finally, CalHR holds recruitment fairs at local community colleges and will outreach to prospective participants at these events.

SEIU Local 1000 has a number of worksite-based networks and communication webs (face-to-face and virtual modalities) that rapidly disseminate information and engage participants. These resources are ideal for performing outreach and sharing information about upward mobility opportunities with incumbent workers. The JAC will leverage Local 1000's ability to publicize the apprenticeship program and the opportunity for upward mobility. Local 1000 will also solicit mentor participation.

**Sharing best practices:** The JAC will participate in California Apprenticeship Council (CAC) quarterly meetings and share lessoned learned with other LEAs. JAC members will also attend relevant Career Education conferences and the semi-annual California Conference on Apprenticeship to broadly communicate this information and learn from others across the state.

The JAC will outreach to experts in both the adult education and career education fields. - A. "District" is of the opinion that "Service Provider" has the necessary qualifications, experience and abilities to provide services in connection with the business of the "District".
- B. "Service Provider" is agreeable to providing services to "District", on the terms and conditions as set out in this Agreement.

**IN CONSIDERATION OF** THE MATTERS DESCRIBED ABOVE AND OF THE MUTUAL BENEFITS AND OBLIGATIONS SET FORTH IN THE Agreement, the receipt and sufficiency of which consideration is hereby acknowledged, the parties to this Agreement agree as follows:

### Scope of Work

"Service Provider" agrees to provide "District" with services of supervision and field instruction to Master of Social Work Student Interns from local universities assigned to RSCCD Child Development Services department and; provide mental health consulting services, coordination, record keeping and documentation to ensure compliance with grants in the Child Development Services department. "Service Provider" will provide all, materials, tools, and other items necessary to complete the contracted services.

#### **Term of Agreement**

The term of this Agreement will begin September 11, 2018 and will remain in full force and effect until June 30, 2019.

### **Performance**

Service Provider will perform its Services hereunder in a professional manner, using the degree of care and skill ordinarily exercised by, and consistent with, the current professional practices and standards of a professional practicing in California.

#### **Compensation**

"District" shall pay "Service Provider" \$50.00 (fifty dollars and no cents) per hour not to exceed \$24,000.00 (twenty four thousand dollars and no cents) for completing contract services.

# **Invoicing and Payments**

"Service Provider" shall submit monthly invoices to "District" for services performed in the immediate prior month. Service Provider's invoices shall be in such a form and format with substantiated data as requested by "District".

Within 30 (thirty) days of receipt of Service Provider's invoices, "District" will make payment to "Service Provider" of undisputed amounts of the Service Agreement price due for services. "District" may withhold or deduct form amounts otherwise due to Service Provider hereunder if Service Provider fails to perform material obligations to be performed on its part under this Service Agreement, with the amounts withheld or deducted being released after Service Provider has fully cured such failure of performance, less costs, damages or losses sustained by "District".

# **Independent Contractor**

It is expressly agreed that "Service Provider" is acting as an independent contractor and not as an employee in providing the Services hereunder. "Service Provider" and "District" acknowledge that this Agreement does not create a partnership or joint venture between them.

# **Termination**

Either Party may terminate this Agreement, with or without cause upon thirty (30) days written notice served upon the other Party. All notices shall be hand delivered, sent by private overnight mail service, or sent by registered or certified U.S. mail and addressed to the Party to receive such notice.

Notices shall be sent to the RSCCD address, attention Vice Chancellor Business Operations/Fiscal Services with a copy of notice to the Executive Director of Child Development Services.

In the event of early termination, Contractor shall be entitled to receive just and equitable compensation only for costs incurred prior to receipt of notice of termination and for the Services satisfactorily rendered as of the date of termination and delivered to the "District".

### **Confidentiality Clause**

All work completed on behalf of District by Service Provider will be held confidential and confidentiality shall survive termination or expiration of Agreement.

# **Indemnification**

"Service Provider" agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold "District", its officers, agents, employees, and volunteers, harmless from and against all loss, cost, and expense, including reasonable attorney fees, arising out of any liability or claim of liability, sustained or claimed to have been sustained, arising out of the activities, or the performance or nonperformance of obligations under this agreement, of the indemnifying party, or those of any of its officers, agents, employees, or volunteers. The provisions of this article do not apply to any damage or loss caused solely by the negligence or intentional acts of the "District".

# **Insurance**

"Service Provider" shall, at its sole cost and expense, procure and maintain, for the duration of this Contract, insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder

a) Commercial general liability insurance in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 general aggregate. The District, its Board of Trustees, and their officials, employees, and agents shall be named as additional insureds by endorsement. There shall be no limitations on the coverage afforded to the District, its Board of Trustees, and their officials, employees, and agents.

# **Entire Agreement**

This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the Parties and there are no representations, inducements or other provisions other than those expressed herein. All changes, additions or deletions to this Agreement shall be in writing and executed by the authorized representatives of both Parties.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Parties hereto certify that they have read and understand all the terms and conditions contained herein and have caused this Agreement to be executed as of the day that both Parties have signed the Agreement.

# BACKGROUND

The Rancho Santiago Community College District and its colleges – Santa Ana College and Santiago Canyon College – are proud to have auxiliary charitable foundations that support the district and each of the colleges:

Rancho Santiago Community College District Foundation Santa Ana College Foundation Santiago Canyon College Foundation

In 1998, the Rancho Santiago Community College District entered into a Master Agreement with each of the college foundations - Santa Ana College Foundation and Santiago Canyon College Foundation – to outline the relationship between the district and each foundation.

On August 7, 2018, during a review of the oversight of the RSCCD Foundation, the Board Policy Committee recommended the development of a Master Agreement template to formalize the relationship between RSCCD and each of the three foundations.

# ANALYSIS

Working with the district's General Counsel, a Master Agreement template was created that can be used for each of the three foundations.

# MASTER AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN THE RANCHO SANTIAGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT AND THE (NAME) FOUNDATION

This Agreement is made and entered into this _____day of _____, 2018, by and between the Rancho Santiago Community College District, hereinafter referred to as the District, and the (Name) Foundation, hereinafter referred to as the Foundation, an auxiliary organization of the District established and operated as an integral part of the District, in accordance with Education Code section 72670, *et seq.*, and shall supersede all prior agreements.

#### I PURPOSE

The administration by the Foundation of the functions and activities described herein, instead of administration by and through the District, is deemed to be more effective in accomplishing those functions and activities than would be possible under the District's usual governmental, budgetary, purchasing, and other fiscal procedures.

# II AREAS OF SERVICE

The Foundation, through amendments to this Agreement and consistent with the agreement of the District, may administer those functions and activities consistent with the California Code of Regulations, California Education Code, District policies and its mission as defined in its bylaws.

# III LIMITATION OF AUTHORITY AND RESPONSIBILITY OF FOUNDATION ORGANIZATIONS (Title 5, California Code of Regulations, Section 59257 (j) (3))

The Foundation shall only engage in those programs, services, functions and activities that are consistent with state and federal laws, and with the policies, rules, and regulations, which have been or may be adopted by the Board of Trustees of the District.

All services, programs, functions and activities that may be undertaken by the Foundation shall be implemented for the general benefit of the District. The Foundation may undertake services and programs in order:

- To generate and provide resources that allow the District to carry on educationally-related activities that may not be funded by the State;
- To establish or strengthen partnerships with private industry or other entities where a nonprofit corporation is required or facilitates said partnership with the District.
- To benefit from the experience and expertise of the Foundation.

Donations and/or gifts to the Foundation shall be accepted as authorized by the District's policies and regulations.

# IV USE OF FACILITIES

The Foundation may occupy and use the District facilities and property only for those services and functions that are consistent with the policies, rules, and regulations, which have been or may be adopted by the Board of Trustees of the District. All assigned facilities may be shared with other programs, including instructional programs of the District.

The Foundation may occupy and use the following facilities in accordance with the District policies and regulations:

Board room and conference rooms located at the District's operations center.

The right to use any of the District's facilities or equipment included in this Agreement or amendments shall cease upon written notice to the Foundation and the Board of Trustees by the District Chancellor that the facilities are needed for the exclusive use of the District.

#### V REIMBURSEMENT FOR SERVICES AND FACILITIES

On an annual basis, the Chancellor shall determine the amount the Foundation shall reimburse the District for costs associated with the Foundation's use of District facilities and property, District employees on loan or providing services to the Foundation, and any other costs paid by the District on behalf of the Foundation.

#### VI AUDIT

An independent CPA firm will audit the Foundation. The Foundation may select their own CPA firm or select the same firm used by the District. The Foundation shall be responsible for all costs associated with its independent audit.

# VII COVENANT

During the term of this Agreement, the Foundation agrees to maintain its existence and to operate in accordance with Sections 72670-72682 of the California Education Code and with Sections 59250-59276 of the California Code of Regulations, Title 5, as well as the District's policies and regulations.

# VIII

#### **RIGHT OF ENTRY**

It is understood and agreed that at any time the District, officers, employees and agents shall have the right to enter described facilities or any part thereof for the purpose of examination or supervision and to inspect books and records.

# IX DISPOSITION OF EARNINGS

Income generated by the Foundation in excess of costs, Board of Directors designated reserves, and appropriate provision for its annual budget shall be used for the general benefit of the District as determined by the Foundation's Board of Directors.

# X GOOD STANDING

The Foundation shall remain in good standing with the District or the District shall, at its sole discretion, have the right to terminate this Agreement and shall have the option to require the Foundation to cease any or all of its activities.

# XI EXPENDITURES FOR INDIRECT COSTS

If the Foundation administers a state or federally-sponsored program, it shall reimburse the District for indirect costs associated with the performance of services by the District for the Foundation relating to said program. Such reimbursement will take into consideration the District's indirect cost rate and the approved indirect cost allocation, if any, of the state or federal program award.

#### XII MAINTENANCE AND OPERATING EXPENSES

The District shall provide maintenance and custodial services in the same manner as it provides for its own offices. The Foundation agrees that it will keep and maintain facilities and equipment it uses in a clean and orderly condition.

### XII REAL PROPERTY MATTERS

The Foundation's Board of Directors shall not enter into any contract or other business arrangement involving real property without prior approval of the District Chancellor or designee in accordance with District procedures and regulations.

### XIV

# FINANCIAL REPORT

The Foundation shall report to the District on its financial operations through monthly financial reports submitted to the Vice Chancellor, Business Operations and Fiscal Services.

#### XV

# SIGNS, FIXTURES, AND EQUIPMENT

During the term of this Agreement, the Foundation shall have the right to place and attach fixtures, signs, and equipment in or upon facilities as authorized by the Chancellor in writing as to number, size, and locations. Fixtures, signs, or equipment so erected, placed, or attached by the Foundation shall be and remain the property of the Foundation and be removed therefrom by the Foundation upon termination of this agreement.

### XVI THIRD PARTY AGREEMENTS BY THE FOUNDATION

The Foundation shall not enter into any contract that would obligate the District, its facilities, equipment, or personnel without the prior written approval of the District. Any such contracts must be consistent with the District's policies and regulations.

# XVII SUBMISSION OF ANNUAL PROGRAM AND BUDGET

The Foundation's Board of Directors shall submit its program and budget for the next fiscal year to the District Chancellor for his/her approval on or before May 15 of each year. Should the District Chancellor determine that any program or appropriation planned by the Foundation is not consistent with the policies of the Board of Trustees, the program or appropriation shall not be implemented. Further, should a program or appropriation which had received approval, upon review, be determined by the District Chancellor to be operating outside of the scope of the policies of the Board of Trustees, then that program or appropriation shall be discontinued by direction of the District Chancellor until further review is accomplished and an appropriate adjustment is made.

# XVIII INSURANCE, INDEMNIFICATION, AND RESTORATION

The District shall provide for the Foundation all risk liability coverage under the terms and conditions of the District's all risk blanket policy. Further, the District will extend its directors and officers errors and omissions coverage to include the Foundation board members, officers, and managers.

In the event that the District is unable to maintain such coverage for the Foundation, the District shall provide thirty (30) days notification to the Foundation of the District policy cancellation. In the event of such notice of cancellation by the District, the Foundation shall secure the appropriate coverage under its own name.

The Foundation shall be included in the District's insurance policies for all of its regular functions. When special events are sponsored by the Foundation, separate insurance coverage may be required by the District.

The Foundation agrees to indemnify, defend, and save harmless the District, its officers, agents, and employees from any and all loss, damage, or liability that may be suffered or incurred by the District, its officers, agents, and employees caused by, arising out of, or in any way connected with the use of the described facilities by the Foundation or in connection with this Agreement, provided that the loss, damage, or liability does not arise from the intentional or negligent acts or omissions of the District, its officers, agents, or employees.

Upon termination of this Agreement, the District shall have the option to require the Foundation, at the Foundation's own expense and risk, to restore the facilities as nearly as possible to the condition existing prior to the execution of the Agreement. But if the Foundation shall fail to do so within ninety (90) days after the District exercises said option, the District may restore the property at the risk of the Foundation, and all costs and expenses of such removal or restoration shall be paid by the Foundation upon demand of District. The District shall have the right to exercise this option within thirty (30) days after the expiration of this Agreement, but not thereafter.

# XIX NON-ASSIGNABILITY

This Agreement is not assignable by the Foundation, either in whole or in part, nor shall the Foundation permit anyone else to use the described facilities or any part thereof without the prior written permission of the Chancellor.

# XX DISTRIBUTION OF ASSETS UPON CESSATION

Upon cessation of the operations of the Foundation under this Agreement, unless extended or renewed, the net assets of the Foundation resulting or arising from this Agreement shall be either transferred to the District or expended for the benefit of the District.

# XXI NOTICES

All notices herein required to be given, or which may be given by either party to the other, shall be deemed to have been fully given when made in writing and received by the Foundation's Executive Director, Foundation's Board of Directors, or the Chancellor.

# **BP 2015 Student Member**

### Reference(s):

Education Code Section 72023.5

The Board shall include one student member. The term of office shall be one year commencing June 1.

The student member shall be enrolled in and maintain a minimum of six (6) semester units in the District at the time of nomination and throughout the term of service. The student member is not required to give up employment with the District. The student shall maintain the standards of scholarship and eligibility criteria enumerated in Administrative Regulation 2105.

The student member shall be seated with the Board and shall be recognized as a full member of the Board at meetings. The student member is entitled to participate in discussion of issues and receive all materials presented to members of the Board (except for closed session). The student member shall be entitled to any mileage allowance necessary to attend board meetings and reimbursement for approved travel (see BP 2735) to the same extent as publicly elected trustees.

The student member shall have the privilege to cast an advisory vote, although the vote shall not be included in determining the vote required to carry any measure before the board. The student member may, prior to the vote on any item before the Board, advise the President of the Board that the student member would like to cast his/her vote first as a means of providing advice to the Board.

The student member shall not be liable for any acts of the Governing Board. The student member shall be bound by Code of Ethics/Standards of Practice (BP 2715).

On or before May 15 of each year, the Board shall consider whether to afford the student member any of the following privileges:

- The privilege to make and second motions;
- The privilege to attend closed sessions on matters concerning student discipline;
- The privilege to receive compensation for meeting attendance and the amount of that compensation, up to the amount prescribed by Education Code Section 72425;
- The privilege to serve a term commencing on May 15;
- The privilege to serve on Board committees;
- The privilege to cast an advisory vote;
- The privilege to attend conferences like any other member of the Board of Trustees.

# **BP 3580 Use of Unmanned Aircraft Systems**

Unmanned aircraft systems ("UAS"), including model aircrafts, drones and any other devices flown and controlled remotely, will be operated on or over district property in accordance with Federal Aviation Administration regulations, applicable federal, state, and local law or regulation, and District procedures. The District will establish an administrative procedure to ensure compliance with those legal obligations and to reduce risks to safety, security and privacy. The operation of UAS on District property shall be limited to business or instructional use only. The District prohibits all other uses of UAS on or over District property or at District sponsored events without prior authorization.

# **BP 4020 Program, Curriculum and Course Development**

U.S. Department of Education regulations on the Integrity of Federal Student Financial Aid Programs under Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended

The programs and curricula of the District shall be of high quality, relevant to community and student needs, and evaluated regularly to ensure quality and currency. To that end, the Chancellor shall establish procedures for the development and review of all curricular offerings, including their establishment, modification, or discontinuance.

Furthermore, these procedures shall include:

- appropriate involvement of the faculty and Academic Senate in all processes;
- regular review and justification of programs and course descriptions;
- opportunities for training for persons involved in aspects of curriculum development.
- consideration of job market and other related information for vocational and occupational programs.

All new programs and program discontinuances shall be approved by the Board.

All new programs shall be submitted to the California Community Colleges Chancellors Office for approval as required.

Individual degree-applicable credit courses offered as part of a permitted educational program shall be approved by the Board. Non-degree-applicable credit and degree-applicable courses that are not part of an existing approved program must satisfy the conditions authorized by Title 5 regulations and shall be approved by the Board.

Courses of instruction and educational programs, when applicable, shall be articulated with proximate high schools, four-year colleges and universities under the direction of the District Board of Trustees. The colleges will maintain a common curriculum. Each college shall have the flexibility to develop curriculum that best meets the needs of its students and the community it serves.

## **Credit Hour**

Consistent with federal regulations applicable to federal financial aid eligibility, the District shall assess and designate each of its programs as either a "credit hour" program or a "clock hour" program.

The Chancellor will establish procedures which prescribe the definition of "credit hour" consistent with applicable federal regulations, as they apply to community college districts.

The Chancellor shall establish procedures to assure that curriculum at the District complies with the definition of "credit hour" or "clock hour," where applicable. The Chancellor shall also establish procedure for using a clock-to-credit hour conversion formula to determine whether a credit hour program is eligible for federal financial aid. The conversion formula is used to determine whether such a credit-hour program has an appropriate minimum number of clock hours of instruction for each credit hour it claims.

Title 5 (§55256,5) provides specific hour to unit ratios for Cooperative Work Experience. The ratios are 75 hours of paid work experience for 1 unit of credit and 60 hours of non-paid work experience for 1 unit of credit.

The Code of Federal Regulations defines clock hour programs (34 CFR 668). Clock hour programs are required to use the formula for calculating units of credit that is contained within the code.

The Colleges grant the degrees of Bachelor's in Science (Santa Ana College), Associate in Arts, and Associate in Science to those students who have completed the subject requirements for graduation and who have maintained a 2.0 average in subjects attempted. Students must also complete the general education residency and competency requirements set forth in Title 5 regulations.

Students may be awarded a Certificate of Achievement upon successful completion of a program consisting of at least 12 semester units and has received California Community College Chancellor's Office approval. The Certificate of Achievement must include degree-applicable coursework designed as a pattern of learning experiences designed to develop certain capabilities that may be oriented to career or general education.

Students may be awarded a Certificate of Proficiency upon successful completion of a program consisting of less than 18 unites that has been approved by the Colleges' Curriculum and Instruction Council.

The Chancellor shall establish procedures to determine degree and certificate requirements that include appropriate involvement of the college curriculum committee. The procedures shall assure that graduation requirements are published in the Colleges' catalogs and included in other resources that are convenient for students.

Nursing students who have already earned a baccalaureate or higher degree from a regionally accredited institution of higher learning are not required to complete any general education requirements that may be required for an associate degree. Instead, these students only need to complete the coursework necessary for licensing as a registered nurse.

If a waiting list for the program exists, the District shall consider length of time on the waiting list and prerequisite grades when screening nursing students.

If no waiting list exists or if the waiting list is depleted, the District shall consider all of the following when screening nursing students:

- Academic degrees or diplomas, or relevant certificates, held by the applicant;
- Grade point average in and completion of relevant coursework;
- Diagnostic assessment test results;
- Life experiences or special circumstances of an applicant;
- Any relevant work or volunteer experience; and
- Proficiency or advanced level coursework in languages other than English.

Loan assumption agreements may be awarded to individuals who at a minimum possess a baccalaureate degree in nursing or a field related to nursing who have agreed to teach nursing on a full-time or part-time basis commencing not more than 12 months after receiving a loan assumption award. The loan assumption program is referred to as the State Nursing Assumption Program of Loans for Education (SNAPLE). The loan assumption agreement will be considered no longer effective and deemed terminated if a program participant fails to complete a minimum of three academic years of teaching on a full-time basis or the equivalent on a part-time basis.

# **BP 4231 Grade Changes**

Reference(s):

Education Code Sections 76224 and 76232 Title 5 Section 55025

The Chancellor shall implement procedures to assure the accuracy and integrity of all grades awarded by faculty. The procedures shall include, but not necessarily be limited to, the following:

- Assurance that in the absence of mistake, bad faith, fraud or incompetence, the grades awarded by faculty shall be final.
- Procedures for students to challenge the correctness of a grade.
- The installation of security measures to protect grade records and grade storage systems from unauthorized access.
- Limitations on access to grade records and grade storage systems.
- Discipline for students or staff who are found to have gained access to grade records without proper authorization or to have changed grades without proper authorization.
- Notice to students, faculty, transfer institutions, accreditation agencies and law enforcement agencies if unauthorized access to grade records and grade storage systems is discovered to have occurred.

# **BP 4300 Field Trips and Excursions**

Reference(s): Title 5 Section 55220 Government Code Section 11139.8

The Chancellor shall establish procedures that regulate the use of District funds for student travel and attendance at conferences and other activities that are performed as a class assignment or co-curricular activity.

The District may pay for expenses of students participating in a field trip or excursion with auxiliary, grant or categorical program funds if the funds are used consistently with the funding source. The expenses of instructors, chaperones, and other personnel traveling with students may also be paid from District funds.

Students and staff shall at all times adhere to the standards of conduct applicable to conduct on campus.

# **BP 4410 Educational Research**

The chancellor will establish procedures for the approval of educational research projects that are conducted by all employees for whom the educational research in question is not within their job responsibilities, as well as for those not employed by the District. The procedures shall address the rights of any human research subjects, specifically students and staff, which includes but is not limited to confidentiality, and shall ensure that the research is of a quality that the District will support.

## Introduction

#### **Purpose of Request**

The Rancho Santiago Community College District (RSCCD) is issuing a Request for Proposals (RFP) for the services of an Executive Search Firm to assist the Board of Trustees of the District in identifying potential candidates for the position of Chancellor and CEO of the RSCCD.

### Rancho Santiago Community College District

The Rancho Santiago Community College District (RSCCD) is one of the largest community college districts in the state of California. The district covers one quarter of the land area of Orange County, registers an enrollment of more than 50,000 students, is one of the largest employers in the region with more than 4,000 employees, and has a budget of approximately \$600,000,000. RSCCD has eight major facilities locations in local communities, including the main college campuses of Santa Ana College and Santiago Canyon College, as well as the Orange County Sheriff's Regional Training Academy, the Fire Technology Academy, the Digital Media Center, the District Headquarters, and several satellite centers.

Through its two colleges and other educational sites, the district offers a comprehensive range of educational activities encompassing transfer education, career technical education, basic skills development, adult education, community education, apprenticeship training, and a variety of economic development programs and services, including the Orange County Small Business Development Center, the Institute for Workforce Development, and the Center for International Trade Development.

## **Services Required**

- Perform the initial assessment of the qualifications of interested candidates.
- Provide support for the interviews, reference checking, and other elements of the recruiting and hiring process.

## **Timeline and Submission of Responses**

#### **RFP Schedule**

It is estimated that the contract for services will begin the week of October 29, 2018 or thereabouts and will terminate no later than June 1, 2019.

The RFP will be issued on Wednesday, September 12, 2018. Responses will be due no later than noon PST on Monday, October 10, 2018. Responses received later than that date and time will not be considered. The RSCCD assumes no liability for late delivery or receipt of responses.

The responses will be evaluated pursuant to the criteria set forth in the RFP. Notification of selection or non-selection will be communicated to all respondents who submitted conforming responses by the due date.

#### **Proposal Requirements**

#### **Community College Agreement: Employee**

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the University of Redlands (herein referred to as "Redlands") and Rancho Santiago Community College District (herein referred to as "MOU Partner") documents the commitment of both parties to enter into a mutually beneficial education and training agreement.

Through this agreement, Redlands offers discounted tuition, customized education and training opportunities, special events and other benefits to benefit-eligible employees, spouses and domestic partners of MOU Partner.

#### **Discounts for Employees**

School of Business and School of Education Programs

MOU Partner employees, spouses and domestic partners of employees shall receive the tuition discount of 15% for programs offered at any of the Redlands regional campuses.

School of Continuing Studies Certificates and Workshops

MOU Partner employees, spouses and domestic partners of employees shall receive the tuition discount of 10% for MOU Partner-sponsored programs offered by the School of Continuing Studies and delivered on-site at MOU Partner facilities.

**On-site Programs:** On-site programs are delivered at MOU Partner facilities, at the request of MOU Partner. MOU Partner agrees to provide classroom/computer lab facilities as required for particular courses, programs and degrees, subject to Redlands approval. Redlands shall set minimum enrollment requirements. Should minimum enrollment requirements not be met (or subsequent to the start of the program, fall below minimum requirements), students may be offered the opportunity to register at another Redlands regional facility, and discount rate would be adjusted according to the terms listed above. Additional restrictions may apply.

**Program Delivery:** Each course and program has unique requirements, and prospective students should examine all requirements before registering.

**Academic Policies:** All policies stated in the current *University of Redlands Catalog* apply. These policies pertain to graduation requirements, academic honesty, withdrawal, re-enrollment, grade disputes and other policies important to all students undertaking degree work at the University of Redlands.

**Application, Admission and Registration Requirements:** Where applicable, students must meet all current application, admission and registration requirements.

**Verification of Employment Status:** Redlands may, at any time, require verification of current employee status of any MOU Partner student receiving the above listed discounts. Verification must be supplied directly from the MOU Partner, not the student.

**Transcripts:** Where applicable, prospective undergraduate students must provide official transcripts from each college or university ever attended. Prospective graduate students must provide an official transcript from each institution from which they earned a degree.

**Tuition and Fees:** Tuition and fees are charged according to the *University of Redlands Catalog* in effect at the time of the student's enrollment. Tuition and fees are subject to change.

**Payments and Billing Statements**: Students enrolled in the School of Business or School of Education are billed directly by Redlands for tuition and fees. Students are responsible for submitting payment within 45 days and are solely liable for payment of all tuition and fees regardless of financial aid or MOU Partner tuition remission/reimbursement policies. Students enrolled in the School of Continuing Studies are required to pay for courses before attending their first class.

**MOU Expiration:** The initial term of this agreement is (3) years, and shall automatically renew thereafter for successive one year periods. Either party may terminate this agreement upon 30 days written notice, which termination may be affected any time after the initial three-year term.

**Indemnification:** MOU Partner shall defend, indemnify and hold Redlands, its officers, agents and employees harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense (including reasonable attorney's fees), or claims for injury or damages arising out of the performance of this MOU but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorney's fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligence or intentional acts of omissions of MOU Partner, its officers, agents or employees.

Redlands shall defend, indemnify and hold MOU Partner, its officers, agents and employees harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense (including reasonable attorney's fees), or claims for injury or damages arising out of the performance of this MOU but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorney's fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligence or intentional acts of omissions of Redlands, its officers, agents or employees.

**Entire Agreement:** This MOU contains all of the agreements and understandings relating to this educational partnership and obligations between MOU Partner and Redlands in connection therewith and neither party and no agent thereof has made or is making, and neither party in executing and delivering this MOU is relying upon, any warranties, promises or agreements, except as set forth in this MOU. All understandings and agreements heretofore between MOU Partner and Redlands relating to educational programs are merged in this MOU, which alone fully and completely express their agreement.
